## U.S. IS TO BE GIVEN THE RIGHT OF SEARCH

### NOVA SCOTIA LABOR AGITATOR FINDS HIMSELF IN PENITENTIARY TODAY

#### Terms of Treaty with United States Presented to Imperial Conference by Lord Curzon

LONDON, Oct. 31.—Final terms which form the basis for the Anglo-American treaty to enable the latter country to cope with rum running along the American coast were formally presented to the Imperial Conference by Lord Curzon this afternoon. The terms of the treaty follow:  
1. The United States authorities have the right to search any British ship within the twelve mile limit suspected of carrying liquor for smuggling purposes.  
2. The United States will formally affirm by treaty the principle of the three mile limit for territorial waters.  
3. British ships have the right to carry liquors under seal into the territorial waters of the United States.

#### COAST RANGE STEEL COMES INTO DEBATE

Mrs. Mary Ellen Smith Takes Issue With Clearihue Over Company

VICTORIA, Oct. 31.—A lively debate in the legislature this session over the proposed Coast Range Steel plant is foreshadowed. In the debate yesterday Mrs. Mary Ellen Smith, seconding the address in reply to a speech from the throne, sharply criticized the attitude of J. B. Clearihue, member for Victoria, who moved the reply.  
Mr. Clearihue attacked the enterprise and the proposal to give it a Government subsidy and Mrs. Smith criticized Clearihue's attitude saying that "knowing what the steel industry means to the country, the Government will not quarrel or quibble with those desiring to give the industry a chance of development."  
Dealing with immigration Mrs. Smith said the old country was full of desirable immigrants to whom Canada is a land of heart's desire but they must be made to understand that they will be welcome, because at present there is a propaganda of discouragement which tends to keep them away.

#### GOOD HUNTING IN THE SOUTH

Two Parties Return After Successful Trips to Hartley Bay

A hunting party escorted by Capt. Pete Rorvik in the N.M.R. returned to port this morning after a very enjoyable and successful trip to Hartley Bay, Campagna Island and Banks Island. They got two deer and a number of geese, grouse and ducks. The party consisted of C. H. Orme, E. C. Gibbons, Joe Scott and Harry McLeod.  
The power boat Bethune, Capt. Jack Bradbury, returned to port last night having been down the coast with a party on a nine day hunting trip. The party included Harry Berry, Jack Keeffe, J. Lindsay and J. Thomas. The country around Gardner Canal and Douglas Channel was thoroughly gone over for game and the participants are loud in their praise of the excellent sport offered. A bag of five deer and a quantity of grouse, geese and ducks tells its own story of their hunting progress.

#### DRIVER ACQUITTED OF MANSLAUGHTER KILLED A WOMAN

Compelled to Swerve Violently by Oncoming Car and Ran on to Sidewalk

VANCOUVER, Oct. 31.—Charles E. Smith of Vancouver was acquitted of the charge of manslaughter yesterday by the assize jury composed of nine men and three women, which deliberated 65 minutes.  
Mrs. Catherine Bolton received fatal injuries when she was struck by the auto driven by Smith on April 27. An oncoming motor truck compelled Smith to swerve violently. His car ran up on the sidewalk where Mrs. Bolton was standing.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—It was revealed for the first time yesterday that Right Hon. Andrew Bonar Law was suffering from cancer of the throat for over a year and was aware of it when he accepted the premiership of Britain. It was known only to his most intimate friends.

#### EIGHT HOUR DAY IS PROPOSED IN LUMBER INDUSTRY OF B.C.

VICTORIA, Oct. 31.—The legislation which Premier Oliver plans to introduce to regulate the hours of labor in British Columbia will apply only to lumbering and kindred industries. It is understood the Government bill does not aim at establishing an eight hour day in all industries.

#### WINNIPEG BLOCK IS SWEEPED BY FIRE AND FIREMAN INJURED

WINNIPEG, Oct. 31.—The Hammond Block, Albert St., including a large office and sample room building in the centre of the city's business section is being swept by fire. One fireman was injured and the occupants of the building were rescued with difficulty.

