ORIENTAL QUESTION DISCUSSED AT OTTAWA

DARK BLUE VICTORIOUS IN CLASSIC BOAT RACE BETWEEN UNIVERSITIES

Oxford Wins Boat Race and also Wrests Track Honors from Cambridge

LONDON, March 24.—This was Oxford's day today for Oxford University not only won the big classic boat race on the Thames at Putney but also took the honors at the fifty-ninth annual track meet against Cambridge.

PUTNEY, March 24.—Oxford University crew defeated the Cambridge eight over a four and a half mile course from Putney to Mortlake on the Thames River.

This morning Cambridge was slightly favored in the betting although the crews were pretty evenly matched.

This is the first victory for Oxford since the war, Cambridge having won the three last consecutive races. The first race between the two universities was rowed at Henley in 1829.

INCREASE IN IMMIGRATION

Fifty One Per Cent More Arrive in February This Year Than Last

OTTAWA, Mar. 24.—There was a 51 per cent increase in immigration into Canada for February over the corresponding month of last year. The increase is from Great Britain and other countries, while the number from the United States has fallen off. The total immigration for the month was 3,290 as against 2,183 for February 1922. From Great Britain came 1356 as against 569 a year ago.

MR. ARNOLD EXPLAINS ABOUT HIS EVIDENCE

JUMPED FROM GERMAN LINER AT NEW YORK

NEW YORK, March 24.—Five men, believed to have been stowaways jumped from the liner Emden when she came in from Hamburg, swam in the darkness for an hour when they became exhausted and were rescued. They will be deported.

ONE HORSE KILLED JOCKEYS INJURED IN CRUELEST RACE

LIVERPOOL, March 24.—The Grand National steeplechase, known as the "cruelest race in the world," resulted fatally yesterday to at least one horse. Two jockeys were hurt, while 21 of the 28 starters fell. One horse broke his leg in taking the Beecher's brook and had to be killed.

URNS DOWN U.S. ORDERS

Sheffield Firm Shows Resistance at Fordney Tariff by Action

LONDON, Mar. 24.—The Westminster Gazette says the Sheffield Forge and Rolling Mills declined the American offer for 300,000 special steel bars. The order was originally intended for the Ruhr plants but could not be filled by them.

It was stated that in view of the lack of consideration shown by America to Sheffield as instanced by the Fordney tariff aimed at Sheffield special steel, local firms were not prepared to hold up orders of English customers in favor of American competitors.

AGED WOMAN IS SHOT IRISH RAIDING PARTY

Irregulars Attacked Outposts of National Troops Near Mullingar

DUBLIN, Mar. 24.—An eighty year old woman and her daughter was shot dead yesterday at Aughfin, Longford, by a raiding party.

A mine wrecked lobby of a motion picture house in Dublin and an outburst of rifle and machine gun firing followed. One man was seriously hurt.

MULLINGAR, Mar. 24.—Irregulars today attacked an outpost of national troops quartered at a railway station near the town's reservoir. The invaders were repulsed after prolonged rifle and machine gun fire. The Nationals suffered no casualties.

Negotiations With Japan for Modification of Treaty Under Which Immigrants Come Here

OTTAWA, March 24.—Canada is negotiating with Japan for a modification of the immigration treaty between the two countries under which not more than 400 Japanese laborers are allowed to emigrate to Canada each year. Premier Mackenzie King stated in the House of Commons yesterday.

Mr. King said the treaty provided that if an unreasonable number of Japanese entered Canada, steps could be taken to prevent them, but a careful check showed that less than 400 yearly had entered during the last ten years.

W. G. McQuarrie, member for New Westminster, said the Japanese government might keep faith but individual Japanese did not. More were entering Canada illegally than legally.

The treaty was subject to the Canada Immigration Act and the government should use its right to prevent the entry of people whose habits and climatic nativity made them undesirable, said Mr. McNeill of Comox-Alberni who favored abrogation of the Canadian-Japanese treaty, if that would stop Japanese immigration. Mr. Neill said he did not fear that Japan would stop trading with Canada if the treaty were denounced. He pointed out that there was a clause in the Act providing that a Jap holding one hundred acres of land could bring in ten Japs but nothing was specified as to how many times these ten could be imported. If the Japanese government was sincerely anxious to enforce the spirit of the treaty, why did they not investigate stowaways as they arrived in Canada and why did not the Dominion government also investigate stowaways.

LOCAL MEN AT OTTAWA

Meeting With Government Expected to Take Place on Monday

OTTAWA, March 23.—The Prince Rupert delegation arrived here safely on Wednesday and had a conference with Fred Stork, Prince Rupert's member, and at once an effort was made to get in touch with the ministers to try to arrange a meeting at which the local men might state their case. The ministers were up to the eyes in the work of the session and it was at once found that there would be delays. It is expected, however, that an interview will take place Monday.

