LADS CONFESS MURDER OF YOUNG LORENZ

REPORTED IRISH ARE CHARGED WITH SUPPLYING AMMUNITION TO REBELS

Lorenz Was Murdered by Young Victoria Lads who Held up with Gun First Person Met on Street

VICTORIA, March 13.—Ronald Smith, aged 17, and Herbert Burton, aged 15, have confessed to the police that they murdered Lionel Lorenz, the 20-year old Royal Bank clerk, on the night of February 28. Possessed of a gun, they held up the first man they saw in the suburbs. Lorenz faced their gun and said "Go on with you. I have only twenty-five cents." He started to hand over a purse and tried to grasp Smith's gun. Smith says that he sidestepped and fired. Seeing Lorenz fall to the ground, both boys mounted to their bicycles and hurried home. Four other boys arrested in connection with the case were not implicated by Smith and Burton who will be arraigned in the Supreme Court by law but will, it is expected, be eventually committed for jury trial.

RIDLEY HOME WANTS MONEY

Delegation Appeared Last Night
Before Council Asking for a
Generous Grant

A delegation consisting of W. E. Fisher, Miss Davies, Mrs. C. G. Mills and Mrs. E. McCoskie appeared before the city council last night requesting that a grant be made by the city towards the completion of the cottages for the Ridley Home recently moved here from Metlakatla. After the delegation had been heard, the mayor referred the matter to the finance committee for report. A letter from the finance committee of the Ridley Home pointed out that the erection of three cottages at a cost of \$8,400 was proposed. So far the finances had only allowed for the completion of one. Many children were seeking admission and it was necessary to complete the other two but financial assistance would be necessary.

W. E. Fisher outlined the history of the Ridley Home with special reference to its value to the city. It was felt that the city as a body should give a liberal grant. There was no other institution of its character in the city for the bringing up of the children. Since the inception of the home at Metlakatla some years ago 412 children from Prince Rupert had received instruction and care in it.

Not For Indians

Miss Davies corrected the impression that it was a home for Indian children. There had never been Indian children in it. Out of the 412 children from Prince Rupert trained in the home since its inception 44 had been motherless and 28 fatherless. There was great need for such an institution as this in the city and its work of giving orphaned children proper training and upbringing was invaluable. This was the first public appeal for funds the Ridley Home has ever made. An investment now of \$1,000 by the city council would mean the expenditure of \$12,000 annually in the city.

Mayor Newton said that, despite the demand this year for economy, the matter would receive the best consideration of the finance committee. It was difficult to face all the requests made for liberal grants but it would be the aim of the committee to see what would be possible and the request would at least be sympathetically considered.

The matter was referred by His Worship to the finance committee for report and the delegation retired thanking the council for giving it a hearing.

BLOW RECEIVED IN BOUT IS FATAL TO TACOMA PUGILIST

TACOMA, March 13.—A blow which Fred Powers, aged 26, local professional boxer, received in a bout last night proved fatal. He died in a hospital here this morning from hemorrhage of the brain.

WILL SHOOT HOSTAGES IF GERMANS ATTACK

Mayor and Four Prominent Citizens Held by French in
Occupied District

ESSEN, March 13.—The German population of Recklinghausen district have been warned by the French commander that if there are any further French troops assassinated or ambushed the Burgomaster of Buer, who is held as a hostage together with four other town officials will be shot at once as a measure of retaliation. Eight Germans were killed yesterday in clashes with French troops in various parts of the district and a state of siege has been declared.

INDIAN BOY VICTIM SWANSON BAY FIRE

Elmer Street Died Following
Destruction of His Parents'
Shack—Burial at Port
Simpson

Elmer Street, an Indian boy, was burned to death in a fire which destroyed the shack of his parents at the Indian town, Swanson Bay, last Saturday night. Word to this effect was received by Chief Minty, of the provincial police, from Swanson Bay today. Apparently the lad was rescued from the blaze but he expired the next morning. Dr. Street, coroner, decided that an inquest was unnecessary. The body was sent to Port Simpson for burial.