#### REV. J. H. TURNBULL DIES AT TORONTO

TORONTO, Oct. 31.—Rev. J. H. Turnbull, pastor of High Park Presbyterian Church here and one of the most prominent advocates of Church Union, died suddenly of heart disease, aged 52.

#### SCOTLAND WINNER AGAINST IRELAND

LONDON, Oct. 31.—The inter-league game played between Scottish and Irish league football teams resulted in a victory for Scotland by a score of one to nothing.

### Leader of Nova Scotia Miners Goes to Prison Two Years for Sedition

HALIFAX, Oct. 31.—Two years in Dorchester penitentiary was the sentence pronounced this morning on James B. McLachlan, former secretary of the United Mine Workers for District 26, convicted by the Supreme Court on a charge of seditious libel.

During the coal and steel strike in Cape Breton last July and August McLachlan was arrested on a charge of spreading false reports and his colleague, Daniel Livingstone, president of the organization, was also arrested, charged jointly with McLachlan with conspiracy. Livingstone has not yet been tried.

### Scarcely Two Million Pounds of Halibut Marketed During October Owing to Bad Weather

Unfavorable fishing weather prevailing during almost the entire month, caused the total halibut landings here in October to be lower than usual at 1,844,100 pounds. Seventy-three American boats landed a total of 1,470,900 pounds and seventy-six Canadians, 373,200 pounds. The total was 320,000 pounds less than that for October last year, 2,164,100 pounds, and 270,500 less pounds than the total for September, which was 2,114,600 pounds.

The highest price paid during the month went to the American schooner E. Neilson which marketed 6,500 pounds on October 20 for 23.1c and 12c. The lowest price, 13c and 9c, was paid for two small Canadian catches yesterday.

Collides With Police Car and Many are Injured on Busy Corner

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 31.—Twenty-four persons were injured, two fatally, when a fire hose wagon and police patrol, both answering the same call, collided at a busy street corner and crashed into a store window mowing down every body in the way. Several firemen were among the injured.  
The collision took place at the corner of Fifth Ave. and Broadway where a crowd of window shoppers and theatre goers were at the time.

#### LAW WILL BE BURIED WESTMINSTER ABBEY

LONDON, Oct. 31.—The body of Andrew Bonar Law will be buried in Westminster Abbey at noon Monday. It is believed the body will be cremated before the funeral and that the grave will be somewhere in the nave of the abbey.

#### RANK OUTSIDER WON THE CAMBRIDGESHIRE

NEWMARKET, Oct. 31.—Verdict, at 100 to 7 against, won the Cambridgeshire Stakes here today defeating Epinard, three to one, by a neck. Dumas, seven to one, came third.

#### Colored Lady is Given Six Months for Selling Whiskey Admitted Having Sold Beer

May Huger, colored, 913 Third Avenue West, was found guilty this morning by Magistrate McLymont on a charge of selling intoxicating liquor to wit whiskey, and was sentenced to six months' imprisonment at Okalla Prison Farm. Constables Stewart, Ruggles and Huggard of the provincial dry squad testified that she sold whiskey and beer to them in the form of drinks. Accused admitted the selling of beer but denied that she had sold whiskey. W. E. Fisher conducted the prosecution and Milton Gonzales appeared for the defence. The hearing of the

One Huerista named Zetina was killed when the police fired into the howling mob of deputies who fought with sticks and canes and were brandishing revolvers.

#### B.C. LEGISLATURE PASSES RESOLUTION BONAR LAW DECEASE

VICTORIA, Oct. 31.—The Legislature yesterday recorded its regret at the death of Bonar Law in a resolution proposed by the premier and seconded by Hon. D. McLean. The resolution read: "That this House desires to place on record its appreciation of the splendid service rendered the Empire by the late Right Hon. Bonar Law and its regret at his removal by death."

#### EDMONTON MAN FOUND IS DEAD AT VICTORIA SHOT WITH REVOLVER

VICTORIA, Oct. 31.—Found dead in a room in a downtown hotel, the body of a man believed to be C. Wilson of the firm of Carroll, Wilson & Co., of Edmonton, was found with a revolver bullet wound in his head and the weapon clutched in his right hand.

