## OF WHEAT

British Customs Authorities Make Ruling Benefitting Canadian Ports

LONDON, Dec. 22: (Canadian Press)-British customs authorities ruled yesterday that Canadian wheat shipped via the United States, to be accorded the six percent Imperial preference provided under the Ottawa trade agreement, must be consigned to a British destination before leaving the Dominion. It cannot be stored in United States elevators until reconsigned and shipped to Great Britain.

Canadian scaports are expected to benefit from the ruling which was made in connection with a test shipment recently made via Buffalo and New York. It is regarded as a direct thrust at United States elevators at such lake ports as Buffalo which have been accustomed to handling much Canadian grain on its way to the United Kingdom.

### Representatives Pass Modification Measure By 230 to 165 Vote

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 22:-The first successful move to modify the Volstead Act was achieved by wets yesterday when the House of Representatives by a vote of 230 to 165 endorsed the Collier Bill providing for the legalization of the sale of beer of 3 2-10 alcoholic content by weight—an amount equal to four percent by volume.
