GRANBY CO. PLANS AGGRESSIVE CAMPAIGN PART OF JAPANESE CREW AND STOWAWAYS ARRESTED IN VANCOUVER

New Docks and Aerial Tram for Maple Bay Mine: Concentrates from Copper Mountain to Trail

(Special to Daily News)
VANCOUVER, Feb. 26.—Concentrates from the Copper Mountain property recently acquired by the Granby Company, are sent to Trail to be smelted, it was announced by H. S. Munro, general manager of the Granby Company on his arrival in the city from Anxox.

The plans of the company are to make alterations in the mine so that it may be worked at its capacity of 2,000 tons a day. Concentrates would be taken to Anxox where they were denied by Mr. Munro. Such procedure would not be economical, he said. About 400 men would be employed in the mine and the mill and although the mine is sufficiently developed to enable it to be worked at capacity right away, additional work will be undertaken.

SAULTED BY STRANGE MAN

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 26.—An 11-year-old girl, Dorothy, and her sister Dorothy, aged 5, were coaxed into an auto by a strange man into an auto and criminally attacked. The girl was found. MARGARET RYAN IS ABANDONED

BOSTON, Feb. 26.—Six men boarded the schooner Margaret Ryan, beset by gales, and were getting rid of the cargo of the ship while the ship was in the sea, stripped of her sails and otherwise damaged. Finally the British steamer Corinthian found the distress signals and rushed to her aid, while the Ryan's crew hurried to meet her in the boats. The Ryan was abandoned.

OPPOSE CUT STEAMER RUN

Victoria and Seattle Endeavor to
Remain on G.T.P. Map

VANCOUVER, Feb. 26.—Victoria and Seattle shipping, commercial and other interests are vigorously opposing the cutting out of those ports of call in G.T.P. steamer schedules effective after March 3. Instead of elimination they advocate the speeding up of the connections between Vancouver, Prince Rupert and Victoria. At a conference held at Victoria on Saturday between Osborn Scott, general passenger agent of the C.N.R. at Vancouver and H. C. Keeley, general manager of the C.G.M.M. and several prominent business men of this city it was rumored that the C.N.R. officials put up an alternative proposition to Victoria details of which will be announced this week.

WILL FACE SERIOUS FOREST ACT CHARGE

Peter Starr, Native, Brought to
City Last Night From Ocean
Falls by Provincial Police

Peter Starr, native, was brought to the city on the Venture last night by Provincial Constable Beaven of Ocean Falls, to face trial on a charge under the Forest Act of unlawfully removing a tree bearing timber limit marks. The offense is an indictable one and is considered serious, the penalty being up to five years imprisonment. Stipendiary Magistrate J. H. McMullin will preside over the preliminary hearing which commences at 2:30 this afternoon and L. W. Patmore, of Patmore & Fulton, will prosecute. The offense is alleged to have taken place at Tom Bay on Finlayson Channel. R. H. Loughton, forest supervisor from Hazelton, G. G. Armistage, forest ranger from Ocean Falls, and W. G. Henning, from Swanson Bay, are here to give evidence.

FORMER LUMBER BROKER OF PRINCE RUPERT ON WAY TO ALASKA MILLS

F. G. Brynolson, manager of the North West Spruce Co., of Vancouver, and formerly of this city, was a passenger for Ketchikan and Juneau on the Princess Mary, passing through here this afternoon. Mr. Brynolson, speaking of the lumber export business, said that the sailing schooners were proving the salvation as far as shipping from Alaska was concerned. He is now selling for three mills in Alaska and a schooner is at present at Ketchikan loading for Australia. Asked why similar shipments could not be made from this port, Mr. Brynolson said there were no mills operating on the coast to supply such a market. The Americans seemed to be living there but the Canadians as far as the business was concerned. Mr. Brynolson will be in the north about two weeks.

FRENCH OCCUPY MORE TERRITORY

DUSSELDORF, Feb. 26.—The French today are in possession of strips of territory between Cologne and Coblenz and Mayence bridgeheads, thereby securing the railway lines that hitherto had been in occupied territory. The operation is planned to strengthen the Rhine-land customs control.

