## RATHER TENSE SITUATION IN RUSSIA TODAY

### TORNADO CAUSES MUCH LOSS OF LIFE IN TEXAS; PIRACY CASE IN CHINA

#### Swanson Bay Pulp Plant Lumber and Shingles Breaking all Records

Running night and day and turning out 50 tons of pulp per day in addition to large quantities of lumber and shingles, the plant of the Whalen Pulp & Paper Co. at Swanson Bay is now breaking all production records of its history. H. Hennessy is the manager of the plant and J. A. Samuelson has arrived from Quebec to superintend the pulp making.

Nine carloads of pulp, shingles and lumber are being shipped weekly to Prince Rupert by car ferry behind the tug for transshipment East over the Canadian National Railway, and from 4 to 6 scows are sent weekly to Vancouver.

An order for 400,000 feet of lumber to be filled by May 15 for shipment to Japan is now being filled and in a few days one of the Canadian-Robert Dollar boats will come to load it.

The Princess Ena, Capt. C. C. Sautey, loaded 500 tons of pulp at Swanson Bay for Frisco last week and is now at Port Alice, another of the company's plants, to complete loading a cargo of 1500 tons. The Ena, it is expected, will make still another trip to California with the Whalen product.

#### CAPITALISTS INVESTIGATING

Party Here at Week-end Looking into Possibilities Regarding Timber and Mines

"Looking into the investment possibilities with a view to becoming interested and to interesting clients" is the way a group of Eastern brokers and bankers spoke of their visit to Prince Rupert and district at the week-end. The party was made up of William S. Jenkins, John E. Calloun and J. G. Bjornstad of Minneapolis. They represent a good deal of capital and they look with favor, it is understood, on some of the things they have seen. Particularly they are interested themselves in the Esk timber and mining properties controlled by John Willman, including the mill which is at present closed temporarily.

The party will also look into the possible investments here and expect to be heard from Messrs. Jenkins and Calloun in the south last night, accompanied by E. F. Duly.

#### PPER PRICES GO SLIGHTLY LOWER

Has Been Sold as Low as 6 1/2 Cents Alongside Ship at New York

NEW YORK, May 14.—Most prices are holding at 16 7-8 cents a pound delivered, but one prominent producer is quoting 16 cents, and others would be willing to sell moderately at that price. Second-hands have been selling at prices equivalent to 16 cents, and others would be willing to sell at 16 5-8 cents. The Connecticut valley point, which has been made at 16 1/2 cents refinery in last two weeks, while copper has been sold at 16 1/2 cents, is slightly under.

This second-hand offering is of little importance and is due only to the small amount of copper that each month gets in the hands of speculative interests, upon which they must either pay by payment by end of this month, or specify destination by the first of next month. Total amount of under-market offering is probably not much more than 2,000,000 pounds at a liberal estimate. Largest individual second-hand sale this week has been 350,000 pounds, and most sales that are being talked about are much more in carload lots of 25 to 30 tons or 50,000 to 100,000 pounds.

McLeod is held under \$2,000 bail pending prosecution.

#### JAPANESE FISHERMAN BURIED ON SATURDAY

T. Yamamoto Was 44 Years of Age and is Survived by Wife and Family at Dominion Cannery

The funeral of the late T. Yamamoto, Japanese, took place on Saturday afternoon from Hayner Bros. chapel at Fairview Cemetery, Rev. H. Higashi, of the local Japanese mission, officiating.

Deceased, who was 44 years of age, died in the hospital last week after an illness of ten days. He was a fisherman at Dominion Cannery and is survived by a widow and three children.

#### SHIPS HELD BY ICE ON LAKE SUPERIOR

Held About Three Miles From Shore and Supplies are Running Low

SAULT STE. MARIE, May 14.—The steamers Frank Ball, Cletus Schneider and H. P. McIntosh were caught by ice floes in Lake Superior and have been held there by a strong wind three miles from shore for more than six days. It is feared their food supplies must be low but it is impossible to reach them with supplies. They must wait until the wind or thaw breaks up the ice jam.

#### Russian Demonstrators Hang Effigies of Lord Curzon and Politicians Make Speeches

MOSCOW, May 14.—Thousands of demonstrators marched through the streets hanging effigies of Lord Curzon in protest at the British foreign secretary's ultimatum concerning British fishing vessels seized by the Soviet in neutral waters. The Soviet leaders addressed the mob saying Russia offered England a conference with the aim of settling the differences.

"Russia is anxious to avoid a clash, but if war comes the red army is ready," says Trotsky.

LONDON, May 14.—Labor organizations held a mass meeting in Hyde Park yesterday as a protest against the British ultimatum to Russia. The British government was denounced by several speakers. There were no disorders.

MOSCOW, May 14.—Soviet Russia's note to Great Britain, the text of which was given here today, was couched in conciliatory terms, expressing regretful surprise at the ultimatum. It proposes a conference with England to discuss the disputed questions.

#### CANADA NEGOTIATING FOR LONDON OFFICE

LONDON, May 14.—Reports that the Canadian Government had secured the Cox Building in Pall Mall for the Canadian High Commissioner's office, is denied by two reputable sources or at least branded as premature. The negotiations are far from complete.

#### PIRATES IN CHINA SEAS

Seize Vessel and Carry off Much Loot Terrorizing Passengers

HONGKONG, May 14.—European passengers were among those terrorized and robbed when the Chinese steamer Tai Shun was seized near Swatow Saturday by pirates, who disguised as passengers, overpowered the crew and sailed the ship for 24 hours and finally left her at the mouth of a small creek transferring to a junk loot valued at \$60,000.

