STORM SENDS FERRY ASHORE PORCHER ISD.

PRINCE RUPERT MAN BECOMES SUPERINTENDENT OF PROVINCIAL POLICE

Much Business Coming to Local Drydock Will Employ Goodly Number

With the exception of a few vessels which will go to Esquimalt, the entire Canadian Government Merchant Marine fleet operating on and to this coast will come to Prince Rupert this morning for annual inspection and overhaul. Half a dozen of the vessels will be here in the course of the next five weeks. The Canadian Importer from Cuba and the Canadian Rover, on coastwise service, are due on February 26. The Importer will be in the dock for 2 or 3 days and the Rover will have full inspection taking from 5 to 7 days. The Canadian Britisher, from Australia via Portland, is due on March 5. She will also be in the dock for from 5 to 7 days and the Canadian Inventor, direct from the Orient, will be in from 2 to 3 days. The Canadian Observer and the Canadian Farmer, of the coastwise service, are due on March 10 and 31 respectively and each will dock for from 5 to 7 days. The vessels of the same fleet will be here in April, the definite date of arrival not yet being known. J. Knox, superintendent engineer for the C.G.M.M., will be here for five or six weeks in connection with the docking of the boats and Bert Manthrop, steamboat inspector, will be here from time to time as required. B. C. Keeley, C.G.M.M. manager, is expected from Vancouver next Wednesday. The work on these boats will mean quite an addition to the payroll at the dry dock.

NEW SCHEDULE FOR STEAMERS

Seattle and Victoria Calls Likely to be Eliminated in Near Future
THREE TRIPS A WEEK
Effort to be Made to Cater to the Tourist Business by this Route
VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—Resumption of the twice a week service between Vancouver and Prince Rupert in April and the inauguration of a thrice a week service in June is planned by the C.G.M.M. coast steamship service for this year. Officials of the company will confer here on Monday on the summer schedule which, it is expected, will be made public very soon. With a large tourist business expected this year and the freight traffic northwards constantly increasing, it is the plan of the company this year to concentrate more than ever on the service north and with that end in view the service of the company to Seattle and Victoria is to be eliminated. After March 3, the G.T.P. steamers will cease to run from here to the two southern ports, the Prince Rupert being scheduled to make her last trip to Vancouver Island and Puget Sound on that date. April 15 is the date tentatively set for the resumption of the bi-weekly service. The double-ended run from Prince Rupert to Stewart and Anxox will then be discontinued and each of the boats will make one of the points similar to the time-table of last year, leaving Prince Rupert for the south at midnight instead of in the morning as at present.

CIVIL SERVICE INVESTIGATION

Progressives Support Liberal in Appointment of Committee
PEAWA, Feb. 23.—After a debate in the Commons yesterday the House adopted a motion demanding a special committee to investigate the civil service. The vote taken on the motion was 103 to 66. Progressives and the rest of the opposition supported the motion while the Conservatives opposed it. Mr. Meighen accused the government of trying to repeal the Civil Service Act or to reduce its efficiency.

DEATH OF CONTRACTOR IS FOUND IN RIVER

C. Rogers of Vancouver Was Ill and Despondent Before He Disappeared
VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—The body of Arthur Charles Rogers, a Vancouver contractor who had been missing for three days, was found in the Fraser River east of Lulu Island. He had been ill and despondent as a result of the recent loss of his mother. The police believe he suicided. An inquest will be held. Rogers left a wife but no children.

GRAYSON LED AT HALF-WAY

Followed Closely by Winterton and Campbell in The Pas Dog Derby

THE PAS, Feb. 23.—Billy Grayson, driving C. B. Morgan's entry in the Dog Derby, was leading when Sturgeon Landing, 100 miles from here, was reached at 10.27 last evening. News of this effect was brought here by a carrier pigeon. Grayson was followed a few minutes later by W. Winterton and Baptiste Campbell driving Creighton's team. The rest of the contestants were strung out behind. Bjorkman had to quit the race owing to the poor condition of his dogs.

