TREATY MAY BAR ALL CHINESE LABORERS PARLIAMENT IS OPENED TODAY AT OTTAWA BY GOVERNOR GENERAL BYNG

Chinese Trade Treaty Removes Head Tax Says Ottawa Consul General

Laborers from China to be Prohibited and Canadian Wheat to be Exchanged for Silk

VANCOUVER, Jan. 31.—A reciprocal trade and immigration treaty is shortly to be concluded between Canada and China, according to Dr. Tsur, Chinese consul general at Ottawa on his way here from Peking.

"Canada wants our silks and we want Canadian wheat," Dr. Tsur. "The trade treaty will provide that China will not allow laborers to come to Canada while the Dominion will remove head tax," he said.

PRINCE RUPERT AS A POSSIBLE SHIPPING PORT

Victoria Despatch to Financial Post of Toronto Mentions Rivalry Over Grain Business

LIBRARY MOVES INTO NEW HOME

Old Public Works Building Provides Commodious and Well Appointed Quarters

The municipal free library reopened in its new quarters in the old provincial government public works building at the corner of Third Ave and Fourth Street this afternoon at 1 o'clock. The interior of the premises has undergone a complete remodeling and cleaning up and the quarters, commodious and well arranged, should meet the needs of the library for some time to come. After having put up with the inconvenience of the old Red Cross hut for several months, Miss Grant, the librarian, is much pleased with her new location. There is much more room allowing for new and more comfortable appointments both for the librarian and the public.

Reading Table

A new feature that is to be found in the new home of the library is a large reading table for which have been provided several valuable periodicals such as the Scientific American, National Geographic Magazine, Punch, Atlantic Monthly, Harper's Magazine, The Studio, World's Work, The New Statesman, The Nation (British), Missionary Review of the World, Canadian Magazine, Canadian Bookman and English Bookman. There is also a fine map containing large and detailed maps of every district of the province. The reading table may also be used by members of the library for looking over books before taking them out.

The new library is also to be fitted out with a workroom in which the librarian will be able to do her filing and preparing of records. This has not yet been finished by the carpenters, however.

Official Publications

The library is also being supplied now with the B.C. Gazette, Canada Gazette, Commercial Intelligence Journal and memoirs from the Canadian geological survey.

Miss Grant reports that the membership of the library to date stands at 810 showing a healthy and steady increase in the popularity of the institution. The 1922 board held its last meeting yesterday and the 1923 board is to have its first next Tuesday.

TURKS ASKING MORE DELAY

Would Have Two Weeks Before Being Asked to Sign Peace Treaty

LAUSANNE, Jan. 31.—A long consultation among allied delegates in an endeavor to maintain a united front against the Turks preceded the opening of the Near East conference today. It is said the British will probably be disposed to grant the Turks some days for reflection.

Ismet Pasha and the Turks asked the conference for a delay of two weeks before the affixing their signatures to the peace treaty and a delay of eight days before the meeting of the conference. The commission would in the meantime, he explained, be striving by every means to reach an agreement.

RUSSIAN REFUGEES LOSE LIVES AT SEA

MANILA, Jan. 31.—With the arrival today of the steamship Paris, a belated member of the fleet carrying Russian refugees, it was learned that her sister ship had been sunk off Formosa last week with the loss of 20 lives.

PRESENTATION TO MR. DUNCAN

German Defiance to France Must Make Good Her Mistake

BERLIN, Jan. 31.—An apparently inspired statement issued by the semi-official news agency, says it is the task of the German people to reduce the French Premier's calculations to an absurdity. The statement concludes: "Not until France realizes that Poincare's action in Ruhr is not only unjust but also a mistake which must be made good, can the path of negotiations become free."

Britain Accepts the Americans Proposal for Funding of War Debts to the United States

LONDON, Jan. 31.—Great Britain has decided to accept the American offer regarding the funding of the British war debt in the United States.

The decision was reached at a cabinet meeting this afternoon. The terms are three per cent for ten years and three and a half per cent thereafter.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The British decision to accept the American debt funding suggestions is said today by Secretary Mellon to open the way for an immediate drafting of recommendations to the president for changes in the funding law to legalize the terms suggested in the American proposition.

FRANCE WILL NOT DEVIATE

Germany's Fate in Own Hands Says Commander of Occupation Forces

DUSSELDORF, Jan. 31.—"Germany's fate is in her own hands. Nothing will make us deviate from the course which has been laid out for us. We will take whatever time and measures are necessary." Thus spoke General Denoutte, allied commander in the occupied zone.