**Passing Of A  
Great Canadian.**

Canada claims Bonar Law as one of her sons and his passing reminds us that a great Canadian lived in Britain and did a great deal toward Canadianizing that country. He was a man of whom all British people may well have been proud. No breath of scandal ever touched him and he had marked ability. He was loved by those who followed him and respected by those opposed to his policies. Not only was he sincere, but he carried with him an intense conviction and ability to sympathize with those who opposed. When he retired from office a French newspaper paid him the following tribute:

"During his short term of office he completely broke with the policy of his predecessors by observing in all domains and particularly in diplomacy a sincerity and perfect uprightness that in no way prevented him from being absolutely devoted to the British cause."

**Shop Early  
For Good Results.**

Nearly everyone gives Christmas presents and it is customary at this time of year to request people to shop early and to mail their parcels early in order to relieve the congestion which usually comes later.

Those giving presents, who wish to really please the recipients, plan carefully what they are to get. Often the store-keeper can be a great aid in making a proper selection. Sometimes, if the presents are purchased in time, a very little work on the part of the donor will add a personal touch to the gift which is always appreciated. The great thing is to make the purchases early and in connection with this it is well to remember that Christmas is less than eight weeks away.

**Infectious Diseases  
And Who Should Pay?**

The city of Kamloops has sent on to the local city council a resolution suggesting that as the whole country is concerned in stopping the spread of infectious or contagious diseases, the cost of isolation hospitals should be borne by the whole country.

It is well, perhaps, in considering this resolution to consider the opposite view. The cities are the breeding places of disease and through the negligence of the cities many lives are lost. In order to encourage preventive measures it is well that the cost of treating outbreaks should fall on those places mostly responsible for disease. If drains are kept in good shape, sewers are constructed, premises are kept clean, the water supply kept pure, and the moral conditions looked after, there is not very much need for an isolation hospital. Disease breeds in filth and cities are usually filthy somewhere. They have hidden sores that are breeding places for disease. Cleanliness and healthful conditions in a city will obviate the need of asking the government to take care of patients who have to be isolated.

**Edmonton's Problems  
Are Much Like Ours.**

Says the Edmonton Journal: "The decline of summer brings with it the approach of the civic elections, and the elections in turn bring up for consideration the problems of our civic government. Business conditions are readjusting themselves, or being adjusted, by the returns from a bountiful harvest. But the burden of taxation resulting from the debenture indebtedness and other boom time commitments is so heavy that the improvement in business conditions is in large measure cancelled. The first step toward a return to former conditions of prosperity must be a reduction in the burden of taxation and this can only come about by drastic reductions in controllable expenditures. Whoever pays the taxes the amount is taken out of the business of the city, and every section of the population feels the loss. To the mayor and aldermen who will be elected in December next the citizens must look for action that will relieve the present burden of taxation. If the money is spent it must be repaid, and it can only be paid out of the taxes of the citizens. The financial position of the city can only be made good by drastically decreasing expenditure."

**GETS TWO YEARS FOR  
CAUSING DEATH OF  
AUTO PASSENGER**

**Edmonton Man Found Guilty of  
Manslaughter and Sent to  
Penitentiary**

EDMONTON, Oct. 31.—"Two years less one day at Fort Saskatchewan jail," was the sentence meted out to William Munro at the supreme criminal court yesterday morning, he having been found guilty by a jury after a three days trial which concluded late the afternoon before. The charge was one of manslaughter, the guilty man having been the driver of the taxi which late on the night of September 14, piled into a ditch at the north of the city and caused the death of Joe Bisseggar, one of the passengers, the girl with him having escaped injury.

**Pleaded for Him**

When the guilty man stood up for sentence, his counsel, George Massie spoke for ten minutes on his behalf. Referring to the three points upon which the jury might have found the man guilty, he said there was no doubt about excessive speed in view of the evidence but he did not see how they could have found him guilty if they did upon the other point, that of drunkenness. Whereupon the court interposed to remind Mr. Massie that the jury did not assign any reason for their verdict, being sworn to make their finding on the facts of the evidence.