ROBERT M. TAYLOR IS DISTRICT ENGINEER

VICTORIA, March 24.—Robert M. Taylor, now assistant district engineer at Prince Rupert has been promoted to district engineer for the Prince Rupert district.

COLONIZATION VOTE PASSES THE COMMONS

OTTAWA, March 24.—A vote of \$600,000 for the Canadian colonization scheme carried in the House of Commons yesterday after considerable discussion.

STORK TOOK PART IN FISHERIES FIGHT FOR OTTAWA RECOGNITION

OTTAWA, March 24.—Fred Stork, M.P., took part in a debate this week in connection with the fisheries commission report and the fight the commission is having to secure recognition of the report, especially from members of the permanent staff of the fisheries department. The commission is alive and on the job all the time and has already scored heavily in securing the adoption of its recommendation for the reduction of Japanese licenses for forty per cent as recommended.

NEW UNION STEAMER LAUNCHED YESTERDAY

Gardona is Name of Vessel Which Will Replace Chelohsin in Vancouver-Prince Rupert Service

VANCOUVER, March 24.—The Union Steamship Co.'s new steamer Gardona, being built for the Vancouver-Prince Rupert service, was launched yesterday on the Clyde River, Scotland. Late in May the steamer will arrive in Vancouver via the Panama Canal and will replace the steamer Chelohsin which will go to the logging camp run.

MARQUIS WINS BOXING MATCH

Beats a Scottish Miner in First Round of Amateur Championship Series

GLASGOW, March 24.—The Marquis of Glasgow, a prominent University boxer, last night defeated a miner, J. Henderson, on points on the first round of the Scottish amateur middle-weight championships.

PRINCE GEORGE TAX RATE FIFTY MILLS

PRINCE GEORGE, Mar. 24.—The city council has adopted a 50-Mill tax rate for the year 1923, an increase of 15 mills over last year. There was a special meeting of the council this week to discuss the matter. Many ratepayers were present.

SEMI-FINALS IN FOOTBALL

Westham and Bolton Wanderers Prove Victors in Games Played this Afternoon

LONDON, Mar. 24.—In the semi-finals for the English Football Association cup this afternoon Westham defeated Derby County by five goals to two and Bolton Wanderers defeated Sheffield United one to nothing.

The final match between Westham and Bolton Wanderers will be played next month on the new grounds at Wembley at which King George, the Prince of Wales and a distinguished assembly will be among the spectators.

EDUCATION FOR ALL CITIZENS

Sir Henry Newbolt Would Fit Every Man For a Life of Harmony and Service

PURPOSE OF LEARNING

Would Have Every Person Given the Same Advantage as His Neighbor

True education does not consist in cramming children with facts which they will soon forget. True education is the training which fits a man for a life of harmony and service with his fellows. Sir Henry Newbolt, the distinguished English educationist and poet, declared in the course of an address before the Canadian Club at its luncheon in the Empress Hotel, Victoria, a few days ago. This true education, he emphasized, involved the teaching of the English language, and this teaching, he believed, would make possible a new unity among the British races and among the nations of the whole world.

Up to the present, Sir Henry observed, education in the best sense had been confined to certain privileged classes. While he did not believe that English people would abandon their present system of private schools he foresaw the day when rich and poor alike would receive the same education. Proposal To Spend Money For South.

Arthur Lineham, former alderman of the city of Victoria, real estate broker, capitalist, and enthusiast has been advocating in the south that British Columbia shall spend half a million dollars on advertising the province as a mecca for tourists and summer residents. It is claimed that it would be a paying proposition and the proposal is being taken quite seriously by many people and by some of the newspapers.

Naturally Prince Rupert will resent such an expenditure. When we are told that although we pay taxes on all our automobiles in this city the provincial government cannot build us even a quarter of a mile of road leading out of the city on which we can drive, we shall oppose most vigorously any expenditures which will benefit the south at our expense. We pay a big share of the taxes and we expect to get some of the returns. The fact that we got a big courthouse does not mean anything. We should have had that years ago but it was delayed. Now we cannot allow that to interfere with the road expenditures which should be ours.

We object most strenuously to funds being diverted to advertising a section of the province while we have no facilities for taking care of our share of those tourists here. We notice that it is planned to have Nelson taken in as a partner in the scheme along with Vancouver and Victoria. That district has been given roads and facilities for handling tourists. Give us the same and we will then be ready to join in any comprehensive scheme provided it be carefully planned and well thought out.

Not Likely Government Will Be Influenced.

It does not seem likely that the provincial government will be influenced by such a cry. When we ask for money here we are told that everyone must retrench and that there is no money for us. So must Arthur Lineham and his band of enthusiasts be told, if the government is to be consistent. It is easy enough to get up a cry to spend money belonging to someone else. That money is ~~ours~~ we shall, through our representatives, have a say in spending it. We strongly urge that until Prince Rupert's legitimate demands are supplied as well as the legitimate demands of the northern districts generally, including that for a bridge at Terrace across the Skeena River, that the attempt to wrest money from the public treasury for the benefit of Victoria and Vancouver alone be resisted to the full.

