# HUGE DEAL WITH SOVIET IS PLANNED

## VANCOUVER POLICE CLERK SUICIDES --- LEAP FROM ROOF

### David Black Plunges To His Death After Having Been Arrested

Tragedy on Cordova Street Occurred Last Evening Following Al altercation Earlier in Day Between Dead Man and Three Strangers

VANCOUVER, Dec. 27: (Canadian Press)—David Black, aged 24, police court clerk, leaped seventy feet to the street below from the roof of the police station on Cordova Street at 5:45 yesterday afternoon and died in hospital an hour later. Black had been in an altercation with three strangers earlier in the day as a result of which he was charged with attempted robbery with violence. He was released on bail to appear today.

### PASSES IN VANCOUVER

Miss Kate Rose Deacon, for Twenty Years Resident of Terrace, Dies

The death occurred on Wednesday of last week in a Vancouver hospital, where she had been a patient for three months, of Miss Kate Rose Deacon, sister of Mrs. T. J. Marsh of Terrace and aunt of Mrs. James Farquhar of Prince Rupert. The late Miss Deacon, who was the youngest daughter of the late Col. and Mrs. James Deacon of Lindsay, Ontario, had been ill for some time prior to her death. She had resided with Mrs. Marsh at Terrace for twenty years and was well known and highly esteemed by many friends in Prince Rupert.

The funeral took place from St. George's Anglican Church in Fairview, Vancouver, last Friday afternoon with Rev. M. H. Jackson officiating. Interment was made in Ocean View Burial Park.

### VANCOUVER ROBBERIES

No Less Than Four Hold-ups in One Evening Reported to Police of Southern City

VANCOUVER, Dec. 27:—Four hold-ups were reported to the city police here Friday night.

At 7:15 three armed men held up a butcher shop at 1188 East Hastings Street and made their getaway with \$40.

About 8:30 the box office at the Capitol Theatre was robbed by bandits.

Earlier in the evening two messenger boys were held up and robbed in different parts of the city. One boy had \$10 taken from him and the other \$3.

### MILLIONAIRES ARE GREAT DEAL FEWER IN UNITED STATES

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 27:—Whereas there were 530 millionaires in the United States in 1929, there are today only 75, it is revealed in a tabulation of government taxation returns.

### BALANCE IS FAVORABLE

OTTAWA, Dec. 27:—The Dominion of Canada had a favorable trade balance of \$49,113,408 for the year ending November 30, it is announced by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This compares with an unfavorable trade balance of \$17,068,783 for 1931 and an unfavorable balance of \$104,000,000 in 1930.

### TO DEFER LICENCES?

Movement on Foot Whereby Motor-vehicle Fees Would not Become Payable Until April 1

VANCOUVER, Dec. 27:—A movement is reported to be on foot in the prairies and in British Columbia to ask the provincial governments to defer the issuance of 1933 motor-vehicle licences until April 1.

Oil companies, it is reported, will offer to advance the governments the funds they will thus be delayed in receiving.

### STEAMER IS SOLD

Dingwell, Cotts Co. Dispose of Canadian Seigneur to Japanese Interests

Instructions are being awaited here today as to whether the freighter Canadian Seigneur, formerly belonging to the Canadian National Steamships and recently purchased by Dingwell, Cotts Co., English shipping concern, is to be turned over here or in Vancouver to Japanese interests to whom the vessel has been in turn sold by Dingwell, Cotts.

The dry dock during the past ten days has carried out certain repair work on the Canadian Seigneur and the vessel is now ready to leave. If she is taken over here by her new owners, she will proceed direct to the Orient, it is expected.

### YOUNG BOY IS INJURED

Hugh Alexander MacKenzie, Aged 8, Suffers Double Thigh Fracture in Auto Smash Saturday

Hugh Alexander MacKenzie, eight-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Alex MacKenzie, is a patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital suffering from a double fracture of the thigh and Joseph Slaggard, local taxi operator, is serving seven days' imprisonment in the city jail for having been in charge of a motorvehicle while intoxicated following an automobile smash-up on Christmas Eve at 8:40 p.m. on Sixth Avenue just the other side of Hays Creek Bridge.

Mr. MacKenzie, well known local furniture dealer and father of the injured lad, had his delivery truck parked on the right hand side of Sixth Avenue looking east while making a delivery at the home of J. D. Allen. Slaggard was driving west along Sixth Avenue from the direction of Seal Cove and struck the MacKenzie truck with his left wheel, pushing the truck up over the low curb onto the sidewalk and knocking down the boy who was standing on the sidewalk alongside and to the rear of the truck. The lad was lying under the car when he was picked up by his father. Within five minutes he was taken by a passing car to hospital.

