SENSATIONAL IRISH PLOT STORY PUBLISHED OVER HUNDRED MILLION POUNDS SURPLUS IN GREAT BRITAIN FOR YEAR

London Newspaper Alleges Plot Was Prepared to Assassinate a Number of Public Men in Britain

LONDON, March 14.—A sensational story of a plot arranged by the Irish Republican organization to murder British cabinet ministers and other public men and to commit other outrages is printed today by the Daily Sketch. That newspaper connects the alleged scheme with the activities of Irishmen recently arrested in Great Britain.

The Sketch says the persons marked for assassination included Premier Bonar Law, David Lloyd George and Sir Hamar Greenwood.

A large number of women in the organization, the newspaper asserts, obtained employment in the households of intended victims and were thus able to supply outside persons with details of the men's movements.

The plan also included a provision for a disturbance in London through the rougher elements in the larger cities.

The El Cedro, owned at Anyox before going to Buckley Bay, she brought north 12,000 barrels of fuel oil for the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Co.

POWELL RIVER OFFICIAL DIES

General Superintendent of Mills
Loses Life from Blood
Poisoning

POWELL RIVER, B.C., Mar. 14.—William Sheahan, general superintendent of mills here, died of blood poisoning Monday, aged 56. The body will be taken to Oregon City, Ore., Thursday, for interment.

One of the late superintendent's daughter's lives at Oregon City, another at Eugene, Oregon, and a son Edward at Los Angeles. The other son, Joseph W. Sheahan, lives at Powell River.

YUKON RESTAURANT MAN DIED YESTERDAY

CAPTAIN SUTTON FEARED DROWNED

Skipper of Rennell Believed to
Have Jumped from Cold
Storage Wharf

Capt. W. Sutton, of the halibut schooner Rennell, took his own life last night by jumping into the harbor from the wharf of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. at Seal Cove. Although the body has not yet been discovered this fact has been pretty well established.

At 12:20 last night a call was received at the police station from the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. to the effect that a man had jumped overboard from the wharf. Sergeant Bailey and Constable Alex. Macdonald hurried to the scene and found a slicker, under coat and boots belonging to Sutton lying on the wharf. Drugging operations were started as soon as possible by the company and the police but, up to noon today, these had been unsuccessful in recovering his body.

From papers found among the effects of deceased it was learned that Sutton was born in Newfoundland in 1895. He enlisted for the Great War in 1915 with the Royal Newfoundland Regiment and was honorably discharged in 1918 with the rank of sergeant. He served with distinction and was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal and the Croix de Guerre. He was wounded twice in action, his head having been injured on one occasion.

Widow in Australia
Deceased is survived by a widow and child living in Maryland, New South Wales, Australia. The child he has never seen.

Capt. Sutton arrived at Vancouver in August 1922, on the C.G.M.M. Canadian Highlander, having made the passage on that vessel as an able seaman. Coming shortly afterwards to Prince Rupert he entered the halibut fishing business as skipper of the schooner Rennell.

VICTORIA MEDICAL MAN'S CAREER ENDS

Dr. Hassell, Superintendent of
the Jubilee Hospital, Died
Yesterday

VICTORIA, Mar. 14.—Dr. R. S. Hassell, for many years superintendent of the Provincial Royal Jubilee Hospital here died yesterday afternoon after a long illness.

Dr. Hassell was one of the best known medical men in the city. He was for many years superintendent of the hospital until the early part of the war when he resigned and took a position as medical superintendent at the soldiers hospital at Esquimalt. Later he returned to the Jubilee Hospital in a similar capacity.

The doctor was president of the Victoria Arts and Crafts society for a number of years and took a keen interest in the natural sciences, being a prominent member of the Natural History Society and holding the position of president on more than one occasion. He was a friend of the late James D. Dunsmauir, and Mrs. Hassell was formerly a society leader, being one of the organizers of the Alexandra women's club and taking a leading part in other organizations of a public service nature.

