AMERICANS WITHDRAWING FROM RHINE

MINE WORKERS' STRIKE OF PROTEST IN RUHR VALLEY IS ENDED TODAY

German Mine Owners Refusing to Deliver Coal Will Get Off With Fines it is Now Thought

BERLIN, Jan. 24.—American troops were withdrawn from the Rhine today ending the American military participation in the occupational area.

BERLIN, Jan. 24.—After a 24-hour protest strike, the workmen in the Thyssen and Stinnes coal mines in the Ruhr valley resumed work today "in order to continue the production of coal in unoccupied Germany," it is announced. It is estimated that 10,000 workers participated in the strike.

MAYENCE, Jan. 24.—Fritz Thyssen and his five fellow German industrialists apparently are to be only fined by the French court martial trying them here today for their resistance to the French demands for Ruhr valley coal. The prosecutor at the close of the morning session of court suggested he was inclined to leniency because of the patriotic motives of the Germans.

BERLIN PAPER BUILDING HAS BAD COLLAPSE

Twenty Killed and Many Seriously Injured When Top Storey of Taneblatt Building Gives Way

BERLIN, Jan. 24.—Twenty persons are reported killed and many seriously injured in the collapse of the top storey of the Taneblatt newspaper building today. The editorial and mechanical departments of the paper sustained serious damage.

INVESTIGATION ALASKAN LOSS

Black Commissioner to Proceed Immediately With Probe Into Disaster

VICTORIA, Jan. 24.—An investigation of a searching character will be held into the loss of the Alaskan. Instructions were received yesterday by Capt. J. D. McPherson, wreck commissioner, from the minister of marine at Ottawa to proceed immediately with investigations into the disaster which resulted in the loss of ten lives off Pachena point.

LEGACY IS RECEIVED

Request of Miss Moffatt Puts General Hospital Entirely Out of Debt.

President D. G. Stewart reported at last night's meeting of the hospital board that the legacy of \$1,000 left to the hospital by Miss Moffatt, of Scotland, sister of Adam Moffatt, the former patient of the institution and come to hand and would realize some \$4,600. Mr. Stewart stated that the legacy would put the hospital entirely out of debt.

MURRAY QUILTS PREMIERSHIP

After Over 26 Years in Office Nova Scotia Chief Executive Retires

WONDERFUL RECORD

Liberal Leader Had Confidence of all Parties in Maritime Province

HALIFAX, Jan. 24.—Hon. George Murray, premier of Nova Scotia for more than 17 years, has notified the cabinet that he will resign today and recommend as his successor to the premiership Hon. E. H. Armstrong, minister of public works. He was recently quoted as saying that he had been in office long enough and wanted a rest.

Mr. Murray has been premier of Nova Scotia for a longer term than that held continuously by any chief executive in a self governing dominion. He is a Liberal, but his supporters are not all Liberals. He is held in general esteem in the province and a year or two ago the legislature passed a law providing that on his retirement his official stipend of \$5,000 a year shall continue.

Beaten Four Times

Premier Murray recounts that in the early periods of his political career he was beaten four times. Since that, however, he has had no set back. During the war he rendered signal service in marshalling the forces of the province.

The retiring premier was born in Cape Breton in 1864 and was educated at Sydney. He taught school, practised law and since going into politics has led his party to victory on six successive occasions. Twice at least he has been offered knighthoods and has refused to accept titles. He is a democrat of the democratic. That is why he has sustained the confidence of the people for so long. Unspoiled by office he retires today voluntarily.

Mr. Pattullo will receive it on behalf of the government and will doubtless make a short speech.

Then the minister will proceed to open the door and those attending will have an opportunity to go through the building. In the basement tea will be served and an orchestra will be playing. The affair taking somewhat the form of a conversation.

No invitations are being issued personally to anyone but all are invited to be present.

