FRANCE RESOLUTE AND UNACCOMODATING

ALASKANS DEMAND THAT PRINCE RUPERT BE OPENED TO THEIR BUSINESS

Premier Poincare, in what is Believed Reply to Overtures of Britain, Gives no Ground

SENLEIS, France, July 16.—President Poincare on Sunday proclaimed the French government's unalterable decision to stand resolutely for complete execution of the Versailles Treaty with Germany's debt of 132,000,000,000 gold marks as agreed upon by the Allies at the London conference and against any international finance committee to replace the reparations commission. The premier declared that France was finished making concessions to Germany and was tired of tampering with that country.

Premier Poincare's strongly worded address, while carefully refraining from mentioning the speech of the British premier in the House of Commons last week, is considered as the French government's preliminary answer to the British position with regard to the occupation of the Ruhr.

LONDON, July 16.—The speech of Premier Poincare on Sunday, although making no direct reference to Premier Baldwin's proclamation nor the present negotiations, was none the less an indirect reply to the British premier it is believed in official circles here. According to reports of the speech received, it showed hardly a trace of any accommodating spirit such as indicated in recent reports from Paris which had led the people here to expect an impetus to the British leniency toward Germany in all recent reparations difficulties. If Premier Poincare's speech is France's last word, it is taken as boding ill to any progress on recent negotiations and certainly will be received in England with great disappointment.

CONV TO UNITED STATES
LONDON, July 16.—Prime Minister Baldwin announced in the House of Commons today that he would communicate to the United States for its information the draft of the reply he was preparing to the German reparations note. He made the statement in reply to a question from Ramsay MacDonald, Laborite leader.

NEW YORK, July 16.—Of 512 passengers from Great Britain on the Atlantic liner Baltic, which arrived from Liverpool, only forty-two first cabin passengers will be admitted into the United States. The remainder will go to Ellis Island to be held pending deportation. According to the present plans of the immigration authorities, the July quota of immigrants for Great Britain has been exhausted.

IRISH DEPORTED FROM AUSTRALIA
Father O'Flanagan and John O'Kelly Shipped Away From Sydney on Steamer Mongolia

SYDNEY, New South Wales, July 16.—Two Irish Republicans, Father Michael O'Flanagan and John O'Kelly, who were arrested here in April on charges of engaging in seditious activities, were removed from jail today and deported on the steamer Mongolia bound for London. Ten days ago they were offered their release on condition they agreed not to address public meetings. They refused and later declined the opportunity to leave the country voluntarily.

RAILS ARE TAKEN UP

Removal Was Discovered Before Nova Scotia Train Arrived

The railway is now being patrolled by troops. The coal company's plans to continue the movement of coal with the railway company are looked to as one of the most serious of possible developments in the strike situation. A youth named McInnes has been arrested for alleged tampering with a switch.

TORONTO, July 16.—The Drury Farmer government after being in office since November 14, 1919, was dissolved on Saturday and today the Ferguson Conservative cabinet was sworn in.

AIRPLANE FLIVVER RACE IN FRANCE IS WON BY L. COUPETT

BUENOS AIRES, France, July 16.—L. Coupett won the Petit Parisien's hundred thousand franc prize for flivver airplane competition. He covered thirty-one laps on a ten kilometre diamond shaped course at an average speed of 64 7.10 kilometres per hour. The competition was limited to airplanes not exceeding 500 pounds in weight.

MRS. MORRISON DIES SUDDENLY

Well Known Local Lady Succumbs to Attack of Heart Failure

Many friends in Prince Rupert will be shocked to learn that Mrs. Cora Morrison, wife of Daniel H. Morrison, formerly of Prince Rupert, died very suddenly last week in California of heart failure. The funeral services were held at Forest Lawn Chapel, Glendale, California, on Saturday and were attended by a large number of former Prince Rupert residents. The body is being shipped to Vancouver for burial, the widower accompanying it.

