Found guilty of manslaughter in connection with the killing of B. Harata at Buckley Bay on August 18, E. Nishida, Japanese, was sentenced to four years in the New Westminster penitentiary by Mr. Justice D. A. Macdonald at the Supreme Court assies this morning.