Modern Democracy On Exhibition.

Yesterday the wires brought word of the premier of France calling a deputy an "abominable scoundrel" in the chamber and causing a scene. We also got word of the former government of Manitoba trying to cut off debate by the use of the closure and bringing on an all night session and the members remaining in their places until ten o'clock the following morning, fighting it out. Then at Ottawa there is a government finding it difficult to pass through some immigration legislation which does not seem to be popular with the members. Democratic government would be all right if it were not for the perversity of human nature. So would socialism be all right if it were not for the same thing.

Experimental Shipment Of Western Hemlock.

The experimental shipment of western hemlock, mention of which was made yesterday, will be watched with a great deal of interest. It is shown that the lumber can be sent to the Eastern market profitably, then there should be a steady business from this port and with the local mill operating as it is sure to do soon, and possibly another mill on the islands, there should be a great improvement in business here. There was a time when business was wonderfully stimulated by the shipments of aeroplane spruce through this port. Now it seems as if we are going to see an export lumber business develop.

TELLS OF JAPAN AND HER PEOPLE

Miss Cox, 23 Years a Missionary There, Addresses Local Audience on Flowery Kingdom

A very interesting and highly instructive lecture on Japan was given last night under the auspices of the Ladies' Reading Club in the Presbyterian Church Hall by Miss Cox, who for the past 23 years has been engaged in missionary work in that country.

The lecturer dealt with the growth and progress of Japan since the Russo-Japanese war in 1904 and the effect of the victory on the minds of the Japanese. They believed, after that war, that Japan was one of the great nations of the world and also developed the belief that might was right and nothing else counted.

Status of Women

The Russo-Japanese war produced a wonderful change for the better in the status of the Japanese woman. Before the war she had been practically a nonentity but afterwards she received privileges and rights hitherto unknown to her sphere. Education was one of the greatest of these advantages and the result was that now there were many women doctors, lawyers and public speakers in the nation.

High schools, practically unknown in Japan before the Russo-Japanese war had sprung up in all directions and every sacrifice was now made by the individuals to receive education in order to make themselves the equals of the citizens of the Western nations.

Attitude of Germany

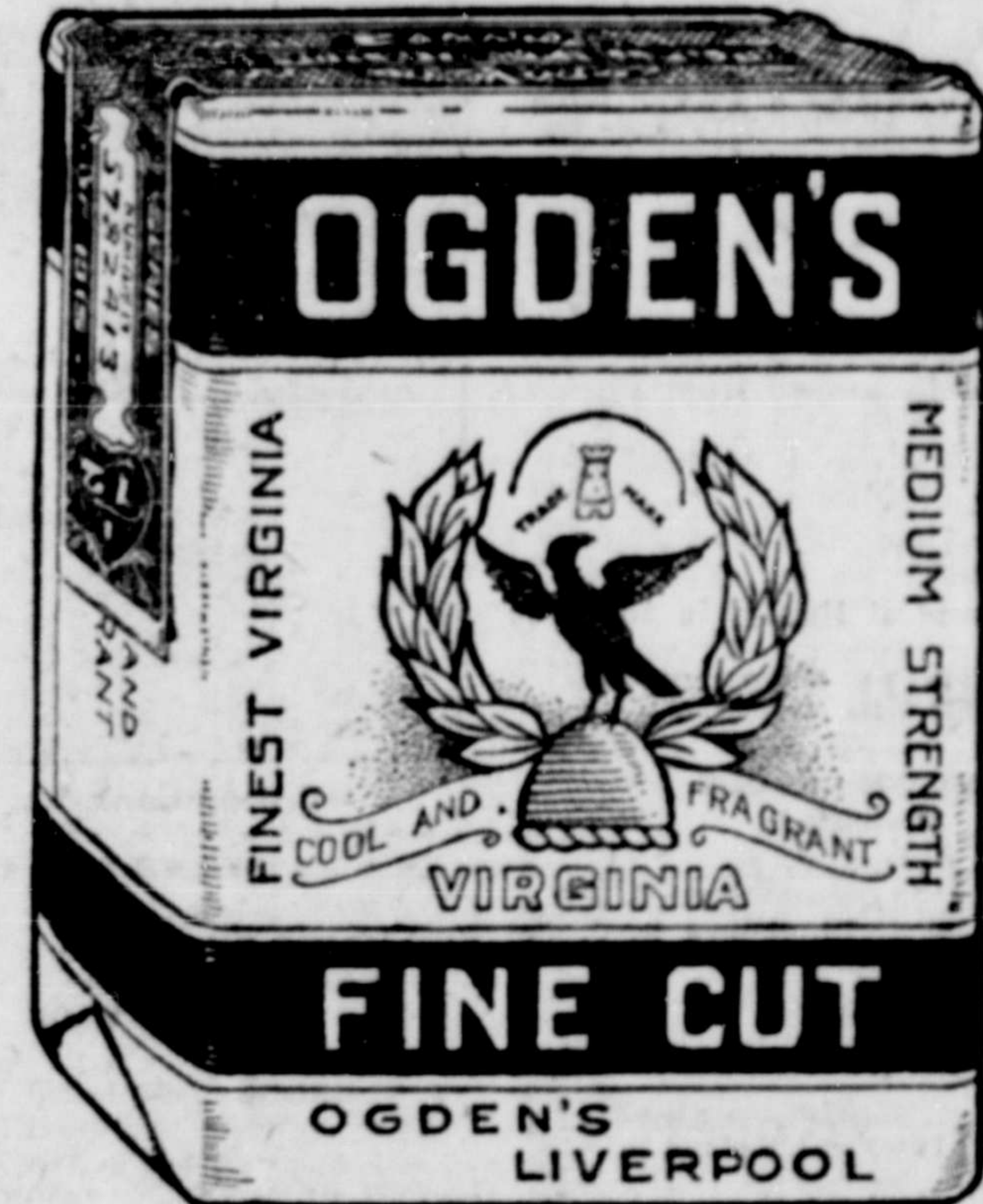
Miss Cox went into the subject of Shintoism and its effect upon the minds of the people and also dealt with the Great War as it affected the Japanese. When the war broke out the Japs were pro-German. The army had been German trained, many of the professional men had received their education in German institutions and the country's trade was to a large extent with Germany. From German propaganda they had developed sympathy with Germany and the principle that might was right had been further inculcated in their minds. The Japanese, however, were not a cruel race by instinct and, when reports of the atrocities inflicted by the Germans in warfare reached the country, their attitude was changed immediately and public opinion went completely in the other direction with the result that they cast their lot in with the Allies.