They were remanded for preliminary hearing Thursday at 11 o'clock.

RUTH SAYS BLACKMAIL

Suit For \$50,000 Damages
For Assault Brought
Against Big Hitter

NEW YORK, March 14.—Babe Ruth has been made defendant in a suit for \$50,000 brought by attorneys for Miss Dolores Dixon, aged 19, who charges that Ruth assaulted her several times last summer.

Ruth, who is at present in New Orleans, denies the charges and says he and his wife will fight them to the last ditch, claiming that blackmail is back of the charge.

REGULATION OF GERMANS

Squeeze by French Following
Death of Countrymen Occu-
pied Area

BERLIN, Germany, March 14.—French authorities have ordered residents to remain indoors after 7 p.m. following the death of two Frenchmen in riots. All lights are to be out at 10 p.m. and men are forbidden to carry their hands in their pockets while on the streets.

The French have occupied Thynnen, a coal harbor at Rheuan, one of the largest transit points on the Rhine.

MADE INVESTIGATION HOUSES OF ILL FAME

District Attorney Led Delegation
In Ketchikan Few Days Ago

Charles Miller, assistant district attorney for Ketchikan, has been told that vice is rampant in Ketchikan, so he summoned Deputy Marshal Fred Handy, L. McIntosh, one of the dry squad officials, Chief of Police Si Howell, City Marshals Moyer and Hallison, and paid an official visit to the alleged places of dispute says the Ketchikan News.

Accompanying Mr. Miller on this tour of investigation were the Rev. Van Marter and Mrs. Van Marter, Frank Capp, A. J. Elia, Mesdames Spaeth, Bullock and Anna Mary Muir, stenographer, who accompanied the party to take stenographic notes and transcribe the investigation proceedings into typewritten evidence later.

Arriving at the district where the alleged vice was reported to exist, Mr. Miller instructed that a patrolman be stationed at the entrances and exits of certain houses, which was done, after which the inmates were questioned as to property rights, mode of living, etc., all of which was properly noted and recorded.

British Government Will Show Record Budget Surplus to End of Financial Year on March 31

LONDON, March 14.—The morning newspapers predict a record budget surplus at the end of the financial year, which is March 31. A statement of the chancellor of the exchequer of the state of the finances to March 10 shows a surplus of £102,000,000, made possible by the large reduction in expenditures and a considerable increase in revenue.

BUSY CANNING SEASON EXPECTED THIS YEAR

Much of 1922 Pack is Still Un-
moved But This Seems to

tions for 1923

In spite of the fact that much of the salmon which was packed last year at the canneries of this district still remains at the plants, all of them are preparing to re-open this season and a very busy year with a big pack is expected. The Union steamer Chelohsin has been making all the canneries calls the last few trips taking in supplies and advance crews and some of last year's pack has also been handled. The increased business caused by the re-opening of the canneries will soon make it necessary for the Union company to put on their second steamer on the northern run and the summer service with the Chelohsin arriving on Sunday night and the Venture on Friday morning will be in augmented in about two week's time, it is expected.

IMMIGRATION PROVIDED FOR

Hon. Charles Stewart Announces
Some of Plans of His De-
partment

OTTAWA, March 14.—Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of immigration, told the House of Commons yesterday that the government aimed to secure immigration by aiming at repatriation of Canadians who had gone to the United States and to encourage immigrants from the United Kingdom and certain European countries.

The department, he said, had set aside \$600,000 to assist passages of selected children and families of settlers already here and also domestic servants.

Mr. Stewart further told the House that the Canadian Colonization Association would receive \$10,000 a month also for ten months provided they settled a minimum of 200 families on the land this year.

WILLIE HOPPE BACK IN FORM

Beats Schaefer in Second Game

NEW YORK, March 14.—Willie Hoppe recovered championship form last night and overcame the lead of 223 points by which Jake Schaefer beat him the previous night and reached the 1,000 point mark while Schaefer got to 994 in the second of a three game series to decide the championship of the world in eighteen two balking billiards.

