### DEATH OF MINE MAN

John H. Mackenzie of San Francisco Had Operations All Over the West

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 24: (Canadian Press)—John H. Mackenzie, aged 75, widely known for his mining operations in Alaska, British Columbia and the western states, died here last night. He was born in Toronto.

Mackenzie joined the rush to the Yukon after the Bonanza Creek discoveries and organized the Klondyke Mines Railway.

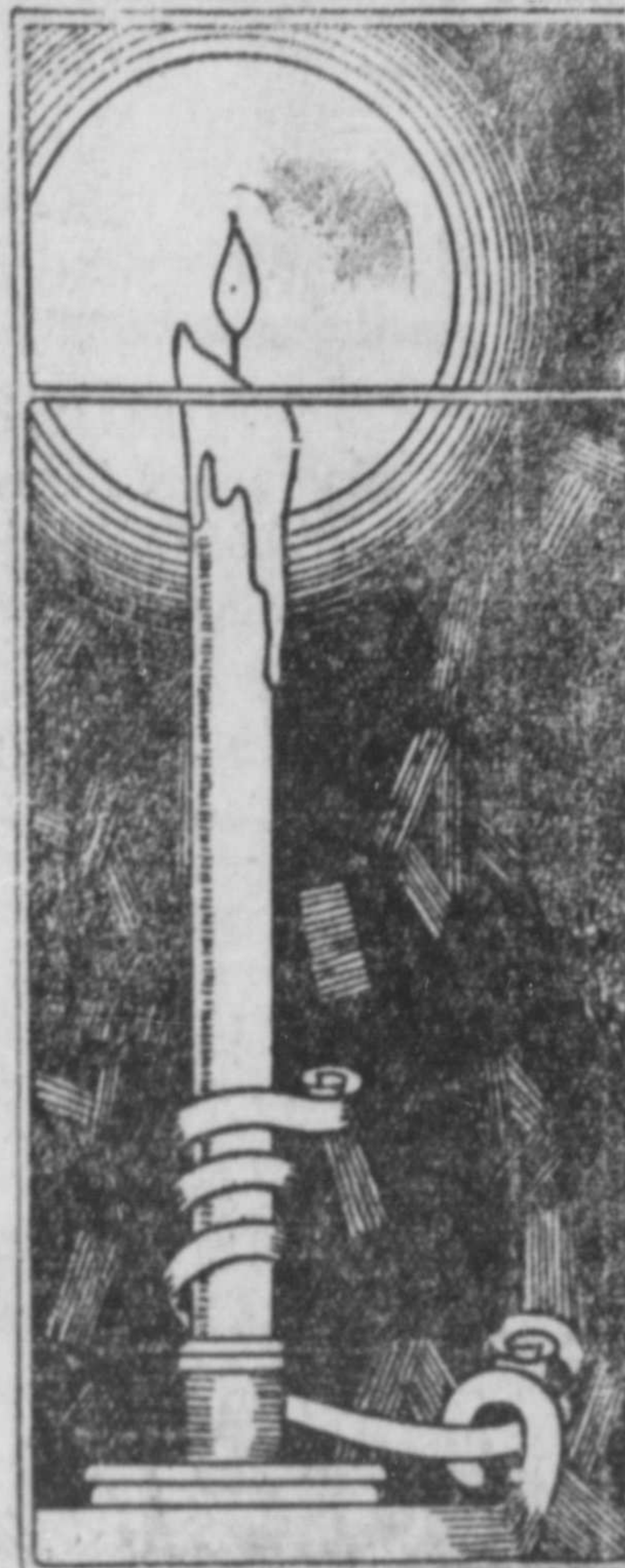

### New Debt Negotiations With United States Are Started By French Premier Boncour

PARIS, Dec. 24: (Canadian Press)—Premier Joseph Paul Boncour suddenly and dramatically virtually launched new debt negotiations with the United States yesterday by personally calling upon Ambassador Walter Edge at the American Embassy. Mr. Edge had intimated previously that he would be glad to receive Premier Boncour.

Premier Boncour asked that Mr. Edge take the matter of war debts up with Washington so that France may help in a solution of the debts problem. The conference lasted for half an hour, details of the conversation, which was of an informal and personal character, not being disclosed.