VANCOUVER WINS CUP

VICTORIA, Feb. 26.—The Kerr Cup, emblematic of the championship of Vancouver and Victoria high schools was won by the King George High School hockey team here today, the score being eight to nothing.

Mutiny Aboard Japanese Vessel Bound Vancouver Stowaways Are Arrested

VANCOUVER, Feb. 26.—The city police were called by officers of the Japanese cargo steamer Taihu Maru and the immigration authorities arrested nine alleged mutineers of the steamer's crew and 29 stowaways when the vessel entered the harbor here yesterday afternoon.

The stowaways were found after a long search hidden in the port coal bunkers. They are being held for deportation. The mutineers are to appear in court here.

According to the captain's report, shortly after leaving Kobe for Vancouver to load logs, a number of stowaways put in an appearance and with the co-operation of some of the crew, defied the ship's officers. The men were armed, it was declared, and thus intimidated anyone daring to interfere with them.

The ship's plight was wirelessed to agents here and when she entered the harbor she was met in mid stream by harbor officials.

The vessel carried a crew of 30 officers and men.

Hand Grenades, Rifles and Machine Guns are Seized by U. S. Police New York Harbor

NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—The seizure of 75 cases of hand grenades and high explosives being unloaded from a truck into the basement in the Chelsea Pier district Saturday night led to the discovery of 100 more cases which had been secreted in a riverfront lodging house.

Federal authorities uncovered in the same building 200 rifles, 20 machine guns and large quantities of steel jacketed machine gun ammunition in belts.

PEACE IN IRELAND RUMOR IS REVIVED

DUBLIN, Feb. 26.—Reports from Irish provincial centres indicate a revival of peace efforts. The rumor is that a settlement may be reached in the course of a week or so between the Government and anti-Government parties.

IS ISOLATED BY ICE PACK

Newfoundland Suffering from
Extreme Cold. Steamer

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, Feb. 26.—With all coastal vessels held fast by ice packs in the harbors of the southern seaboard, Newfoundland reports indicate that the ice condition is the worst they have had in 50 years.

United States And League Of Nations.

According to press reports, President Harding, the man
who was elected on a ticket opposed to the League of Nations,
has now sent a request to Congress asking them to authorize
American membership in a permanent court of international
justice organized under the auspices of the League of Nations.

While there is no objection to President Harding changing
his mind when he sees that he has been mistaken, the impres-
sion that flashes through the mind on reading the dispatch is
that the anti-league campaign was just gotten up to defeat
President Wilson and to elect Harding. Like many other elec-
tion cries it was a wrong one and was conceived by the leaders
and supported by them for no other purpose than electioneering.

What impresses thinking people when they read of these
things, is that democracy is not yet a success. It is as easy to
lead the people astray as it is for a smaller group to go astray
or for a king to go astray. The mob is never infallible and in
fact is very often wrong. Because they are wrong, however,
does not mean that we should change back to the old system.
The only recourse is to educate the people so that they may be
able to think for themselves instead of following the mob. In-
dividual education is necessary and also mass education. People
may be educated in both ways. Individual education is carried
on in the schools, in the homes, in the Sunday schools and in
the night schools. Also through public lectures and group
meetings. Mass education is carried on chiefly through the
newspapers, the magazines and books and in election cam-
paigns. Often a movement is largely psychological, caused
partly by the influence of mind upon mind. We have seen re-
ligious movements spread through the country and also prohibi-
tion movements, war fever, labor movements, and various other
more or less psychological waves that have affected the whole
country. This can be used for educative purposes. Also it can
be used to defeat good objects just as the move against recipi-
tivity with the United States was largely a manufactured patri-
otism that caused, not only the overthrow of the government,
which was a small thing, but the defeat of a measure that
would today have been of inestimable benefit to those of us who
live on the Canadian border and who might benefit very largely
by United States trade.

Immigration Has Commenced.