The Union steamer Chelohsin, Capt. Stacey, with passengers and mail, arrived from Vancouver and way ports at 1 o'clock this morning, sailing an hour or so later for Alice Arm and Anox. The vessel is due to sail for the south at 6 tomorrow evening.

#### TENDERS ASKED FOR STEWART-HYDER ROAD

Tenders are being called for the construction of the Stewart-Hyder road, a permanent thoroughfare about a mile long that will do away with the necessity of keeping up the long trestle leading to the town of Stewart. This is an improvement which will prove a real economy although the road to be built will be rather costly.

#### SCATTER FACTORIES THROUGHOUT MICHIGAN

#### Texas Tornado Brings Death to Many People on Farms and Ranches of Southern State

BIG SPRINGS, Texas, May 14.—Fifty persons were killed and about 100 injured near Colorado, Texas, when a tornado swept this section of the country, according to meagre reports arriving here.

COLORADO, Texas, May 14.—Eight bodies of persons killed in a tornado near here this morning have been brought to Colorado and it is reported several more bodies are on the way here. Twelve persons are counted dead.

While there is as yet no official count of the number of persons killed in the big storm, persons doing relief work report that dead and injured are being found on almost every scattered farm and ranch dwelling for miles southwest of here.

#### RUSSIA BEGINS AERONAUTICS

Expect to Have 5,000 Aeroplanes Before Long and Has Made Start

FRANCE STILL LEADS

NEW YORK, May 14.—Soviet Russia has begun the development of a great commercial and military aircraft program and occupies an important position in the international race for the supremacy of the air, according to the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce, which has made public its annual survey of aviation throughout the world.

The report, covering flying activities in 58 countries, finds France the leader of all nations in both commercial and military aviation, and still working on heavy programs. The survey of the Russian activity, however, is of unusual interest.

"Russia is using German, French and Dutch airplanes. Special aviation schools have been established at Toul, Moscow, Smolensk, Kharkov, Pola, Ekaterineslaw, Mokilaw and Petrograd. The council of Commissaries has voted to obtain 300 new airplanes for the Red Army. It is reported unauthoritatively that 100 planes have been bought from Italy. In four cities the government has established domestic aircraft factories. The program for the year is fully to equip 70 fighting squadrons.

"In all, the Soviet government's program calls for 5,000 airplanes with spare parts. With the assistance of German aeronautical experts plans have been made for exploiting vast territories. Great trunk lines have been charted. It is proposed to have in operation by 1926 many thousands of aircraft. German pilots are expected to join the comparatively few Russian aviators on the commercial lines.

Edward Cook, pioneer contractor of Vancouver who built some of the earlier large buildings in the southern city, is visiting Prince Rupert with A. A. Cox, architect from the same city. They arrived from the south on the Prince George Saturday afternoon and are staying at the Hotel Prince Rupert.

#### OBJECTION TO TARIFF CHANGE

Premier Dunning of Saskatchewan Takes Issue With Mon. W. S. Fielding

REGINA, May 14.—In a statement, which claims that the national Liberal platform adopted at the Winnipeg convention in 1919 is the basis of Liberalism, Premier C. A. Dunning of Saskatchewan says western Liberals will not accept the tariff views of Hon. W. S. Fielding as outlined in this year's budget.

Dunning says Fielding has no right to change at will the tariff policy enunciated by the most representative gathering of Liberals ever held in Canada.

#### CURZON'S NOTE

Suggests Expansion of Proposals to Make Them Eligible for Discussion

LONDON, May 14.—Lord Curzon's reply to the German reparations note expresses disappointment at the inadequate sum offered and at the lack of precision as to the guarantees. It suggests that Germany will reconsider the situation and expand the proposals in such a way as to convert them into a feasible basis for further discussion.

## RELIGION A MATTER OF NATIONALITY SAYS LANGUAGE PROFESSOR

TOKIO, May 14.—Just as Buddhism and other Oriental cults will never spread extensively to Occidental nations, so Christianity will never become firmly established among the countries of the Orient, according to Dr. Sylvain Lévin, professor of oriental languages at Strasbourg University and the College de France, who recently arrived here.

"The religion of a nation depends on the average temperament and intelligence of its people," said Dr. Lévin. "Christianity in its demand for active participation in affairs of the nation is best suited for western countries. Likewise, Buddhism, Brahmanism and other Oriental religions, with their basic principles of contemplation and meditation, fit best into the scheme of things as typified in the less strenuous life of the Orient."

Dr. Lévin claims that Buddhism is by far the most strongly established in Japan and the religion best suited to the people of this country.

Local Dealers Do Business in Open Know They Must Face the Music if Their Customers Are Displeased MEET PATRONS FACE TO FACE Mail Order Men Prefer to Sell at Long Distance Rather Than Deal With People in Their Own Cities

One of the stock excuses of the man who orders goods from a mail order house is that there are many things that he wants that the local merchants do not carry in stock, and that it is necessary for him to send away from town to get them.

This explanation may be all right on the theory that a poor excuse is better than none, but it fails to pass muster when it is subjected to a little scrutiny.

The local merchant is in business for the very purpose of getting you what you want. He has the information that will enable him to get what you want and to get it as quickly as you could get it from a mail order house.