## Christmas Greetings

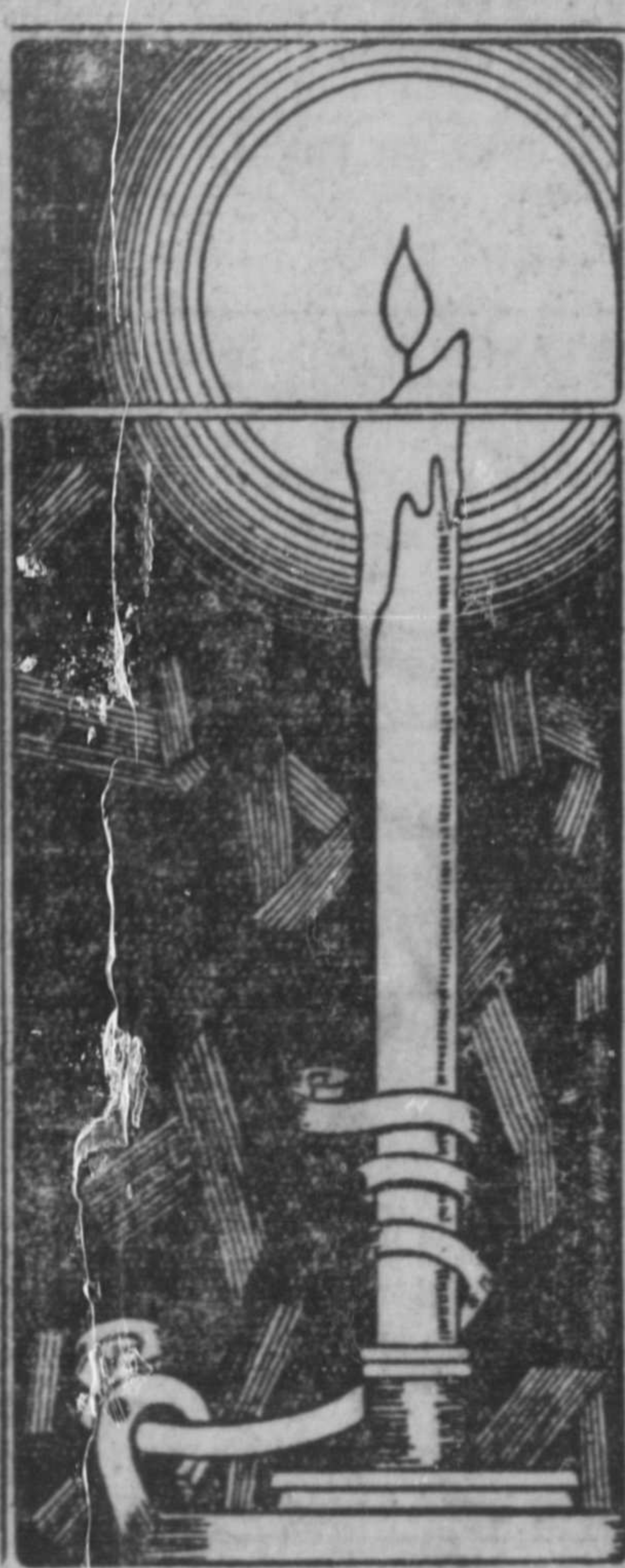

### MESSAGE OF POPE

World Will Forget Differences Next Year, Pontiff Predicts—Christmas Armistice

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 24: (Canadian Press)—Pope Pius XIII, in a Christmas message to the world, today predicted that debts, payments and postponements, insolvencies, disarmament and lack of confidence would cease to preoccupy the universe during the Holy Year beginning on April 2 next which will commemorate the nineteenth centenary of the passion, death and resurrection of Christ.

It was announced from the Vatican last night that, due to the efforts of the Pontiff, there would be a twenty-four hour Armistice over Christmas in the hostilities between Bolivia and Paraguay in South America.

