While the United States government will not participate officially or appoint official representatives on the commission of inquiry, it will approve the participation by American economic experts in their private capacity.





### PLAGUE OF LOCUSTS PROVIDES MATERIAL FOR A NEW FACTORY

Drought in South Africa Gives Farmers and Others an Anxious Time

LONDON, Dec. 8-Owing to the very severe drought and the early appearance of locusts, South African farms are experiencing a very anxious time, says the Johannesburg correspondent of the Daily News. There is at present little, if any, grass in the Transvaal, dams and wells are failing and the cattle and sheep are dying in large numbers.

The locust plague took the officials by surprise, as they hatched without rain, which is very unusual. At present they are infesting the country in large numbers. In former years it has possible to exterminate lieved of the burden. 