MARK GIVEN UP THE GHOST

Bourse Gazette Predicts Central Europe Will Share Russia's Fate

BERLIN, Jan. 31.—One ten thousandth of their pre-war value was the price of German marks on the bourse today. There was a lively demand for dollars on the basis of 45,000 and actual offers of 50,000 first.

Financial critics agree that the mark has given up the ghost. The Bourse Gazette predicts Russia's fate will confront Central Europe if the civilized world continues to look on complacently as Germany is being overrun by "French imperialism and brigandage."

STINNES CONTRACT WITH FRANCE HAS BEEN REPUDIATED

BERLIN, Jan. 31.—Hugo Stinnes, has repudiated the contract for construction work in the devastated area of France, which he concluded several months ago with Marquis Lubersac. It is reported that hundreds of car loads of building material have been sent into Northern France under the provisions of the agreement.

STEWART AGAIN HEADS HOSPITAL

D. C. McRae Vice-Chairman and Major Gibson, Secretary—All Elections Unanimous

D. G. Stewart was unanimously president of the hospital board at the first business meeting of the new board last night.

In moving Mr. Stewart's re-election, W. E. Collison stated the board could hardly be imagined without Mr. Stewart as its head. He had been president since the inception of the institution and it was largely through his interest and energy that it had been so successful. Seconding the motion, Ald. Collart referred to Mr. Stewart's interest in the nurses' home project and expressed the opinion that he should be re-elected in order to lead in carrying it through to a successful conclusion. Mr. Stewart demurred but said if it was the wish of the directors he could hardly refuse the honor.

D. C. McRae was re-elected vice-chairman and Major George E. Gibson, managing secretary, at his present salary, both selections being unanimous.

The election of officers was the only business of the meeting at which were present D. G. Stewart, D. C. McRae, Mrs. Jarvis McLeod, S. K. Campbell, W. E. Collison, T. Ross Mackay, Ald. Theo. Collart, E. H. Mortimer and Major Gibson.

GOOD CATCH OF HALIBUT

Landings During Month Half Million Pounds More Than Last Year

In spite of adverse weather conditions that prevailed for a good part of the month, the fish landings at this port for January were well sustained, the total of 1,966,900 pounds of halibut which was marketed during the month being 592,000 pounds greater than January, 1922.

The highest price paid during the month was 20c, on January 13, as compared with 18.9c, the high mark for January last year. The lowest price during the month for first class fish was 11c, on January 3.

The total catch landed here in January 1921 was 777,000.

MR. AND MRS. DAWSON GONE TO CALIFORNIA

Left for the South by Train by Way of Jasper Park

Mr. and Mrs. Dawson left on the train last night for Vancouver by way of Jasper. From there they will go to California where Mrs. Dawson expects to remain awhile in an effort to recover her health.

Mr. Dawson will return in a few weeks.

Owing to Mrs. Dawson's health Mr. Dawson found it impossible to attend a meeting of the Railway board at Ottawa, but he will take up the work on his return from the south.

Parliament Opened Today at Ottawa by Baron Byng of Vimy Formalities are all Concluded

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—Baron Byng of Vimy, governor general of Canada, today opened the second session of Canada's fourth parliament. The scene in the Senate chamber where the ceremony took place was a brilliant one. As the Governor General, accompanied by an escort from the Princess Louise Dragoon Guards, entered the chamber, a salute of 21 guns was fired from Nepean Point. Members of the House of Commons were summoned from their chamber to the Senate where the King's speech was read.

The formalities were briefer than last session. The Commons today heard only the speech from the throne.

The formal opening of Parliament over, the members of the House of Commons again headed by Speaker Lemieux, returned to their own chamber for the despatch of business. The premier first introduced a pro forma bill respecting the administration of oaths of office. The bill is only a formal one. It was introduced and no more will be heard of it again until next session comes around.

Tributes were paid to the memory of the four members whom death had called since last session: D. A. LaFortune, Edward Blackadder, W. C. Kennedy, minister of railways and J. A. Stewart, minister of railways in the Meighen administration.

The debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne will open tomorrow.