MARTIAL LAW IS DECLARED

French Take Extreme Measures in Bochum in Consequence of Disturbance.

BERLIN, Feb. 23.—"Martial law is declared in Bochum" says a despatch in consequence of yesterday's disturbances in which French soldiers fired on a crowd with fatal results. In the affair one German was killed and two wounded.

THREATENED SUICIDE THEN DISAPPEARS BUT RETURNS TO FRIENDS

VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—F. F. Newton, former manager of the messenger service now in liquidation, who disappeared sending threats of suicide unless his affairs and charges made against him were cleared up, has returned to town on the published invitation of his friends, who promised inquiry into his affairs immediately. Newton declined to say definitely that his threat of suicide has been withdrawn.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN KANSAS CITY

Twelve Lose Lives and Others Reported Missing; Bodies Recovered

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 23.—Twelve persons were burned to death and five others are reported missing as a result of a fire which destroyed a two storey frame rooming house here. Twelve bodies were recovered this morning, five adults and seven children. Between 30 and 40 persons occupied rooms on the second floor of the building.

SERIOUSLY INJURED SAWDUST EXPLOSION

Nine Men Thrown Twenty Feet in Air at Montreal Cigar Factory—Two Badly Hurt

MONTREAL, Feb. 23.—Nine firemen were blown twenty feet in the air by the explosion of several tons of sawdust following a fire in the heating plant of a local cigar factory today. Two of the men are in a serious condition.

COMMISSION ON SOLDIERS

First Day Hears Evidence on Detail of Administration: Aim Practical

VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—The first day of the royal commission hearing on returned soldier problems was occupied with details of administration, medical treatment and pensions. Colonel R. C. Proctor cross-examined H. D. Twigg of Victoria for the Veterans said that veterans were given medical treatment immediately where urgently needed and their eligibility inquired into afterwards regarding pay and allowances. The same subject is on today.

Chairman Lieut.-Col. Raiston announced at the opening of the session that the object of the hearing was to try to solve problems and work out practical legislation and not to hear charges and recriminations.

M. M. STEPHENS COMPANY HAS BEEN INCORPORATED

Victoria, Feb. 23.—Provincial incorporations for the week include one Prince Rupert firm, M. M. Stephens & Co., Ltd., a private company capitalized at \$50,000.

Car Ferry Driven Ashore on Porcher Island this Morning Had Nine Empty Cars Aboard

The Swanson Bay car ferry, proceeding with nine empty cars to the Whalen pulp mill, was driven ashore on Porcher Island at 7 o'clock this morning when the tiller of the tug Bermuda, Capt. Hagen, which was towing her south, broke. The Bermuda and her tow left here at six o'clock last evening to take on a cargo of pulp at Swanson Bay for eastern shipment. The tug returned here at 11 o'clock this morning following the accident. The extent of the damage is not definitely known as yet but as soon as the present storm has subsided a representative of the underwriters and A. A. Forsythe, of the local C.G.M.M. office, will proceed south to make a survey.

Dr. Grant Urges Rupert People to Hustle for Business for Themselves Instead of Looking to Others

That Prince Rupert should get out and hustle business for themselves instead of always looking to the government and the railway for help, was one of the rather daring suggestions made by Dr. H. R. Grant to the Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday. He urged that we should not be always trying to play the other man's game in our own way. If Sir Henry Thornton said the line did not pay and must be shut down, we should feel sore. Why not develop the industries of Prince Rupert and district and make it impossible for such a thing to happen. In this connection publicity was necessary and it was for the local people to make possibilities of the place known. They all wanted to see the city grow.

Dr. Grant said there should be a man sent out from here who had made a study of all the conditions. He should get in touch with those likely to come here and induce them to invest their money here. Not only were there grain dealers but men interested in the pulp business and in the erection of a smelter. The position here was an important one. Okanagan's Example

FROM BARBER TO BE BANKER

Joseph Marcino is Sought by Police for Frenzied Finance Operations

CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—Joseph Marcino, known the country wide under different names, is sought by the police for alleged frenzied finance in which he is said to have cheated investors of a million dollars twelve years ago. Marcino came to the United States as a barber immigrant and soon became a banker and dealer in securities. He started banks in different parts of America which failed.

