PACIFIC HALIBUT DISCUSSED AT MONTREAL FATHERS HAVE A VERY DIFFICULT PROBLEM TO DEAL WITH TONIGHT

Halibut Fisheries are Discussed at Montreal

Close Season is Recommended and Representations are Made to Dominion Government to Try to Arrange One.

(Special to Daily News)
MONTREAL, Feb. 27.—Approval of present moves for international negotiations for the establishment of a close season for the halibut fisheries in the Northern Pacific was formally adopted in a resolution adopted at a meeting of the executive of the Canadian Fisheries Association held at the Board of Trade building here with the vice-president, J. A. Paulhus, in the chair. It was decided to urge upon the Dominion government the necessity of arranging a convention between the Canadian and American governments to take proper steps to protect the valuable halibut fisheries.

As the close season, it was reported, should be made effective in time to prevent the taking of halibut during the spawning season, which occurs in these waters from November 15 to January 15. While it was impossible to prevent the taking of halibut during the spawning season, it is a deep-sea fishery, and it is pointed out that the Canadian and United States governments could easily overcome this obstacle by adopting a convention forbidding the landing or sale of halibut, since the fishermen would stop their operations once they found it impossible to market their catches.

Being Depleted
It was further pointed out that during this close season the halibut would be very poor eating as this was the spawning season. In preparing the memorandum to be forwarded to the Canadian government it was set forth that while in the earlier days the North Pacific halibut fisheries seemed inexhaustible they were rapidly becoming depleted through the continual activities of the fishing fleets, especially in the destruction of millions of these splendid food fish during the spawning seasons.

BRITISH ARE PLEASED WITH U.S. MOVEMENT

Does Not Take Seriously Possibility of Senate Approving Proposal

LONDON, Feb. 27.—President Harding's proposal for participation of the United States in a permanent court of international justice receives much attention in the morning papers. The press welcomes the proposal and, although not anticipating that it will be approved by the Senate at the present session or that it induces the entrance of the United States into the League of Nations, it is interpreted as a sign of the United States aloofness in European affairs being abandoned.

VANCOUVER WINS PACIFIC LEAGUE

Defeated Seattle Metropolitans in Dazzling Performance Last Night by 12 to 3.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 27.—The Vancouver Maroons made sure of a place in the Pacific Coast Hockey League play-off by defeating the Seattle Metropolitans in the last game of the regular league schedule here last night by 12 to 3.

The locals made amends for their recent off form games by making a dazzling performance before which Seattle crumbled in disorder. Vancouver now stands three points ahead of Victoria and five points ahead of Seattle in the standing. The last mentioned two teams have two games with which to complete their schedule. Vancouver will await a post-season series with the leader of the two.

FREE FIGHT IN JAPANESE LOWER HOUSE

Demand For Universal Suffrage Causes Trouble: General Demand

TOKIO, Feb. 27.—Today's session of the Lower House of the Diet broke up in a free fight over the universal suffrage bill with the debate on the bill still finished. The universal suffrage movement has assumed large proportions. There have been street demonstrations and parades in this city with the idea of impressing the government with the necessity of granting the desire of the populace. The opposition party in the Diet has also been demanding the passing of the bill giving effect to the request, but this has been opposed by the government supporters.

DEBT FUNDING WITH RUMANIA

That Country Owes Canada Twenty Million Dollars and no Interest Paid

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—Canada accepted the proposal from the government of Rumania for the funding of its debt to the Dominion. Hon. W. S. Fielding announced in the House yesterday afternoon. No funding was arranged with Greece. Rumania owes Canada \$20,449,161.49 in principal and Greece owes \$7,526,473.17. Rumania has not paid any interest charges and Greece has paid only a portion of the interest charges. Arrangements for the conversion are being made through the Canadian High Commissioner.

Canada First as Country for British Emigration says Admiral Tufnell to Passenger Agents

LONDON, Feb. 27.—Empire migration as a means of solving the British unemployment problem was discussed at a conference of the British Passenger Agents Association and London representatives of the Dominions. Admiral L. G. Tufnell said his great anxiety was to impress the men of Britain with the advantages to be gained in the Dominions which he had seen. He gave the palm to Canada because of the climate, placing New Zealand second and Australia third.

