RECORD SAILING FROM RUPERT TO ORIENTAL PORTS

Canadian Transporter Makes Fast Passage of 16 Days from Here to Yokohama

C.G.M.M. steamer Canadian Transporter, Capt. Watson, which loaded lumber here in June for Japan, returned to Vancouver last Sunday morning after setting up a company speed record for the return trip to the Orient. The ship made the run from Prince Rupert to Yokohama in sixteen days and from Dairen to Victoria in nineteen days, ten hours. The Transporter brought 1,000 tons of corn and oil from the Orient.

The Transporter's record proves the claim of Prince Rupert that this port is in a strategic position for Oriental shipping in view of the shorter distance from here across the Pacific.

Startling Disclosures Before Bar Association on Increase of Crime

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Aug. 30 .- Startling disclosures of the extent and rapid increase of crime in the United States were submitted before the American Bar Association yesterday by a special committee on Law Enforcement which urged that the whole code of criminal practice in the 48 states of the union be rewritten so that the long arm of the law might also become swift, sure, constant and, on occasion, merciful.

Data on numbers of crimes, methods of trial and treatment of prisoners in England and France were cited, in comparison with which this country showed to a decided disadvantage. The blame was laid partly up-

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

FILES SUIT AGAINST A FISHING COMPANY

Sellow claims to have frightened the wolf away with his screams and that he lived on the island for three months on roots and berries. He declares the experience ruined his health.

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