Mrs. Morrison's family home was in Vankleek Hill, Quebec, and she was one of the real pioneer women of Prince Rupert, having arrived here in 1909. She resided in the city until last summer when, with her family, she moved to California. Some years ago she was stricken with heart trouble from which she suffered until the time of her death. Since moving to California, however, her health became much improved and her death came suddenly. Ten minutes after the final attack, she breathed her last in spite of the efforts of physicians who were immediately summoned.

During her long residence in the city she became the centre of a wide circle of friends, among whom she was highly esteemed. She was an active member of the Presbyterian Church and belonged to several social organizations.

Besides the widower, Mrs. Morrison is survived by two daughters, Helen and Kathleen, and a son, Frank.

WIRELESS STATIONS FOR NORTH COUNTRY

Minister of Interior Says Parties Going This Fall to Erect Stations in Yukon

EDMONTON, July 17.—Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the Interior, who is visiting Edmonton, confirms the news as to the erection of wireless sending stations in the north. One each will be placed at Mayo mining camp and Dawson in the Yukon and others at Fort McMurray and Fort Smith, two parties being sent from the east to erect the plants this fall.

In addition to the Mounted Police and the government officials the wireless will be a boon to the fur traders and trappers who will be able to learn the prevailing prices on the "outside" instead of having to guess at current market values as at present.

PORTLAND, July 17.—Miss Marjorie Leeming of Victoria won the Oregon State women's tennis singles championship on Saturday defeating Mrs. J. C. Cushing of Oakland, California, 6 to 4 and 6 to 3.

This Port May Derive Great Benefit Result of President's Visit

Alaskans have taken direct to President Harding their demand that "Prince Rupert be thrown open to Alaska," according to Lukin Johnston, staff correspondent for the Vancouver Province with the presidential party on the Alaskan cruise, who says that, as a result of the president's visit, it would not be surprising if changes were made in the United States shipping laws which would greatly benefit this port.

In a special despatch to his paper from Seward, Mr. Johnston says:

Prince Rupert has been more on the lips of members of President Harding's party than the name of any other town in America during the journey up the coast. At every port visited the general demand has been voiced that "Prince Rupert be thrown open to Alaska." Alaskans regard the United States shipping laws which prevent them using the British Columbia port for the shipment of their products as an unreasonable restriction which places the interests of United States shipping and the port of Seattle before their interests. The extensive fishing industry of Ketchikan, for instance, can not use Prince Rupert because under the shipping laws of the United States goods can not be carried from an American port to a foreign port for re-shipment when their ultimate destination is the States. This means that American fishermen fishing in American waters base their operations on Prince Rupert to avoid having to ship 600 miles further south to Seattle.

QUESNEL CHURCH IS BURNED DOWN

Fire of Mysterious Origin Destroys Building and Rectory Adjoining

QUESNEL, July 16.—A fire of mysterious origin destroyed the Anglican Church and the large rectory building adjoining with a loss of \$20,000 partly covered by insurance. The buildings were vacant pending the arrival of a new vicar, Bishop de Pencier, together with his wife and daughter, had occupied the manse on a recent visit but, on their departure, all the doors were locked with the exception of the front door.

CANADIAN SCOTTISH OFF DRY DOCK TODAY

Will Sail For South to Load Lumber This Evening

The C.G.M.M. freighter Canadian Scottish, Capt. Hoeking, which arrived in port on Wednesday evening last direct from the Orient for general overhaul at the dry dock, will come off the pontoons at 4 o'clock this afternoon, the overhaul having been completed. The vessel will leave port this evening for Nanose Bay and other southern points to load lumber and will leave Canada on her return trip across the Pacific on August 7.

Great Saving By Direct Talk.

Direct talk entails a great saving in all walks of life. In wireless it is a benefit in that it saves all the delay and extra work of relaying. It is good news that Prince Rupert wireless station is to be placed on the direct wire circuit.