Industrial Conditions

Miss Cox drew a vivid picture of industrial conditions prevailing in Japan in such trade centres as Nagasaki, Kobe and Tokyo. Working conditions in the big factories were appalling. As in other countries, the Great War produced millionaires and also brought about extreme degradation and poverty. Labor had received practically no wages and the owners of industries had waxed wealthy. At present there were no trades unions for bringing labor together to improve the conditions of the workers.

CANNOT CUT AT GEN. HOSPITAL

Salaries of Pupil Nurses Higher Than at Other Places but Advantages Fewer

PLANS FOR NEW HOME

Active Campaign For Building Fund to Commence the Middle of May Next

The question of the possibility of cutting down expenses at the hospital came up for discussion at the meeting of the hospital board last night. S. K. Campbell on behalf of the House committee said they had investigated and had discussed the matter with Miss Black, the matron. It had been found that while undergraduate nurses were paid more here than at the larger institutions, yet the advantages were fewer and the extra pay made up to some extent for the lack of advantages. As it was, the pupil nurses were paid \$20, \$25 and \$30 a month respectively for first, second and third years, while training. This was higher than was paid at Vancouver or Victoria. However, it was difficult to get pupil nurses even at that figure and he recommended that no change should be made.

They had at present eight graduate nurses, which was rather a large number but if these were allowed to go, undergraduate nurses would have to be secured to take their places, and these were difficult to get. So many girls did not like to look forward to three years of training with very little pay. When they did take up the work they usually preferred to go to a hospital where they got wider experience and more recreation. It was regrettable that such facilities were not obtainable here. The erection of the new nurses' home

would to some extent remedy this and would be an inducement for girls to take up the work.

New Floors Needed

The House committee also recommended the laying of new floors in several rooms. The committee was asked to get prices on this work and report to the next meeting, recommending to the board exactly what should be done, hemlock flooring having been mentioned by T. Ross Mackay as a good substitute for edge grain fir and much cheaper.

Some discussion took place in regard to the amount of the disposal of the board in the estimates for this year. It was pointed out that the liquor money held by the city for the building of the Nurses' Home.

S. K. Campbell told of the plans for the new home, the campaign for which would actively commence the middle of May. The committee was already preparing a publicity campaign to precede the big drive for funds.

Outstanding accounts were ordered paid.