Apparently immigration to this country has commenced.
Also it seems as if the southward drift has pretty well stopped.
We must look to Europe to supply us with new settlers to fill up
this country. They will come, slowly at first, but in ever in-
creasing numbers if they are encouraged. We have the land
and the resources and these must be developed either by the
white or the Oriental. If we refuse to admit the white then we
must expect to be forced to admit the Oriental. Talking will
not keep them out. It is absolutely immoral to tie up vacant
lands and refuse to allow their use. No individual has any right
to do that and neither has any country. The trend of the times
is against any individual or nation being allowed to stand in the
way of progress.

Mob Movement In Emigration.

Migration is largely the result of psychological mass move-
ment. The recent southward drift to California was the result
of the tendency of men to herd themselves like cattle or sheep
and to move in the mass. There was no special attraction in
California. Wages there are low and there is not work for all.
Industry is crowded and with the breaking of the boom there
will be much distress. Those who have gone will wish them-
selves at home in the north once more.

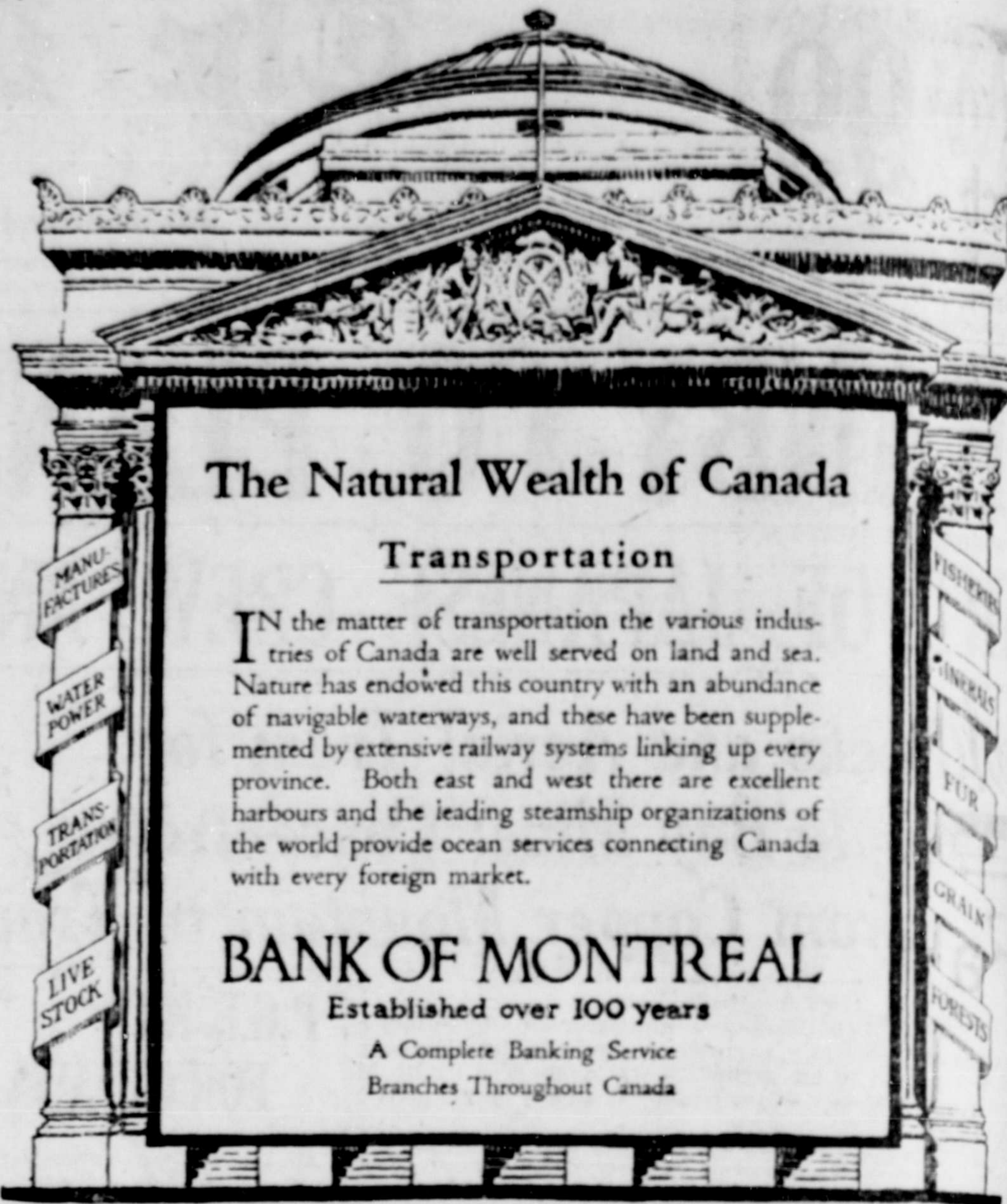

LOCAL YOUTHS INSTALL RADIO

Felix Ball and Norman Kinslor
Hear Kansas City and Other
Far Away Stations

For audibility and strength of
receiving the amateur radio
station erected by Felix Ball
and Norman Kinslor, at the
home of the former 429, Fifth
Avenue, West is one of the most
successful sets on the coast.

On one occasion, when the at-
mospheric conditions were par-
ticularly good, this station lis-
tened in on a radio concert given
in Kansas City, in the Middle
States, a distance of over 2,000