So it is in other walks of life. When there is anything to be done, any orders to be given or any questions to be asked, there is nothing like direct talk. It saves a lot of worry, mistakes, heart burnings and ill temper and often it saves a lot of money. If there is any trouble, go to the fountain head, to the seat of the trouble and straighten it out at once with direct talk.

Direct talk is the first principle of the new diplomacy of which so much has been heard but which has not yet been put into general use.

Thousand Cars For Canadian National.

The Canadian National Railway is to order a thousand new freight cars, and doubtless a number of passenger cars will also be required in addition to the refrigerator cars that are already being built. This is an intimation that business is on the increase.

Possibly the Railway Company may be able to build some of those cars in their shops at Prince Rupert. With such a fine yard and excellent machinery here, it seems a pity that the new management of the line has not yet been able to utilize them.

Prince Rupert Party Needed.

There are two big political parties, each of which is struggling for supremacy and of which we know a great deal, sometimes too much. There is also a more or less intermittent group which sometimes calls itself the labor party. In addition there is a new movement that is spending a lot of money and using a lot of effort to get itself recognized, known popularly as the McRae party or the capitalist party. All these parties try to tell the electors how they wish to serve them, yet in many instances all they want is to get into power or to down the other party.

These parties are all very well for the high-ups in those parties, but what is needed today is a Prince Rupert party that will tell all the other parties to go to Gehenna unless Prince Rupert gets what is her due. While it is not wise to be insular or to be over selfish, yet it seems necessary to fight our way all the time. None of the parties, as such, care anything about Prince Rupert, except to get the votes of the people. They are not interested in local problems except in so far as these affect the general policies of their party. Parties that are out usually full of promises and criticisms and those that are in put us off as much as possible. If we unite in our demands and positively refuse to support any party that does not deliver the goods locally, we shall make headway.

Why Did He Do It And Who is Behind It?

Why did he write that article and who inspired him to do it? seems to be a very common question when the editor makes anything which looks like a new pronouncement. It never seems to enter the mind of anyone that perhaps the editor sized things up for himself and came to a conclusion. Sometimes this paper takes suggestions and more often it turns them down. There has to be a definite line of policy hewn out with as much consistency as seems desirable. No one has enough influence to turn us from a line of conduct or policy unless it can be shown that the policy is not good for Prince Rupert.

Every One Wants Money's Worth

Natural Desire is Not to Get The Worst of Any Business Transaction

CHEAPEST NOT ALWAYS BEST

Person Who Buys From Catalogue House Sees Only the Price and Forgets That Value is Thing That Counts

When you spend your money you naturally want to get all you can in return. No one can criticize you for having that desire. Only those who are commonly referred to as having "more money than sense" throw their money away. All others are careful to see that they do not get the worst of any bargain. But one has to be able to look farther than the end of his nose if he is to be sure that he is getting the most that he can get for his money.

That is the defence of the man who buys from the mail order house instead of patronizing the merchants of his own town. He says he can get more for his money when he buys from the mail order man than when he spends his money at home. But in arriving at that conclusion he certainly has not been able to look further than the end of his nose.

In most cases the man who buys goods from a mail order house does so because he is getting the goods for less money than he would have to pay for them at the store in his own town. He thinks he is looking out for No. 1 and he says it is not his fault if the merchant in his town cannot make any money and is forced to go out of business. He overlooks the fact that he is likely to be as hard hit as anyone else when that merchant closes his doors but, leaving that probability out of consideration, the chances are about 10 to 1 that the buyer has really lost money on his deal with the mail order man.

Price Not Only Consideration

If buying an article of any kind, whether it be a house and lot or a paper of pins, the price is not the only thing to be considered by any means. You are not in the habit of going into a store when you want to buy a suit of clothes and saying to the storekeeper: "Give me the cheapest suit of clothes you have in the house." You want the best suit of clothes you can get for the price you pay for it, but you don't usually want the cheapest thing you can find.