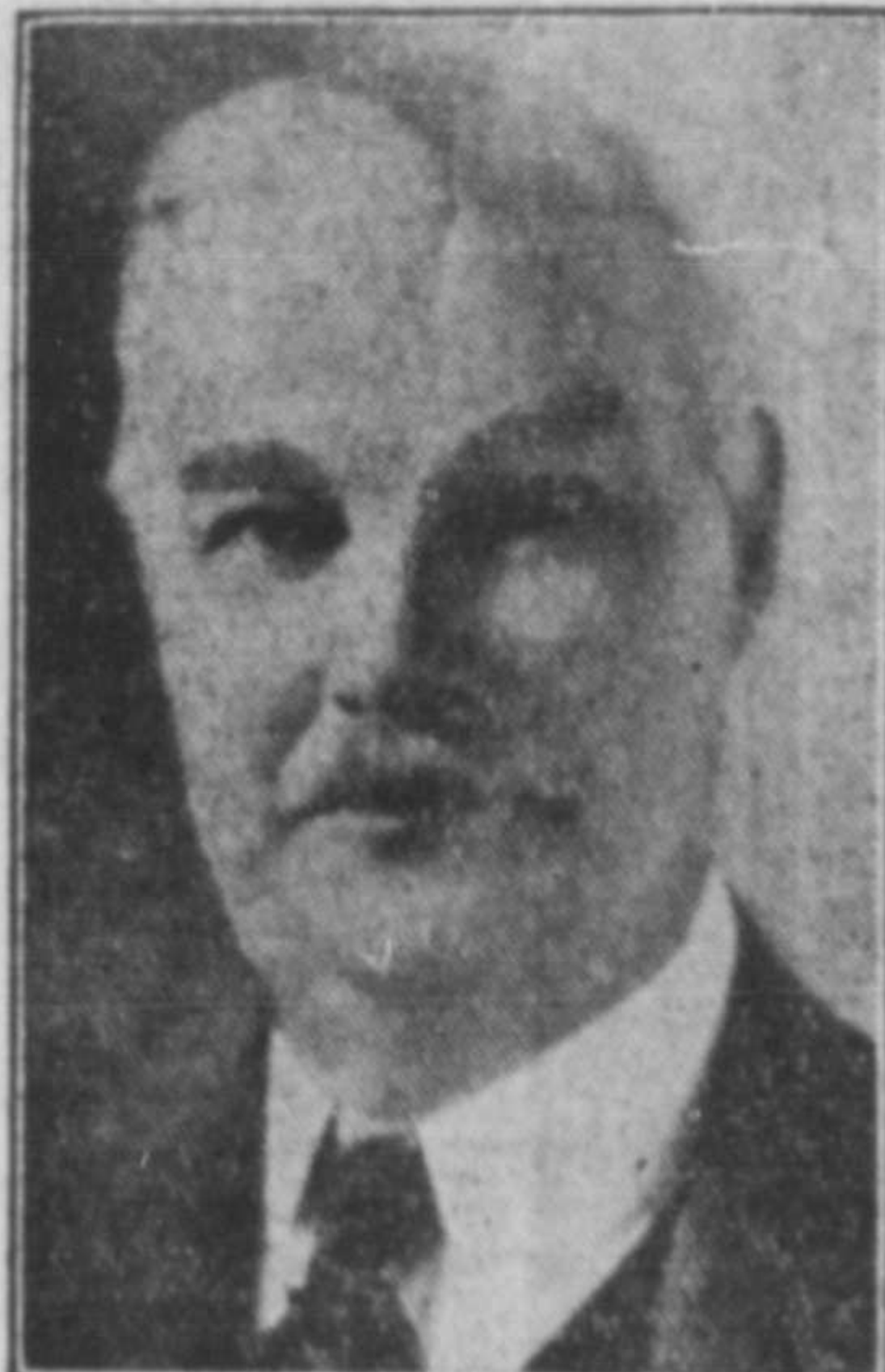

### Steamer Newbrough is Sinking Off Jamaica; Rescue Ship on Way

Vessel was Bound From British Columbia to United Kingdom With Cargo—President McKinley is Proceeding to Scene

NEW YORK, Dec. 24: (Canadian Press)—The British freighter Newbrough, bound from Vancouver and other British Columbia ports to the United Kingdom with cargo, broadcast an "S. O. S." message this morning, stating that she was sinking off the island of Jamaica with engine room already flooded. The liner President McKinley, 125 miles away, is proceeding to the scene to rescue the crew.

