## SENATE REFORM SCHEME BEFORE COMMONS

### WHALE MEAT IS TO BE EXPORTED FROM NADEN HARBOR THIS SEASON

#### Fielding Introduces Plan for Reform of the Canadian Senate; Half Appointed by Provinces

OTTAWA, March 22.—Hon. W. S. Fielding yesterday submitted to the House of Commons his scheme for the reform of the Canadian Senate, suggesting that half the senators be appointed as at present by the Dominion government and to be known as Dominion senators, the other half to be appointed by the provincial governments and to be known as provincial senators. Other features are as follows:

Nominations to the Senate to be made for a period of ten years with eligibility for another ten years.

All senators to be retired at the age of eighty.

Existing senators to be given the option of retiring at 75 years of age on a pension amounting to two thirds their present indemnity.

Mr. Fielding said he was opposed to a popularly elected Upper House lest it become a rival for the House of Commons.

An amendment made by a Quebec member for a popular election of senators carried the debate beyond the time for adjournment and the question was not voted upon.

#### STEAMERS FOR LOCAL SERVICE

Believed That C.N.R. is Planning to Give New Service to Stewart and Islands

That the Canadian National Railway contemplates the putting into service of two local coastwise steamers between Prince Rupert and Stewart, and Prince Rupert and the Queen Charlotte Islands, during the coming summer, is the opinion expressed today in local transportation circles.

It has been suggested that the C.N.R. put on two small fast steamers capable of carrying a complement of passengers and about 100 tons of freight, one of which would be able to leave here for Stewart one day and return the next, while the other steamer would ply regularly between this port and the Queen Charlotte Islands calling at any points where passengers or freight were.

It is also probable that the Canadian National railway authorities would in this event make Prince Rupert the home port of the coastwise fleet.

If the local business is taken care of in this way it is felt that great benefit would accrue to the Canadian National railway lines out of Prince Rupert. A regular passenger and freight service between this port and Stewart and the Queen Charlotte Islands would undoubtedly be the means of diverting considerable traffic of a remunerative nature to the C.N.R. out of here which would otherwise go to Vancouver and over the Canadian Pacific railroads or other lines. Any traffic diverted to Prince Rupert would naturally go to the Canadian National Railway.

#### MCCAFFERY IS AN OPTIMIST

Says Thinks No Lot on Townsite Will be Less Than \$1,000 in Six Years

VALUE SECTION 4 \$250

Court of Revision Appeal is Proceeding Today and Closes by Tonight

That lots in Section 4 were worth \$250 each was the expert opinion given at the Taxation appeal before Judge Young yesterday by M. P. McCaffery. He justified this statement from the developments he felt were about to take place here as a result of the benign political situation and because of the cheap lumber rates offering by way of the Panama Canal. In six years from now he prophesied that no lots in the townsite would be offering for less than \$1,000. The city then would have a population of 40,000.

Alderman Stephens this morning said he thought the assessment was a fair one. He explained the methods used in making the assessment. The Alder Block was taken as the base and all other lots assessed in relation to it. Recent sales were used as a guide in determining values.

John Dybhavn also claimed that the assessment was fair. He related experiences with other courts of revision.

W. McLarnon, assistant tax commissioner for the company, was on the stand yesterday and was called again this morning. E. S. Allistone, city tax clerk, gave technical evidence this morning.

Court adjourned at 11:50 this morning until 2 this afternoon. To comply with the law judgment must be delivered today, or within one month of the final sitting of the Court of Revision. The hearing will continue this afternoon and on into this evening, it is expected.

#### FINISH BRIDGE ON BEAR RIVER

Provincial Government Lets Contract With View to Immediately Completing Facility

VICTORIA, Mar. 22.—Plans are being made by the provincial government to proceed this year with the building of the Bear River bridge at Stewart.

Yesterday the contract for completing the rock fill was awarded to G. A. Elstron at a cost of \$14,000. Mr. Elstron was given a contract for half of the total rock fill last year and this year will complete the work. The filling is being done in order to shorten the span of the bridge. The former bridge was washed out by high water.

Cyril Jackson, also of Stewart, has been given the contract for supplying piling for the trestle work.

The government will probably do the actual bridge work itself.

#### BRITAIN HAS KEPT TREATY

Scrapped Two Million Tons Since Washington Conference Says Amery

LONDON, March 22.—Col. L. C. Amery, first lord of the admiralty, in a public speech here, said Britain had scrapped warships totalling 1,600,000 tons since the Washington conference or with ships in construction and auxiliary vessels she had scrapped 2,000,000 tons including 35 battleships, 83 cruisers, 283 destroyers, 95 torpedo boats, and 101 submarines.