A man may delude himself into believing that when he buys a suit of clothes from a mail order house for \$20 he is saving money, but what is there to justify him in such a belief? The mere fact that he is getting a suit for \$20 does not mean that he is saving money. The chances are that if he should go to the man who runs the clothing store in his own town and asks for it he could get a suit of clothes for \$20 and the chances are also that it would be just as good if not a better bargain than the suit which he could get from the mail order house for the same sum. It is not the price he pays that shows whether he is getting a bargain or not. It is the quality of goods that he gets for his money that counts.

Can Undersell Mail Order House

The home merchant can sell as cheaply as the mail order man if he sells as cheap goods as the mail order man sells. His expenses are not as heavy as those of the mail order man. He pays less rent in proportion to the business he does, his taxes are less in proportion to the capital invested. His advertising bills are less than those of the mail order man in proportion to the volume of his sales. He can undersell the mail order man any day in the year if he wishes to sell only goods of the same quality and style of those sold by the mail order man, but he doesn't do this because he knows that the majority of the people in his town do not want that quality and style of goods. Therefore he keeps in stock goods of all qualities and all prices. He has the \$20 suit for the man who thinks that he can get more for his money by buying a suit at that price than he can by buying a better one for \$40, but he tells the customer just what he is buying.

The next time you think about buying something from a mail order house, if you ever do think of such a thing, go first to your home merchant and ask to see the article which you are thinking of buying.

**TURKS TO CHANGE NAME
ANCIENT GREEK SHRINE**

St. Sophia at Constantinople to be Named After the Prophet Mahomet

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 16.—In order to remove all vestiges of Greek domination of Constantinople, the Turks intend changing the name of the historic mosque of St. Sophia to Mehmedie Mosque, that is, the Mosque of Mahomet.

Founded by the builder of Constantinople itself, Constantine the Great, who dedicated it to "Eternal Wisdom," St. Sophia Mosque is one of the most famous religious buildings in the world. For more than a thousand years it was one of Christianity's most cherished shrines. It was built in the year 326. It was destroyed by fire in 404, restored, and again destroyed. Under Theodosius it was rebuilt into a magnificent church in 415, and 50 years later was further embellished by Justinian. Twenty years later the main dome fell in, and again it was restored to eclipse its former grandeur.

It is said 100 architects were employed, each of whom had a staff of 100 artisans. The altar was of gems set in gold and silver; the doors were of ivory, amber and cedar, the outer one being silver-plated. After the capture of Constantinople by the Turks in 1453 the church was converted into a mosque.

By the Turks St. Sophia Mosque is held in a veneration second only to that which surrounds the famous Kaaba, or Sacred House, at Mecca. The Greeks regard it with equal sacredness, and they have never given up their dream that a king of the name of Constantine would one day relapse Constantinople for Greece and with it St. Sophia. They hoped the late King Constantine would fulfill that role, but political misfortune and death intervened.

FISH ARRIVALS

Halibut Boats Marketed 132,000 Pounds of Halibut at Exchange This Morning

Four American boats sold 69,000 pounds, and eight Canadians sold 63,000 pounds, a total of 132,000 pounds of halibut, on the Fish Exchange this morning. The Canadian schooners received higher prices for both first and second class catches than did the Americans. The fish sales this morning will result in the shipping of six carloads for the east tonight which will clean up the refrigerator cars on hand. The arrivals and sales were:

CANDIDATE IN B.C.**

Sidney Bazzett-Jones Successful in Chartered Accountant Examinations

Information has been received that the recent Intermediate examination of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of British Columbia held on June 12, Sidney Bazzett-Jones of this city was successful in making the grade. Five candidates sat for the Intermediate and six candidates for the Final Examination, and of these Sidney Bazzett-Jones was the only successful candidate in the province and is therefore more to be congratulated than under ordinary circumstances. He is at present articled to George Rorie, Chartered Accountant, of the firm of Rorie & Small, Federal Building.