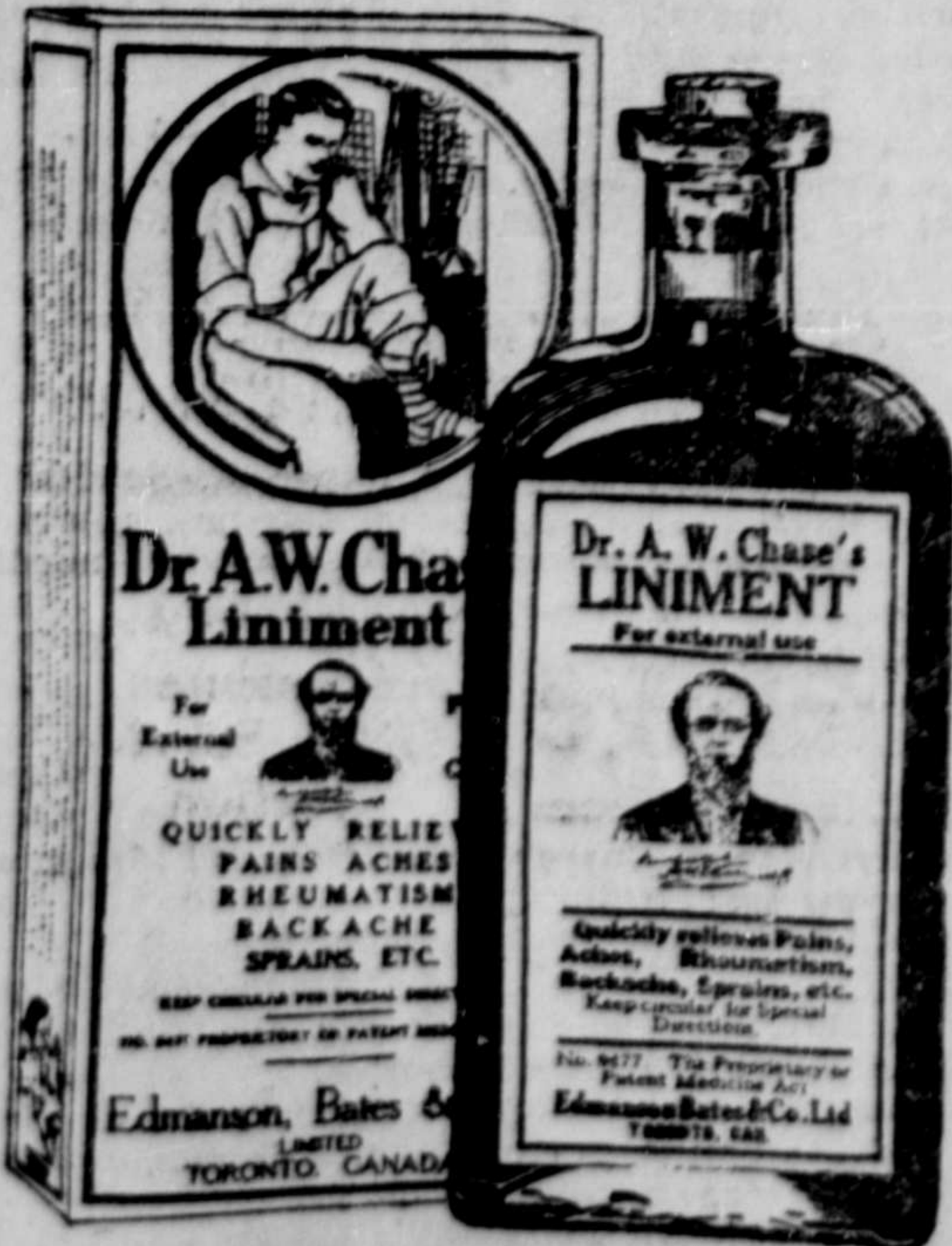

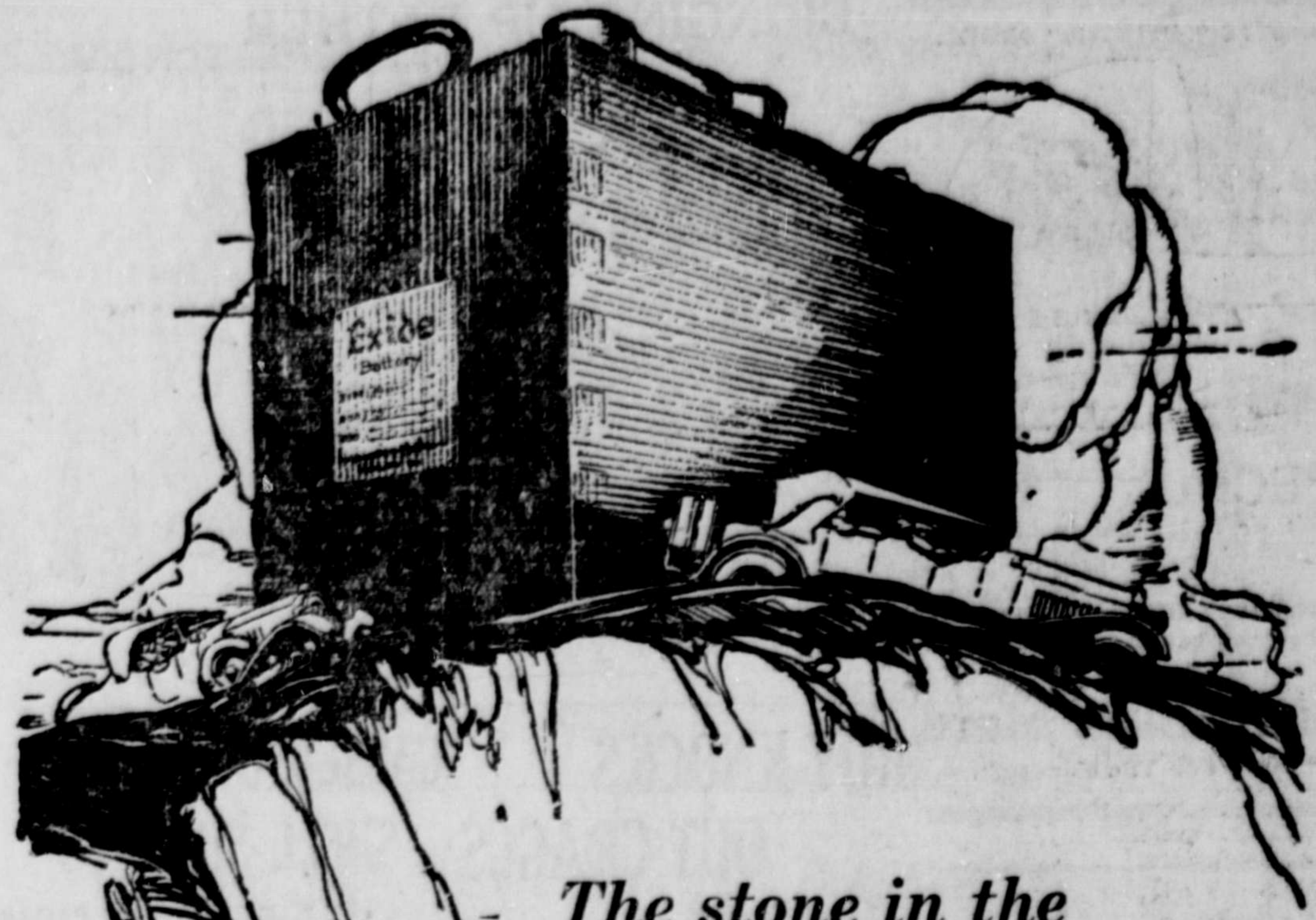

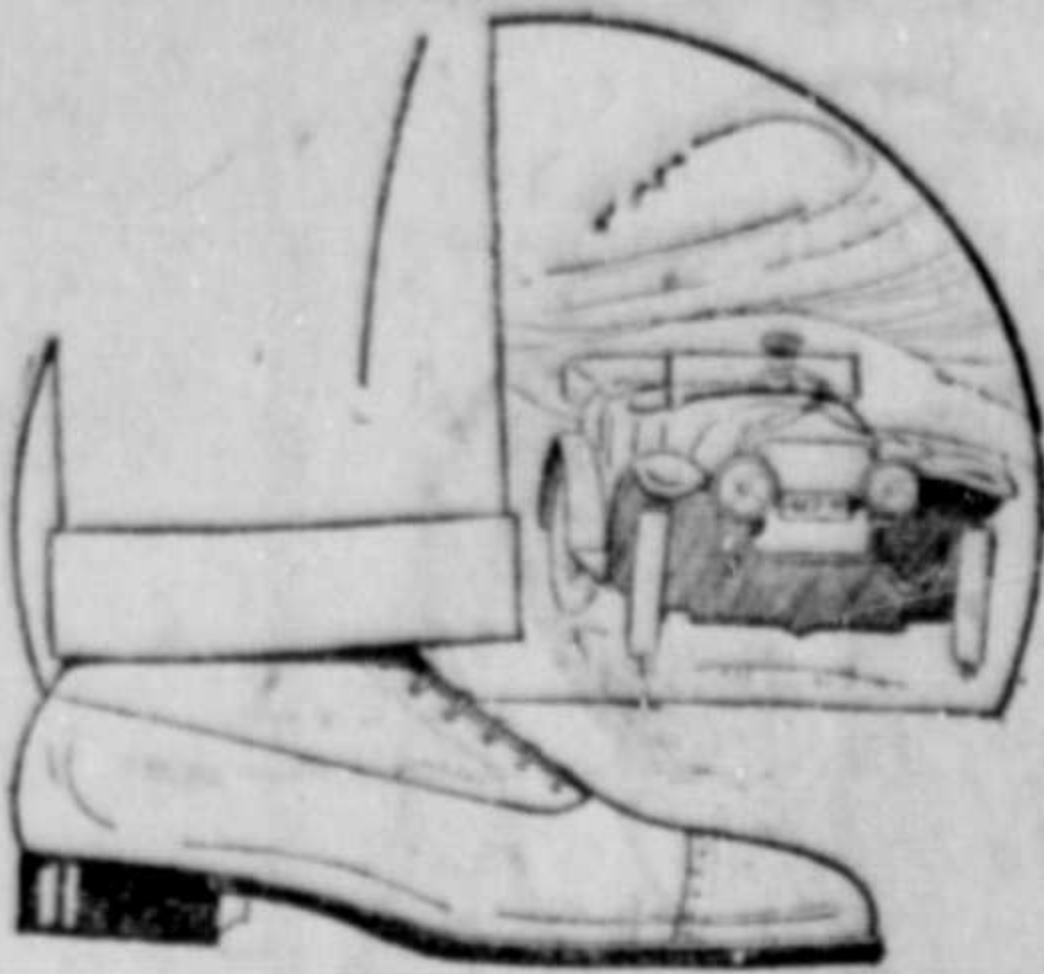

Doings of the Mosquito Fleet which is the chief source of Prince Rupert's prosperity

Along the waterfront considerably improved during the week and the Admiral and his merry men are in excellent spirits. The fish arrivals have been coming in splendidly while the weather man has been indulgent from a fisherman's point of view. Best of all, the Fish Exchange has been very considerate and good prices have prevailed which, in view of the rather strenuous times experienced on the deep sea grounds has helped the boys considerably. No untoward happenings are reported from the high spots.

Spring salmon have made their appearance in nearby waters. During the week a launch came in from Port Simpson with a catch which had been landed by hand trollers in that vicinity.

Cow Bay is selling a lively pace among the salmon trollers and the real Mosquito fleet are putting everything in order for a spirited dash to the salmon grounds. Seal Cove and vicinity is much frequented and a number of trollers have left that place also.

The colichean has been discovered depositing itself in the Naas River and the natives have been busy chasing this class of fish.

Several fur arrivals are reported from northern and southern points and the cargoes have found ready local buyers.

Campagna Island, outside Surf Inlet. The furs were of excellent quality and found a ready local market. After taking on provisions and doing minor overhauls, Arnie left for his happy hunting grounds to repeat the performance.

S.S. Chief's New Launch