Colonel J. H. McMullin Heads Provincial Police View to Reorganization

VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—With the aim of reorganizing the whole provincial police system, Hon. A. M. Manson has appointed Colonel J. H. McMullin, at present government agent at Prince Rupert, to be superintendent of provincial police dating from March 31.

The present police superintendent W. G. McMynn becomes superintendent of the Okalla prison farm which is also to be reorganized.

Colonel McMullin will have charge with Mr. Manson of the reorganization with a view to closer co-operation with the Liquor Board. Colin Campbell, the present superintendent of the Okalla prison is to be superannuated.

It has been known in Prince Rupert for some time that Colonel McMullin was to get the appointment but no official notification had previously been received. The Colonel is looked upon as being especially well fitted for the work which he has undertaken and will doubtless bring credit to a force, the efficiency of which means a great deal to the province. In a speech in the legislature last autumn Hon. A. M. Manson stated that he had already made a number of changes in the provincial police force and that others were to follow. The inefficient officers were to be weeded out and others put in their places. The department, he stated, were demanding results and where it was found that the officers were not getting results there were to be changes. Doubtless this will be the policy of the new head of the department. It is understood that Mrs. McMullin and family will be accompanying the Colonel to Victoria where they will live.

NEW OFFICERS ORANGE LODGE

Membership Increasing and Cash Balance on Hands Says Officials Reports

VICTORIA, Feb. 23.—A. H. Avery of Princeton was elected Grand Master of the provincial grand lodge of British Columbia Orange Association yesterday. Other officers are: Deputy Grand Master, D. B. Brantain of Coquitlam. Assistant Deputy Grand Master, V. Hobbs, Victoria. Grand Chaplain, Rev. Hobben. Secretary, J. E. Carpenter. Treasurer, G. L. Raynor. The reports of the grand secretary, grand treasurer declared the order throughout the province to be in a flourishing condition with the membership increasing and a satisfactory cash balance on hand.

JAPS ASKING FOR SUFFRAGE

Demonstration in Favor of Bill in Tokio today Big Affair
TOKIO, Feb. 23.—Ten thousand police were called out here today to control a demonstration in favor of Universal suffrage bill to be introduced in the lower house of the Diet tomorrow. The procession paraded the city and then marched around the palace cheering the emperor. The Opposition in the Diet is supporting the bill and the Government party is expected to oppose it.

CAPTURE OF IRREGULARS

Five Were Taken Last Night, Among Them Sean Fitzpatrick
DUBLIN, Feb. 23.—Five Irish irregulars, the most important of whom was Sean Fitzpatrick, were captured by officers of the criminal investigation department of the Free State in a raid at Drumcontra. A report is in circulation that De Valera has been taken but there is no confirmation of this. Irregulars were taken in raids here last night and this morning. More raids are now in progress.

Power Of Advertising Shown In Dog Race.

The general interest taken throughout the country in The Pas dog team race is an example of the power of advertising. The Pas is not an easily accessible place nor is it a place that would ordinarily come into the limelight. They have had, though, a good publicity agent who has kept the world posted on the activity of the camp and the result has been that everyone knows of it and most people of a sporting turn of mind are interested in the dog team races which are run every year over a two hundred mile course.

Without advertising, the World Series baseball would not amount to anything. Already the newspapers of the whole continent have been supplied with nicely printed schedules of games for the baseball season and there has been a good deal of advance copy sent out. This is a type of advertising that counts a great deal. It is begun early and carried on all the time. There is no let up.

So it is with the big boxing matches. The publicity is carefully planned and very expensive but it brings results.

Prince Rupert May Copy Methods.

Prince Rupert may copy the methods of the dog team racers and of the baseball magnates to some extent. Sometimes free advertising can be secured but it has to be carefully planned and skillfully executed. The difficulty is to get the time to undertake the work. Most men of ability are also busy people and cannot undertake the work. A publicity man is worth a great deal to a place but if he is good he is an expensive person and a town this size finds it difficult to finance.