Proceeding, Mr. Massie referred to the death of three men in the city from a similar automobile accident on Sunday and said that people had become unduly excited over such accidents and perhaps rightly so. It had been unfortunate for the man found guilty at this time and he made a plea for leniency that the young man before the bar of justice might not be doomed to penitentiary but given a chance of a fresh start that would follow a shorter sentence in jail.

**Lenient Sentence**

Mr. Justice McCarthy repeated again that the counsel for defense had done all that counsel could. The jury had found the man guilty and he didn't see how they could have done otherwise with the evidence before them. He had listened to the appeal of Mr. Massie and had considered it. In dealing leniently with the accused, he did so in the hope that he would mend his ways and pick up. The leniency was expressed in the verdict above, for the offence was one which might draw life imprisonment.

**BARBERS OBJECT TO  
BEING PROFESSIONALS**

VICTORIA, Oct. 31.—Indignantly claiming that they are simply tradesmen without "any high toned ambitions of being professional guys," barbers are sending in protests against the proposed measure that calls for a law classing the tonsorial experts with doctors and other members of the learned professions. The law, if it goes into effect would be stringent in calling for examinations. The protesting barbers aver the movement is started by members of their craft who feel the sting of competition by barber "colleges."

**FOX RAISING IS A  
PROFITABLE INDUSTRY**

**Vancouver Island Man Tells of  
High Quality of Product  
There**

VICTORIA, Oct. 31.—Beaumont Boggs of this city, speaking before the Metehosin Farmers Institute told of his wife's experience in raising foxes at North Saanich. High prices were paid for the furs, as much as \$760 being paid for a single pelt.

"It is a fact," said the speaker, "that the pelt of the captive fox brings a higher price than the wild fox, and the best fur does not come from the cold dry climate, as seems to be the general idea, the fur in such climates being usually of a coarser quality than the fur of foxes raised in a more humid climate."

Mr. Boggs gave information regarding the breeding of foxes. The Dominion government, recognizing the importance of this industry, has appointed an official expert, who will give all necessary information and advice to the prospective fox farmer.

The care of foxes and their habits were fully explained by the speaker, and the estimate of the cost of feed per annum, which did not exceed \$5, was given. Mr. Morrison, who had a fox farm for some years in Alberta, is now carrying on the industry near Royal Oak, came out at Mr. Boggs' suggestion, although receiving many discouraging opinions from others, and finds that he can raise just as good and valuable pelts here as in Alberta.

Mr. Boggs stated that fox farmers were asking for legislation to be passed to protect the foxes from dogs. Their request is "that they be allowed to shoot any dog found within 300 feet of a pen."



**WEALTHIER CLASSES LEAVING IRELAND**

High Income Tax One Cause of Many Wishing to Quit Country

DUBLIN, Oct. 25.—There is today an exodus from Ireland of members of the wealthier classes. Lord Oranmore and Browne is selling his property in Mayo, and other territorial magnates are taking the same course. Their estates in land come under the operation of the Land Purchase Acts, which transfer them to the tenants at a fixed price, and they have nothing left but their mansion houses and demesnes.

The destruction of the past year has wiped out many of the mansions. The fact that a higher income tax is payable in the Free State than in Great Britain and Northern Ireland also accounts for the desire to leave.

Yet the exodus is by no means general, and there are many men of wealth who prefer to stay in Ireland. When the Earl of Mayo, who is a Free State senator, was burned out of his family place in County Kildare, he took up his residence in the house of a gamekeeper on the estate, and resisted all attempts to drive him out. It is the desire of the Free State Government to encourage such men to stay in Ireland.

**PREHISTORIC PAST OF THE PHILIPPINES**

Recent Discoveries Indicate Islands Were Once Inhabited by Chinese

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Oct. 30.—The veil has been lifted from the prehistoric past of the Philippine Islands and discoveries have been made rivaling those in the tomb of Tutankhamin, according to a report which has just been received at the University of Michigan from Dr. Carl E. Guthe, heading an archaeological expedition now in the islands.