GIRL FELL DOWN SHAFT OF ELEVATOR 40 FEET DIED SHORTLY AFTER

VICTORIA, Mar. 13.—Miss Dorothy Savage, eighteen years of age, a sales clerk in the Hudson Bay Company's store, fell forty feet down an elevator shaft and died shortly after.

BIG TOLL OF STATES STORM

At Least Forty Lives Lost,
Hundreds Injured and Property
Damage of Millions

CHICAGO, March 13.—The list of dead is nearly forty and injured 200 as a result of furious March storms which swept the area between the Rocky Mountains and Appalachian Range, Sunday night. Gradual restoration of communication brings additional tales of death. Damage to transportation lines, homes and business buildings will reach into millions of dollars. A report today from Nashville says the death list in Tennessee alone numbers thirty with nearly one hundred injured and property damage running into millions.

GRADUATE NURSES SUBSCRIBE MONEY FOR NURSES' HOME

The Graduate Nurses' Club, which has been very active during the past few months in raising money for the benefit of the new Nurses' Home building fund, has handed over the sum of \$72.30 to be used in that connection. The money was raised at a tea held some weeks ago at the home of Mrs. A. E. Acland.

SHOCK IS RECORDED

Earthquake of Moderate Intensity Lasting Twelve Minutes
Somewhere in South

VICTORIA, Mar. 13.—An earthquake shock of moderate intensity was recorded at the observatory here late Sunday lasting twelve minutes. The distance of the centre of disturbance is estimated as 640 miles. It was probably off the coast of California.

Gun Running was one Chief Offences Those Arrested Great Britain

Number of Republicans are Executed by Free
State: Women Active in Rebel Cause:
Government well Supported

LONDON, March 13.—The belief that further raids are impending in Britain persists in the press although it is generally reported that the persons considered most dangerous were gathered in last week end.

Free State secret service agents became acquainted with most of the details of the gun running and other schemes at secret meetings of the plotters. Women have been particularly active in the Irish Republican cause in Britain, keeping in regular touch with the irregular forces. One of the men arrested possessed papers showing he sent 20,000 rounds of ammunition from London to Dublin.

DUBLIN, March 13.—Michael Greavy, Henry Keenan and James O'Rourke, republicans, were executed here today.

CORK, March 13.—William Healy, James Tarle, Patrick Hogan, John Croke were executed here today by the Free State.

DUBLIN, March 13.—The names of one hundred people arrested in England and Scotland over the week end were published by the Free State yesterday with the explanation that they were charged with supplying materials to the rebels with which to make war on the established government in Ireland.

LONDON, March 13.—By a majority of 108 the House of Commons supported the British government action in arresting people charged with complicity with the Irish rebels after labor members had moved the adjournment in order to criticize the government action.

SUDBURY HAS SERIOUS FIRE

One Woman Loses Her Life When
Whole City Block is Destroyed

SUDBURY, March 13.—Mrs. Wilfrid Walker was burned to death and her husband is in a critical condition as a result of a fire which destroyed the Gamble-Robinson warehouse storage plant and a whole city block today. Mr. and Mrs. Walker, occupying one of the buildings, were caught in the flames.

NANAIMO HERRING CATCH IS LARGE

The total catch of herring in this neighborhood this season is 13,000 tons. These fish have all been taken since October 5 and most of them within the last few days. Seven salteries are being operated on Protection Island, Departure Bay and Newcastle Island. Nine-tenths of the catch is dry salted for the Oriental market.

NEW YORK, March 13.—Jake Schaefer defeated Willie Hoppe, champion eighteen two balkline billiard champion here last night 500 to 277 in the first block of a 1500 point match for the world's title.

NICE, France, March 13.—King Gustav, of Sweden, has entered as a participant in the Southern France tennis championship tournament. This is the first time in history that a reigning monarch has entered a championship tennis contest. King Gustav is 64 years of age.

HERRING RUN NOT UP TO MARK YET

So Far Run of Bait Fish is Not
Satisfactory, Manager of
Cold Storage Plant Says

According to T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., the herring run so far is not proving satisfactory. The company's boats are out cruising but the catch is not up to that of last year.