TOO MANY WOMEN IN BRITAIN AND TOO FEW IN CANADA IT IS SAID

LONDON, March 14.—Great Britain has too many women, very close to two million more than men being shown by recently prepared statistics. Canada has a surplus of men, according to similar statistics. It is the proposal of the Overseas Settlement Committee to encourage the migration of women to Canada in order to benefit this country and that.

LABOR DELEGATES ARE GOING TO RUHR FROM BRITAIN ANNOUNCED

LONDON, March 14.—The British labor party is sending an official deputation to the Ruhr and other parts of Germany to report on the situation.

Halibut Treaty And Enforcement.

A careful perusal of the despatch which was published in this paper two days ago in regard to the halibut treaty with the United States indicates that the headline writer did not quite grasp the significance of it. The despatch said that Congress failed to pass the act enforcing the treaty. The treaty itself, it seems, was adopted in the dying hours of the session but no provision made for putting it in force. A special act of Congress was needed for this, particularly in providing penalties for those who break the treaty. This act was not passed but will be taken up directly Congress meets in the autumn. The despatch seems to have been quite correct but the local interpretation of it as shown in the headlines was incorrect. There will be no halibut fishing after the middle of November in order that the fish may be given an opportunity to spawn without disturbance.

Why Did We Wait So Long For Library?

The avidity with which the people of Prince Rupert have taken advantage of the privileges offered them in the public library is most surprising. The wonder is that we waited so long before establishing the institution. There have at various times been agitations for things which have not had the public behind them. For example there was a big movement launched to provide playgrounds and it was a most worthy object, yet when the city at large expense made a playground at the corner of Sixth Ave. and McBride Street, it was used, apparently, with the utmost reluctance. Not so the library. No sooner were the doors open than people at once began to use it and the interest has gradually increased until today a thousand people are borrowing books, which means, of course, a great deal more than a thousand readers. The library has been the most pronounced success of all the public service efforts in the city.

Ridley Home And Public Support.

For the first time in its history the Ridley Home is asking the people of Prince Rupert for support. The cause is an excellent one. The provision of a suitable home amid the best possible surroundings for the homeless boys and girls, of whom there are bound to be a number in so large a country as surrounds us, is not only a privilege but a duty. If we as a people are to succeed we must see that everybody is given a chance in life. These boys and girls without the home have not much of a chance. They promise to drift into human wastelands. By giving them a fair start, they are enabled to hold their own in the battle of life and to become good citizens. Here, then, is an outlet for the activities of those who wish to do something for the benefit of the community and the race. It is a humanitarian effort. Let the boys and girls have a chance. They have in most cases met with misfortune through no fault of their own and the least we can do for them is to provide them the opportunity to make good.

Pulp And Paper Mill Some Day.

Undoubtedly there will be a pulp and paper mill in this neighborhood some day. It may come soon. The probability is that it will be constructed in the very near future for unless a mill is constructed and operated the timber holders have to pay the government at the lumber lease rate which is much higher than the pulp lease rate. The provincial government is interested in this movement and is taking the attitude that a mill is needed in this neighborhood and its establishment will be encouraged. They have taken that attitude for some time.

The news published yesterday that a syndicate was now busy buying timber as the first step toward the establishment of a paper mill at or near this city is most encouraging. We have been expecting that very soon we should hear of activity along those lines. However, it must be remembered that in juggling with millions, time is needed and there are likely to be delays. The encouraging feature is the fact that paper is needed. We have the timber, the undeveloped waterpower, and the shipping facilities. It should not be difficult to get those interested who want the paper.

REMOVING OF FISH HEADS FROM WHARF NOT TO BE ALLOWED

E. Edison Appears in City Police
Court to Account For Action
in Doing So

E. Edison appeared in the police court this morning before Magistrate McLymont charged with having stolen fish heads valued at \$5.00 belonging to the Lupert Marine Products from the fish wharves at the government wharf. The case was dismissed with a warning to the accused who guaranteed that he would desist from interfering with the property in question. W. E. Fisher appeared for the company and Milton Gonzales for the accused.

