The Mermaid came a close second with a bid of 23c and 12c for 8,000 pounds also from the Booth Fisheries. while the Roald Amundsen was paid 22.7c and 12c by the Atlin Fisheries for 13,000 pounds. The highest price on record before today for first class fish was 23c paid during the war.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20. Zev, the American horse, defeated Papyrus, the English Derby winner, by six lengths in a mile and a half international race today.

Away with a lead of a length, Papyrus seemed to stop and Zev took the lead as he passed the paddock gate.

The American colt held the lead of a length until the home stretch was reached where Jockey Sande called upon Zev for speed.

The English colt, driven hard by Donoghue, failed to get up when they passed under the wire.

Frozen halibut are to be shipped from this port direct to France if plans of French businessmen mature. Official notification has been received that trial shipments are to be made with a view to working up a business with this port. It is possible also that salt cod will be shipped to France from this coast in the near future. The matter has been taken up through official quarters and it is quite possible this may be the beginning of an important industry.



Twelve Mile Limit And Halibut Fisheries.

If the present three mile limit of territorial waters should be extended to twelve, as desired by the United States, it would very seriously affect the fishing industry. At present all vessels fish in Hecate Straits outside the three mile limit. With the extension of the territorial limit, Hecate Straits would become almost closed to foreign fishing vessels and then might become a Canadian halibut preserve.