#### BISHOP BACK FROM UP LINE

Confirmation Services Were Held at Various Points—War Memorial Unveiled at Forestdale

Archbishop F. H. Du Vernet returned to the city on last night's train after having spent the past fortnight visiting various points in the interior.

The bishop held confirmation services at Endako, Forestdale, Hazelton and Kitwanga and preached at Telkwa and Smithers as well as visiting other places. At Endako he gave a lecture on psychology.

At St. Paul's Church, Forestdale, Bishop Du Vernet unveiled a war memorial tablet in the new chancel. This chancel was just recently built and was given by the congregation of Holy Trinity Church, Tunbridge Wells, England, the entire structure being as a war memorial. Rev. J. H. Kerr, formerly of Police Group, is clergyman in charge at Forestdale with headquarters at Burns Lake.

Bishop Du Vernet stated that plans were being made to move the present church at Hubert to Quick across the Bulkley River. With the decision of the government not to build a bridge across the river at this point, the agricultural population finds itself on the opposite side of the river with no communication with the former railway station at Hubert.

#### LOW SALARIES OF OFFICIALS

No Increases Were Made When Wages Went up Nor Reduction When Wages Came Down

OTTAWA, March 22.—No reduction was made in the salaries of officials of the Canadian National Railways at the time of the reduction of wages in July last, stated George P. Graham, acting minister of railways, in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon in reply to a question. "The employee's wages," said Mr. Graham, "were increased from time to time in accordance with the McAdoo and Chicago awards and supplements thereto, but salaries of officers were not increased proportionately nor have they ever been paid at rates comparable with those enjoyed by officers of competing lines or in other branches of industry."

W. H. Snell, C.P.R. general passenger agent, Vancouver, and J. G. McNab, divisional freight agent, are expected from the south on the Princess Mary tomorrow morning. They will spend a day here returning to Vancouver on the Princess Beatrice Saturday afternoon. Mr. McNab was formerly general agent here.

#### LORD SANDERSON DIES

LONDON, Mar. 22.—Lord Sanderson, former under secretary for foreign affairs, is dead aged 82.

#### EMPLOYEES FAIL TO REACH SETTLEMENT WITH CITY COUNCIL

The committee representing the civic employees interviewed the city council at a special committee meeting last night but a settlement of the wage dispute was not reached. A special meeting of the civic employees has been called for tonight to consider the situation.

The council refused to entertain a demand that common labor be paid 65c. an hour.

#### PROVINCE GIVEN LEAVE TO APPEAL DOMINION ORDER

LONDON, Mar. 22.—The judicial committee of the Privy Council has granted the province of British Columbia leave to appeal against the Dominion government's disallowance of the Provincial act validating orders in council with reference to the employment of Oriental labor in British Columbia.

#### DAM WORK AT OCEAN FALLS

Vancouver Contractors Resume Big Job of Adding 15 Feet to Height of Present Reservoir

OCEAN FALLS, March 22.—Robertson & Randall, Vancouver contractors, have resumed work on the enlarging of the dam here for the Pacific mills. Work on the project was started last year but a sudden stop was put to it when excessive quantities of water came raging down the river in the fall and swept out all the preparatory work that had been done.

Eighty men are now employed on the work and it is expected the dam will be finished in June. Fifteen feet is being added to the elevation of the present dam. This will give an additional several million acre feet of water storage and will preclude the possibility of closing down of the plant in future on account of water shortage. Several times during the past few years the mill has had to close down or curtail operations on account of scarcity of water.

#### DR. PLASKETT GIVEN THE HIGHEST HONORS

VICTORIA, Mar. 22.—Dr. J. S. Plaskett, director of the Dominion astro-physical laboratory here has been appointed a fellow of the Royal Society, the highest distinction in the British Empire.

#### IRELAND MAY APPLY LEAGUE OF NATIONS

DUBLIN, Mar. 22.—James Douglas moved a resolution in the Dail requesting the executive council to apply for membership for the Free State in the League of Nations.