According to the story told in court, accused had been in the past accustomed to removing the fish heads from the government wharf. He had not been aware of the contract existing between the Marine Products Company and the fish houses for the taking away of the offal to the Tucks Inlet bi-products plant and had continued the practice under a misapprehension. The prosecuting counsel stated that accused had been warned but had paid no heed. All that was desired, however, was a guarantee on the part of accused and others that the practice would be discontinued. His Worship, therefore, disposed of the case accordingly, to the satisfaction of the parties concerned.

SWEDISH BOOKS ADDED TO PUBLIC LIBRARY

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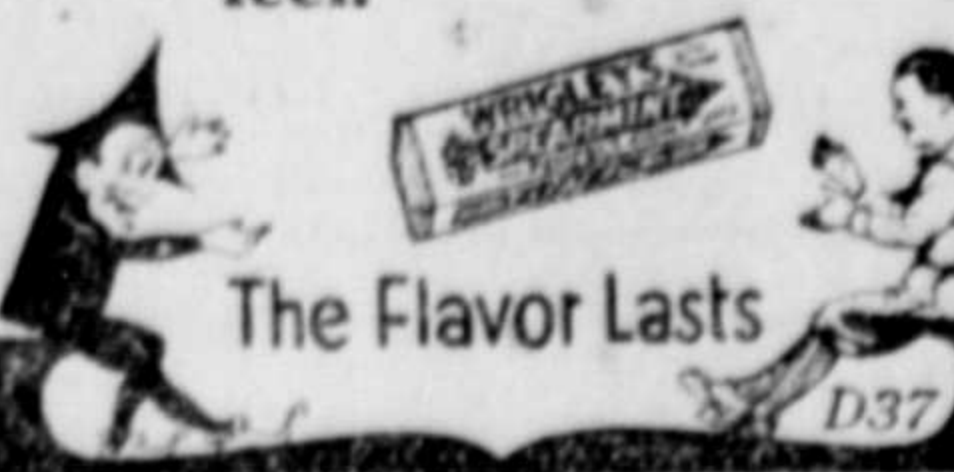

LAD STOPS WAR

Carrying Union Jack He Orders Rival Armies to Cease Firing

ADELAIDE, South Australia, March 13.—A great advantage of a public school education for boys is that it teaches them to assume responsibility, in the opinion of Sir Tom Bridges, governor of South Australia. The governor praised the training of good public schools in an address here recently to the boys of St. Peter's College, and pointed his remarks with the story of an English public school boy who, standing on his own feet alone in Armenia, stopped a war with a display of courage, self-confidence, and the Union Jack.

"It was at Tiflis in 1919," the governor said, "when I received a telegram from the control officer at Erivan saying war had broken out between Georgia and Armenia for possession of a large tract of rich country that belonged to neither of them. I asked members of my staff who the control officer was. They said he was only a schoolboy just come from England, where he had been in the cricket eleven at Eton and Sandhurst. I decided to give him a chance, and sent him a telegram to stop the war and delimit a neutral zone."

He then ordered both armies back ten miles, summoned their chiefs and delimited a zone about the size of Yorkshire over which he had himself governor. He enlisted police, appointed officials and ran a first-class state for about six months. 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BRINGING UP FATHER



DANCING IN PARIS LIGHTLY DISCUSSED

People Still Cling to Fox Trots There in Spite of Efforts to Revive Old Styles

PARIS, Mar. 12.—Reports of the death of the fox-trot have come in only less often than that of Lenin. And yet the fox-trot goes on in Paris and plays the star part as well in the salons of the Faubourg St. Honore as in such democratic dancing-halls as the Bal Bullier. In view of the crush of balls just now in Paris the fox-trot would seem to have as strong a hold as ever, but for certain little significant signs which may perhaps be the writing on the wall. For one thing, there is nobody nowadays who cannot fox-trot, which to the elect is not a desirable quality. And the elect have taken the drastic step of reverting to a fashionable ball to a number of the old dances—dances which took a great deal of learning and demanded a manner and distinguished their dancers very sharply from those who did not possess it. "Harriet, my love," said Grand-mamma Selby with an air, and Harriet stepped out blushing and trod a measure with Sir Charles Grandison—a performance which very justly went down to history in the family annals.