Slaggard was arrested soon after the accident by Constables Grant and Wyman and pleaded guilty when charged in police court before Magistrate McClymont this morning.

Both cars were damaged.

### Ratepayers' Association Figures Corrected by Mayor Orme Who Asks That Statements be Rectified

The following letter was received from Mayor Orme this morning:

"Editor, Daily News:—In your issue of Friday, December 21st you gave a full report of a meeting held by the Ratepayers' Association on the previous evening. I find also that a report of the committee's findings have been broadcasted in the Province newspaper.

"This committee has estimated that the deficit on revenue for 1933 will be \$269,171.00, basing their calculations on the receipts and expenditures for 1932. The following are the actual facts:

"The city's anticipated deficit for 1932 is \$68,000.00 and not \$100,000.00, as estimated by the report.

"The social services outlay is \$12,000.00, and direct relief \$25,000.00, or a total of \$37,000.00, and not \$275,000.00 as reported.

"On these two items alone there is a misstatement of facts amounting to \$270,000.00, or more than the much applauded deficit.

"It is difficult to understand what reasons have actuated the committee in making these very obvious and palpable errors in placing such statements before the public, and it is to be sincerely hoped that they will lose no time in rectifying these misrepresentations.

"In fairness to the city council and myself I think the above should be given publicity.

### Negotiations Under Way To Sell Cattle to Russia Taking Oil

Plan to Market 100,000 Canadian Cattle to Soviet Being Negotiated by Minister of Agriculture at Ottawa

OTTAWA, Dec. 27:—Negotiations between Canada and Russia now going on may result in the sale to Russia of 100,000 head of Canadian cattle, chiefly dairy cattle, according to information obtained from persons connected with the negotiations.

In government circles it was indicated that no announcement would be made until negotiations were at a more advanced stage. Hon. Robert Weir, minister of agriculture, admitted he had been working on a proposal to exchange Russian oil for Canadian cattle.

THE FIRST SIGNS

The first signs of a tendency to return to normal were seen yesterday and Sunday when the holiday was in many cases celebrated in the old fashioned way. Of course there were economies, but they did not seem so apparent as on the previous Christmas. The indications were that the buying strike was over and that those who could afford it were willing to spend once more.

Naturally the spending is encouraged by the prices asked. Turkeys at from fifteen to twenty-five cents a pound is something never before known in Prince Rupert. It is not much of a spread from the prairie prices. Many farmer there sold their turkeys for ten and twelve cents a pound for the best grades. These had to be packed and shipped and the retailers had to have a profit. The buyer would announce that he would be in a certain village on a certain day. The farmers all around took in their turkeys and sold them, according to grade. If word got around that one buyer treated the farmers better than another the farmers all flocked to that village to sell. Usually one buyer went to each village but he had to compete with other buyers who went to other villages or towns.

With the desire of those with money to spend it will come increased demand on the factories, increased employment, increased buying power, more spending, more employment, more buying, and pretty soon everybody will be working. Some people scoff at the idea that this will be the case, but it will.

LONDON IS LET DOWN

British Officials Express Disappointment at Slowness of Action On Debt Revision

LONDON, Dec. 27.—Considerable disappointment was expressed in official circles here at announcement of President Herbert Hoover that, owing to the attitude of President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt, it would be impossible for him to set in motion any plans for war debt revision survey or a world economic conference. No move on the part of the United States can now be expected until after March 4 when the new president will be inaugurated.

Confidence of an early debt revision was one of the factors which actuated Great Britain in meeting the \$95,500,000 war debt payment to the United States on December 15.