#### No Friction Over Signing of Halibut Treaty but Situation is Delicate, Times Declares

LONDON, March 22.—The delicate position in connection with the signing of the halibut fisheries treaty at Washington by a member of the Canadian government and not by the British ambassador is the subject of a leading editorial in the Times this morning. The Times points out, however, that there is fortunately no evidence of friction over the matter between the Dominion and Imperial governments. Despite Premier Mackenzie King's reply to questions in the Canadian House regarding the signing of the treaty, and the statement that no slight has been cast upon Sir Eric Geddes in connection therewith, the Times considers that a certain amount of doubt still veils the sequence of events leading up to the signing of the treaty. It says that in justice to the people of the United Kingdom, and of Dominions other than Canada, who are vitally interested and also to the people of the United States, it believes it essential that the whole situation should be cleared up as soon as possible.

The matter needs delicate handling and clear thinking, says the Times, and above all sympathetic understanding of the Canadian standpoint. "Canadians have been misled into thinking that the treaty was a separate and virtually independent act on the part of the Canadian government," says the Times, which calls upon the British government to clear the air by a full official statement in connection with the signing thereof.

#### ASK CHANGE INCOME TAX

Larger Exemption for Children and Complete Exemption in Certain Conditions

OTTAWA, Mar. 22.—The House of Commons yesterday adopted a resolution that the Government should consider the expediency of raising the amount of exemption from income tax for each child to \$500 and exempt altogether the father of five minor children who has less than \$5,000 income. The Minister of Finance promised to consider the matter.

#### Whaling Company to Ship Frozen Whale Meat to Japan from Naden Harbor This Year; Five Steamers

VICTORIA, March 22.—The entire whaling fleet will go into commission this year and will leave for the various stations in about a month from now, after being overhauled here. Two whalers, the William Grant and the Blue will hunt out of Naden Harbor and it is expected a big business will be done this year in export of frozen whale meat to Japan. The cold storage plant at Naden Harbor will be utilized to handle the meat. At the Kyuquot station off Vancouver Island, whale meat will be canned and shipped to England for distribution.

Three steam whalers, the Orion, Brown, and White will make their headquarters at Rose Harbor so that Queen Charlotte Islands will be headquarters for five steamers in all, commencing about May 1.

Capt. Le Marquant, head of the Consolidated Whaling Corporation Ltd., says the demand for whale meat in Japan is on the increase and it is proposed to make shipments to that country from the Queen Charlotte Islands station. This will be all handled from Naden Harbor at the north of Graham Island.

#### STEAMER PLANTING SOCKEYE SALMON IN SMALLER STREAMS

Steamer Givenchy was in port yesterday after planting a quantity of sockeye salmon eggs in the small streams along the coast with a view to building up the sockeye supply. Some of the streams have been depleted from over fishing.

#### L. R. STEEL DIED TODAY

Head of Bankrupt Corporation Passes Away on Eve of Investigations

BUFFALO, March 22.—Leonard R. Steel, founder of the L. R. Steel corporation, which went into receivership March 8, died early today on the train en route to Chicago. Steel's death came on the eve of investigations into stock selling and other financial methods and his promotions by county and state authorities. It is not believed, however, that his death will affect the status of the Canadian shareholders. The question of the disposition of the Canadian assets did not rest with Steel but with the recently appointed receivers.

Buy Power Cheaper From Private Companies.

In the Locomotive Engineer's Journal for February there is an article dealing with municipal power plants that indicates what can be done by developing the large water powers in the neighborhood. It is an argument in favor of municipal ownership, but it says:

"Municipal plants, they tell us, are finding one after the other and more and more that it is cheaper to buy current of the private companies than it is possible for them to produce it themselves.

"It is true. And many an unwary municipality is falling into the trap. Some have done so and later discovered their mistake. Others have done so and are still unaware of any unfavorable results."

"Here is what is happening: The private power companies are as rapidly as possible building up great systems of plants uniting and interconnecting first a few cities and then more and more until they have captured fifty or a hundred or even more cities, towns and villages and made contracts with them for current. This gives them the advantage of large scale production. By that means they are able to reduce the unit cost of production to one half or one fifth of that of small isolated plants."

What We Need Is Power Right Now.

While the article speaks of private ownership as a menace, it admits that production is cheaper and that by business methods costs can be cut down to one half or one fifth. Here then is a lesson for Prince Rupert.

This city needs power in the worst way. There is none here to offer possible customers. The present plant is operated pretty well to its capacity. Before much more can be sold another plant or another system must be installed. To do this economically a large sum of money must be spent in making provision to supply big plants such as pulp and paper mills. The outlay will run into millions.

Theoretically the municipal power plant is correct for a city already built and a heavy consumer. But when a town is small and struggling, and where a little outside help means a great deal, it is well to have some big interests pulling in our direction.