miles.

A Daily News representative
listened in at his first radio
concert at this station re-
cently and the results were re-
markably good. The weather
was very stormy and interfered
to some extent but in spite of
that fact Portland, Oregon, was
heard very distinctly.

The first item heard was a
lecture given by the Radio de-
partment of the Portland, Ore-
gonian on child welfare and the
female voice of the lecturer was
exceedingly clear, so much so in
fact that it was possible to take
the lecture down in shorthand.
Gus Olson's jazz orchestra of
the Portland Hotel was the next
item and the selections "Some-
day You Will Cry Over Some-
one," and "Together," were dis-
tinctly heard. In addition to
these particular items several
excellent vocal selections were
heard from the same station.

Other stations picked up were
Hale Bros. Inc., of San Fran-
cisco; The Province, Vancouver;
Calgary Herald; Times, Los An-
geles; and the Mercantile Trust
Co. of San Francisco.

The aerial of this amateur
construction station measures 50
feet high x 60 feet long and the
receiving sets are of the Remler
pattern unit system which can
be added to at will. The re-
ceiving set consists of four in-
struments, strung in a line,
three tuning units and one de-
tector unit, known as the regene-
rative circuit. The advantage
of the regenerative circuit over
the non-regenerative circuit is
that the former gives a greater
range and more volume of
sound. The four instruments
have three switches and three
dials on the face. The dials are
numbered and have the same ap-
pearance as the combination
lock on a safe. It is by turning
and twisting these switches and
dials that the station is tuned to
the required wave length and
the numbers on the dial enable
the operator to obtain the best