COMMISSION ON RETURNED MEN

Colonel Robertson Says Most of Those Handicapped Can Give Good Service

VANCOUVER, Feb. 27.—Before the Royal Commission investigating ex-servicemen's affairs sitting here, Lieut.-Col. H. Robertson of returned soldiers' commission, Victoria, stated yesterday that British Columbia had unusual problems in regard to veterans as 23,000 more members of the G.E.F. and Imperial forces were now resident in the province than had enlisted. This was accounted for by the favorable climatic conditions, men coming from all parts of the Dominion from choice and on the advice of physicians. He maintained that a majority of the handicapped men would give 100 per cent service if the right niche was found for them.

MINISTERS LIKELY TO VISIT PRINCE RUPERT

Mackenzie King and Ernest Lapointe to Make Trip if Nothing Intervenes

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—Premier Mackenzie King and Hon. Ernest Lapointe are both expected to visit Prince Rupert during the coming summer. The visit of the premier will depend upon their being no conference in London. Mr. Lapointe, being minister of marine and fisheries, is naturally interested in the development of the northern port, and especially in connection with its fishing possibilities.

POLICE REQUIRED TO QUELL FIGHT IN HOCKEY MATCH

Regina Beat Saskatoon by 4 to 0 in Game Last Night Which Was Marred by Disorder

REGINA, Feb. 27.—Regina defeated Saskatoon 4 to 0 in last night's Western Canada League hockey fixture. The game was marred by fighting throughout and ended in a free for all which required a squad of police to separate the players and fans who unified promiscuously on the ice. Newsy Lalonde was absent owing to illness.

The city council is placing the matter of collecting outstanding license fees in the hands of the solicitor for action. The speeding up of dog tax collections is also to be pressed on the police commission. A report from the Finance Committee recommending such action was adopted by the council last night.

CHELOHSIN AGROUND AT CAMPBELL RIVER

CAMPBELL RIVER, Feb. 27.—The Union steamer Chelohsin is aground at a few hundred yards off here this morning. There are many passengers aboard but it is believed there is no danger to either the passengers or the steamer.

VICTORIA COUGARS DROPPED GAME IN CALGARY BY 4 TO 2

CALGARY, Feb. 27.—The Victoria Cougars lost their winning streak in their Western Canada League series when they lost to Calgary last night by 4 goals to 2. This was the last game of the Cougars' prairie tour.

ENDERBY WINS THE INTERMEDIATE HOCKEY B.C. CHAMPIONSHIP

NELSON, Feb. 27.—The Enderby hockey squad is the intermediate hockey champion team of British Columbia, having defeated Trail in two games with a total score of seven to five.

ALASKAN OIL RESERVE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—The withdrawal of 20,000,000 acres of land in Alaska from the new naval oil reserve is announced.

CRIME UPON YOUNG GIRLS

Wylie Morgan Confesses and Takes Police to Discover Child's Body

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 27.—Wylie Morgan, 38 years of age, has confessed to abducting two sisters five and six years respectively and assaulting both, then throwing the dead body of the elder girl away and permitting the younger to escape, the police stated last night. The police were led by Morgan to a hollow tree in which the dead body of the older girl was found. The younger is recovering from her injuries and led the search parties throughout the day before Morgan confessed.

Morgan is under strict guard while the mob is trying to get at the jail cell where he is incarcerated.

Capitalist System Justice and Equality.

A correspondent, whose letter is published elsewhere, wants to know the opinion of the Daily News editor in regard to the capitalist system and justice and equality. We hardly think it matters what is the opinion of the Daily News on so great a subject, but for the benefit of those who may be interested we suggest that justice is an ideal. So far no state has been found where the people get justice. In this country under a capitalist system justice is not one of the things on which we can pride ourselves and, according to the most authentic reports obtainable, the condition in Russia is far worse than it is here in that respect.

The capitalist system is very imperfect. No one doubts that for a moment. However, no other system has yet been proved workable that gives a larger measure of justice than is obtained here in Canada. Many people here have come from other countries and most of them will agree that here we have better conditions than in most countries.

Equality is one of those things we shall never obtain. There is nothing approaching equality in this country and surely no one would be so bold as to suggest that they have it in Russia, the country of the Soviet. People are not born equal. There is a handicap of the worst kind in nature and as long as there are such handicaps there will also be handicaps in human society. The world is imperfect, being only in course of construction. Human creatures are certainly very imperfect. We are just beginning to feel that we are somebody and there are possibilities ahead of us. The fact that Louis Forkrud is beginning to feel the injustices of life is a sign of better things ahead. It is a feeling which is becoming prevalent in the world today.