LIQUOR SUPPLY AT WASHINGTON

Prohibitionists Claim to Have Found Source of Leak and Asked For Action

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—The prohibition department issues a mysterious statement that they have discovered the source of Washington's embassy liquor which is said to have supplied Washington Society with liquor. The prohibitionists merely announce that they have asked the state department and treasury to stop the leak.

TYPHUS PLAGUE INVADES ATHENS

ATHENS, Jan. 24.—All schools, theatres, public halls and cafes in Athens have been closed and the people are not allowed to gather in large numbers in public places owing to the prevalence of typhus.

DISAPPROVAL CITY COUNCIL

Trades and Labor Council Condemns Method of Instituting 8-Hour Day in City Hall

The Trades and Labor Council passed a resolution at its regular meeting last night expressing regret and disapproval at the city council for not supporting the amendment put at Monday night's meeting by Ald. Macdonald and Ald. MacKenzie calling for the submitting of the 8-hour day proposal to a joint committee of the Civic Employees Union and the city council for consideration. Objection was taken, not so much at the institution of the 8-hour day instead of 7-hour day as at the action of the Aldermen, who had expressed approval and support of the United Labor Party's platform, in voting against the amendment.

Outside the passing of this resolution there was little else than routine business. James Black, vice-president of the council, was in the chair and there was a fair attendance.

FRENCH SEIZE GERMAN MONEY

Officials Arrested for Refusing to Obey Orders of Invaders

LONDON, Jan. 24.—A despatch from Essen says the French have seized a million marks which one of the Ruhr companies was transporting from the bank to its town office.

DUESSELDORF, Jan. 24.—The Belgians have arrested the Burgomaster of Duisburg.

TREVES, Prussia, Jan. 24.—The local director of finance and his assistant have been arrested for refusing to obey orders from the French.

Sir Henry Thornton Enthused Over Western Canada and will Look well after its Development

Sir Henry Thornton is enthused over the West and its possibilities, according to F. G. Dawson, director of the Canadian National Railways, who arrived home today after travelling through from Winnipeg to the coast with the president of the road and other officials.

Mr. Dawson says that Sir Henry is keen on entering on a policy of development and intends to appoint a vice-president of the road in charge of development, immigration and settlement.

Sir Henry had a great reception everywhere he went, and Mr. Dawson says the government of Canada made no mistake when he was appointed head of the railway system. He was particularly pleased with Vancouver and predicts a great future for that city. On his next trip west, which will be within a few months, he has promised to make a more leisurely tour through interior British Columbia as far west as Prince Rupert and to look into the possibilities of the country and the port. In the meantime he is non-committal as to possible improvements, except that the needs of the various districts will be well looked after and each case will be dealt with on its merits as it arises. On the present trip the president was getting a bird's eye view of the country and meeting the people.

LAST HONORS TO MINISTER

Funeral of Late Hon. W. C. Kennedy at Windsor, Ont., Was Impressive and Widely Attended

WINDSOR, Jan. 24.—Attended by Premier King, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the opposition, Mayor Wilson and hundreds of other statesmen and civic dignitaries as well as representatives of various organizations and municipalities, the body of the late Hon. W. C. Kennedy, minister of railways, was laid to rest this morning. The entire community took part in the service which was held in St. Alphonsus Roman Catholic Church. Business of the city was suspended while the funeral was in progress.

RUPERT AS GRAIN PORT

Ex-Cabinet Minister of Alberta Says This Port Should Have Elevators

HAMILTON, Jan. 24.—Speaking here, Hon. C. P. Smith, former minister of education in the Alberta government, declared that Eastern Canada would not have prosperity unless the present difficulties of transportation and trade were removed for Western grain growers. Mr. Smith quoted figures to show why the Dominion government should build elevators at Vancouver and Prince Rupert and ship half of the western grain by way of the Pacific coast.

REFUGEE SHIPS ARE ALL ACCOUNTED FOR

MANILA, Jan. 24.—Wireless advices received here from Tai Wan, Formosa, said that three of the missing Russian refugee ships en route to Manila from Shanghai put in there short of fuel. The message added that two others were following closely and that the remaining two were returning to Shanghai.