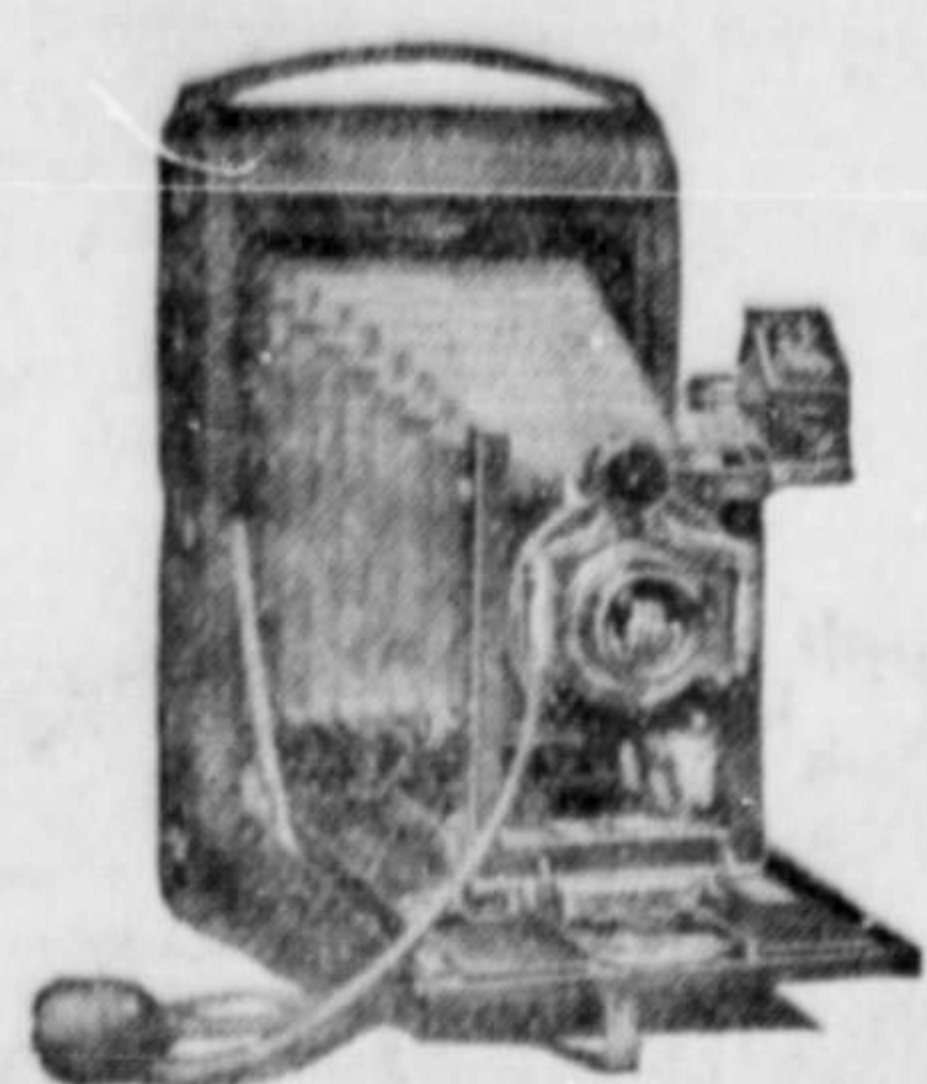

BANQUET TONIGHT TO CAPTAIN NICHOLSON

Sketch of Life of Former Manager of the Coast Service Proves Interesting

VICTORIA, Feb. 26.—Officials of the C.G.M.M. and Canadian National Railways are giving a banquet at Vancouver tonight in honor of Captain C. H. Nicholson, former manager of the Grand Trunk steamers. Several members of the local staffs crossed for the occasion. The scene of the dinner will be the steamer Prince George, a vessel that was built under Captain Nicholson's supervision and for fourteen years under his management.

Captain Nicholson's life has been a real romance. He began his career at sea as a cabin boy, and now goes East to assume the double burden of manager of the Canada Atlantic Transit Company and the Ontario Car Ferry Company. He began his long and varied experience in the steamship business as a cabin boy with the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company in 1881. In 1882 he entered the service of the late C. F. Gildersleeve, of Kingston, Ont., operating steamers on the St. Lawrence River, Bay of Quinte and Lake Ontario, supervising the positions of purser, mate, and master.

Commands Vessels
He commanded the steamers Hero, Hastings, Norseman, North King and other vessels. In 1892 he was appointed general freight and passenger agent on the merging of the Gildersleeve interests into the Lake Ontario and Bay of Quinte Steamship Company, holding that position until 1894, when he took charge of the interests of that company on the American side, being located at Rochester, N.Y. In 1903 he was appointed general manager of the Muskoka Lakes Navigation Company, and in 1904 traffic manager of the Northern navigation Company, having charge of operation of the Lake Superior division. In 1909 he was appointed manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Coast Steamship Company, with headquarters at Vancouver, a position which he has continued to hold until the present time.