GRAVE TASK IRELAND YET

Efforts Being Made by Irregulars to Prevent Holding of Elections

IRELAND, Jan. 31.—That the Free State government is still confronted with a grave task, is shown by the intensified campaign of destruction and incendiarism by irregulars. These acts are regarded as proof that the irregulars are determined to resort to every means to prevent the government from functioning and to break the country's morale and thereby if possible prevent the holding of the elections.

Secretly irregulars continue to amass arms and ammunition and explosive bombs and land mines, the destructive power of which are alarmingly great.

Minister of Defence Mulcahey announces that the bodies of men executed by the Free State will not be handed over to relatives.

WAGE CUT FOR LIQUOR BOARD

Fewer Inspectors to be Employed Watching Breweries It is Announced

VANCOUVER, Jan. 31.—A twenty per cent cut in the wages of outside employees of the Liquor Control board, commencing February 1, is announced here. The rate will be four dollars a day against five paid previously. The reduction affects deputy inspectors, warehousemen and the men on the trucks.

VICTORIA, Jan. 31.—Along with the cut in the liquor board wages there is to be a sweeping reduction in the staff of the brewery inspectors which the board employed to watch the breweries day and night to see that no beer got out unannounced. There will in future be but one man on eight hours during the day on the breweries.

GOLDSTREAM HOTEL VICTORIA, BURNED

Well Known Road House on Malahat Drive Goes Up in Smoke

VICTORIA, Jan. 31.—The well-known Goldstream Hotel, about twelve miles from here at the entrance to the Malahat drive, was burned to the ground at noon yesterday. This was a well-known road house and at one time was popular for picnic parties and Sunday outings. It was built more than twenty years ago.

Old Farmer John Has Plenty Of Brains.

Farmer John Oliver has plenty of brains. He still is leader by right of the people of British Columbia. Sometimes he may say something which smacks somewhat of the yokel, but beneath it all is a vein of sound common sense. Even the cultured east is beginning to recognize that here is an outstanding man even though the King's English may sometimes suffer from his method of rendition. Farmer John is an out and out Canadian although not born in this country. He fought his way to the top and now at last he is being recognized everywhere throughout the country. When people talk of forming a farmer party they must remember that they can never get a farmer leader so typical of the farmer class as is the leader of the present government of British Columbia.

School Board Should Watch Their Steps.

We all want an investigation into the school fiasco. Everyone is agreed as to the desirability of finding out if possible who is responsible for the trouble. The difficulty is that the architect is away, apparently for keeps, and almost all the witnesses are away. Before commencing to spend the people's money on this investigation, we suggest to the board that they secure some very definite data as to the cost. We have just got clear of spending money on that building and if we are to add another mill to the tax rate in order to make an abortive inquiry, there will be a good deal of indignation expressed by the ratepayers. Have the inquiry, if it can be done without much expense, but be very definite that the amount to be spent is limited to a few hundred dollars at the most. We can make better use of our money than throwing it away on an inquiry that seems likely to get us nowhere.

Smithers People Join Fair Board.

Prince Rupert will appreciate the action of a number of Smithers citizens in joining the Northern British Columbia Agricultural and Industrial Association. The amount of money that was received, while not negligible, does not figure in the affair so much as the kindly and fraternal spirit that prompts the action.

The Daily News has again and again urged on the people here and in the neighboring settlements the desirability of co-operation. Unfortunately the distances are great, the cost of travelling is high, and the time taken in visiting interferes with business, else there would be much closer association between the residents of each place. Prince Rupert people should visit as often as possible the other places and it is to be hoped the courtesy will be returned.

Sometimes petty jealousies arise, but these are purely local and are unnecessary. Prince Rupert welcomes the success of Smithers, of Terrace, of Telkwa, of Vanderhoof, and of Prince George. We like to see Stewart, Anxox and Alice Arm make progress. It pleases us to see progress on the Queen Charlotte Islands. We recognize that we have everything to gain and nothing to lose by their prosperity. Our interests are mutual. That is the way it should be with all parts of the province. We regret that just now the action of a fraction of the Vancouver people has made it impossible to feel that way in regard to the big city on Burrard Inlet. Some day perhaps we shall forget the nasty stab in the back they tried to give us and shall be able to once more work in harmony.