With the means at our disposal, however, something can be done and is being done. We are keeping fairly well before the people of Canada but if we could get what we have to offer placed seriously before the people who might help us financially and industrially it would be putting us in a position to prove whether what we have been saying about our advantages over other places is correct.

Developing From Within.

For many years our aim here seemed to be to import anything we wanted. We sent to the outside for it. We imported our employees and we imported our sportsmen. Now we are changing things. We are developing our own and will soon be on the export market.

An example of the value of developing home product was seen in the basketball game played at Anyox yesterday. The winning team was very largely home product. The boys were trained here and they gave a good account of themselves. They showed that Prince Rupert can produce just as good as is to be found anywhere. When we sent our students to the University they made good in their respective lines. So they are making good in sport and there seems every probability they will make good in the more serious life contests.

Make Good Use Of What We Have.

The main thing for any place is to make good use of what it has. To develop its latent powers, to give the boys a chance in life and the girls too. We often express the belief that Prince Rupert has wonderful prospects, that her future is assured and that she is destined to become a great city. If we believe this we must further ask ourselves the question, what are we doing to make good our faith? If the people sit back and trust to luck, they may depend that they will get nowhere and that we can never expect to be anything more than a fishing village. It rests largely with us.

BONE TALKS OF SHOE BUSINESS

Tells Why Hides in This Part of Country No Use; Pretty Legend

"I am often asked why domestic hides are so cheap yet good grade shoes are so dear," said D. W. Bone of the Family Shoe Store, in an address before the Rotary Club yesterday afternoon. "The reason is that hides in this part of the country are so badly skinned that often they are worse than useless. They will not tan up and are useful for only the cheaper grades of leather such as is used in certain grades of upholstery. It would pay the farmers to get a man to come to the country and show them how to skin animals properly. In Argentine and some of the European countries the governments have spent a lot of money in teaching how to take off the hides properly. Argentine and France are the chief hide exporting countries for the making of shoes."

Mr. Bone said that shoe making was one of the oldest businesses. The wearing of hob nail shoes by the Romans in the mountains was said to be the cause of their victories over the barbarians.

Technical Work

Discussing the technicalities of the business, Mr. Bone told of the difference between the welled shoe and the McKay sewn or cheaper grades. He told of the various operations of work in a shoe factory such as cutting, lasting, soling, putting on the heels and finishing. Most of the work was done by machinery although the cutting was mostly done by hand.

The address concluded with an old Egyptian eiderella legend of a slave girl who because of her position was not allowed to wear sandals. Her duty was to affix the sandals of the others. However, she crept away into the reeds and made sandals for herself and became very expert at the work. One day an eagle picked up one of the beautiful little sandals which she had made and carried it away. He happened to drop it in the grounds of the King's palace and the prince went to look for its owner. Finally he found her and made her a princess.

Choice of Friends

Speaking of the choice of friends, the speaker mentioned that any that had a lowering tendency should be dropped. One did not have to eat a leg of lamb to know if it was fresh, one mouthful was enough. So it was with friends. They soon indicated what they really were. If you went with wolves you would soon learn to bark. Friends whose principles were of a low order had a bad influence.

There were friendships formed among men engaged in common enterprises. Living in a small town all were engaged in the enterprise of town building. Those living there ought to be all friendly. While other cities seemed to be wrapped up in their own affairs, they were only doing what we were doing. The thing for Prince Rupert people to do was to play their own game and stick together.