### Jury Urges Leniency In Case of Harpell; Sentence on Tuesday

Conviction Resulted From Series of Articles Critica of Thomas B. Macaulay Published in Journal of Commerce—To Appeal Verdict

MONTREAL, Dec. 24: (Can. Press)—James J. Harpell, publisher, was found guilty by a Quebec Supreme Court jury yesterday afternoon of defamatory libel against Thomas B. Macaulay, president of the Sun Life Assurance Co., as a result of a series of articles published in Harpell's periodical, "The Journal of Commerce." The case was heard before Mr. Justice Greenshields, who reserved his sentence until next Tuesday. The jury made a recommendation for leniency. The verdict will be appealed.

### MEMBER IS UNSEATED

Supreme Court of Canada Ousts Aime Boucher From Quebec Federal Seat

OTTAWA, Dec. 24: (Canadian Press)—The Supreme Court of Canada yesterday unseated Aime Boucher, Liberal member of the federal riding of Yamaska, Que. The case had been before the courts ever since the 1930 federal election when Boucher was given a majority of one over Paul Comtois, Conservative.

Napoleon Veilleux, a Yamaska elector, protested Boucher's election, taking the case to the courts on the grounds of illegal election practices. The decision of the Supreme Court will mean a new election unless it is further appealed.

**PASSING OF CANNERYMAN**

W. J. Jefferson, Well Known in Prince Rupert, Died Recently in Vancouver

W. J. Jefferson, veteran canneryman of the British Columbia coast and very well known in Prince Rupert, having resided in the city and district for years, passed away recently in St. Paul's Hospital, Vancouver, where he had been located during recent years. His funeral took place from Nunn & Thomson's Chapel with Rev. S. H. Heath officiating.

The late Mr. Jefferson came to this coast thirty years ago from Sydney, N.S., and for years was a cannery manager with the Western Packers. Later he became associated with Francis Millard and for a time was located at Prince Rupert as a cannery manager. He was also well known on the Skeena River and elsewhere in the north.

Deceased is survived by his widow, who, before her marriage, was Mrs. Florence Breanan, a member of the Prince Rupert General Hospital graduate nursing staff in the early days, a son, Harold, and daughter, Helen. There is a sister in Halifax and a brother in Sydney, J. A. Kirkpatrick, Fred Beak, F. Hamilton, F. E. Payson, G. H. Harris and A. C. McAdam were pallbearers at Mr. Jefferson's funeral.