Cause of Popularity
It is, of course, one thing to revive old dances and another to change the modern style of dancing. Some people have attributed the popularity of the fox-trot and all its brothers and sisters to the fact that it is easy. This is, of course, incorrect. The fox-trot, danced well, is not easy at all, and when it looks easy it is demanding a very high standard of dancing. Moreover, the easy dance is not necessarily the most popular. Girls used to toil comfortably through the mazes of the lancers and the quadrilles, and were by no means abashed at the memory-work therein implied. Even more recently the number of people in Paris who undertook to tango was legion, and the tango is perhaps as difficult as any dance ever invented. The difficulty, therefore, of minuets and pavanas and the rather more pibiccan gavottes is not the factor which need necessarily make them unpopular.

Matter of Clothes
Dances really turn a good deal on the clothes worn and the type of mind obtaining at the moment. The war, which bottled people up in one direction, made for complimentary laxity almost naturally. Fox-trots suggested lack of ceremony and fitted in with the feeling of the day. But now people are beginning again to realise that ceremony was really invented because it was amusing and flattered the vanity and gave an ordinary person a distinction that he might otherwise not have had. And so it is possible that the fox-trot and similar dances may suddenly seem suited for what are generically known as "natives," but not for those who live more sophisticated lives.

is seen in a recent incident affecting the organization of the Senate finance committee. This committee has charge of tariff bills and bills relating to the revenues.

Senator Calder of New York, whose term ends March 4, resigned from the finance committee without warning and Senator Reed of Pennsylvania was instantly put on in his place by the republican organization.

This is an unusual procedure. Ordinarily, a senator stays on an important committee such as finance to the last day of his service. In this case, the arrangement was accepted on all hands as a manoeuvre of the Old Guard to keep the progressives or democrats from gaining strength in the finance committee after March 4 and keeping the committee absolutely in control of the extreme high tariff men. Senator Reed of Pennsylvania is a typical

ultra high tariff member who may be relied on to do what he can to get high duties for the manufactured products of his state.

Flexible Provisions

Not only are steps being taken to keep the finance committee under the control of the high tariff men but the same is true of the House ways and means committee which also has charge of tariff and revenue bills. The Old Guard will if possible keep that committee completely under the sway of the high tariff forces.

Meantime, the flexible tariff provisions of the tariff law, as to which much was promised last summer, are being so leisurely applied that the public is getting none of the benefits of these provisions. When it will, is uncertain. All indications are that tariff leaders in the republican party are anxious to discourage much activity in application of the flexible tariff.

Because of the increase in the cost of living, it is expected the tariff question will once more be the liveliest kind of an issue in U.S. politics in a comparatively short time.

MUCH ACTIVITY AT ALICE ARM LIKELY

Logging Camps and Mines Will Provide Employment For Large Number

ALICE ARM, March 14.—The logging camp of Thretheway Bros. will employ about sixty men, and the Granby Co.'s camp will, it is expected, employ about forty men. Several smaller camps will also be operating.

With the disappearance of the snow several mining properties will commence operations. The Esperanza mine will continue operations throughout the summer, and the Lone Maid property is also expected to continue operations. Development work will be undertaken on the Horse Shoe group by Wm. Bunting, of Hyder, Alaska, and Elmer Ness, and the Homestake Mining Company will develop their property at the Kit-sault Glacier. While no word has been received regarding the operation of the Dolly Varden and Wolf properties, it is expected that these properties will shortly be operated, as the railway, power plant, etc., are rapidly being developed in value through being idle. Numerous enquiries regarding mining properties are being received from the outside, and there is every possibility of the rich mineral deposits of this district being developed by big mining companies in the near future.