LABOR MEMBERS IN LONDON FAILED TO FIND ACCOMMODATION

Club Being Taken Over to Provide Beds and Meals at Reasonable Prices

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Many Labor M.P.'s are experiencing difficulty in finding economical accommodation in London. Arthur Henderson, secretary of the Labor Party, has sent to Labor organizations a circular on the question of the formation of a residential labor club. He says that "negotiations are at present proceeding for the acquisition of premises near the Thames Embankment, with 150 bedrooms and public rooms and administrative offices, eminently suitable for such a club as will meet our present needs." It is calculated that by a minimum enrolment of one thousand London and one thousand country members it will be possible to provide accommodation at the rate of \$1.50 for single bed and breakfast and \$2 where a member and his wife take up residence, in addition to providing meals and refreshments at reasonable prices and the usual club facilities. The Carruthers had been out of this port since January 7 and some anxiety had been felt as to her safety but, outside of experiencing some rough weather, the little vessel is none the worse of the wear and the crew are all safe and sound. The Carruthers has really made two trips since being out, one light catch having been disposed of at Seward.

GRAVE DANGER YOUNG GIRLS

Went Motoring With Chinese and a White Man: Now Before Courts

PUBLICITY IS ASKED

Judgment was reserved by Magistrate Jay in the Juvenile Court in the case of a young Chinaman charged with committing acts contributing to the delinquency of a white girl, sixteen years of age, says the Victoria Colonist.

The charge was laid as a result of the investigation by the police department into the causes leading to the delinquency of the two girls charged with vagrancy who have been detained for several weeks on the order of the magistrate, and whose case has aroused much public interest.

Arising out of the police allegations as to the associations of young men, both Chinese and white, with these girls, a young white man was also charged before the magistrate. He will be brought to trial next week, when he will be defended by Alexis Martin. The charge against him is of a serious nature.

Evidence adduced both for and against the Chinese defendant, who gave his age as seventeen, and who is the son of a well-known local Chinese merchant, was not directed to specific acts of a serious nature. City prosecutor Harrison, who is assisting the magistrate in the investigation of the case, explained that the charge had been laid in furtherance of the determination to get at all the facts. The facts in this particular case, as Mr. Harrison viewed them, were illustrative of the process which began with motor car rides and suppers in Chinatown, and which inevitably culminated sooner or later in the ruin of girls who were still children in the eyes of the law.

been missing since that night. **Judgment Reserved**

Mr. Higgins, who asked for dismissal of the charge, said that the Juvenile Delinquent Act was not intended to cover such a case. The evidence as adduced showed no crime on the part of the defendant. There was evidence of moral obliquity and degeneracy on the part of the girls themselves, and of the step-brother; and counsel urged that the encouragement to delinquency proceeded rather from the white girls than from the Chinese.

Found in Chinatown

Detectives Phipps and Caldwell testified that they arrested the two girls in Chinatown, on the night of Feb. 1, last. There was another girl, sixteen years of age, who had not been arrested. There were two Chinamen, one of them the accused, who had both run away as soon as the officers appeared. The accused had been arrested following his return from Vancouver, to which place he had gone as soon as the girls were arrested. The other Chinaman had disappeared, and the officers had not been able to locate him. The sixth member of the party was a step brother of the younger girl arrested. The detectives had taken the girls to their homes on a former occasion of their frequenting Chinatown, and had warned them that they would be brought before the court on a repetition of the offence.

The girls testified that they had motored that night with the party of six. The missing Chinaman had brought cigarettes for them, and paid for their supper at a chop suey house on Cormorant Street. They were on their way to see the sights of Fantan Alley when they were seen and arrested by the police officers.

The accused Chinaman, who said that he had formerly been employed as a waiter at St. Margaret's School, had left that work because he was tired of it, and had lately plied for hire in a motor car purchased for him by his father, testified that the suggestion as to drives, cigarettes and Chop Suey suppers had originated with the girls. He was driving the car for the other Chinaman, who had hired it, he said. The other Chinaman bragged that he was a "big shot."

Under the Tobacco Restraint Act for instance, it was a delinquency in any child under the age of sixteen to smoke cigarettes. Judgment would be reserved until next Tuesday.