Held up for six hours by a snowstorm south of Grenville, the C.P.R. steamer Princess Mary, Capt. Arthur Slater, Vancouver for Skagway, did not reach port until 8 o'clock last night. There was considerable freight on board for this port and the steamer cleared for the north at 10.30. She is due back here southbound on Saturday morning.

Should Register If Not On List.

People of Prince Rupert and district who are not on the provincial voters' list are urged to register at once so that in the event of an election they may be in a position to exercise the franchise. There may not be an election within the next six months but no one can tell. The thing to do is to be prepared. Once on the list, there will be no need to register again before the election whenever it may happen to come.

Those who failed to vote at the last election will find their names were removed automatically and they will have to register again. Those who have recently moved into the district or who may have naturalized since the last list was made up, will have to register if they are to vote. This is the time to do it before the list closes for the half year.

Period For Outdoor Sports Is Coming.

The period is now coming when outdoor sports will be enjoyed by the young people. While a good many crack players have left town since last year, there are young lads growing up all the time and many of them are developing well and should be able to fill up the gaps.

Every encouragement should be given to outdoor sports for it is one of the most important features of the life of the community. Athletic prowess is much to be commended and admired. The ideal is for the whole city to play. It is all right to go out to watch the games and pay the price of admission. Funds are needed but it is also desirable that everyone should enjoy some particular form of outdoor sport. That is why a bowling green for the older people would be an excellent thing. It seems impossible to make a golf course here just at present but a bowling green would answer the purpose just as well.

Duty Of Parents To Children.

The duty of children to parents has been the theme for lectures and lessons since the world began, but of late a new form of admonition has sprung into fashion. Today the duty of parents to children is being emphasized. Dr. Grant spoke of it before the daughters of Empire on Saturday and urged its importance in the improvement of the national life. Formerly parents were autocrats whose word was law. Today the tendency is for parents to allow the children to become autocrats whose every whim is law. That is the opposite extreme. The idea of co-operation between parents and children is to be preferred to either. There is no reason why parents should use their power to enforce obedience to their own whims, but there is reason that children should be taught to respect the rights of others, either their elders or the younger people. It is only by instilling in the youthful mind respect for authority that any country can become great.

Freak Of Boys Ended In Murder.

According to the despatches today, the freak of young boys in going out on a daring hold-up game, resulted in the murder of Lionel Lorenz, the bank clerk who lost his life recently at Victoria. This is one of the signs of the looseness of the age in the bringing up of children. Boys must be taught respect for authority, but that need not be by the club method, although sometimes a club or a piece of cow hide is a necessary means of impressing the youthful mind.

It is to be supposed that the Victoria boys had no idea of murder and never considered the seriousness of their offense. It was a daring exploit such as they had read of or seen depicted on the screen. It was something of a lark to them. They were stepping out. It is after the event that the seriousness of what they have done enters into consideration.

SHOULD REGISTER NOW AS LIST CLOSES SOON

Half Yearly Court of Revision to
Sit Next Month; List Closes
April 2

Voters in provincial and Dominion elections are reminded that the voters' list for the current half year closes on Monday, April 1, and the half yearly court of revision will be held two weeks later on Monday, April 16.

Anyone who did not vote at the last election is automatically struck off the list and must register again in order to be in a position to vote in case an election should take place. Anyone not on the list cannot be put on except by registering in the regular way.

The voting on provincial and Dominion elections has nothing whatever to do with civic registration and there is nothing to pay. All that is necessary is for the applicant to go before the registrar or any notary public and fill out a form making an affidavit that he or she is not already a voter in some other constituency. The government agent at the Court House is the registrar.

WOULD HAVE CITY COUNCIL GIVE UP SALARY FOR YEAR

Motion of Ald. Perry Not Seconded,
However, and Indemnity
Bylaw Passes

Ald. Perry moved at last night's council meeting that the mayor, clerk and aldermen for 1923 serve without salary but failed to get a second.

PORTLAND CANAL PROSPECTS GOOD

So Says George Clothier in Interview Given in Victoria

A dispatch from Victoria to Vancouver papers says: Big things are in store for the Portland Canal district in a mining way, claims Mr. George Clothier, provincial mining engineer for that section of British Columbia.

