HON. ERNEST LAPOINTE IS VISITING CITY

DAWSON BRINGS OPTIMISTIC MESSAGE REGARDING MILL; B.C. LOSES CASES

Minister of Marine is Pleased with the City and is Busy Man Here

Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of marine and fisheries, reached the city on the steamer Prince George last evening accompanied by Madame Lapointe and O. Langlois, Mr. Lapointe's secretary. They were met at the steamer by Fred Stork, M.P., and other citizens and proceeded to the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Stork on Allin Avenue where a dinner party was given in their honor. Later in the evening Mr. Lapointe officially opened the annual Catholic bazaar.

This morning, accompanied by Fred Stork, M.P., Adam Mackie, inspector of fisheries, Capt. F. T. Saunders, Ald. Theo Collart and Mr. Langlois, Mr. Lapointe visited the marine station on Digby Island.

Immediately on the return of the minister to the city, he met several delegations at the Dominion Fisheries office and then

MR. LAPOINTE AT BOARD OF TRADE LUNCHEON

Gives Optimistic Address Dealing With Many Vital Subjects This Afternoon

Bringing a message of optimism, of tolerance and of moderation to the people of Prince Rupert, Hon. Ernest Lapointe today addressed the Board of Trade at luncheon in the St. Regis Cafe, with E. G. Gibbons presiding, and supported and introduced by Fred Stork, M.P.

Mr. Lapointe touched upon many vital subjects in a national way and expressed the hope that there would be reciprocity between the United States and Canada in the fish business. He told of the various improvements in trade and commerce that had taken place, Canada was the only country that had been actively engaged in the war from the beginning whose money was at par. If the world had confidence in Canada why should Canadians despair.

Mr. Lapointe also spoke of the progress of the Canadian National Railways under the able management of Sir Henry Thornton and the board of directors of which a Prince Rupert man was by no means the least. If things went on improving as they were today, Canada's financial troubles would soon be over.

The visitor also mentioned the sympathy for and interest in Prince Rupert which was always shown by those who had been connected with the original plans for the railway. They were always glad to see anything which made for her progress. He made a plea for a spirit of unity throughout Canada.

Votes of Thanks

A vote of thanks to the speaker was proposed by W. E. Williams and seconded by Mayor Newton, both of whom urged Mr. Lapointe to use his best influence in bringing to realization those aspirations that had originally actuated the establishment of the city. The provision of a grain elevator it was expressed would be the first step in this direction.

There was a large attendance at the luncheon representative of the business and professional men of the city. The gathering opened with the singing of "O Canada" and closed with the National Anthem. The Westholm Orchestra rendered selections during the repast.

Capitalists are Negotiating for Local Lumber Mill and a Good Many Nearby Timber Limits

That there is a good prospect of the Emerson mill and the big pulp limits in this city being sold to some big United States capitalists, is the word brought back from Vancouver by F. G. Dawson, who arrived last evening on the Prince George. When in the East recently he got in touch with some moneyed interests and gave them particulars of the local property. They were very much interested and arrangements were later made to meet Mr. Dawson in Vancouver where they were introduced to the owners of the property. They have satisfied themselves in regard to the property if their technical men bear out the information which has been given. These men will now be sent here to examine the mill, the pulp mill site and the timber limits.

Mr. Dawson explained this morning that the proposition was one for a pulp mill to be installed almost immediately and this to be followed later by a paper mill. The company which hold the property today have 51 limits, mostly on the Quitsamateen River, between here and the Naas with six hundred million feet of standing timber. This has been surveyed more than once and the cruising checked up.

Tentative arrangements have been made with the railway company for lease of the site and there seems quite a probability that the deal may go through.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 18. — The first mixed jury in British Columbia disagreed last night after three hours deliberations on a charge against Wong Hoy accused of stealing \$50 from a Sikh boy. Hoy said the complainant owed him money and he was trying to recoup himself.

The judge had previously expressed himself in disapproval of women jurors reluctantly dismissed eight men and four women.

Alberta Calls on Dominion to Provide Facilities for Getting Wheat Crop out of that Province

EDMONTON, Oct. 18. — Steps to guard against the threatened congestion of grain carriers on both the great lakes and Pacific routes and to secure the fullest possible arrangements for getting Alberta's big wheat crop out to market have been taken by the provincial government, in the way of calling the dominion authorities' attention to the seriousness of the situation and the need of immediate provision for increased freight accommodation.

A letter has been sent by the government to Hon. W. S. Fielding, acting prime minister, pointing out the enormous proportion of the work involved in moving this province's crop alone and urging action accordingly.