CONSUL DENIES SELLING LIQUOR

Cuban Charge d'affaires at Washington Gives Lie to Rumor of Complicity

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Published reports coming from the Cuban charge d'affaires that some "embassy liquor" was seized in a visit by the Cuban charge d'affaires to the State department and a public statement by him declaring his entire ignorance of any "alleged selling of liquor" at the legation.

Difference Between Government and Opposition.

In Alberta the farmers have had a convention and they have been passing resolutions, just as all other conventions pass resolutions. They have been asking for a number of things which they are not likely to get. Just one instance of what is asked may be enough to illustrate the point. They ask that a provincial bank be established and that the bank print enough notes to cover the amount required by farm borrowers. They seemed to have the idea that if the government printing presses were set to work there would soon be plenty of money for all.

Attorney General Brownlee made a plea for going carefully, especially at a time when they were finding it necessary to go to the money markets for thirteen million dollars to meet maturing bonds. He warned them that if they were not careful the government might have to cease business altogether.

It must be remembered that the Government of Alberta is a farmer government and in close sympathy with the aspirations and needs of the farmers but they are in office and find themselves imbued with the responsibilities of office. They have had to look at all sides of every question, to weigh the pros and cons, and to realize that rash action may be fatal. On the other hand the farmers at the convention, just as all other convention delegates, have not had the opportunity of weighing the consequences of any action they may take if it should be instrumented in legislation.

Danger Of Tampering With Money Standard.

The fallacy of supposing that to print more money would make it possible to get higher prices for crops, to secure loans on easier terms or to get higher wages with the same purchasing power, does not seem to have entered into the minds of the farmers. Many of them find themselves owing money to the banks, and the banks want to be paid. That is natural. The movement to print money seems to be for the purpose of getting back at the banks.

Government banks have been tried in some countries and in a few cases, it is understood, have been a success. Where that is true is where the state banks have been conducted on the same basis as the business of a chartered bank here. If they are careless in making loans and careless in making collections they lose money just as any bank under similar circumstances would lose money. If they do business on a proper businesslike basis they are not any better from the borrowers point of view than the banks we have. The worst danger in provincial or state banking is that politicians or political favorites may get privileges which other people cannot get. State ownership of utilities is not the solution of all our ills. There is as much injustice and hardship under a system of state ownership as under an individualistic system. As we develop we may evolve a system that will prove workable but at present it is unwise to enter into any dangerous experiments.

Look At Europe For An Example.

We only have to look at Europe for an example of the printing of unlimited money. In the countries where it has been done, the countries have been isolated financially. It has been found almost impossible to import the necessities of life to which the people have been accustomed. Great hardship and poverty has resulted and today those countries are in an almost hopeless condition. Even where, as in the case of Germany, they are recovering their trade and commerce, the people are not getting the benefit. They have to work for low wages, considering the purchasing power of the money. They have comparatively few of the luxuries of life and they are lowering the standards of life throughout the civilized world by their cheap labor. It is always dangerous to interfere with the great economic forces. While we must have changes and doubtless many of them will be beneficial, the great danger is in making radical changes, in trying to reach the goal immediately instead of taking the natural process. Nature has been millions of years bringing us to the present point and she will take at least thousands of years carrying us on to a point where we shall find that we have that equable temperament where we can all do justly and live in that utopian condition of which we sometimes dream.

MISSIONARIES WERE SAVAGES

Alaskan Indians Once Came to
Kill and Enslave Now Bring
Message of Peace

CHOIR OF FORTY VOICES

Choir of Forty Natives Hold
Evangelistic Services at Port
Simpson

PORT SIMPSON, Jan. 24.—A band of natives from Ketchikan and belonging to the Kluge tribe arrived here a few days ago. They are out on an evangelistic trip, and came as they say "to express their thanks to God and the missionaries who lived here earlier and especially Dr. Crosby." It was from the latter they first heard the gospel in the old guest house belonging to the Hudson's Bay Co.