Sport Chat

As soon as spring is in the air, boating is in the minds of hundreds of people. In Prince Rupert and preparations are now being made along the waterfront by local yachtsmen for their summer's enjoyment. Tired businessmen may be seen these bright and lengthening evenings hieing themselves forth to give their craft the once over. Soon there will be a painting and caulking campaign and the work that goes with the care of a pleasure boat will be under way. It will also be open season for the breaking of the Sabbath Day.

Yacht Clubs in the east are laying out for the coming summer the most ambitious programs in years. Particularly is this the case along the Great Lakes. The Royal Canadian Yacht Club of Toronto last year in the larger racing events and does not intend that the defeats of 1922 shall be repeated in the coming summer. To lift the George Cup, emblematic of racing supremacy on Lake Ontario and now held by the Huskie of Watertown, N.Y., Toronto yachtsmen came to the conclusion that they must have faster boats so three Class R sloops have been built this winter. These are all of the larger type of boats averaging 35 feet long on deck with water line length of 25 feet, 7 foot beam and 5 foot depth. They are to be the last of the combination of speed and seaworthiness, equipped with Marconi rigs and close to the maximum sail spread the regulations allow.

Perhaps the greatest development in sailing with the Royal Canada Yacht Club this winter has been the inauguration of Class C sloops. They are intended to fill in the gap between the dinghies and the

George Cup type. It was a long jump from a \$200 dinghy to a \$5,000 yacht such as complete for the interlake events, and comparatively few can afford to make it. The Class C is to bridge this gap. Eleven of them are being built this winter for club members by a firm at Penetang, Ont. They will all come from the same mould, being as nearly identical as it is possible to build them. They are costing \$1,000 each and while being purchased by individual members the club is bearing a portion of the cost and placing the restriction that they cannot be sold outside the organization. They will have standing keels like the larger type, heavily weighted with lead, will be 25 feet long over all with a water line of 16 feet. They will have Marconi rigs and carry 350 square feet of sail. They are expected to provide the most exciting club race of the season.

WOMEN ARE HARD ON MEMBERS OWN SEX GERMAN COURT CASES

BERLIN, March 14.—German women, recently accorded the right to sit on juries in criminal cases, have shown an inclination to impose even more severe punishment than men, particularly in cases where the defendants have been women.

"I always feel sorry for a woman defendant," said a Berlin judge commenting on woman's entry into the jury box, "when a majority of the jury is composed of the fairer sex. My experience so far has been that the women have less mercy than men, and hold out for verdicts accordingly."

Ever since Germany became a republic and women gained the right to ballot, the question of permitting them to sit on juries has been brought up for discussion from time to time, there being many opponents to the advancements of women's right among the public generally and especially in the legal profession. It was long contended that women were too tender-hearted to listen to sordid details of criminal cases. But the women denounced to those contentions, kept up the struggle for admission as jurors and, after nearly four years have finally won their point.

BABY SON OF MR. AND MRS. VOLSTEAD NAMED HOOCH BY AUTHORITIES

NEW YORK, March 14.—An announcement has just been made of the birth of a son to Mr. and Mrs. Volstead of the Central Park Zoo. The baby will be named Hooch. Mother and son are doing well.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1/2 acre before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years and has made proportionate improvements, he may be cause of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of pre-emption and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$250 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 3 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his former acquisition, and improvements provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown ground land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 610 acres may be granted to one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 10 acres may be purchased on conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditionally upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The provisions which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

Notices relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money advanced, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enforcement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately on whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1918, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

CO-OPERATIVE STORES WERE DISCUSSED BY T. AND L. COUNCIL

A report was read at last night's meeting of the Trades and Labor Council outlining the methods of operating co-operative stores and reviewing the extent of the business done by such in England and Scotland. The matter will be further discussed at a meeting to be held in April with representatives from the Skeena Valley.