Dr. Guthe's report hints strongly for the first time that Chinese formerly inhabited the island, a conclusion which he says is substantiated by the deposits unearthed by him during the last year. Material so far discovered, Dr. Guthe's report says, includes hundreds of pieces of pottery, broken and unbroken, much of it of the Ming period, some Tang, some Sung and much yet to be identified. There also have been found human bones, chip-stone and iron implements and weapons, copper and bronze articles, gold inlaid teeth and gold, shell, coral, glass and stone ornaments.

### BRINGING UP FATHER



### SUMAS LANDS ARE BEING CULTIVATED WITH EXCELLENT RETURNS

Owners of Adjoining Lands Are Leasing Pasture on Margin of Area

VICTORIA, Oct. 30.—When it is considered that 120 bushels—or two tons—constituted the crop taken this season from an acre by one of the farmers on the West prairie section of the Sumas reclamation area it will not be difficult to understand why Mr. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture, had such faith in the proposal which he fathered and carried through to a successful conclusion. The land in question was ploughed last year after having been flooded by the Fraser River—a condition now guarded against by the plan that has been brought to fruition.

It is also interesting to observe that the farmer in this particular instance received \$1.00 per ton over the market price on account of the high quality of the oats produced. This fact takes on more than usual significance when it is understood that a good British Columbia average crop is somewhere in the region of sixty bushels to the acre.

Naturally buoyed up with such excellent returns Mr. Barrow is optimistic regarding the future of Sumas and his plans have been developed with an eye to practical requirements. In other words he proposes to seed one thousand acres of this particular area to Timothy before the Fall days have gone, in order to prevent the spreading of weeds, and with an idea of furnishing the interested charges from the crop returns.

The government owns 12,000 acres in this area, 7,000 acres of which are lake bottom lands, and it is Mr. Barrow's intention to crop all the lands in the meantime and have them revenue producing against the time when they will be put on the market.

Sumas Lake has been reduced to one third of its normal winter area and pumping will be completed when the connecting ditch now being put in is finished.

Meantime Sumas land owners are being given first opportunity to lease for one year the marginal grass lands adjoining their holdings. Besides giving the farmers extended holdings at moderate rental this action will bring the sodded lands into first rate cropping condition.

### In the Letter Box

**URGES PROHIBITION**  
Editor Daily News.

Apparently the one great question to engage the attention of the legislators at the coming session of the House will be the purchase and dispensing of intoxicants.

Laymen have discussed this question freely during the interim and, with an election in sight, we might again have the opportunity of expressing our opinion in another vote—for or against prohibition.

It appears that a country, claiming to adopt Christianity should be consistent. Because a few of us consider intoxicating liquor a benefit to mankind, when required for medicinal and other purposes, it is not right to compel others to become associated in the purchase and sale—for revenue purposes—of intoxicants, harmful to a great many.

"If, as some people imagine, intoxicants are beneficial as a beverage, they should not compel others to become associated in a business proposition, thereby forcing them to adopt a means of raising revenue for the use of those indulging in intoxicants, also for those who are opposed to such practices. Laws are not always made for the protection of the majority or for their desires.

The minority must be protected. The majority in any country can take care of themselves. Why should we be forcing some people to agree to the law, which is not beneficial, and also to assist in allowing intoxicants to be shipped to our neighbors across the border? We sell, legally, to some of our own people, and fine, or imprison men and women, if they indulge too freely in what we hand them. Is this right? It appears more like obtaining money under false pretences.

**No Halfway**  
Engaging in the intoxicating liquor business will bring about the downfall of any government.

It is a very debasing way of raising revenue. Are we better able to conduct a saloon business than our one hundred millions of neighbors? Let us vote on a Prohibition Act, that will prohibit. No half way measure. It appears that those who favored prohibition in the past are simply waiting for things to regulate themselves. In the Legislature and out of it let us be consistent and oppose what is an evil to others—even if we must abolish what we may consider of use to ourselves.

The women of our country, with their votes and influence should consider their share in the good government of our Province and vote for prohibition. We can get along without revenue from such a source.

Open Letter to Hon. John Oliver

HON. JOHN OLIVER, Premier of British Columbia, Victoria, B.C.