On the evening of the 20th Rev. Ed. Marsden from Metlakatla, Alaska, with over forty members of his choir landed here. They gave a sacred concert in Grace Church to a well filled house. It is gratifying to see and know that in the few years since the establishment of missions on this northwest coast the native tribes have been so transformed that the old heathen songs have been replaced by some of the best musical selections in the world, such as "The Messiah," "The Heavens Are Telling," "Gloria in Excelsis," "The Hallelujah Chorus," and many others. In the concert some of these were given while a native led the choir and another presided at the organ with an eagerness of knowledge and practice.

Great Change

The fact was mentioned by one of the visitors from Alaska that when they came in former years it was to enslave or kill but now good fellowship prevails everywhere.

On Sunday evening, Jan. 21, in Grace Church where every available seat was filled, Mr. Williams, a Kluge Indian, preached in the Tsimpsen language, which he has acquired from contact with the people of Mr. Duncan's mission.

His subject was the words spoken to Hezekiah: "Put thy house in order." To all who could follow in the native language the discourse was interesting.

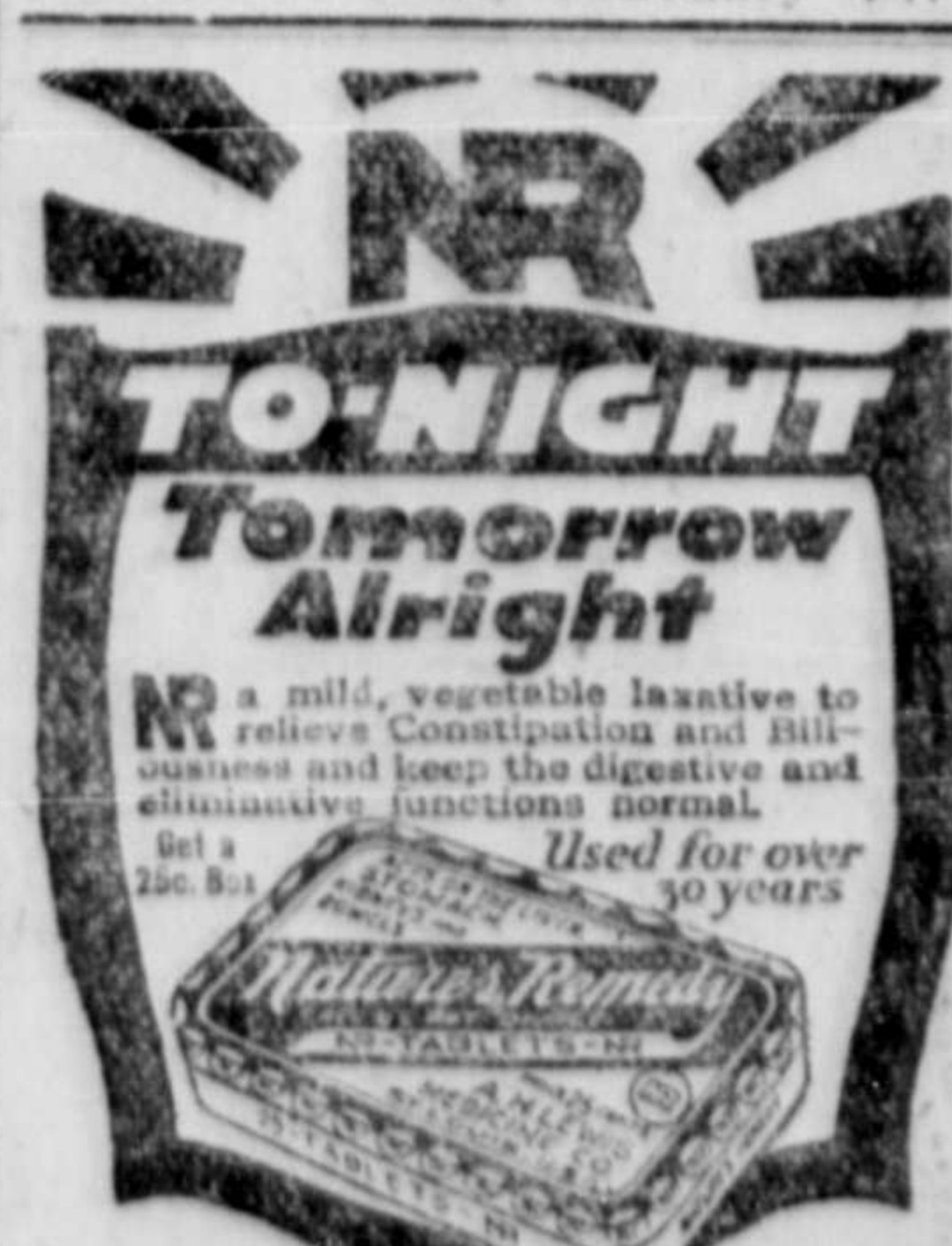

WILD RICE EXPERIMENT

Being Tried Here by Alex. McRae
 —Expensive Seed Imported
 Specially by Local Bird
 Hunter

An experiment in the planting of wild rice as an attraction for wild ducks and geese is being tried by Alex. McRae, the enthusiastic bird hunter of this city. Last fall Mr. McRae received a shipment of wild rice seed from Robert Campbell, of Hillcrest Farm, Keen, Ontario, and planted it in a fresh-water lake near the city. He has not yet ascertained if the seed is growing and probably will not know definitely until summer. If the experiment proves successful he intends to try it out more extensively.

In planting the seed, Mr. McRae simply scattered it in the lake where the water was from six inches to two feet deep with a muddy bottom. It grows up through the water and renews itself if properly planted.