The action of the Civic Employees' union in asking for a conciliation board to go into the matter of recent civic reorganization was endorsed unanimously.

The Oriental question and camp conditions were discussed at considerable length.

A report from the Labor Gazette showing the cost of living to be increasing was read.

Ald. S. D. Macdonald, president of the council, presided and there was a good attendance of members.

PRESENTATION TO COL. McMULLIN BY TYEE LODGE MASONS

Col. J. H. McMullin was farewelled by Tyee Lodge, A.F. & A.M., last night on the eve of his departure from the city to take up his duties as superintendent of provincial police at Victoria. He was presented with a Past Master's apron and a case of handsome pipes. Col. McMullin was Worshipful Master of Tyee Lodge last year.

5,000 FARMERS RAISE SILVER FOXES IN U.S.

Many Also Raise Other Varieties of Fur in 25 States

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Canadians for some years have been taking the lead in the fur farming industry, and Canadian bred foxes, particularly those of the Maritime Provinces are famous through the United States. It now appears that many people on this side of the line are following the example set by Canadians in establishing this profitable industry. A recent bulletin issued by the Department of Agriculture says:

"Important progress has been made in investigations pertaining to the rearing of wild fur bearing animals in captivity. Fur farms are reported from twenty-five States where foxes, skunks, raccoons, minks, opossums, martens, muskrats, squirrels and beaver are raised. It is estimated that 500 ranchers are raising silver foxes in the United States, that they have between 12,000 and 15,000 foxes in captivity, and that the value of the investment is about \$8,000,000.

SOVIET FARMERS ASK FOR BULLETINS EDUCATIONAL NATURE

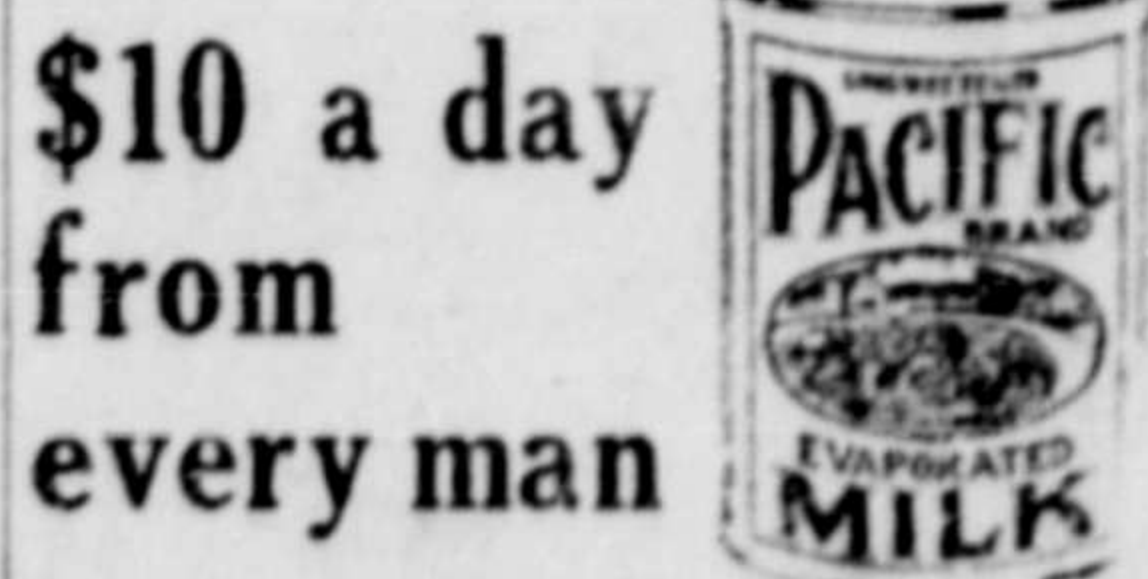