With three times as much grain to be moved from Alberta as last year, the task facing the country as a whole is a big and serious one, and there are possibilities of trouble in it unless prompt steps are taken to meet it. That is the purport of the letter to Ottawa, which the government has intended as an official reminder of what the facts at this end of the line really are.

Immense Crop to Move

Alberta's share of the total estimated crop of 457,653,000 bushels in the three provinces is put at 160,000,000, and approximately 70 per cent of this will be for export. Last year there was handled from the three provinces about 262,178,000 bushels, and this year, on the same basis, there will be it is expected, over 320,000,000 bushels. So far most of the grain that has gone forward by the lake route has been from Saskatchewan and Manitoba and the heavy end of the movement from Alberta still remains. During the months of October and November, with one trip in December, the Canadian boats operating on the lakes will have a total carrying capacity of about 71,400,000 bushels, whereas last year, when there were American as well as Canadian boats on the route the total shipped by that route was 137,661,066 bushels. The letter to Ottawa also points out that the elevator capacity at the head of the lakes has increased only a little over 1922 and now is approximately 60,000,000 bushels.

Urgent Need of Action

These figures make a serious situation, the dominion authorities are reminded, and Alberta is much concerned about the provision necessary to meet it. Both the great lakes and Vancouver routes will be required, and with greatly increased service on both it will be a difficult matter to move the crop, on account of its unusual proportions. The figures, too, are more likely to run over than under the estimates.

What the provincial government is asking is that action be taken at Ottawa to secure that the largest possible number of carriers be put on both routes, in order that provision may be made for the rush of wheat to the lake head and seaboard that will follow almost immediately. The situation is so urgent, it is pointed out, that action along these lines is the greatest and most immediate need from Alberta's point of view.

SAM WESTON GOES TO JAIL

Two Years for Having Stolen Auto in Possession; Other Cases Dropped

VANCOUVER, Oct. 18. — Sam Weston, formerly of Prince Rupert, was sentenced to two years in jail for having a stolen automobile in his possession. Twelve other charges of the same kind against him were not proceeded with.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 18. — Two years in the penitentiary was the sentence meted out by Judge Cayley yesterday to Sam Weston, convicted of having received a stolen auto. "Your youth appears to be the only thing in your favor," commented His Honor. "You were evidently in business in a wholesale way as a fence." C. S. Arnold, counsel for accused, asked that stay of proceedings be entered in connection with ten other similar charges but H. S. Wood, crown attorney, stated some of the car owners were pressing to have the cases they were interested in tried. "I have not yet decided," said Mr. Wood. The other cases were accordingly adjourned indefinitely with the understanding that if the Crown decides not to hold any other trials, a stay of proceedings will be entered.

Value To Country Of Parish Church.

At the Catholic bazaar last night Hon. Ernest Lapointe spoke of the value of the parish church in the life of the country. He coupled with it the value of co-operation and instanced the progress of Quebec where in each parish the people were united under a parish priest.

In the west we are not a church going people and yet no one would wish to remove the churches from the community. They are the centres from which radiate better influences which crystallize into forces that move the country.

No one can exactly gauge how much we owe the churches in the life of the country. We can only guess. Of what we are sure is that no community would like to be without them.

Election Talk Is Premature.

Premier Oliver says the talk of a provincial election is premature. There is no proposal to appeal to the country just now. As a matter of fact there is no issue on which to appeal to the country just at present. Everything is going well. The interests of the constituencies are being served by the members now representing them and an election just now would be quite unjustified in view of the cost it would be to the country and the manner in which it would unsettle business.

When the Legislature decided to extend the period during which they could sit from four years to five, it was with a desire to bring about greater stability and to prevent the too frequent recurrence of elections. If some momentous issue arises, then it is the duty of the premier to ask the Lieut.-Governor to dissolve the legislature and take a vote of the people. There is no such momentous issue at present. Conditions have steadily improved since the last election and will continue to improve. An election some time in the year 1925 would meet all legitimate demands. There seems at present no good reason why the people should be put to the expense of an election earlier.

Centralization Of Public Schools.

Some years ago the public schools were managed and financed from Victoria. Teachers received their monthly checks from the minister of education and the local school boards had little to do. The McBride government wisely made a change. They decided it would be better for the local committees to take more interest in their schools. They had to pay for them anyway directly or indirectly and they should have more financial responsibility. That is the government policy today. It is a carrying on of the McBride policy in the matter of finance. The municipalities have to raise a portion of the money required, the province contributing a certain amount for each teacher employed.