The position here today is that negotiations are on for the sale of the mill and pulp limits of the Emerson Estate. Anyone purchasing this will have to get power and this power question is one of the difficulties to be overcome in making a deal and getting the industry started here. The city is financially unable to act. If instead any inducement can be given to a big power concern to develop the Falls River or Khtada powers and bring them to Prince Rupert so that anyone wishing to locate here can be sure of getting abundance of cheap power, then we may hope to show some progress industrially. Our power should be our source of wealth. As it is we derive no benefit from being within forty miles of several fine power sources.

Forget The Theory Get Down To Practical Business.

It is all very well for theorists to write about the advantages of municipal ownership. Let us grant them all and still what can we do if we have not the money or credit or courage to go to work ourselves and spend millions on harnessing the source of supply and bringing the power here. Is it not better to be reasonable and let someone who has the money come and spend it here and build up our city. In twenty or thirty years time when their charter expires it will be for the next generation to decide whether they want to change the system. They can do it then, perhaps to advantage. Just now what we need is power and that at almost any price, provided we can supply it on attractive terms to those who would locate here and help us build up the city.

Low Rates From Big Plants.

The article tells of the low rates secured from big plants. Winnipeg supplies current retail at 3c a kilowatt hour; London, Ont., at 3c; St. Catherine's, 1.6c; Toronto, 2.2c; Stratford, 2.1c; and the average of 99 Canadian municipalities is 3.1c. Yet here in Prince Rupert our plant is running at capacity and we have to pay very much higher rates.

The article tells of the advantages of abundant and cheap power for lighting, cooking and operating industries. It says: "Cheap electric power is the most vitally important factor in the development of the modern city. Its utilities, commercial and industrial development, its domestic problems, indeed its very existence depends upon it."