During 1922, he points out, there was a development of over \$10,000,000 in the Portland Canal country, a 50 per cent increase over the previous year. The engineer prophesies that the 1923 will be the biggest year in the history of mining in his district.

Last year the Granby Company bonded three properties. One of these at Maple Bay, will ship copper this year. Another group, George, is being developed and if satisfactory results are obtained the present railway will be extended back with them all the launders facilities for the Naas River district, as well as the Bear River country.

Salmon River Section
In the Salmon River section, stated Mr. Clothier, the famous Premier mine has paid \$3,150,000 dividends, or sixty-three per cent of the capital stock. Of this amount no less than fifty-five per cent was paid last year—1922. The Premier had shipped 70,000 tons of ore in 1922, containing 120,000 ounces of gold and four million ounces of silver. The silver produced by this mine in 1922 is more than has been produced in the entire province in any previous year, said Mr. Clothier.

From 250 to 350 men have been employed. The tramway has been inaugurated to take care of from 200 to 250 tons per day capacity and may be increased to 300 tons per day. The output of the mine is being regulated by the tramway capacity. The greater part of the tonnage is being shipped to the Granby Company's smelter at Anyox.

Much Work Done
The Big Missouri, in the same neighborhood, formerly under option to Sir Donald Mann, has had a great deal of development work done last year and has been handled by Messrs. Tritte and Wilson, of Fernie, big stockholders in the Premier mine. Ore was proven to a considerable depth by sinking a shaft, and much surface cutting was done last year. As the work progresses, Mr. Clothier stated, the value of this property will be proved.

The engineer explained that the involved affairs of the Dolly Varden Company on Alice Arm had had a bad effect upon general development in that district, while the settlement of the legal difficulties over the famous Engineer mine in Allin should bring that property to the front quickly.

Mr. Clothier is highly optimistic over prospects in Northern British Columbia. He will address the Vancouver Chamber of Mines Friday evening.

ELEVATOR AT OCEAN DOCK SOON FINISHED

Work is Proceeding Steadily Under Albert Auer, Engineer—Six Men Engaged

The work of installing the loading elevator at the new ocean dock is proceeding steadily under the supervision of Albert Auer, the engineer. Some five or six men are employed and the job will be finished soon.

It is rumored that the ocean dock may soon be used for sacked grain shipments from the prairies to ocean going steamers.

Sport Chat

The Basketball Association is planning to wind up the local season tonight with a rousing program and it is expected that the Exhibition Hall will have a record crowd for the occasion. The headline basketball game will be the match between the Senior and Junior Colts and a good deal of interest should attach itself to this meeting of the champions of their respective divisions. Two High School teams will also put on a game and two boxing bouts round off the program. Not the least interesting feature will be the presentation to the champion teams of each League of their trophies by the respective donors.

Great preparations are being made for the champion basketball excursion to Anyox tomorrow night and the fifteen players and those who will accompany them are confident of bringing back with them all the laurels going to the smelter town. The trip itself is being looked forward to with almost as much interest as the actual playing of the games and the travelers are going to take advantage of all there is to be seen. Some of the time will be spent at Stewart and Hyder on Thursday morning while the Prince Rupert slays there and the teams will reach Anyox on Thursday evening. There will be little time to spare over the playing of the games but it is understood some sort of a reception is being planned by the Anyox hosts. The teams will be home again on Friday morning.

Despite the fact that Chicago has been in the second division for several seasons, the Chicago club has one of the greatest records of any team in the National League. New York has cut down Chicago's lead in championships won but the Cubs still lead eleven pennants to ten. The Chicago club has been continuously in the field since 1876, the opening year of the league and in forty-seven National League races the Cubs have made the record of never finishing last. Only Chicago and Boston, of the original League set, have had teams in the race ever since 1876. The Cubs stand second in the life time standing of the National League with a per centage of .555 having won 2,752 games from their opponents and lost 2,203.