BANQUET FOR J. F. VENABLES

Presentation Made by C. H. Orme
on Behalf of Those Present

LETTER OF APPRECIATION

At a banquet given in his honor last night J. F. Venable, the retiring manager of the Prince Rupert Agricultural and Industrial Association, was presented with an address of appreciation of his services as fair manager and citizen and also he was given a set of pipes in remembrance of the occasion. President Orme of the association presided and a sumptuous repast was served of which a large number partook. A six piece orchestra provided music and during the evening appreciative speeches were made. Mayor Newton speaking on behalf of the city of the loss that would be sustained through Mr. Venable's leaving.

After Mr. Orme had explained the object of the gathering, C. C. Mills, on behalf of Mr. Dawson, who was going south that evening, read a letter of appreciation as follows:

Mr. Dawson's Letter

"It is with sincere regret that I find it impossible to be with you tonight to join in the festivities and to bid farewell and God-speed to Mr. Venable, who was a valued employee for several years of my firm, and who so faithfully and successfully handled the management last year of our annual fair, of which I happened to be president.

Mr. Venable's resignation came as a complete surprise to me and with misgivings as I had hoped that the association would be fortunate enough to keep him permanently. A man of his energy, initiative and ability, coupled with a good strong board of directors is all that is needed to make our annual fair more and more of a success. The Northern B.C. Agricultural and Industrial Association has become a permanent institution and with sound business judgment on the part of the directors and the right kind of active management its development is almost unlimited.

Mr. Venable, besides being an active and energetic manager of the fair has rendered excellent service in the way of gathering and compiling information and data which will be of great value to his successor and to the present and succeeding boards of directors. Furthermore in his report to the officers and members of the association he has pointed out very clearly and exhaustively where mistakes were made last year and has recommended a remedy and this report should be very carefully read by all the new directors as they will find therein some very helpful suggestions.

Brought Success

The popularity contest put on last year by Mr. Venable was a huge financial success, bringing in a gross revenue of \$3,750.00, and notwithstanding this fact the gate receipts in cash each day of the fair exceeded those of each day of the preceding year. These two factors, coupled with the energy of the manager in selling to good advantage all the commercial and carnival booths was what made the fair such a financial success and enabled the directors to go ahead with much needed and very important and quite extensive and expensive repairs and permanent improvements.

Mr. Venable also planned and inaugurated towards the end of the year an extensive membership drive which was very commendable but which was not the success it should have been, due, I fear, to the lack of interest on the part of the directors, but it is not too late yet to carry this scheme out to a successful conclusion, and at no further expense to the new board, as the tickets are all printed and available and I respectfully suggest to the new board that a vigorous membership drive be carried on as I am firmly of the belief that by this means you will be able to interest hundreds of people in your exhibition who would otherwise be apathetic.

I am very sorry that it was not my privilege to have been present at the annual meeting and to have taken part in the proceedings, and I wish to take this opportunity of expressing my sincerest thanks to my co-directors for their hearty co-operation in the work and for the harmony and good fellowship which existed throughout the year.

Support New Board
I wish also to congratulate the members of the agricultural association, on the election this year of an exceptionally strong board of directors and to congratulate the directors on their selection of C. H. Orme as president and to say that if you will co-operate with him as my board did with me, your fair will be a huge success and a great credit, not only to you, but to the city of Prince Rupert and the entire district.

In conclusion, I wish the new board every success and pledge them my hearty support, and advice should they need it, and will say further that I think you can count on the hearty support of every real citizen of Prince Rupert and district, or should be able to, as the exhibition is an event of great importance to everyone who is trying to develop Prince Rupert and the territory contiguous thereto.

To Mr. and Mrs. Venable I convey my sincerest best wishes for health and prosperity in their new field, wherever it may be, but join with all the rest of their friends in hoping that they are not leaving Prince Rupert for good.

Mayor Newton said the unfortunate part of festivities such as they had that night was the pang of regret that came with the parting with one who had been there since the early days. Mr. Venable was a worthy citizen, energetic in the life of the place, and could have continued as such and as a faithful official of the exhibition. This was the only aspect for regret. If anything could demonstrate the worth of Mr. Venable it was the report they had just read. It clearly indicated the great grasp he had on the operations in connection with the exhibition.

Mr. Newton commended the idea expressed in the report, that the fair board should get in touch with the outside districts. In conclusion he said he voiced the sentiments of every citizen in regretting that Mr. Venable should be leaving, wishing him every success and extending the same to Mrs. Venable and family.

The presentation of the address and the case of pipes was made by Mr. Orme.