**BRITISH COMMISSION
SAYS FRENCH BATTLE
SCARS ARE VANISHING**

Work of Restoration is Proceeding Apace in Devastated Areas

LONDON, July 16.—France of today, like the France of 1871, is making a magnificent effort by hard work to restore the ravages of war, according to an official report of the British Department of Overseas Trade. The report is the work of the Commercial Councillor of the British Embassy in Paris, J. R. Cahall, and is painstaking and exhaustive. The general conclusions of the report are:

The present economic position of France is strong.

Her industrial population is fully employed, and her output in most fields of production is only limited by shortage of manpower.

The industrial reconstruction of the devastated areas is fast approaching completion.

Coal Mining

The report states that the destroyed or damaged coal mines are increasing their output with improved technical equipment. The great woollen and cotton works are kept going to the full extent of the labor at their disposal. The great agricultural areas of wheat and beet root, the chief crops of northern France, will soon approximate the pre-war areas.

Ports, waterways, railways, and roads have been and are being improved. Water power, systematically turned to account. New resources in ores, coal, potash, and oil have been developed. There has been advance in industrial organization in a marked fashion in the chemical, electrical, metallurgical, engineering, aluminum, and other industries, discernible through French industry as a whole. French foreign trade in weight has already surpassed pre-war figures.

Land Reclaimed

Fine results have been obtained by hard work in the devastated regions. Of 8,166,684 devastated acres, 7,447,297 have been cleared of projectiles, trench work and barbed wire; 19,920 factories have been rebuilt out of 22,160. Of nearly 3,941,000 acres of devastated agricultural land, more than 1,235,000 have been put under the plough.

The main railway system has been repaired, nearly all the waterways have been made navigable, and of the 36,450 miles of devastated roads, 19,743 have been restored to traffic and 8,671 have been improved.