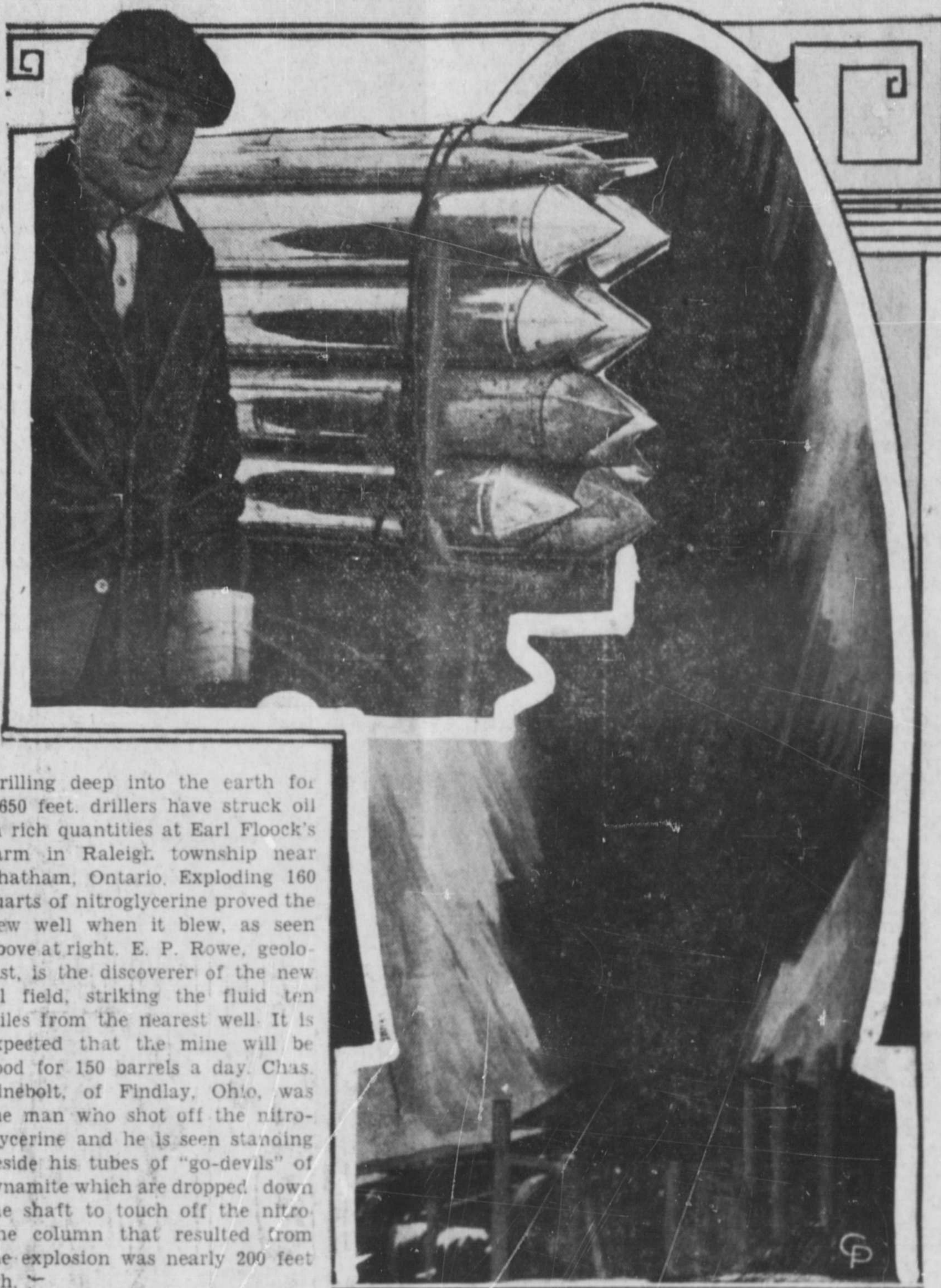

### New Oil Strike Near Chatham, Ontario



Drilling deep into the earth for 1,650 feet, drillers have struck oil in rich quantities at Earl Flook's farm in Raleigh township near Chatham, Ontario. Exploding 160 quarts of nitroglycerine proved the new well when it blew, as seen above at right. E. P. Rowe, geologist, is the discoverer of the new oil field, striking the fluid ten miles from the nearest well. It is expected that the mine will be good for 150 barrels a day. Chas. Rinebolt, of Findlay, Ohio, was the man who shot off the nitroglycerine and he is seen standing beside his tubes of "go-devils" of dynamite which are dropped down the shaft to touch off the nitro. The column that resulted from the explosion was nearly 200 feet high.

### DIES AT SIMPSON

Gloom Cast Over Neighboring Village by Sudden Passing of Mrs. Victor Sansum

A pall of gloom was cast over the neighboring native village of Port Simpson on Christmas night when the sudden death occurred in the hospital there at 6:30 o'clock Sunday evening of Mrs. Margaret Pattie Sansum, aged 41, wife of Rev. Victor Sansum, United Church clergyman at Port Simpson.

The late Mrs. Sansum, who was well known and highly esteemed in Prince Rupert as well as at Port Simpson and elsewhere in the district, had been ill for less than a week. An attack of influenza developed into pneumonia to the ef-

fects of which malady she succumbed.
