# MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE VISITING NORTH

## CHURCH UNION IS STRONGLY RECOMMENDED AT PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY

### Marketing Bulkley Beef Discussed with Minister Board of Trade Council

That the department of agriculture appreciates the interest being taken in the farmers of the interior in connection with the marketing of their beef by the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, was the message conveyed to the council of the board at a meeting yesterday afternoon by E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture. "Such interest is a great incentive to the Provincial Government to aid," he said. "The department of agriculture is realizing that in order to encourage settlement they must see that the new settlers have market facilities as well as land."

### SHOT ALLEGED CHINK BURGLAR

Lumber Dealer Fired Four Shots  
at Man He Found in House

ALDERGROVE, B.C., June 7.—A. A. Berrie, the well known lumber dealer, was aroused early last night by someone trying to get into his house through the window. He found a Chinaman outside who ran to the rear of the house. When Berrie got to the back, the Chinaman had entered the back door and Berrie heard him scream. He seized a Bulkley Valley beef and would revolver and finding the Chinaman outside, he fired four shots en route. The farmer had to open a store himself in order to market his beef but most farmers were unable to identify.

Berrie telephoned the police and was entered on a charge of disorder. He was declaimed bail, too small an amount to pay for the case will come up for trial.

### Time Here when Church Must Move or be Left Behind, Pidgeon Says

PORT ARTHUR, June 7.—The long awaited debate on the question of Church Union was precipitated this afternoon in the Presbyterian General Assembly when Rev. Dr. G. G. Pidgeon, of Toronto, chairman of the committee on union, submitted the committee's report. In the course of his address, Dr. Pidgeon said that the resolution herewith presented recommended to the General Assembly to proceed forthwith to the consummation of Church Union. He said that the discussion of policies during the last twenty years had created conditions that could not continue. Since 1912 the church had been practising conciliation with the hope of reaching unanimity. In the judgment of the majority of the committee members this could not be continued and the minority should not ask for it. The condition of union and operating charges throughout the country would not permit it.

The hour for decisive action had come, Dr. Pidgeon said, and further postponement would only expose the church to the charge of expensive and irresolute trifling with problems of vast importance. There must be a parting in deference to the charge that friends of union were now dividing their own church for the sake of uniting others. Dr. Pidgeon said that a far more disastrous division would be precipitated if union were blocked than if it were consummated. They must either leave behind those who could not follow this policy to its inevitable conclusion or be left behind by all elements of progress in the communion. "As between the two alternatives, there is only one choice left open to the unionists," Dr. Pidgeon concluded.

Berquist's dog achieved notice once before when he swam ashore from the sinking Princess Sophia in 1918 being the sole survivor, human or otherwise, of the disaster which caused the loss of more than 300 lives.

### J. F. Duthie, on way to Smithers to Spend Month, says big Mine to be Shipping in Ninety Day's Time

Quality shipments of ore will not be made from the Duthie Mines, on Hudson Bay Mountain near Smithers, for three months yet, according to J. F. Duthie, head of the concern, who passed through the city yesterday afternoon bound from Seattle to Smithers. The new power plant, Mr. Duthie expected, would be furnished by July 4, but it would take some two months after that to prepare for shipping on a large scale.

Mr. Duthie said everything was looking very promising at the mine. The government was putting in a new road which will facilitate shipping.

On the way north, Mr. Duthie stopped off at Victoria where he met Hon. A. M. Manson, member for Omineca, and Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines. In the course of a conversation with a Daily News representative, Mr. Duthie complimented Mr. Manson on the good work he was doing for his district and its development. "He is a real live wire and is surely on the job," said Mr. Duthie in telling of the reception he had been given at Victoria by Mr. Manson and Mr. Sloan. Mr. Manson's detailed knowledge of Omineca district was surprising, Mr. Duthie stated.

Mr. Duthie will be at Smithers for the remainder of the month of June. Next week he will be back in the city to meet Mrs. Duthie who is coming up from Seattle to spend a few weeks at Smithers.

Speaking about shipments from the mine, Mr. Duthie said that eight carloads of ore had been sent to Trail since January 1. Where the ore in future will go for treatment or how it will be transported Mr. Duthie was not prepared to announce at this time.

### Dr. George Hanson Arrives to Spend Summer in this District Completing Geological Survey

Dr. George Hanson, associate geologist of the federal Department of Mines and head of the reconnaissance party sent out by that department to investigate the mineral resources of the district between Stewart and Terrace, arrived yesterday afternoon from the south to resume the investigations which he has been carrying on for the past three years and which, as far as this district is concerned, it is expected, will be completed this year. Tomorrow Dr. Hanson will sail by the Venture en route to Aiyansh on the Naas River where other members of his party have already arrived.