Rather Costly

Mr. McRae obtained the seed from the East and landed here it cost about \$1 a pound. It is expensive to start with and the method of transporting it and the care that has to be taken of it in transit just about doubles the original cost. It has to be kept soaking wet at all times and is shipped in wet sacks.

Mr. Campbell, from whom Mr. McRae obtained the seed, is in the government employ in connection with game conservation and has made extensive studies of the habits of migratory fowl. He has also interested himself in the cultivation of wild rice as a method of keeping wild fowl from migrating.

Ontario Rice Lake

In Ontario the rice lakes are filled with ducks and geese and it is Mr. McRae's idea to ascertain if the same effect may obtain here with the use of the wild rice. Inadvertently it might provide for him a nice little hunting ground close at hand for his exclusive use if he can keep its identity concealed. Though wild rice is a favorite food of the Ontario Indians it is not with the idea of throwing any new cereal delicacy on the local market that Mr. McRae has interested himself in its culture here.

COMING TO CANADA TO SLAY WOLVES

Capt. Frank Doudera Can Get
 Only One Backer in Attack
 on Ferocious Beasts

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—(By Canadian Press).—There are tough days ahead for the wolves in that section of the continent which the C.S. papers love to refer to as "The wilds of Canada." A daring hunter, Captain Frank Doudera, of Brooklyn, having read stories of fierce wolf packs roaming through the Dominion, is organizing a special expedition to do battle with the ferocious beasts.

Doudera told a reporter of the Brooklyn Eagle that he is looking for four men "who have nerve enough to face a wolf pack alone if need be to join him in a drive against the wolves in Canada which are a great menace to the inhabitants of the small townships there."

That is how the doughty Captain Doudera puts it. He already has one recruit, Joseph Sartori, "who has accompanied Captain Doudera on many of his trips to Alaska and other places."