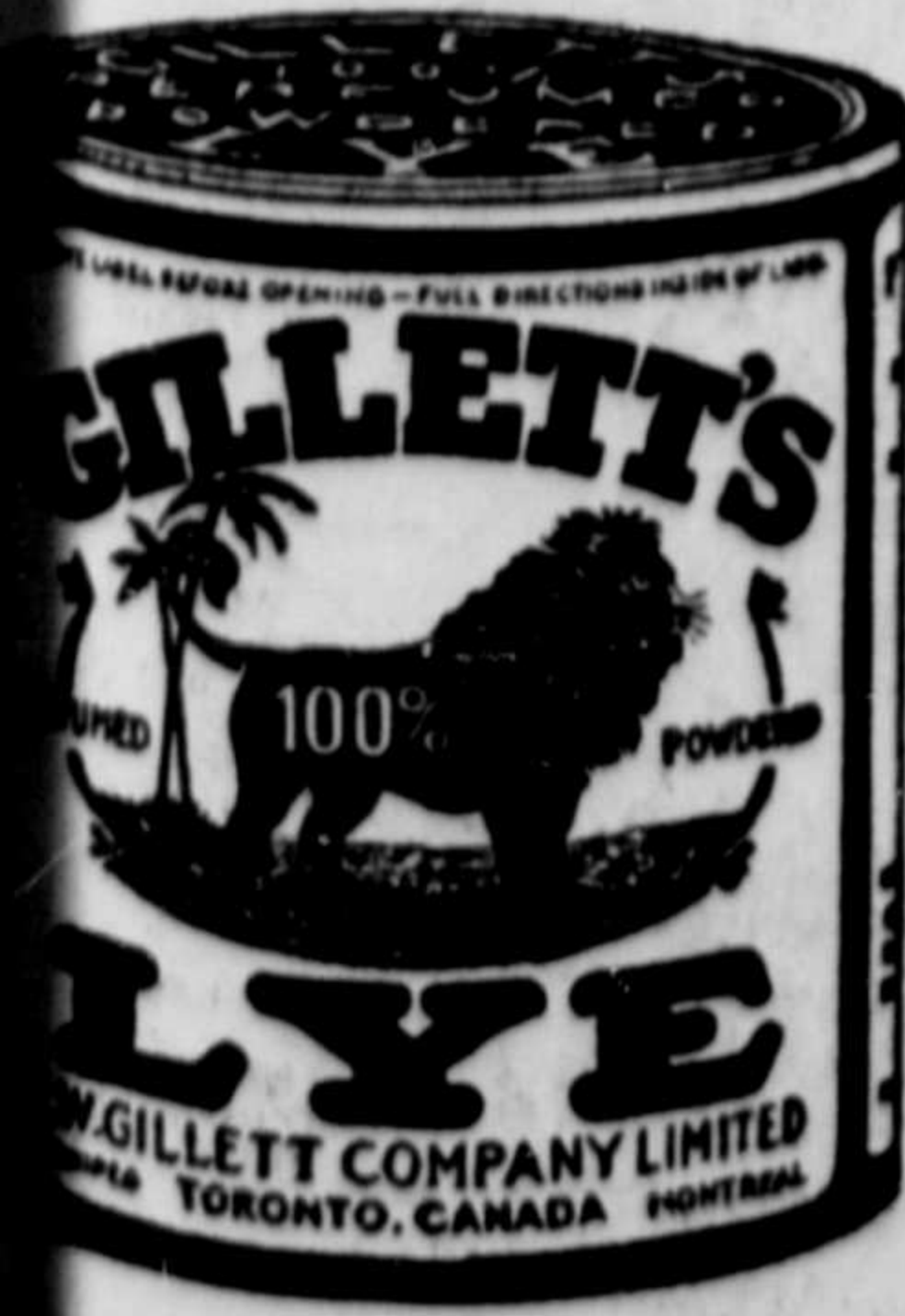

PRINCE JOHN MINE IS SOLD

Stewart Property Changes Hands for Cash After Four Times Bonded

Possibly the most significant mining deal made so far this year was the sale for cash on the 7th of the month of the Prince John property, to the New York Exploration Company says the Portland Canal News.

Consisting of eleven claims and fractions, this property is situated on the west side of the Bear River, 4½ miles from Stewart, and runs from the river bank to the summit of what sometimes is termed the Premier ridge.