The chief of the Mosquito fleet secret service has bought himself a new launch, said to be one of the queerest crafts on record. All the queer gadgets and listening apparatus aboard, including the remodelling and engine fixing, has been done by the well-known shipbuilder N. M. McLean. The boat measures 26 ft. long x 7 1/2 ft. beam and is fitted with thirteen horsepower Regal engine capable of giving this important craft a speed of unimpaired knots per week. The main listening apparatus is said to be so high powered that it is possible to hear if the fishes in the water are watching any plots against the admiral, while conversations carried on in a whistler in Honolulu sound as if the person was relying upon the power of his lungs for a living. The main salon is beautifully upholstered with green lumber while the interior is brilliantly lighted at night with the nose of the skipper. The new craft is to be named Turquoise while in port and will be named in cuss words by the skipper while out on the high seas. The admiral has threatened to go out on a glorious bust up when it is launched.

Spring Salmon Arrive
J. Flewin, of Port Simpson, arrived in port on Wednesday

night with a few delicious spring salmon. The salmon had been caught by a fleet of hand trollers in the waters around the northern port. The skipper nearly got lynched by the eager crowd of purchasers.

Eagle Had Tough Time
The halibut chaser Eagle, which arrived in port on Monday with a catch of 6,000 pounds of halibut, reports experiencing some tough going while in Hecate Straits. A terrific wind was blowing and the force of the waves against the pilot house smashed all the windows. It was necessary to wake up the expert flapjack maker to cook some flapjacks. The big idea was to put the flapjacks in the place of the glass and so keep out the elements. However a safe landing was made after strenuous struggles. According to reports the flapjack scheme worked so well that the Eagle put to sea again on Thursday morning with the throat stoppers still doing the honors for the broken glass.