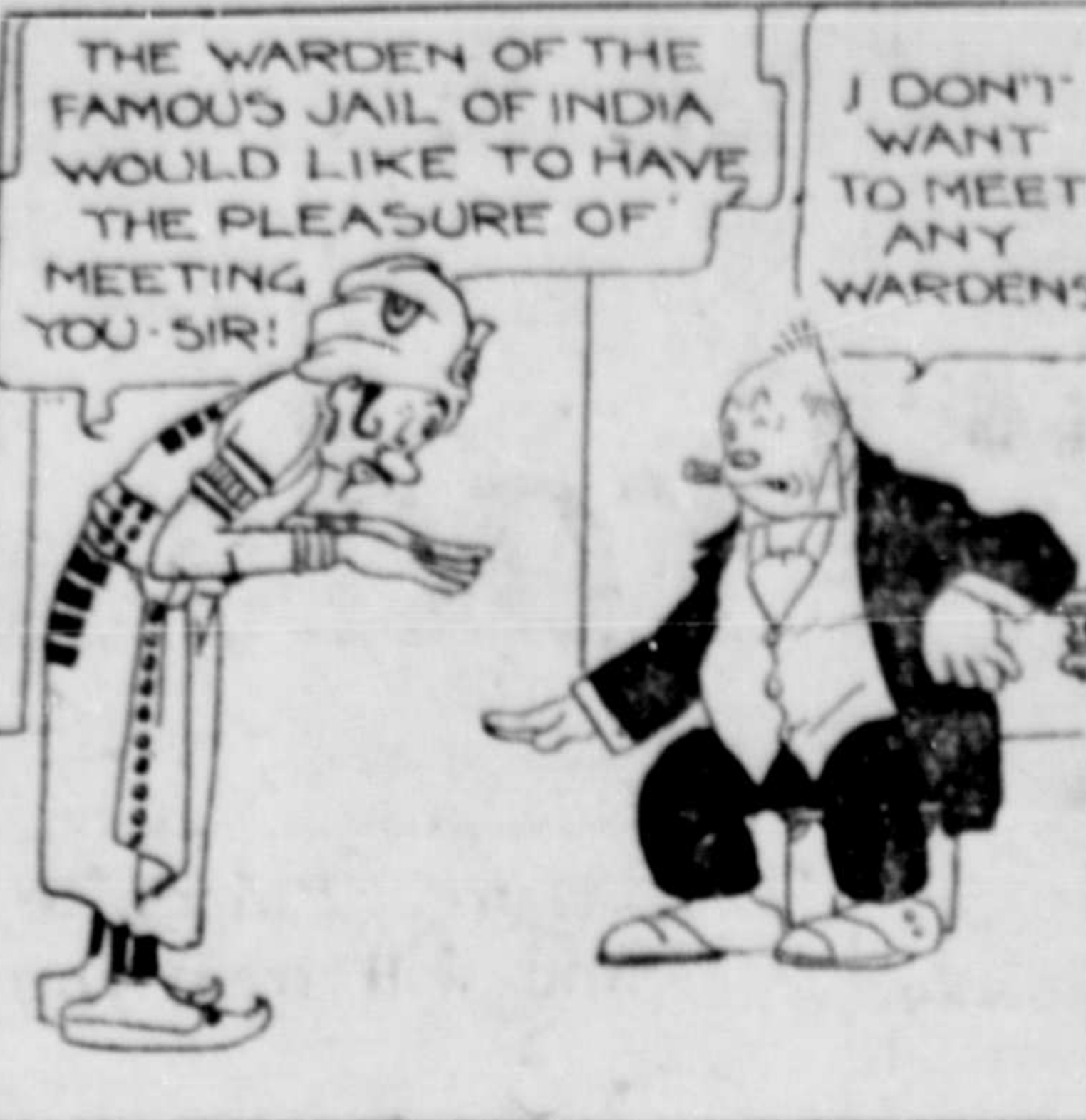

The situation in the Men's Section of the Fraternal Whist League continues to be quite interesting and six of the ten teams still have chances for the championship. The St. Andrew's are still at the top with one point to the good over the Valhalla and Oddfellows who jointly occupy second place. In their past tournaments each of these teams won so there has been no change in the relative standing. The Sons of Canada are three points from the top with still a chance like the Sons of England and Knights of Columbus who are four points down the list. Consistent winning for each of these last three teams will be necessary to obtain at least a tie at the end of the season providing always that the St. Andrew's, Valhalla and Oddfellows meet with reverses. The Knights of Pythias, Great War Veterans' Association, Moose and Elks are now out of the running as far as the championship is concerned. The last mentioned two teams are waging a battle for the cellar.