Appeal Broadcasted

The Eagle, in telling of the pro-

jected expedition, informs its readers that the wolves are causing great fear in many settlements in Canada and "an appeal has been broadcasted for men with nerve to hunt them down and destroy the great menace." This call for help, the Eagle continues, reached the ears of Captain Doudera "and appealed to his sporting nature." Also, he learned that "The Canadian government is offering a large bounty for each dead wolf." The paper continues:

"Capt. Doudera is asking others to join him and wants it made plain that the undertaking is one of great danger. He wants men who are willing to throw caution to the winds and take a chance. He wants hunters with experience and men who are dead shots with a rifle. He himself is one of the most expert marksmen in the Brooklyn battalion of the field artillery and has had experience in hunting and exploring."

Only One Wifing

"Succor announcing his intention to make the trip to Canada, Capt. Doudera has not been swamped with applicants. In fact, Sartori is the only one so far who is willing to go."

Sport Chat

Geese and ducks are very plentiful in the neighborhood of Prince Rupert at the present time but the season is over and there is nothing for the law-abiding hunters to do but regretfully mourn the fact that the open season closes on December 25 and not on February 1, as many of them maintain it should. As the migratory fowl from the interior of Alaska do not arrive here until after Jan. 1, it is the non-migratory birds of southeastern Alaska and B.C. that are shot by local sportsmen in large measure. The Ketchikan Game Protective Association has decided to ask that the open season be changed to date from September 15 until December 30. A similar movement is on foot here with the recommended closing date at February 1. This would give people here a chance to shoot the ducks and geese that breed in the northern interior and only stop here to rest on their way south.

The definite location of mountain sheep at Grand Brook near Lucerne on the line of the Canadian National Railway is said to mark a departure in the movement of the sheep in the mountain district. Heretofore they have been generally found much further north than this. The finding of the sheep at Lucerne will be of considerable interest to big game hunters and sportsmen and will further add to the attractiveness of the Jasper Park country as the tourist resort.

ANYOX HEARS RADIO CONCERTS

Wireless Operator Has Just Completed Latest Type Radio Receiving Set

ANYOX, Jan. 24. — J. H. McDonald, wireless operator for the Granby Company, at Anyox, is not overlooking any advance or improvement in connection with wireless apparatus, whether applying to telegraphy or the newer and more wonderful application of telephony in the practice of wireless. For some time he has been busily engaged assembling a receiving set, which is now finished and built according to the latest model, or United States government standard practice.

Three Sets Here

Mr. McDonald has three complete receiving sets at the station here, two of them being the property of the Granby Company, and are for commercial purposes only, the third belonging to Mr. McDonald, and built especially for the reception of radio-telephone. Anyox wireless station is equipped with aerials two hundred feet in height, with a span of two hundred and fifty feet. The transmitter is of 5 K.W. capacity, battleship type and driven by a three phase 550 volt motor.

The telephone receiver embodies the very latest appliances, the chief of which is the latest idea in long distance short wave reception. Telephone concerts are now always sent out on short waves, or waves ranging from 360 metres in length in the United States to 450 metres in Canada. The United States government permits only first class broadcasting stations to use long wave lengths, and then only providing the class of entertainment of the highest standard, containing no metallic or gramophone music.

Some Difficulties

Chatting with the local expert, the Daily News correspondent was told something of the difficulties which were encountered by the experimenter in wireless telephony, especially at Anyox, which is surrounded by high mountains and many miles inland. He pointed out difficulties of successful reception. Apart from

the mountain ridges, the great deposits of ore in the hills; and as at Pittsburg where the action has been observed and proved, clouds of smelter smoke, containing metallic particles, affect radio waves and in different ways, sometimes reflecting waves favorably to their destinations and at other times having the opposite effect. Then there are the leakages from highly charged power and light transmission lines which make a stir of their own, and possibly numerous other influences which even the greatest of investigators in this practically new departure of science are not aware of.

Some Difficulties

Under the circumstances the results have been all that Mr. McDonald expected. Anyox is nightly in touch with broadcast stations, some as far away as Dallas, Texas, and Troy, New York; while Calgary, Edmonton, Vancouver, Los Angeles, Portland and San Francisco contribute their best to the listener-in at Granby Bay.