Find A Cure For Present Conditions.

Nobody can fail to realize the conditions that exist throughout the world. Inequalities are very evident, but in our own country less than elsewhere. Here everyone has the opportunity to better himself, although it would be hardly correct to call it equality of opportunity. The young man who is left a large sum of money by his parents has nothing like as good an opportunity as his less favored fellows, because the lure of laziness and bright lights are too great for most young men, if they have the opportunity. The man with a big legacy is badly handicapped in the battle of life.

The difficulty is to find a cure for the body politic. Just as with the human body there is no such thing as a cure, so in the body politic cures do not exist. All a doctor can do is to adjust conditions that nature can work easily and unobstructedly. All the statesman or politician can do is to try to make conditions such that people may be able to rise to the greatest heights of health, efficiency and happiness.

It must be remembered here that the possession of money never brings happiness, efficiency, or health. Usually it brings the opposite in each case. On the other hand earning money often does bring all three and the spending of money well earned is a pleasure.

No Equalities Or Justice In Nature.

Anyone who has made a study of natural history realizes immediately that there is no such thing as justice or equality in nature. It is the law of the jungle that the weak are consumed by the strong. No animal in its wild state dies what is generally known as a natural death. The end of all life there is tragedy. Nature handicaps some and they become food for the more healthy and efficient.

Among men an attempt is being made to change this. The difficulty is that we have not got very far. The blood of the jungle still courses in our veins and no matter what the political conditions, the jungle is bound to assert itself sometimes. There are reversionary to type and the people with the jungle nature strong on them find endless opportunity to prey on their fellows.

It has been found that betterment changes cannot be brought about suddenly. There has to be education and training to fit us for changed conditions. In countries where people have made sudden changes they have found the conditions no better. Nature works slowly. We are evolving, and the speed of the evolutionary process is steadily increasing, but we have a long way yet to go. In bringing about better conditions we can all be factors.