Chicago played its first National League game at Louisville, Ky., on April 25, 1876, and immediately established baseball history. Albert G. Spalding, later head of the great sporting goods house, pitched the contest and shut out Louisville by 4 to 0. It was the first shut-out of the Major Leagues and started the expression "Chicagoed" whenever a team was shut out. In addition to Spalding there were many famous players of the early era of baseball in that Chicago National League contest. The celebrated Cap Anson, later famous as the first baseman, played third base; Paul Barnes, second base; Carl Muey, first base, and Jim White, catcher.

While working in the woods last week, Arthur Hutchinson had the misfortune to break his leg. The ice is piled very high under the bridge across the Bulkley River. Sheet iron is being put around the piles to protect them against being cut by the ice when it begins to move.

EMPLOYEES FAIL TO GET RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL ON DISPUTE

Request for Civic Representative
on Conciliation Board Was
Rejected Last Night

The Civic Employees' Union received short shrift at the hands of the city council last night in its request that the corporation appoint a representative on the proposed board of conciliation over the salary and wage dispute. Ald. Macdonald and Ald. Mackenzie moved and seconded that the request be complied with and a representative appointed. The resolution was lost when all the other aldermen voted against it without comment. Ald. Collart was not present.

The Civic Employees' Union has now forwarded its petition for a conciliation to Ottawa. If the petition is accepted the city will again be called upon to name a representative under the Industrial Disputes Act. Failing the appointment of a member by the city, the government will make its own appointment. T. Ross Mackay has been named as the employees' representative.

Proportionately the telephone system here was a large one. While the average of telephones in a city was one to every ten persons, there were 1300 phones in use in Prince Rupert.

COUNCIL IGNORANT, ROAD WORK STILL GOES MERRILY ON

Laying of Rough Rock on Certain
Side Streets Raised Storm
Among City Fathers
Last Night

Who, without the authority of the city council, put the rough rock on Seventh Street between First and Second Avenues and Third Avenue and Fraser Street and on Sixth Street between Third Avenue and Fraser Street which has made those streets impassable for traffic?

This was the question that engaged the attention of the city council in a lengthy discussion last night.

The matter came up in connection with a report from the city engineer stating that it would cost \$69 to put the streets in shape again by laying sand over the rough rock.

Mayor Newton declared that the rough rock had been placed on the streets in question without the authority or knowledge of the council. Ald. Stephens thought there should be an investigation to ascertain who had been so bold as to carry on such a high handed piece of work without consent of the council or knowledge of any of the aldermen.

There was some discussion as to the ways and means of putting the streets in order again and the cost of the damage that had been done and of rectifying it. Ald. Macdonald suggested it might be cheaper to pick the rocks up and leave the streets as they were than to start in patching up. Owing to the fact that the city engineer had not yet made himself sufficiently conversant with the workings of the department it was impossible to get information from that quarter with a view to laying the blame.

Finally it was moved and seconded that the streets be put in shape as suggested by the engineer. This resolution was carried. Ald. Stephens remarking that it was about time the council was finding out who was doing such work when suspension of it had been ordered by the council.

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LABOR LEADER ON UNION AIM

Should Cease to be Negative Declared Ramsay MacDonald in Article

LONDON, March 13.—“Labor should do itself the justice of ceasing to be negative, anti-capitalist, thinking only of its shares,” writes Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the Labor opposition in the House of Commons in the February issue of the Social Review. His article is called “The Outlook for Trade Unionism.”

“Every counsellor who advises labor contrary to the spirit of social co-operation is misleading it,” continued Mr. MacDonald. “The building up of an organization devised exclusively to fight capitalism is an error. The fight against capitalism was to be carried on by applying a better spirit than that of capitalism to social and industrial problems and difficulties.”

After stating that political and moral weapons alone can undermine the walls of capitalism, Mr. MacDonald adds:

“Organized labor, trade union executives, parliamentary parties, should each in their own way and in respect to their own trades and jobs make the conspiracy of capitalism against the community—no falter against the labor party—clear. This has to be accomplished by a persistent explanation of the work of capitalism, its watered stocks, its flotation expenses, its useless payments, its methods of keeping up prices, and such like.”