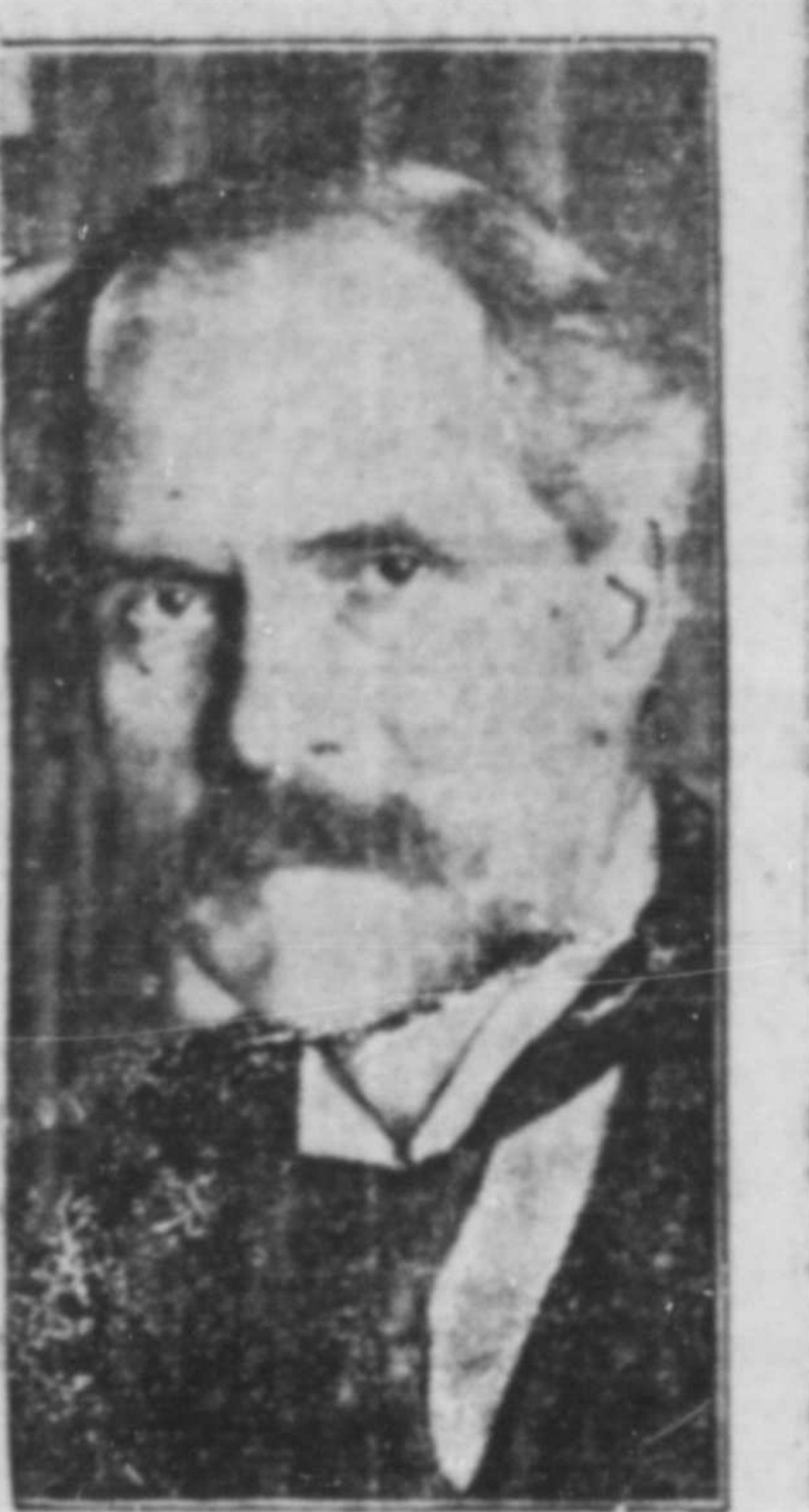

## CONQUER EVEREST

Hazardous Aerial Journey to be Taken by Lord Clydesdale is Keenly Anticipated

LONDON, Dec. 24. (Canadian Press)—Flying men have never planned a more picturesque endeavor than the assault on Mount Everest which—if negotiations now in progress are carried through—will be made by British pilots within the next few months. Highest of the world's mountain peaks, the Himalayan giant has defied many gallant climbing expeditions; most of them retired when still thousands of feet from the summit, though it is possible that two British climbers reached the peak a few years ago. When last seen by their comrades they were going strong for the top—but they never came back.

At first sight the task before the flying party is comparatively simple. Everest rises 29,000 feet above sea-level. The world's height record, by aeroplane, established last fall by Cyril Unwins in a British biplane, is 43,976 feet, nearly three miles higher than the summit. But the mountain lies remote in the heart of a terrific range of peaks many of which rival it in stature, in a region where a forced landing would mean destruction and where blow winds of hurricane force. Further, the head of the giant is the home of tremendous storms, and vast frozen cloud masses shroud the peak from view for many months of the year.

## Is Chief Pilot

Chief pilot of the expedition is the Marquis of Douglas and Clydesdale, a member of Parliament, squadron leader in the Auxiliary Air Force and well known amateur boxer. Lady Houston, whose gift of \$500,000 enabled the United Kingdom to enter for the Schneider Trophy contest in 1931, is providing the funds.

The joint organizers of the flight are Colonel P. T. E. Hetherington, who has travelled widely in Central Asia and the Himalayas, and Colonel V. S. Blacker, the latter being in charge of the flying operations.

The aeroplane most obviously fitted for the flight is the high-flying Vickers "Vespa" craft powered with a Bristol "Pegasus" motor which Mr. Unwins took to the stratosphere when he set the new world's aeroplane height record. Negotiations are going forward to secure the use of this machine and another similar craft.

Two aeroplanes are likely to ascend together, one to make the actual flight over the summit, the other to take a photographic record of the attempt, an obvious difficulty being that of securing adequate evidence that the peak is actually flown over. The flyers will wear specially heated clothing of the kind worn by Mr. Unwins on his recent flights above 40,000 feet and they will breathe through oxygen apparatus.