Capt. Smith Transfers
Captain Tommy D. Smith has transferred his affections from the Eagle to the halibut boat Verna and will take over the latter craft as chief in command—that is if his wife does not ship with him. would be as well educated as the rich, he predicted, and he painted a picture of Welsh coal miners, leaving their day's work underground, to sit in evening clothes after dinner reading Homer and Virgil.
Occupation for Young
"Sir Henry stated in commencement that he did not intend to visit the United States during his present tour because he did not wish to cloud his observations of Canada with observations of another country. Nor did he intend to write a book on Canada. He would not flatter nor criticize Canada, for Canada was not in a position to receive such treatment."
"Education is sometimes regarded as an occupation for the young to keep them away from home and the teachers are supposed to fill them full of information," Sir Henry went on. "But the first thing they do on leaving school is to throw it all overboard."
"This is the general view of education but it is not the view of the very young and the very old. The young don't like it and the old realize that education has failed to train them for life. The old feel, too, that they don't understand the community as they used to do but, as a matter of fact, they never did understand it. The trouble is that your education never taught you what you wanted to know—how to live, to live in harmony and fellowship."
Attitude to Education
"We should take a different attitude towards education. We should think of it not as of interest to ourselves alone, but as of interest to those around us. We don't understand that when we are young, but when we are old we have subdued our selfishness somewhat."
"The old man does not talk