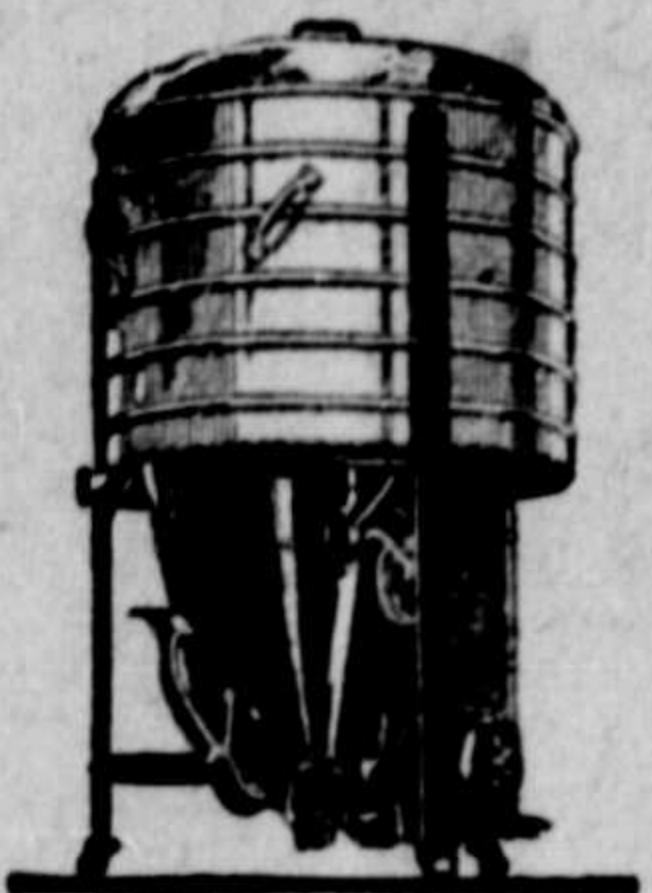

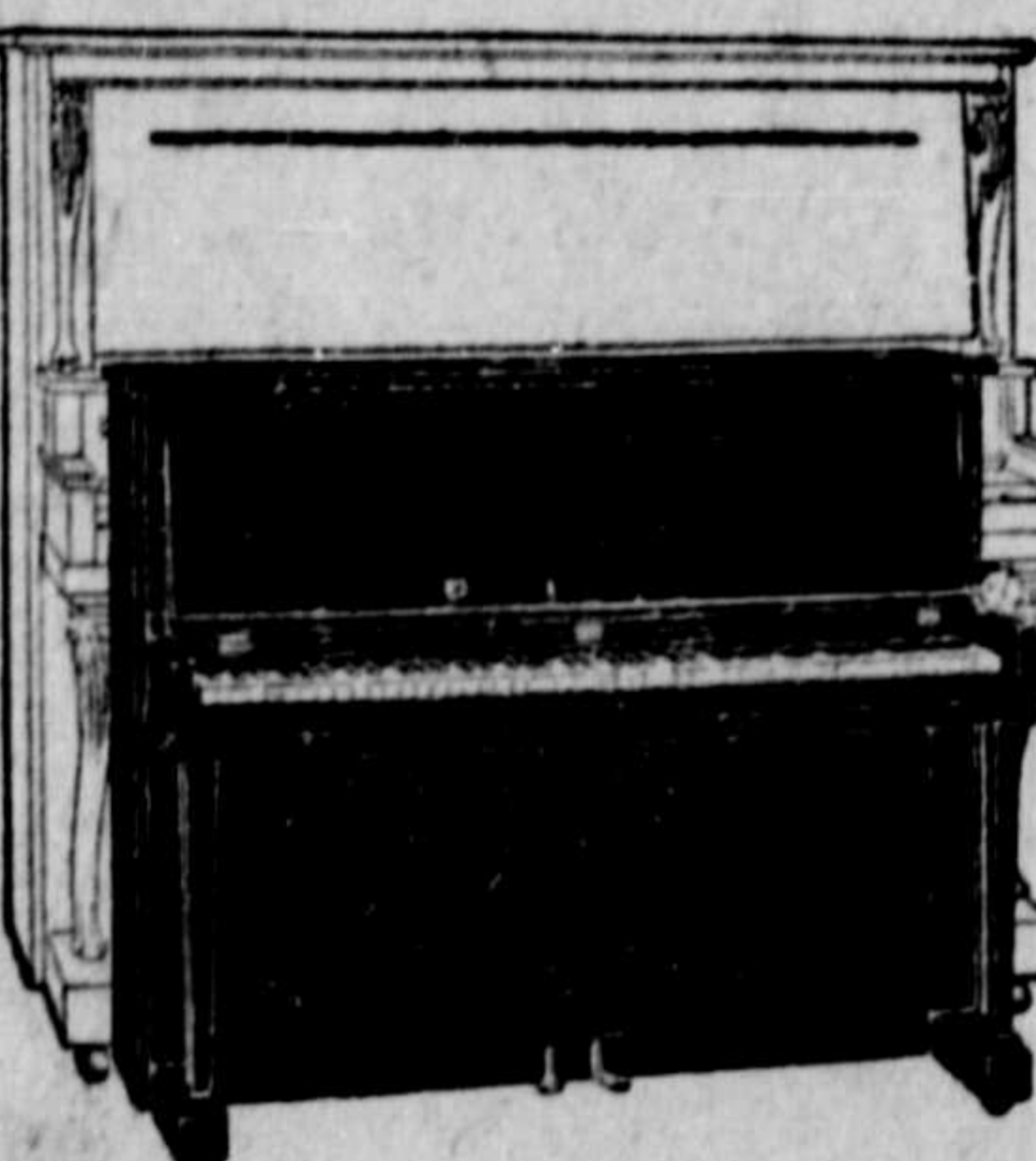