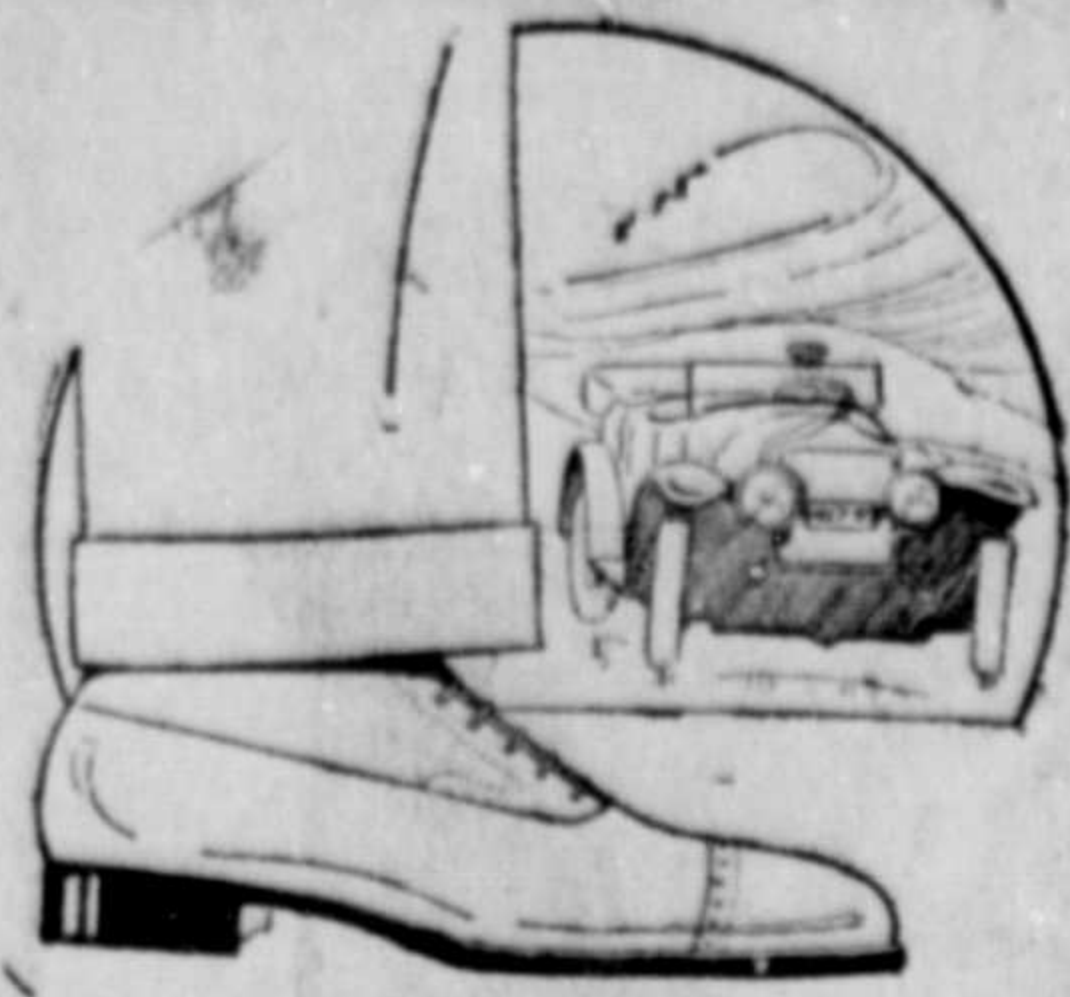

### UPPER PRICES DOWN A LITTLE

Producers Holding Firmly at Seventeen Cents But Can be Bought For Less

NEW YORK, March 22.—The price of electrolytic copper is slightly weaker. While all the larger producers are holding firm at 17 cents delivered, with a considerable tonnage sold at that price, copper can be bought in important directions at somewhat under 16 7/8 cents delivered. Second-hands are still willing to sell at 16 1/2 cents aside ship New York, while abroad English dealers are selling as low as 16.95 c.i.f.

While the amount of copper offered under 17 cents is in fair amount in the domestic market, it is not thought that any material breakdown price will occur, as most producers are sold well ahead, with consumers as yet uncovered on considerable of the metal which they must buy to cover commitments that are being held for placing later in the second quarter.

Demand abroad is in fair volume, but being satisfied mainly by foreign dealers, although Copper Export Association has sold a fair tonnage to France and England during the last 24 hours.

#### Mine Output

The mine output of copper still is 20,000 pounds a month below world consumption, and everything still favors producers as to prices rather than consumers. The present slight weakness is due to smaller demand during the last two weeks such as is to be expected before the start of another buying movement. Price of electrolytic copper for domestic shipment is 16 7/8 to 17 cents a pound delivered to the end of June, with a slight willingness to sell into July. Lake copper is 17 1/8 cents delivered to the end of May. Price aside ship New York is 16 1/2 cents with producers unwilling to meet the price. Prices for European destinations from American producers are at levels corresponding with 17 to 17 1/8 cents c.i.f. Hamburg or London.

Sir G. McL. Brown referred to the many pleasant memories he had of the Province, in which he spent so many years; and H. B. Thomson drew attention to the necessity of translating into action the expressed desire of closer relationships between the Oversea Dominions and the

Mother Country, which was always a prominent feature of such gatherings.

Mr. Pellow-Harvey referred to the increasing interest now shown in British Columbian mining, and stated that at the present time several important groups in the city were examining mining properties in the Province.

J. W. Bruce Referred to Modern Labor Movements and Oriental Question Last Evening

J. W. Bruce, organizer for Canada of the International Plumbers' Union, gave an interesting address last night to the local Carpenters' Union touching on the world labor situation and the problems affecting the working classes.

Speaking of modern labor movement, Mr. Bruce dealt with the reconstruction of the International and spoke antagonistically of radical labor organizations such as the O.B.U. and the I.W.W. These, he said, were not helping the cause of labor.

Mr. Bruce also spoke of the Oriental question and said that the governments were beginning to wake up to the seriousness of a situation at which they had at first scoffed. The speaker said that even in Prince Rupert he had difficulty in getting a meal where Oriental help was not employed.

J. J. Gillis, president of the Union, was in the chair and there was a fair attendance confined to members of the Carpenters' organization.

**PORTLAND CANAL MINING JUDGMENT**

VICTORIA, Mar. 22.—Under certain circumstances "a share" in a mining claim means a one-half interest, according to the judgment rendered this morning in the case of Roberts vs. Roberts by Mr. Justice Murphy.

The parties, Thomas Roberts and W. J. Roberts, are father and son. It appears that the son took up a mining claim in the Portland Canal district, but being unable to meet the assessments, handed it over to his father, who promised him "a share" if he made anything out of it. The father completed the payments and obtained the Crown grant for the underground and surface rights. He then gave an option on the property for a substantial sum.

The judgment is that the son is entitled to a declaration that he is owner of one-half of the property, subject to the father being repaid all his outlay with legal interest, and subject also to the existing option.