Speaking to a Daily News representative, Dr. Hanson said that this season's program of investigation work will start at Aiyansh and an overland trip will be made from there into the Kitsumkalum valley and Terrace. After that the party will go to Alice Arm for a brief time and Anwoy will also be visited. Then Stewart will be visited and about September the party will go to Hazelton and perhaps also into the Bulkley Valley. The belt to be traversed is approximately 150 miles long and 20 miles wide.

#### Objects of Work

Explaining the objects of his work, Dr. Hanson said the idea was to get as much geological information about the mines and Omineca constituency for railway service and extensions and Mr. Pattullo will again urge that the former promises to Prince Rupert and the contracts with that city be carried out.

"I always live in the best place there is in the whole world. If I knew a better, I should live there," declared Lloyd George or Abe Lincoln or some other man who gets his name in the newspapers. And every man with any iron in his blood will echo the sentiments.

People live in Prince Rupert because, for the time being at any rate, this is the best place in the world for them. There is no other place under the sun where they can get as good a living and at the same time enjoy life as well as right here. If there were we should all have been there long ago. If we have been mistaken, this is the time to rectify it. No one should remain here who does not think he has the one best bet in the whole universe.

It is a poor bird that befriends its own nest. If ever the time should come when it was not possible to say a good word for Prince Rupert the next train or boat would carry us hence. ## MACHINERY TO STIKINE RIVER

First Shipment Arrived at Telegraph Creek Includes Two Tractors—Like the Days of '98

Prospects for Season in North Better than Usual: Well-Known Men There

TELEGRAPH CREEK, June 7.—The town of Telegraph Creek, on the Stikine River, was awakened into activity, the greatest since the old rush days of '98, by the arrival of the Hazel B Nos. 3-4 of the Barrington Transportation Company, with a scow on which was 40 tons of mining machinery, including two tractors, the first in the Cassiar.

This is the first trip of the season and opening of navigation, and when these boats rounded Buck's Bar on the Stikine, the Old Timers said it was the longest boat that ever plied the river.

There were 38 passengers on board, among them were A. St. Clair and E. M. Brindie, well known mining men; Amos Godfrey and his partner A. Campbell, who are interested in placer claims on McDames Creek; and D. A. McLeod on a reconnoitering trip with particular reference to the water powers of the country.

Major Aeland and Corporal Bryce of the N.R.W.P., whose headquarters are Prince Rupert, were also passengers. They are here on a trip of inspection and it is a matter of regret among the many friends they made here that they cannot be here longer. A fact which is perhaps a tribute to the well kept law and order of this part of the district.

### Seattle Interests

F. A. Craig and Harvey M. Ross with a crew of men, who will put in a season with a Keystone Drill on Dease Creek; they represent Seattle interests. They are working in co-operation with H. S. Kuehl and Capt. Pendleton from here to the Lake in order to get the machinery in. Capt. Pendleton and Mr. Kuehl have a crew of their own going in to McDames to work the Pendleton placer claim. They are all very optimistic and confidently expect to have a Fourth of July celebration at the Lake.

Great credit is due to the Barrington Transportation Co., and especially to Capt. S. G. Barrington, for the way in which they handled a difficult proposition, as it is no child's play to buck the Stikine when she is running full of mud.

Telegraph Creek has spent a very quiet winter with not a great deal of activity in the fur line outside of a few beaver. There has been lots of snow which will give the miners in the interior plenty of water to work the claims and will be a factor of success to the outfit now going in.

**More Machinery Coming**  
It is also expected that there will be a few hundred tons more of mining machinery in before the summer is over. With this in view the Provincial Government through the Mines Department, has granted a sum of money for the improvement of the Dease Lake Road which will give employment to the local men for the summer. Altogether the signs seem to indicate a very prosperous year.





## HENRY FORD FOR PRESIDENT SUFFERED FROM PIMPLES & BLOTCHES FOR FIFTEEN YEARS

Says is Not Candidate but Friends Persistently Working For Him

WASHINGTON, June 7.—(By Canadian Press)—Developments with respect to Henry Ford as a presidential possibility continue to command attention among the leaders of both political parties.

Mr. Ford disclaims being a candidate but the fact remains his friends are active and that this activity has reached a stage where it is giving concern to many democratic chiefs and is also giving worry to republican leaders.

Democratic politicians who have been in the South recently have come to Washington in the last few days declaring that Ford will get the delegations of several southern states, that most of the southern delegates will be either for Ford or McAdoo, and that Senator Underwood, outside of Alabama, will have little backing from the South. It is declared that practically every southern delegation will have some Ford delegates. Heretofore, it has been generally supposed that McAdoo and Underwood would get the southern delegates.

The recent visit of Mr. McAdoo here has stirred up much democratic political gossip and one phase of it is the fact that an increasing number of democratic leaders are showing friendliness to Ford. They are asserting that Ford would command a big vote