Coupled with the preliminary flying trials, or perhaps preceding them, may be an attempt of Mr. Unwins to reach a height still greater than that now officially recognized as the world's record. He is confident that his aeroplane can climb 2,000 or more feet higher than it has yet done.

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No further games were played last night in the Junior Billiard League. It is expected that several will be run off over the forthcoming holiday week-end.

## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Opening of Halibut Fishing Season May be Delayed  
—Biological Men Leaving for Ottawa Monday—  
Speculating on High Boat of Americans

Although the North Pacific halibut fishing season is due to open on January 15 following the annual close season, there appears to be a strong possibility that new regulations, shortly to be promulgated by the International Fisheries Commission, will alter this date. Whether or not the date is changed by the authorities, however, it seems probable that the fishermen and vessel owners will voluntarily delay resumption of fishing beyond this date in the event that the stock of frozen halibut is not sufficiently reduced by the first of the year to make it likely that fresh fish prices will be high enough to make operations at such a difficult and hazardous period of the year profitable. The subject of production control is also being seriously considered prior to the opening of the 1934 season and it appears probable that methods along this line which were instituted in 1932 will be even further extended next year. A new suggestion that is now being offered is that a definite maximum catch per man per trip should be agreed upon and then, by restricting the number of trips as the condition of the market dictates, the actual supply of fish could be readily regulated.

Capt. Sid Barrington of the Barrington Transportation Co., well known Stikine River transportation concern, has been spending several months this fall in Los Angeles. During his absence from Wrangell, his brother, Capt. Hill Barrington, has been in charge of the company's operations. The new "Hazel B. No. 2," which was placed in operation last year is proving to be a very satisfactory ship.

To the readers of these columns, the *Whiff* Man extends the compliments of the season. That Christmas Day tomorrow shall be as merry a one as possible for all is our earnest hope. We are all having our share of vicissitudes these hard times but, at that, things might have been a good deal worse. Anyway, let us forget the depression and its cares for the day, if we can, and enter into the spirit of the happy Yuletide season.

### Leaving For Ottawa

John Dybbavn, member of the Biological Board of Canada, and D. B. Finn, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, will leave Prince Rupert on Monday morning's train for Ottawa where they are to attend the annual meeting of the Biological Board of Canada. They expect to be away about three weeks. Mr. Dybbavn, in addition to attending the Biological Board meeting, will visit various eastern points on company business.

It has not, as yet, been definitely ascertained what vessel was the high boat of the Pacific halibut fleet for the 1932 season in the matter of shares paid although the impression is that the Western, Capt. George Eliason, is probably high. There were many very low shares some boats sharing no more than \$100 for the entire season.

Jim Bacon, Verge Moore, James Boyd, Capt. R. Gammon and Tom Watts were members of a hunting party which visited the Gardner Canal district last week-end in quest of geese and ducks, making the trip on the seineboat Zenard. The hunters had a very enjoyable trip and got a large bag of game.

### Repair Job Near Finished

The local dry dock has just about completed the repair job on the halibut boat Lysekil which was badly battered on her last trip of the 1932 fishing season and had a narrow escape from destruction. The vessel has had a solid bulwark fitted in place of the former pipe rails and a new pilot house has been built, the old one having been almost demolished by the storm in which she was damaged. By the time the 1933 season opens, Capt. C. Wall will have a craft which will be quite as good as new.

and G. V. Wilby of the Nanaimo Biological Station, herring have been found to constitute the principal food of the fur seal herds migrating off the coast of British Columbia to and from the breeding grounds on the Pribiloff Islands. The investigation was undertaken because of complaints of fishermen who felt that the fur seal herds were a serious menace to the salmon runs. Twenty-five filled stomachs were secured from fur seals killed by Indians off the coast. Herring were found in seventeen of the stomachs, salmon in nine, squid in eight and pilchards in six. In fourteen cases herring made up from 75% to 100% of the stomach content.

Experiments conducted on this coast have confirmed private findings that oil glaze for the protection of frozen fish has given results inferior to those obtained by ice glaze. At the request of T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., experiments were conducted by the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station on both salmon and halibut. From the point of view of expense and in view of technical results, it could not be found that there was any point in favor of the oil method.