Staked Six Years Ago

Staked some six years ago by James Nesbitt and Andy Archie, and William I. in later obtained an interest, it has been bonded three times in the past, but unfortunately the bondholders in each case failed to do sufficient work to prove its merits. Not until bonded for the fourth time to Captain C. A. Mackenzie, about May of last year, has the property received the development that its undoubted ore reserves entitled it to. Since that time almost continuous development work has been undertaken, the results proving so satisfactory that this week the original owners received a substantial cash offer, which they accepted.

The work done under Captain Mackenzie's instructions took on the nature of two crosscut tunnels, the first or upper one being an extension of an existing tunnel. This crosscut is now in a distance of 180 feet, and in that distance has cut two mineralized zones, one 10 feet wide and the other 40 feet, both containing good concentrating ore, carrying values in copper and gold. THROWING SWITCH IS DANGEROUS GAME

To Set Race Against Race or Religion Against Religion Mischievous

The Montreal Star in a recent editorial decries all attempts to arouse religious bigotry or race hatred in Eastern Canada. The same is applicable almost everywhere. The Star says:

"To talk about race or religion where the fight against vice conditions is concerned in this city is to talk trash and mischievous trash at that.

"The forces which are behind the attempt to make this city decent are not, thank Heaven, composed of only one race, any one religion, any one profession. The Committee of Sixteen, the mouthpieces of these forces, is composed of members of the Catholic, Protestant and Jewish faiths. Its personnel includes clergy and laity, and is representative of many professions. This is a matter of common knowledge.

To try to sidetrack the fundamental issue involved in the forthcoming fight to clean up Montreal by raising the race and religion cry is to play straight into the hands of vice and of reaction. The people of Montreal are not concerned with the religion or the profession or the politics of the men who are going into this fight in their defence. The responsible authorities at the City Hall cannot hope to sidetrack the steadily growing demand for a clean-up by any such oblique methods.

COLD STORAGE GETS ANOTHER CARGO OF FRESH HERRING BAIT

The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co's herring carrier Legate, Capt. Swanson, made port last evening with 50 tons of fresh bait which she loaded from the Fredella which is outside prospecting. Herring is still scarce, officials of the company state, and the full run is not yet on.

VANCOUVER MAN DIES RESULT OF EXPOSURE

VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—Exposure to the cold night air when his house on Gambier Island was destroyed by fire resulted in the death of Charles A. Lett of Grace Harbor.

Mr. Lett who was 70 years old was Vancouver's leading insurance man 23 years ago. He established the firm of C. W. Lett & Co.

NEW AIRCRAFT TO CARRY 200

Will Soon be Operating Between London and New York Says Major Branner

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Major-General Sir W. S. Branner is of the opinion that a passenger air service will soon be operating between London and New York. The transatlantic trip will be done in 12 hours. Speaking at the annual air conference in the Guildhall he mentioned that estimates are already worked out for a new type of aircraft. It will be built to carry 200 passengers and ten tons of mail. In this new type of flyer it should be as safe to cross the Atlantic by air as it is to cross Canada by rail. One aim of aircraft designers is to improve aerial transportation so that storms may be navigated in the air as safely as they are on the ocean. Occasionally reports are heard of an aerial cruiser now under construction in a British yard. She is supposed to be a seafaring craft designed for landing in mid-Atlantic and navigating on the sea when necessary. Even with the comparatively small type of present day aircraft, aviation in Great Britain is making fine progress in the direction of greater safety and reliability. Last year 10,000 regular passengers were carried in addition to 22,000 "joy-riders," Sir William Branner said, on British commercial air routes without a single casualty, that is without one passenger being killed or even injured. This record should help to inspire confidence in British aviation.

Premier's Flights

Lloyd George used to fly regularly from London to Paris during the Peace Conference in 1919. Perhaps at no remote date a Canadian prime minister may think it no great hazard to fly from Ottawa to London to attend a congress of the British Commonwealth. Canadian aviators earned a high reputation for themselves during the war. Canada should continue in the van of progress in civil aerial transportation.