When the \$2,000,000 plant of the Marconi Company is erected down the coast, Anyox may be able to get in easy with individual apparatus, or by the aid of an amplifier connected with Mr. McDonald's receiver listen to the broadcast concerts while comfortably seated in Recreation Hall.

PROHIBITION IS PREDICTED

Man Who Beat Churchill Says Steps Being Taken to Force Issue in Britain

LONDON, Jan. 24. — By Associated Press. — Great Britain's one Prohibitionist member of parliament, Edwin Scrymgeour, now universally known as "the man who beat Churchill," today predicted that in the next general election, assuming it will be five years hence, the cause which he represents will sweep the country.
This sanguine prophecy was made by Dundee's newly-elected dry champion soon after his maiden speech in the House of Commons, not in the tones of a dreamer flushed with his first burst of victory, but in the cool, deliberate manner of a man who thoroughly believes he knows the workings of practical politics.

The Scotchman

Mr. Scrymgeour made his statement to a representative of Associated Press. He is a kind-faced Scotchman, slightly bald, and apparently about fifty-five years of age. His rather large though well-formed lips bespeak his kind manner, although there is a definite suggestion of firmness in the long, drooping, gray moustache which covers his upper lip. Ernest unpretentiousness is perhaps the outstanding description of his general appearance. Glad in an ordinary unincreased Scotch tweed business suit, with a large watch chain stretched across his breast, from which a well-worn crucifix is suspended, Mr. Scrymgeour at once gives the impression that ostentation is certainly one characteristic entirely alien to his nature.

"America has been intensely interested in your victory," said he correspondent, grasping the large, rough hand of the Scotchman.

"So I hear," he replied in an unmistakable Scotch accent.

"On what basis do you predict a dry victory in the next general election?" asked the correspondent.

Bring Pressure

"Well, in the first place," he answered, "since my election I have received every day a stack of letters that high — and no measure with his hands held up to his waist — congratulating me on my victory. The writers of virtually all these letters say they are going to bring pressure to bear on the members from their several constituents to support the bill I intend to introduce. If that does not work the people of this country at the next election, taking a lesson from Dundee, are going to nominate avowed prohibitionists, and my prediction is that there will be enough elected to force a prohibition bill through Commons."

"The people of this country are learning that it's no good supporting temperance candidates on the promise to do anything to stop, or even regulate, the liquor traffic. We don't want temperance; it never amounts to anything. What we want is absolute eradication, and no other program will satisfy us."

Antagonizing States

"We may not be able to pass a bill through this House, but we're going to make a start. One of the first things I intend to do is to draw the attention of the government to the fact that, regardless of the rightness or wrongness of prohibition, we are antagonizing a friendly country, the United States, by countenancing the shipping of vast quantities of liquor to the Bahamas and other British islands off the Atlantic coast, which we know is intended for smuggling into America. It's ridiculous to imagine that the account of liquor now going to these places is only sufficient for British inhabitants. The recent correspondence between Mr. Hughes and Ambassador Geddes clearly indicates that we must be careful not, even tacitly, to interfere with the enforcement of the laws of a friendly country."

Storm of Protest

"When Mr. Johnson — Mr. Scrymgeour avoided the word 'Pussyfoot' — came here there was a storm of protest against his alleged interference with the affairs of this country. Well, the same argument should hold true in our attitude toward the enforcement of prohibition in the United States. Of course, however, we prohibitionists know Mr. Johnson did not interfere with the affairs of this country. He merely came, at our invitation, to tell us what had been done in the United

States and to let us draw our own conclusions. It has been alleged that the Anti-Saloon League has been helping us in the cause of prohibition. Of course that is not true. The Anti-Saloon League has not given us one penny, and we don't expect any material support from any American organization. We are quite able to do the thing ourselves, although certainly we shall welcome moral support from whatever source.