Expectation now is that the stock of frozen halibut will not be over-heavy next year if fishing for fresh halibut is delayed until February 1 or 15. Early trade in frozen halibut this winter has been fairly good and prices have been held to even levels in the principal markets. As halibut frozen in 1932 went into storage at lower cost than in many years, it is being quoted at figures which should serve to move it in fair volume even under existing conditions.

Robert P. Fletcher of Wilmington, Delaware, has been appointed as trustee of the Booth Fisheries Co. which recently went into bankruptcy and which is now in process of reorganization. It is announced that some of the company's multi-farious branches and activities will be closed down although which has not yet been said. It is not expected that there will be any change in the company's activities at Prince Rupert.

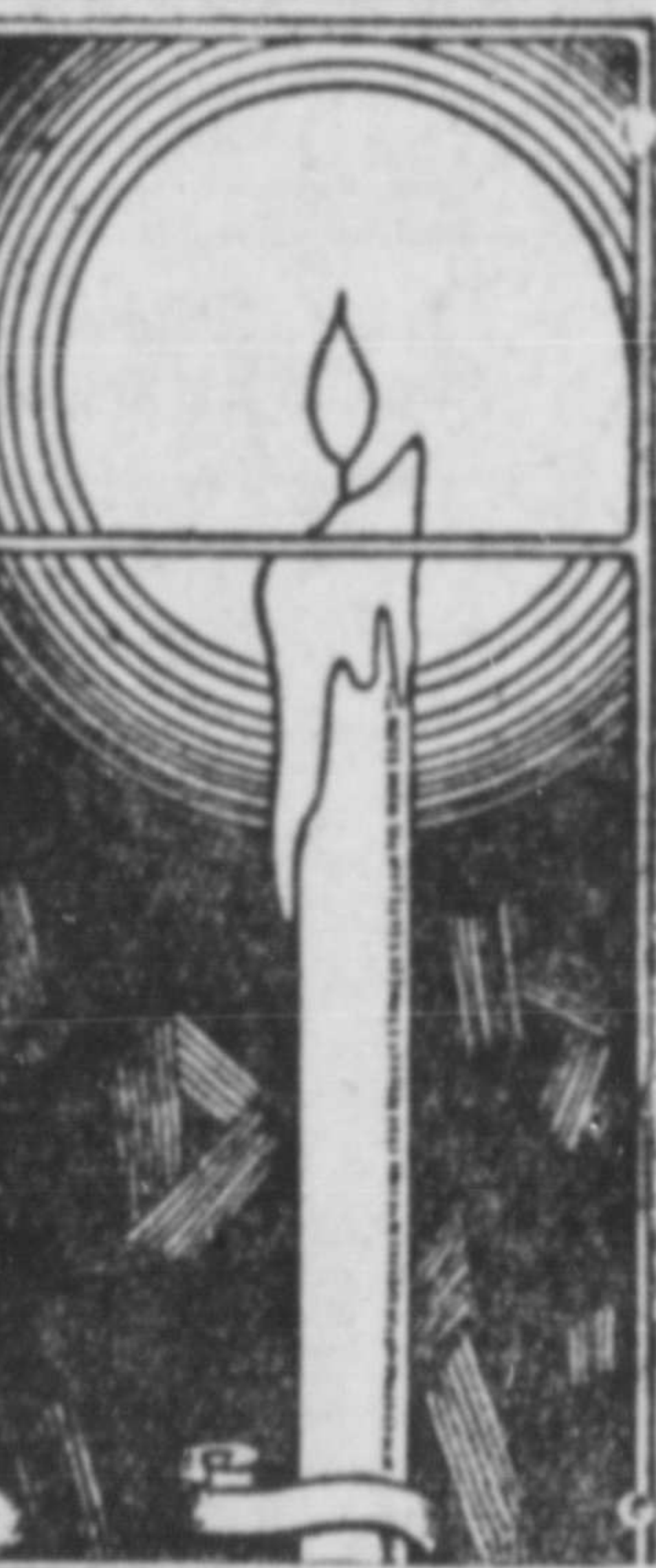