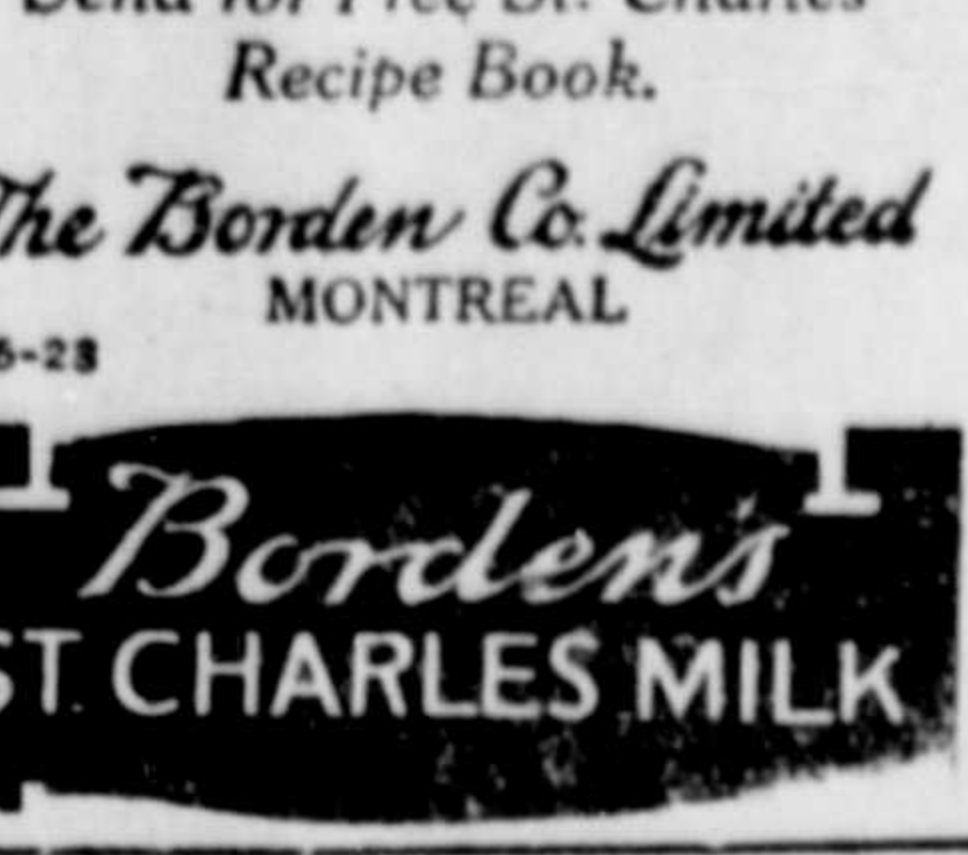

with so much pleasure of the money he made, the success he achieved, but rather on the friendships made, the services rendered, as his record in the community. He likes to feel that he was a unit in a nation, an empire. He feels that he has grown bigger than the little thing which he was when he started.

"The real purpose of education is to develop a man in that way. But few people have received such an education. Indeed, education has been confined to a few classes all over the world. You are probably less troubled with classes than we in England, but I dare say you have them, too. We have classes, it is true, but in England we feel just the same that we are all one people with similar ideals, that we know our fellow-countrymen are, that we shall receive the same treatment in one part of England as in another."

Difference in Education
"In England an officer and a private, forced to spend the night together, would talk about sport, but then they would be through, because they have had different educations.
An Australian officer and private, however, would talk forever because they have been educated similarly, perhaps at the same school."

Sir Henry said he believed that the present English school system would continue, but there was no reason why the public schools and the free schools should provide different educations.
Sir Henry told of his experience with Welsh miners, who wanted a classical education, but desired to continue their work in the mines.
"We shall have a population soon which will work in the mines all day, and at night sit in their evening clothes reading their Homer and their Virgil as the upper classes do today," he declared.

Value of Good Language
"But really why should we have to go beyond our own literature?" he asked. "Why shouldn't we teach our people our own language, which many don't know now."
"In many parts of England the people speak queer dialects, he pointed out. This was a serious disadvantage, because without clear speaking, clear thinking was impossible.
"It's no use talking to a man who can't say what he thinks because he probably doesn't think anything very much worth while," he said. "If you can teach a child to say what he thinks you are getting somewhere."
"In childhood a child understands good language, understands what a poet is saying. That is why I am here to try to find those who sympathize with the necessity of teaching children these things. When this movement is really under way we shall have a new unity in Canada, in England, in the Empire. If the teaching of English in the schools is a small root it is one that will grow so high that the birds of the heavens may come and roost on the branches thereof."