The Union of Municipalities feeling the burden of municipal taxation asked for a reversion to the old system. That the government refuses. The money has to be raised and the people who live here will have to pay for the schools here, no matter whether it is raised by the school board, the city council or the provincial government. There is no shifting of the burden. If we get the benefit we have to pay for it. It would be unjust to do otherwise. The present system may not be perfect but it is better than a system by which all the local institutions would be managed from Victoria.

Well Known Pioneer of City Passed Away This Morning at Residence on First Avenue

Mrs. Patrick Cary passed away suddenly this morning about 1.15 o'clock at her home on First Avenue.

Deceased had retired apparently in her usual state of health. She was seized with a choking spell and called to Mrs. Richard Long, who was staying with her. A physician was at once called but by the time he arrived life was extinct, heart failure being given as the cause.

Mrs. Cary was 72 years of age and was born in Ireland. She came to Canada early in life and was a pioneer of Winnipeg, Vancouver and Prince Rupert. She had resided here since the very early days with her husband who predeceased her over a year ago. Mr. and Mrs. Cary conducted the first hotel in Vancouver and prior

to that time lived on the prairies. The Red River Rebellion was one of her experiences in pioneer days in Western Canada.

Two daughters are left to mourn their mother's demise—Mr. W. J. Caldwell, formerly of Prince Rupert and now residing in Okanagan, Wash., and Mrs. Charles Prosser of St. Louis. They have been communicated with by wire and funeral arrangements will be announced on receipt of advice from them. The remains are in charge of the B.C. Undertakers.



BEAVERBROOK BUYS GAZETTE

Newspaperman Extends Holdings in London by Absorption of Old Established Journal

LONDON, Oct. 18. — It is authoritatively stated that Lord Beaverbrook has purchased the Pall Mall Gazette which will be absorbed by the Evening Standard. Lord Beaverbrook has just completed the purchase of the Evening Standard from Sir Edward Hulton, as well as the Daily Sketch and the Sunday Herald, all London publications. The announcement that Lord Beaverbrook has purchased the Pall Mall Gazette is causing no little perturbation, following immediately as it does the acquiring of other newspaper properties by Lords Beaverbrook and Rothermere.

The accumulation of numerous papers with huge circulations in the hands of two men is regarded seriously as meaning the concentration of an enormous power in the moulding of public opinion which in the present unstable state of public opinion on European questions gives these two men tremendous power.

The Pall Mall Gazette, which now disappears as a separate entity, was founded in 1865 and was intended to realize Thackeray's picture in "Pendennis" of one "written by gentlemen for gentlemen."

FREEMAN ON LABOR

Editor Daily News,
The first labor unions to ask government protection were the saloon keepers, gamblers and prostitutes. They have been protected to death. Today almost every labor union is asking the government to protect their members against the competition of their fellow citizens.

We have a strike of the longshoremen asking, nay, demanding 90c. per hour. Ordinary labor is receiving 50c. per hour. This is a discrepancy in wages of 40c. In other words the longshoremen are asking the ordinary laborer to contribute almost two hours labor in exchange for one. This hardly seems fair. If 90c. per hour are necessary for one class of labor, 90c. should be accepted as the base rate for all labor.

I beg to point out that while money is used as a medium of exchange for commodities, the real base of exchange is a day's labor. Money in dollars and cents is simply a method of exchanging fractions of days labor. One class of labor has no more right to force an unfair rate on the rest than has another.

I beg to point out that there are only two classes of people in a community, namely, those who serve and in so doing help

COMMITTEE TO SEE IF PRICE CURES ARE THE GENUINE THING

Representative Each from University, Ministerial Association, Medical and Legal Professions to Make Inquiry

EDMONTON, Oct. 18.—A committee to examine into the healing work now being done in Edmonton by Evangelist Charles S. Price has been appointed and will begin its investigations at once. The matter has already been before the ministerial association and the board of governors of the university, and a joint committee representing both bodies and the medical and legal professions in addition has been entrusted with the responsibility of conducting an impartial and unbiased inquiry. Its first meeting, for organization purposes, is being held at the university this afternoon.

Rev. G. A. Clarke, for the ministerial association; Prof. E. D. McFee, for the university; Dr. H. B. Logie, representing the medical profession, and a local barrister to be named by Chief Justice Harvey, will comprise the personnel of the committee. Mr. Price will be invited to meet with these committeemen and to give them necessary information about the nature of the cures that have been attributed to his missions here and elsewhere.