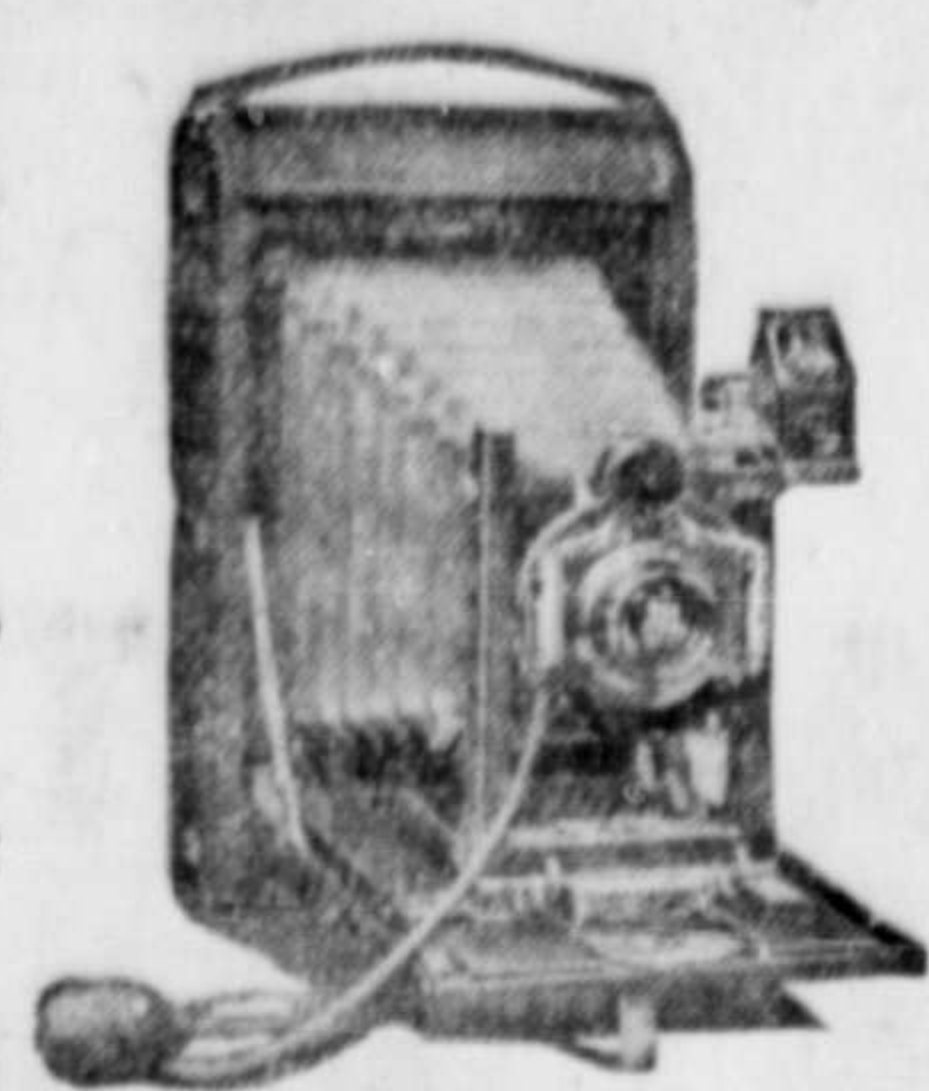

A general borrowing bylaw for \$35,000 was given its first and second readings at last night's council meeting.

The 1923 indemnity law placing the salary of the mayor at \$1,500 and the aldermen, \$300 each, was given its first reading at last night's council meeting.

A report from Assessor McLennan on the assessment roll for 1923 was received and filed at last night's council meeting. Its contents were published last week.

The funeral of the late Thomas Albert Watkins, former keeper of Triple Island lighthouse, took place in Vancouver last Saturday afternoon, Rev. O. J. Nurse officiating.

A report from the city solicitor regarding the reduction in minimum water rate asked for by the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. was referred to the Finance Committee by the city council last night.

At a cost of about \$100 the city is to give an eight-inch water connection to the railway company at the corner of First Avenue and Eighth Street. A report from the Board of Works recommending to this effect was accepted by the council last night.

On account of the unfavorable weather conditions, it was impossible for Archdeacon G. A. Rix to sail for Metlakatla yesterday to officiate at the funeral of the late Mrs. Susan Leighton. The funeral is being deferred until the Archdeacon can make the passage.

The tug Bermuda sailed early this morning for Porecher Island to make an attempt at the high tide at 10:30 to haul the grounded Swanson Bay car ferry off the beach. If the attempt is successful, the Bermuda will arrive in port with her tow late this afternoon.

The city council is to ask the secretary of the school board for a report on the list of policies, names of agents and amount of premiums paid for fire insurance on the schools. A report from the Finance Committee recommending this was adopted by the council last night.

An appeal has been made to missionary bishops and heads of church agencies and institutions for rigid economy. Gross income for general purposes in 1922 was \$3,248,307.49 and the estimated expenditures \$3,646,485.79, leaving an estimated deficit of \$399,078.30. The figures in 1921 were \$3,688,581 received and \$3,513,996 disbursed.

**X-RAY INSTRUMENT
OR TESTING CHEESE**

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—The success of the Swiss cheese industry of America has been saved by the X-ray.

The greatest problem of the industry, according to Professor W. F. Whitmore, of Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute, was: "How can it be determined, without cutting open the cheese, when the holes are of proper size?"

Scientists made an X-ray photograph of a cheese. The holes developed in the negative as distinct dark spots.