Sir: I enclose herewith for your information copy of a pamphlet "SEARCHLIGHT No. 5," issued today by the Provincial Party of British Columbia. If its contents be true, you, your colleagues, Mr. Bowser should, in common decency, retire from public life if they are untrue, you should be given the earliest opportunity to refute them. For that reason I send you this copy. This is the fifth pamphlet which I have sent you within the last few months. Each contains most damaging charges. In one you are accused of conniving with Mr. Bowser to prevent a proper investigation into the first P.G.E. scandal; in another with Hon. John Hart as Minister of Finance after he had his position as a Minister of the Crown, with the technical assistance of an incorporated company behind him, for his personal gain, in connection with the P.G.E. Ry., of which both he and you, are directors. On July 20, 1923, and on July 21, 1923, I addressed open letters to you requesting a reply to these charges and published them in the press.

In these you failed to make any answer.

On April 15 of this year, the Salmon Arm Observer quoted your public address in that city as follows:

The Speaker defied Gen. McRae to debate any charges of impropriety by the present government anywhere, at any time.

Being anxious for that opportunity, I notified you by open letter on April 30 that I would meet you in the city where you would meet the challenge, on a date which you were to select. In that the fullest opportunity might be given you to make your defence, the Board of Trade of Salmon Arm undertook to hire a hall to seat 2,500 people, and I offered to put on a band and dance in connection with the event for the further amusement of those who attended.

You failed to accept that challenge also. I notice, however, in your papers, that when confronted with this failure, at public meetings, you stated you would meet me at a time to suit your convenience, although I had studiously consulted your convenience by leaving the selection of the date to yourself. I had you made a similar reply when asked why you failed to appear at the still unrefuted charges of Mr. R. T. Elliot, on April 29, which were read in your presence on the floor of the Legislature.

Instead, you had your Attorney-General have contentions with me with slighting references to, and innuendoes against me. Speaking in Ash Hall, Vancouver, Hon. Mr. Manson reported in the public press as saying with regard to me: "When we consider the various enterprises with which he is connected in the past, I am inclined to believe he is worth considering. The less said, the better, I think. We shall deal with him when the time comes."

I promptly addressed a letter to the Attorney-General, gave an outline of all essential facts that could be recalled about you, arranged a public meeting at New Westminster, and invited you to meet me there, and unburden himself of all the facts regarding myself in his possession. Following your failure to appear at that meeting which I had allowed him a chance to establish or withdraw his imputation.

The above incidents have forced me to the conclusion that your Attorney-General are common cowards, and that their methods towards those who criticize your public acts are of a despicable character which a coward usually adopts.

Gossip and bluster. From the charges made against your government you have sought safety in silence. Mr. Bowser, has done the same. In the public interest I propose another course to force both of you to recognize your responsibilities.

In present charges against you and your government in "SEARCHLIGHT No. 5," which I send by registered mail, are supported by the affidavits of your own officials. They reveal either a neglect of duty, or connivance with others to defraud the people of the province. You are asked to appoint a Royal Commission to investigate these charges. If they are true you have a great opportunity through such a tribunal, to edit the Provincial Party and to vindicate yourself.

In order that this may be done at a minimum of expense to taxpayers, the Provincial Party offers to bear the cost of the audit. A previous offer by us to pay for an audit of the Department of Industries in order to prove waste and expense, was not accepted by your Attorney-General.

I make this demand for a Royal Commission on behalf of the enrolled members of the Provincial Party. But I make it on behalf of the whole body of long suffering taxpayers, who, if these charges be true, are being exploited by political politicians like yourself and your confederates. On these taxpayers I warn you, that any attempt by you to power, at the coming session of the Legislature, to borrow money on P.G.E. account, or to seek by the dissolution of the Legislature, another term of office, before some adequate impartial investigation is held, will be such an outrage to public morals that the electorate will show its resentment the first opportunity.





## WOMEN STILL FIGHT FOR RIGHTS QUEBEC

Cannot Have a Vote and a Man Too in That Province; Many Disabilities

MONTREAL, Oct. 31.—"You cannot have a vote and a man too, in the Province of Quebec. It would be too much happiness to have both!"