The purpose, as explained by Mr. Clarke and President Tory, is to make a strictly fair and thorough study of the cases referred to, in the hope of ascertaining facts that will, if established, be of acknowledged value to both the scientific and religious life of the time.

SCHOONER BLOSSOM SAILING SOUTHWARD

Will Visit Polar Regions Seldom If Ever Seen by the Eye of Man

NEW LONDON, Conn., Oct. 17.—While Capt. George Finlay Simmons has been scouring the country for a staff and crew to take the schooner "Blossom" into the South Atlantic and Indian Oceans, the ship itself has been prepared for one of the longest cruises ever undertaken by a vessel her size.

The expedition to the Antarctic islands which starts from New London this week for the Cleveland Museum of Natural History is said to be one of the largest ever undertaken for purely scientific purposes. Every one of the 16 men aboard ship, except the three ship's officers, is trained in some line that will aid in the collecting of animal and bird specimens and in taking notes on the zoology, plant life, sometimes human life, and climatic conditions in the regions that will be visited.

The Blossom will visit the least known portions of the world on her two year cruise. Explorers have gone over the Pacific islands and other tropic regions with fair thoroughness. Even the polar regions have been visited in recent years by men who have taken accurate observations of the lands through which they travelled. The South Atlantic islands, however, have been visited only by seal and sea elephant hunters, who brought back romantic stories, but little accurate information of scientific value.

LIQUOR VOTE ALBERTA SOON

Short Sketch of Legislation Leading up to Present Situation

EDMONTON, Oct. 18. — (By Canadian Press.) — Through a preferential ballot with four alternatives electors of Alberta on November 5 will decide whether there is to be a change in the provincial liquor laws. On the result the government will base its legislation, whether the people call for a system of government shops for the continuation and development of the present system of prohibition.

Alberta has had seven years' experience with varying degrees of prohibition legislation. The change from the old liquor license system came into effect in Alberta on July 1, 1916. On July 23 of the previous year a referendum had been held on a liquor act submitted under the provisions of the direct legislation law by the Temperance and Moral Reform Association. It carried by a vote of 58,295 to 37,509.

The direct legislation law provided that in case of an affirmative vote the legislature should at the next session enact the proposed measure without substantial alterations and this was done. The sale of liquor within the province as a beverage was prohibited and a doctor's prescription was required for the purchase of liquor for medicinal purposes.

Under the act, as it was passed, the fact that a person had on his premises more liquor than was reasonably required for himself or his family, "not exceeding one quart of spirits and two gallons of malt liquor," was to be deemed prima facie evidence of unlawful sale. In March, 1917, after this clause had been variously interpreted, the legislature altered it to read that "no person within the province shall have or keep in his private dwelling house a quantity of liquor exceeding one quart of spirituous liquor and two gallons of malt liquor."

Right to Import

The right to import from other provinces was put an end to by federal order-in-council under the war measures act on April 1, 1918, but was restored when this order was revoked on January 1, 1920. On October 25 of that year the federal referendum on the question of whether this importation should be again stopped was taken and the vote stood 62,772 for and 44,176 against. On this occasion women voted, whereas they had not obtained the franchise when the vote of 1915 was taken.

During 1922 what was entitled "The Temperance Act" was drafted and a petition circulated asking the legislature to submit it under the direct legislation law. It provided for hotel and wholesale licenses for the sale of beer. When the legislature met early in 1923, a special committee was appointed to scrutinize the petition and reported that it met the requirements of the direction legislation act. Some members alleged that there were irregularities in connection with the petition, but on March 14 the House adopted the committee's report by a vote of 49 to 7.

Various Phases

It was then argued that, seeing that the province was thus required to incur the expense of a referendum, more than the question of whether the "temperance act" should come into effect should be submitted. Various methods of obtaining a more complete expression of public opinion were urged upon the government and on April 16 Premier Greenfield outlined the course which he proposed to follow. He would move a resolution calling for the submission of the "temperance act." If this carried, he would submit a second resolution which would read that it was "desirable that alternate questions based on other forms of liquor legislation should be submitted by plebiscite at the same time as the referendum on the proposed temperance act." This resolution, however, should not, the premier declared, be construed as embodying the policy of the government. It was "entirely concerned in obtaining the opinion of the House on this question." Should the second resolution pass, he would move a third, calling for the appointment of a committee of five

B.C. LOSES TWO APPEALS TO PRIVY COUNCIL

B.C. Orders in Council Held to Conflict With Japanese Treaty

B.C. LIQUOR MUST PAY DOMINION DUTY

LONDON, Oct. 18.—The appeal of British Columbia against the decision of the Canadian Supreme Court in the case of the British Columbia Attorney General against the Attorney General of Canada relating to the employment of Japanese labor in Canada was dismissed by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.