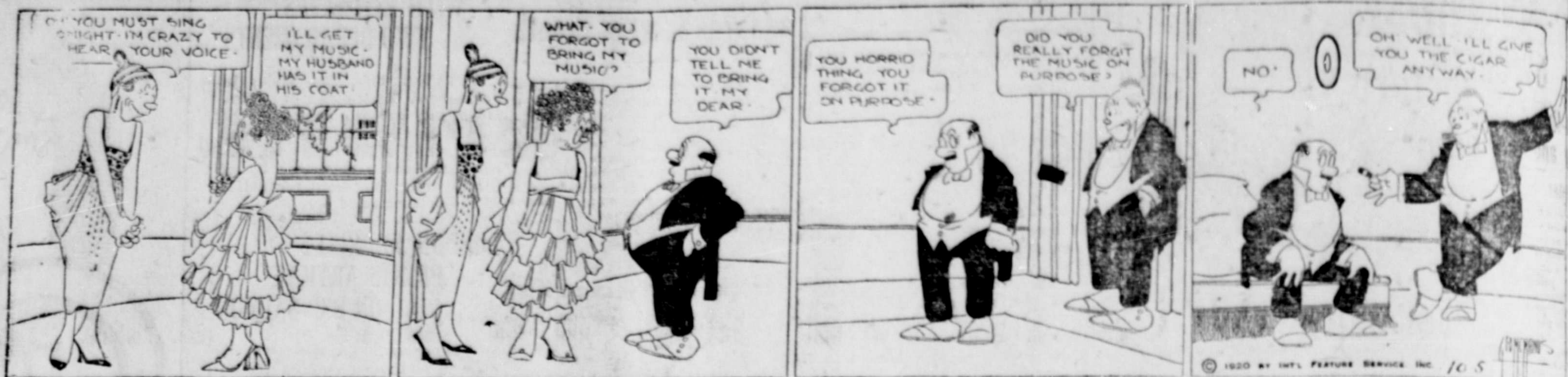

The Pittsburgh Pirates properly deserve third place in the lifetime standing of the National League as Pittsburgh has earned the decision over every club in the league over a span of thirty six years with the exception of New York and Chicago. New York, Chicago and Pittsburgh are the only clubs which have won more games than they have lost. The Pirates captured 2428 games from their present opponents and lost 2157 for a percentage of .530. The Pirates came into the National League in 1887. With the exception of the Brooklyn club, they are the youngest club now in the circuit, though Cincinnati and St. Louis re-entered the league since Pittsburgh's entry. It is interesting to note that Pittsburgh took the place of Kansas City in the National League. After the Kansas City franchise was defunct Pittsburgh transferred its American Association franchise to the National League. Pittsburgh has won four National League championships and one world's championship, all achieved during the era in which Fred Clarke was playing manager of the Pirate squad. The club has been the runner-up seven times, five of them under Clarke's management.

If this line of action was to be followed, it was not in the interests of democracy. Under Dominion law the employees had a right to an arbitration board on such a matter. This scheme would kill that right.

Macdonald's Amendment

Ald. Macdonald offered an amendment that, whereas the opinion of many citizens was that the time was opportune for a revision of the wage scale and whereas, in his opinion, a revision was unequalled for if computed on the cost of living, he resolved that committee of investigation be appointed to inquire into all conditions and report to the council, this committee to consist of four mem-

bers of the council, four representatives of the employees and a chairman appointed jointly. The amendment was seconded by Ald. Mackenzie.

Ald. Macdonald remarked that the resolution advanced by Ald. Perry would bring no credit to him and would not tend for continued support of his administration.

Ald. Perry, in reply, stated that it was time wages should be readjusted. Some wages being paid were too high and the city could not afford them. It was not a question of downing or injuring anyone but just a matter of justice to the taxpayers.

Ald. Mackenzie declared that the motion had not been posted the requisite 24 hours to which Ald. Perry replied that it had been posted at 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon.

Ald. Mackenzie maintained that the wages being paid by the city were not too high in relation to the cost of living. He would not stand for a cutting down of wages.

WRITER WAS VICTIM GROSS SUPERSTITION

Country People Shot Semenov Be-
cause They Said He Had Evil
Eye

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—Sergey P. Semenov, Russian national writer and close friend of the late Count Leo Tolstoy, has been murdered by fellow villagers who believed him responsible for their misfortunes, according to a letter received by Herman Bernstein, author and journalist.

Semenov's neighbors were suspicious of him for some time, the letter said. They would say: "He is forever writing. But what is the use of his writings? If he is an educated man let him go to the city. He may bring misfortune upon us."

Then, whatever misfortune befell the villagers, whether in the fields or their home life, was ascribed to the "accursed black magic of Semenov." He got the name of "Sorcerer."

The letter continues: "If a cow died suddenly or a wagon broke down, the whole village would start whispering: 'That is the sorcerer's evil eye.'"
"One day recently Semenov was on his way to the neighboring village of Butzevo. He was carrying a manuscript to the local teacher who would copy it for him. Gregory Malutin, his son Nicholas and his daughter Vera,