Venable Replies

In reply Mr. Venable said he very much regretted going but he felt he could always come back—applause. He did not say he would stay away. He went away once before. He said he always liked Prince Rupert and he expected it to be a good town. He spoke appreciatively of the interior country and said he would like to see the farmers encouraged. When development here started, he would be back and he hoped it would be soon. It was good to think that somebody cared. He had tried to do the best he could and if he had been successful he was glad to know it. He had found that it was impossible to make a success alone. There had to be team work. He suggested that the 1923 fair would be a much greater success than the last.

Co-operation

In closing, Mr. Orme asked for the co-operation of all in connection with the exhibition this year. The biggest thing was to secure the right kind of manager. It was a good sized business and success depended on getting a man who had a grasp of everything.

PRINCE RUPERT AS A POSSIBLE SHIPPING PORT

(Continued from Page 1).

new branch lines, storage accommodation and new buildings, but in addition to these a vast movement of comparatively recent origin has developed—the westbound shipment of grain from the prairies to British Columbia ports.

The advantage of shipping west for the export trade to the United Kingdom, continental Europe and the Far East did not exist before the Panama Canal was built, and during the war years the shortage of tonnage made it impossible for that route to be extensively used. Now, however, wheat is rolling to the Pacific seaboard for transshipment in steadily increasing volume.

Rivals of Vancouver

Until recently Vancouver, already in possession of an elevator, has been the only city actively engaged in a campaign for the expansion of wheat handling facilities, but now it has strong competition. Lumber interests are behind the effort to build on the wheat trade, because the more wheat gets that come to the coast the more ears there will be available to handle eastbound lumber shipments.

Victoria has entered the ranks of contenders for handling the bulk of the export wheat shipments to the sea, and municipal and business organizations are throwing their influence behind the proposed construction of a \$350,000 grain elevator.

The fact that Victoria is the first port of call for inbound steamships from the Orient and the United Kingdom, the principal offshore markets for prairie wheat, is regarded as an important item in the city's favor as speed is one of the vital factors in the grain handling trade.

Advantage to Farmer

The Winnipeg Grain Exchange has ascertained from actual transactions in 1922 that the farmer can get twelve cents per bushel more by shipping his wheat through a Pacific port than by the Port William and the Great Lakes route. This is on the basis of the present railway rate discrimination against the Pacific Coast whereunder wheat is hauled 1,400 miles eastward for the same rate charged to haul wheat 700 miles westward. When the present discrimination is removed, the permanent advantage to the farmer will, it is said, be about sixteen per cents a bushel, and the total gain to the farmers as a result of shipping by the Pacific coast will reach \$10,000,000 a year.

Rupert's Project

Prince Rupert has been working for months on an elevator project, and business interests in that city believe that the government is likely to co-operate with them in this enterprise. The fact that Prince Rupert is the northern terminus of the Canadian National Railway (G. T.P.) and closer to the grain country of Northern Alberta and Saskatchewan than the southern seaports of British Columbia is strongly in that city's favor, as well as the fact that the route between Prince Rupert and the Far East is considerable shorter than the route between Vancouver or Victoria and the Far East.

All the cities bidding for elevator accommodation are preparing exhaustive data with which to convince the C.N.R. head of their respective advantages, and by the time these are sifted out the transportation situation as it affects the various coast terminals should be clarified.

In connection with the planting of wild rice seed, which is being tried out here as a bait for wild geese and ducks, there is a difference of opinion as to the way the seed should be kept during transportation and while it is awaiting planting. A Department of Agriculture bulletin says that seed packed dry gives better results for a journey of two or three weeks than seed packed moist but warns against exposing it to the sun. On the other hand, Robert Campbell, the Ontario expert on rice seed, says that drying seed kills it so that it will never grow. Alex. McRae, of this city, who is making experiments with the seed, kept his wet all the time.

A test of telepathy, to be sci-
entific, must be capable of being re-
peated at will and verified as
often as wished. Our conscious
mind is not able to bring up a
thought from the depths of our
subconscious soul every time we
wish to do so. This is because of
the barrier of the brain.

The brain is the organ of adap-
tation to physical environment.
So long as we have to live in a
material body and deal with ex-
ternal objects, it is a good thing
that our brain acts like a watch-
man at the gate, refusing admis-
sion into our conscious mind to the
millions of irrelevant
thoughts surging up from the
subconscious depths of our being.
We should be driven to distraction
if it were not for the blessed
barrier of the brain.