Moral Bankruptcy
In conclusion, Mr. MacDonald says: “Capitalism is decaying owing to its moral bankruptcy. It is at war with social production, with common well-being, and with the spiritual love of liberty. If the labor struggle is conducted in the same spirit as the capitalists have shown, and on a class basis, the decisive battles will be fought with economic weapons alone and labor will gain no great victory; but as soon as labor frees its mind so as to come under the influence of the spirit of its historic role to create a social economic organization that will secure liberty and make a single minded pursuit of commonwealth interests practicable, it will equip itself with weapons and hold a position which will make its final victory certain.”

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not under land.
Partnership pre-emption abolished but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjunction of land with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 100 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation of less than 2 years, and has made no improvements, he may be cause of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to value of \$25 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. This cannot be obtained if less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cultivated and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may receive another, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For granting and industrial purposes areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural gas pipelines inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to the site of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money accrued due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, fees of labor, and other expenses.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of United Frontiers or descendants of such direct or indirect, remitted from entitlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase involving forfeiture of interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING
Grazing Act, 1915, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for granting districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers of stock, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

ITALIAN NATIONALISTS

UNITE WITH FASCISTI

ROME, Mar. 13.—The factional strife between the militant and vigorous Fascisti party, which now rules Italy, and the Nationalists, the moderate organization which sought to realize its aims by parliamentary methods, has come to an end. The political purposes of both parties long ago have been similar; they differed only in ways of accomplishment.

An executive committee composed of six Fascisti and three Nationalists, and presided over by Premier Mussolini, has been formed for the purpose of uniting the activities of the two parties.

On recommendation of the city engineer, it was decided at last night's council meeting to put in a temporary 1 1/2 inch water main on Fourth Avenue West at a cost of \$200. It was pointed out by Ald. Munro that grading operations had put the wood pipe out of business and it was necessary to do something at once. The chairman of the Board of Works also stated that the committee hoped to have a report on an 8 inch main for Fifth Avenue to present to the council next week.

Before the General Hospital gets a grant from the city this year a statement of its financial condition must be submitted to the Finance Committee. A report from the committee to this effect was adopted by the council last night.

VANCOUVER ISLAND COAL TO BE TRIED

Finance Committee Deems That More Expensive Fuel May Be More Economical

The city council last night accepted the tender of Albert & McCaffery to supply the City Hall with thirty tons of Vancouver Island coal at \$12.75 a ton. This was done on recommendation of the Finance Committee, Ald. Stephens, chairman of the committee, pointing out that the cheapest coal in price was not always the most economical. It was the intention of the committee to make tests of this coal so as to compare it with Alberta coal which had for some time been used in the hall. Three quarters of a ton daily of this coal had been used and this was considered high.

A second report from the Finance Committee in regard to coal was also adopted by the council. This provides that future supplies of coal for all city requirements over which the council has jurisdiction will be ordered through the purchasing agent and finance committee and not independently by the departments concerned. Ald. Stephens said that coal had been ordered indiscriminately and in one case \$13.75 per ton had been paid. The committee felt that a saving could be effected by controlling and consolidating the purchases.

SALMON EGGS ARE TO ARRIVE AT TERRACE ON THURSDAY NEXT

The salmon eggs coming through to Terrace from the Miramichi River, New Brunswick, are expected to arrive in Terrace Thursday. They will be taken at once to Lakelse, if the river is passable, and will be hatched in the Dominion government hatchery on the creek back from the lake, where the B.C. salmon eggs are hatched artificially each year.

WHIPPING POST FOR U.S. WIFE BEATERS

BUFFALO, Mar. 13.—The whipping post as a restraining influence on wife-beaters is favored by the probation officers of this city. Their opinion was expressed during the hearing of an exceptionally brutal case. Serious cases of wife-beating in which the woman carried the marks for days or weeks average about 50 a year in this city, and there are frequent “repeaters.” “Flogging is the only remedy for these brutes,” says William T. Galvin, chief probation officer. “The lash is being used in Delaware and Canada, and I would like to see it adopted in New York.”

Bad whiskey figured in most recent cases of wife-beating, the court records show.