U.S. AIR SERVICE WINS AERON TROPHY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—The Collier Aeronautical Trophy for 1922 has been awarded to the United States Air Mail Service. 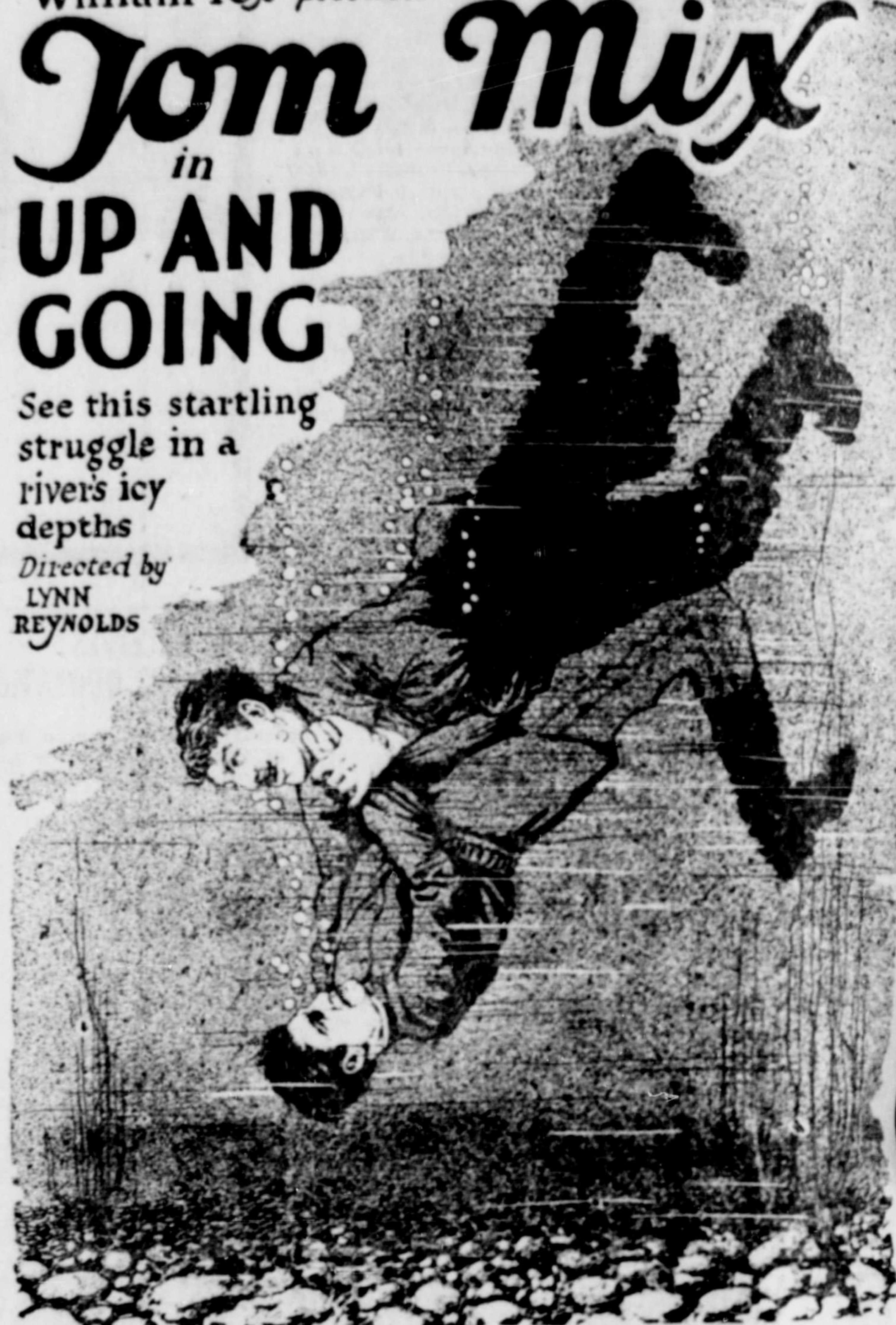

1600 HORSE POWER ENGINE FOR PLANE

LONDON, Feb. 27.—The new twelve-cylinder 1600 horse-power engine will be the largest single power plant designed for fitting into an aeroplane. This is being constructed by a well-known armament firm in an attempt to produce a practical aero engine which will burn crude oil as its fuel instead of high grade gasoline, which is costly. The work of the firm with a 750 horse-power oil-burning engine was so satisfactory that the efforts of the technical staff were turned upon this larger engine. From a commercial point of view—"air expresses" to carry from 30 to 50 passengers now being in design—the production of a giant oil engine of 1,600 horse-power, burning a fuel so much less costly than aviation petrol, will be a development of supreme importance.