Mass golf lessons are taking the place of individual instruction in the United States, in order to satisfy the demand for tutelage in the game, which has become so popular that the building of 200 links annually cannot fulfill requirements. Throughout the west Sarazen and Hutchison have been giving lessons to the multitudes. Likewise at some of the southern links prominent golfers have divulged to the hungry aspirants to better golf how the clubs should be swung. Even in the indoor schools of northern cities, bevy of golfers take inspiration from watching the manoeuvres of the professional.

MANY PUT TRUST IN THE UNKNOWN

Never Satisfied With Those Things With
Which They Are Familiar

INCLINED TO TAKE CHANCE.

Curious Traits in Human Nature Have Made
Possible Growth and Development of
the Great Mail Order Houses

(Copyright).

A curious trait in human nature makes
itself apparent very frequently. That is an
inclination to trust in the unknown rather
than in that with which one is familiar. A
person is very apt to take a chance, even
though he may know that the odds are 100
to 1 against him, instead of being satisfied
with lesser rewards about which there is no
possibility of doubt.

It is, possibly, the flaring up of the ever-
present gambling instinct, but there is
something more in it than that. There is in
it the unexplained tendency on the part of
most people to reach for the chimerical and
ignore the tangible and substantial thing
which is near at hand. Man is seldom sat-
isfied with those things that are within his
grasp but is reaching always for the unat-
tainable. Too often, he loses that which he
might easily gain by blindly pursuing that
which is always just out of his reach.

Why "Con" Man Thrives

Coupled, in a way, with his faith in the
unknown is the tendency on the part of so
many people to place confidence in a
stranger in preference to one who is known
and has been tried and proven. It is this
tendency which makes possible the opera-
tions of the "con" man, the get-rich-quick
artist, the unscrupulous promoter and the
salesman of worthless mining stocks. The
man who would not think of trusting Bill
Jones, his next-door neighbor and fellow
church member, will confidently turn over
his life's savings to a stranger who unfolds
a tale of riches to be won. Bill Jones might
talk his head off in behalf of a legitimate
proposition without getting a dollar where
the slick stranger with the worthless propo-
sition can get thousands.

It is these two tendencies which, ap-
parently, are so widely prevalent among all
classes of people that have made possible the
success of the great mail order houses in the
big cities. A knowledge of psychology is as
important to the mail order man as a knowl-
edge of business practices. He plays upon
these tendencies of man to take a chance,
to trust in the unknown rather than the
known, to place confidence in the stranger
rather than the friend.

Hope to Draw Prize

Those who buy merchandise from a mail
order house are moved partly, whether they
realize it or not, by the trait in their nature
which prompts them to trust in the unknown
rather than in that with which they are
familiar. They are hoping, it may be un-
consciously, that they will draw a prize.
They do not know what they will get, for it
is impossible for one to know what he is
going to get when he orders merchandise
from a picture and a highly-colored descrip-
tion in a catalogue. He is taking a chance
on the unknown.

Buying merchandise from the local
merchant, on the other hand, contains none
of these elements of chance that enter into
the dealings with the mail order house.
When one buys a stove from the hardware
store in his home town, he may get none of
the thrills that come from taking a chance
but he will get a stove that will last longer
and keep him warmer than the one that he
might get from the mail order house and to
the average individual these things are likely
to be more important than the thrills.

Using Your Eyes.

When you buy from the local merchant
you see the thing that you are buying, you
inspect it carefully, examine the workman-
ship and the quality of the material of which
it is made and in many cases you have the
privilege of testing it before paying for it.
You have not only your own eyes and knowl-
edge of values to rely upon, but you have
the advantage of the advice of the merchant
who has an expert knowledge of the mer-
chandise which he is selling and who, in 99
cases out of 100, can be relied upon to tell

CANON VERNON OF TORONTO PREACHED IN CITY YESTERDAY

Rev. Canon Vernon, of Toronto, general secretary of the council of social service of the Anglican Church in Canada, preached at both services in St. Andrew's Church yesterday. In the morning, Canon Vernon outlined the objects of the organization and told of some of the work that was being done. In the evening, he dealt with the subject of social purity telling of the duty of all men to their fellows "both young and old."