In these satiric words Mrs. John Scott, at a dinner given by the Lions' Club summed up the position of women in her province. Mrs. Scott is the President of the Women's Club. She seized the opportunity presented to drive home some facts, vehemently protesting against the lot of women in the province of Quebec as regards their political status, provincially and municipally. Discussion later took place on the substance of the address, and the consensus of opinion was that the granting of the franchise to Quebec women, and the existence of the provincial, municipal and school franchise in all other provinces, was adequate attestation of the justice of women's suffrage and their capacity to discharge responsibilities imposed.

Declaring that the anti-suffragettes, today were either dead or speechless, Mrs. Scott remarked that Mr. Walter Mitchell "now brags that he once voted for a bill to allow women to practice law in Quebec;" that Sir Lomer Gouin maintained that he was a suffragist at heart, which "indicates clearly that his heart is a long way from his head," and that Premier Taschereau had better watch out or the Latin countries would beat him to it in recognizing the status of the women.

**Widows and Spinsters**  
Mrs. Scott flayed the law that permitted only widows and spinsters to have a voice in municipal elections, with no recognition at all for married women; that also ignored them at provincial elections; that a married woman could not administer property, give it away or sell it; that she could not deposit more than \$500 in a bank without her husband's consent; that if no marriage contract exists the husband has complete administration over his wife's property; etc.

An inconsistency which the speaker stressed was, that there was a woman mayor in Quebec; the Mother Superior of the Longue Pointe St. Jean de Dieu Hospital being Mayor of St. Jean de Dieu. Mrs. Scott said that Mayor Martin had failed to keep a promise to do what he could for them. When a bill covering the women's position here came up at Quebec, he had returned to Montreal, and though efforts had been made to obtain a two-minute interview on four consecutive days no success had been realized.

**MANY SCOTSMEN HAVE TO LEAVE HOME LAND**  
Seventy Thousand Have Migrated Since Beginning of Year

GLASGOW, Oct. 30.—Seventy thousand Scots, most of them wrenched away from home by unemployment, have emigrated since the first of this year, the majority going to Canada and the United States.

Tradesmen unable to make a good living at home compose a large part of the moving mass. Of skilled craftsmen, no longer able to find work in the industries that feed the Clyde, hundreds have gone hopefully westward—engineers, building trade artisans, iron and steel workers—highly skilled labor that Britain deeply regrets losing.

Not long ago an American touring the Highlands and the Lochs near Glasgow remarked to his Scottish host that it seemed a pity men had to pack up and leave such a beautiful environment, whose legends and traditions were rooted deep in their hearts.

"Aye, but ye canna live on scenery," said the Scot.

The problem of the nationality of the wife was discussed several times during the last session of Parliament and will come before the Dominion's conference now meeting in London. Here it is expected a final decision will be made as to whether the wife retains her nationality, or takes that of her husband. If the former, the British Government will take steps to have a bill passed allowing all married women to adopt English nationality at once, but prohibiting others from assuming it without going through the usual legal course.

## CALGARY MUST MAKE RADICAL CHANGES TO AVOID RECEIVERSHIP

CALGARY, Oct. 31.—The conviction that the city of Calgary must make some radical changes in its financial arrangements, to avoid an ultimate receivership, was forcibly expressed by Mayor George Webster before the Board of Trade of that city. He pointed to the annual deficits and the practice of shoving the burden ahead each year rather than a definite plan to balance the budget. That the latter will be difficult is seen from the fact that, with present revenues, a general reduction of 25 per cent. in the expenditure will be necessary. This will curtail present services to a degree which will scarcely be accepted by the ratepayers without resistance.

The mayor's address consisted of a general review of the city's financial problem. The collection of taxes has not been up to expectations, the business tax being the only exception. Of the total expected current taxes of \$3,658,703 for the year, only \$2,466,958 had been collected up to Sept. 30. The estimate on the business tax were \$280,000, and \$284,973 had been collected to the same date.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

**PRE-EMPTIONS**  
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series. How to Pre-empt Land, copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 1,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

**PURCHASE**  
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 19, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

**HOMESITE LEASES**  
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

**LEASES**  
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 400 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

**GRAZING**  
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commission. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
