

Wireless Operator Who Visited Ruined Japanese Port Tells

EVERYTHING DESTROYED

Officer on Steamer Says he is Now Trying to Forget Sights Seen There

W. Adams, a wireless officer on the Empress of Russia, which sisited Yokohama since the earthquake, tells in a letter to a friend here of what he saw as follows:

"We docked Friday evening about 6 p.m. alongside the wreck of what once had been a wharf, the same wharf that the Empress of Australia was moored to on that memorable 1st of September. There is nothing left of it but a piece about 600 feet long the short by a bridge of boats. It ruins of streets which are dark and forbidding. I never saw such! a sight in all my life as the ruins Empress of Russia. The whole itown of course was in darkness except that in a few places where fires were raging though five weeks have passed since the quake. There wasn't a sound: It appeared a regular city of the dead as indeed it is. I never saw ships in the harbor later played and over the ruined town to try







Lavell in Victoria Discussing Prison Matters With Hon. A. M. Manson

VICTORIA, Oct. 26. -Dr. Alfred E. Lavelt, chief adviser the board of parole of the province of Ontario has been here conferring with Hon. A. M. Manson in regard to the prison matters and especially with a view to co-operation between the provinces and the possibility of having similar legislation enacted here to that in force in his province. Explaining the system of his province Dr. Lavell said:

"Much can be done for the criminal without coddling him, and a policy of most penal supervision can be designed to the benefit of the prisoner." The board, which is composed of representative men, deals with all cases of punishment imposed by the courts less than two years in duration, and thus controls the inmates of the provincial penal institutions.