The main question as to whether the Oriental orders in council Validation act passed by the B.C. legislature in 1921 and orders in council scheduled to that statute were in conflict with the Japanese Treaty of 1913, of the Dominion parliament, was ultra vires. The Governor General of Canada in November 1921 referred the matter to the Supreme Court for their opinion on the question "Had the B.C. legislature the authority to enact the Oriental orders in council Validation act?" The Supreme Court, with Justice Edinton wholly dissenting and Justice Brodeur dissenting in part, answered in the negative.

Liquors Must Pay

LONDON, Oct. 18.—The appeal of the Attorney General of British Columbia in an action against the Attorney General of Canada on the question as to whether liquor imported into British Columbia by the Provincial Government was liable to Dominion customs duties was dismissed today by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council. This was a test action brought to determine whether the Dominion parliament of Canada had the power to impose customs duties or excise sales tax on goods imported by the B.C. government from outside Canada. The B.C. government claimed that the province was entitled to deliver whiskey without payment of Dominion customs duties or taxes. The Dominion government resolved to claim on the grounds that wines

and spirits imported into Canada were liable to a duty and excise tax. Justice Cassels held that if British Columbia imported goods to carry on business or trade it must pay the customs duties and charges due to the Dominion government. This decision was affirmed by the Supreme Court of Canada.

AN OUTSIDER WON CZAREWITCH STAKES

Prophets Confounded When Rose Prince Led the Field Home at Newmarket

LONDON, Oct. 18.—All advance dope was upset when Rose Prince a four year old colt owned by A. K. Macomber and ridden by Archibald won the Czarewitsch stakes, one of the principal autumn handicaps.

Rose Prince started 25 to 1 against 29 starters. Aga Khan's three year old filly Teresina, that came second, stood 100 to 7 against and Sir Abe Bailey's four year old colt Geylone which came third was a favorite at 6 to 1.

ALBERTA NOW KNOWS ITS CHIEF JUSTICE

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Hon. David Lynch Scott, one of the judges of the Supreme Court of Alberta, succeeded in his appeal to the Privy Council to be ranked as Chief Justice of the Appellate Division of Alberta in the Supreme Court instead of Justice George Harvey. Scott's appeal arose from a decision of the Supreme Court of Canada which ranked Justice Harvey as Chief Justice of Alberta the title and rank claimed by the appellant.

ALGERINE LEAVES PORT STEVENS BAY BOUND ESQUIMALT

In tow of the Canadian Pacific Railway tugboat Nanose, the disabled salvage steamer Algerine, which went on the rocks on Banks Island Saturday night, left Port Stevens Bay at 7.20 this morning bound for Esquimalt where she will undergo repairs.

WINNIPEG IS NOT VERY THIRSTY AFTER ALL PERMIT PURCHASE SHOWS

WINNIPEG, Oct. 18.—Surprise and disappointment was registered on the faces of the members of the Government Liquor Control commission through the paucity of applicants for permits by which holders can procure liquor for beverage purposes, if desired. Orders also do not come up to expectations, being few in number, it is learned on good authority, with the exception of a few isolated cases from whom orders are received almost daily.

It was expected that the issue of permits would have totalled in excess of 30,000, but to date the number has not yet reached the 10,000 mark. Approximately, 8,600 have been issued to residents in Greater Winnipeg, and less than 1,400 outside of this area, with the Brandon district leading the list in totals.

MCLEAN TAKES ISSUE AGAINST CENTRALIZATION

Objects to Proposal That Provincial Government Should Provide Money For Schools

DUNCAN, B.C., Oct. 18.—A proposal that the provincial government bear all the cost of British Columbia schools recently made by the Union of British Columbia Municipalities during their recent session at Prince Rupert was described by Hon. J. D. McLean, minister of education, as "fantastic and retrograde." In a speech which he made to the convention of British Columbia school trustees here yesterday he declared that it would bring the whole system of education into the arena of party politics. The teachers would formally ally themselves to one party to secure advancement.

If such a step were taken the government would have to add the necessary costs to taxation and then it would have to turn the money over to another body for administration, which would not be business.

Mr. McLean said he disapproved the suggestion that the management of school affairs be turned over to committees of the various city councils and a resolution along this line was defeated at the convention.