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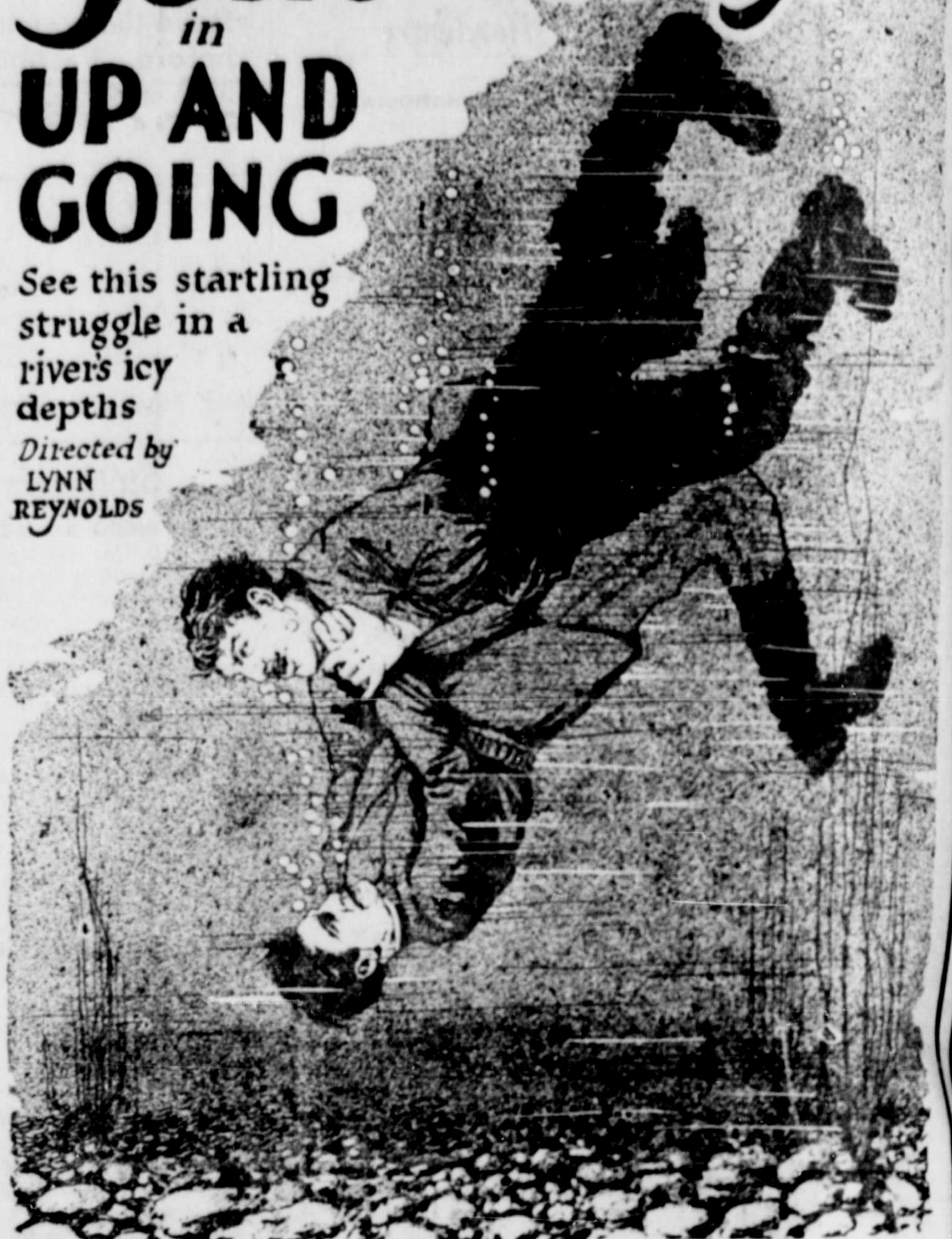
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