Mind and Nerves Connected

It may be asked how can the
little pendulum record uncon-
scious thoughts. The answer is
because of the most intimate re-
lationship between the subcon-
scious mind and the sympathetic
nervous system which, in turn,
controls the involuntary actions
of our vital organs and twitching
muscles. I fail to see at present
how it would be possible to get a
scientific proof of telepathy cap-
able of repetition at will without
some mechanical contrivance to
register the unconscious activi-
ties of the subconscious mind.

In our experience we found that
the progressive lengthening of
the intervening distance, first by
yards, then by rods, and then by
miles, did not make the slightest
difference. From 7 miles away
the message came in just as
strongly as from seven feet away.
Space is only relative to a ma-

terial body in motion, and mind
energy is a spiritual force.

As a trained psychologist I
have not only been making origi-
nal experiments, but I have been
critically observing these experi-
ments and so have something to
announce to the scientific world,
though I feel that I am just on
the threshold of the mystery of
the mind.

Experiment in Schools

As to the Chevreul pendulum, I
think every high school should
use this to demonstrate the first
principle of psychology, the law
of ideomotor action. If the boy
is to make a success in life, it is
well for him to see with his eyes
how an idea in his mind works
itself out in his actions.

In experimenting in radio-
mind, according to our method,
the first step is for each of the
two co-operating persons to prac-
tise with the pendulum alone un-
til each becomes convinced that it
will respond instantly to his
thought of motion. Let him
practise with the bob hanging
half an inch above an index card,
with the letters of the alphabet
phonetically grouped, so as to
economize space, in a little less
than a semi-circle, keeping the
bob at the centre of the circle. He
will be amazed at the way the
pendulum will spell out the word
he thinks letter by letter.

The second step is for the two
persons prepared by practice to
now adopt the principle of di-
vision of labor. One to do the
thinking and the other the re-
cording. The one holding the
pendulum should be most careful
to see that it is swinging to and
fro under the control of his own
mind before he becomes passively
receptive. During this experiment

the two persons should be stand-
ing side by side.

Distance No Consideration

If the word thought of by the
one, letter by letter, is correctly
recorded by the other's pendulum,
there has been thought trans-
ference.

The third step is for these two
persons to put as many miles as
they like between them and re-
peat the experiment. The only
difficulty now is to get coinci-
dence in time.

I have found by experience that
it is well to make use of the law
of rhythm, timing my concentra-
tions to accord with the swing of
the pendulum. Knowing that what
the will is to the conscious mind,
the imagination is to the subcon-
scious mind, I have found it help-
ful for each operator to visualize
the other.

Perhaps this is the greatest
contribution I have to make to the
cause of science. The supposed
barrier of space between two
minds can be effectually annihi-
lated by the power of the imagi-
nation working through the fund-
amental union of all souls in the
realm of the subconscious world.

The object of these experi-
ments is not to cause a passing
merriment, but to give a sci-
entific demonstration of the psychic
truth which lies at the foundation
of the Fellowship of the Spirit
and the Communion of the Saints.

MANY TAXATION APPEALS MADE

Court of Revision This Year to Have Good Deal of Business—51 Protests Entered

The municipal court of revision is going to have a good deal more business to attend to this year than last, according to the number of appeals that have already been entered and which are posted today in the City Hall. This year there are a total of 51 appeals as against 30 last year. Some of these are of a blanket nature and include groups of lots. For instance, the G.T.P. Development Co. is appealing the assessment of all its lots in Sections 3, 4 and 9 on the grounds that they are over valued. The majority of the appeals are on account of alleged over-valuation and inequitable value several water-front owners and lessees are appealing on the ground that the city has no power to assess them. Assessor J. C. McLennan and the court of revision will open sessions at 10 o'clock on February 8.

PRINCE RUPERT ASSESSMENT DISTRICT.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5% before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation for less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be granted a certificate of occupancy, but must transfer his claim to the Crown within 60 days.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$50 per annum and records are made each year.

Failure to make improvements of record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in this case.

Improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 acres are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he enters and in conjunction with his first, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown Grant and

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 400 acres may be used by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased on conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows, inaccessible or existing on land may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces in any war, in which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by pre-emptors, in pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1913. Fees are remitted for five years. Provision for return of money advanced, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on sold lands are remitted.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or descendants, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from installment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travelers, up to ten head.
