# SORROW OF UNITED STATES IS WIDESPREAD

## IMPORTANT REAL ESTATE DEAL CLOSED THIS AFTERNOON IT IS ANNOUNCED

### Woodrow Wilson Will Attend State Funeral of President Harding

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Woodrow Wilson, former Democratic president of the United States, authorized the statement today that "he will participate as far as possible" in the funeral ceremonies here on Wednesday over the body of late President Harding. The extent of his participation was not indicated but it is understood that he will at least ride in the funeral cortege from the White House to the Capitol. Whether he will attend the services will depend on his physical condition at the time.

### CHICAGOFF ID. MINE OPTIONED

Important Deal Announced at Tacoma Involving Famous Property Near Juneau

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 6.—W. R. Rust revealed here on Saturday that an option on the famous Chicagoff mine near Juneau, Alaska, had been taken by George T. Jackson, general manager of the Alaska-Gastineau Mining Co., and W. A. Gastineau, president of the Hirsch-Chicagoff Mining Co.

Mr. Rust is one of the principal owners of the Chicagoff mine along with Hugh C. Wallace, former ambassador of France. The Chicagoff is one of the largest mines in Alaska and it is said to have profited \$10,000,000 in profits since 1909. The sum for which the option has been taken has not been disclosed.

### WILD SCENES AT LABOR CONGRESS

Demonstrations Occur in Dublin and Police are Unable to Prevent Them

DUBLIN, Aug. 6.—Wild scenes occurred in Dublin today in connection with the Irish Trade Union Congress. Delegates going final round on Saturday by 6-2, to the Mansion House found the 5-7, and 6-3. approach blocked by a crowd of demonstrators who tried to seize the building. They shouted "Release the prisoners." Up with Larkin as the Irish labor leader." The police were unable to prevent the scenes.

### SUMMER FROST IN BULKLEY VALLEY

Last Week's Cold Snap Did Some Damage to Crops—Wet Weather Continues

SMITHERS, Aug. 6.—The spell of wet weather is yet unbroken with its resultant worry to those who are trying to get in the hay crop.

Many of the gardens in the district are wearing a sickly hue following the heavy frost of Wednesday last. Beans and peas suffered most but it is expected that potatoes will recover unless another cold snap comes along.

### HARVESTERS FROM BRITAIN

WINNIPEG, Aug. 6.—Nearly 6,000 harvest laborers are expected from Great Britain within the next three weeks to help harvest the grain crops of the three prairie provinces.

### TWO SWIMMERS TRY CHANNEL

Henry Sullivan Six Miles from French Shore—Mrs. Carson Also Making Good Progress

DOVER, England, Aug. 6.—Henry Sullivan of Lowell, Massachusetts, making his seventh attempt to swim the English Channel from Shakespeare Cliff to the French side, was reported six miles off the coast of France this morning.

Mrs. Clemington Carson of the United States, credited with swimming from Albany to New York, started the channel swim at 9:25 this morning accompanied by two Dover boats and a pilot. Mrs. Carson's husband is keeping alongside her to give her food as required. She is making good progress.

### FIRST GAME TO NANAIMO

Connaught Cup Football Final on Saturday Ended in Score of 1 to Nil

WINNIPEG, Aug. 6.—After hard fought struggle, Nanaimo on Saturday emerged winners by a score of 1 to nil over the Montreal C.P.R.'s in the first game of the Connaught Cup Dominion football two-games championship series.

The teams meet again tonight to decide the ownership of the cup. The Montrealers are not discouraged in the least and feel they will appear to better advantage in the second game and take the cup East. On the other hand, the Nanaimo boys are equally confident of swelling the lead.

### MONTRAL MAN IS KILLED IN AUTO SMASH VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Aug. 6.—Arthur Lamont, Montreal salesman, was killed when the automobile in which he was riding was struck by a street car and bounced off against a hydrant. David Powell, Vancouver, who was with him, was injured.

### SWISS COLONIZATION HEAD VISITS CANADA

Dr. Hans Bernhard Arrives in Montreal and Will Visit Com-patriots Recently Settling Here

MONTREAL, Aug. 6.—Dr. Hans Bernhard, director of the Swiss Association for interior colonization and industrial agriculture, arrived here on the steamer Megantic yesterday. He will spend the next six or seven weeks touring Ontario and the prairie provinces and will visit as many as possible of the 750 Swiss immigrants who settled in Canada this year. He was accompanied from Switzerland by Fritz Beck, the Association's representative in Canada and the United States.

### MUCH FISH IS LANDED TODAY

Halibut Arrivals Over the Week End Total 349,000 Pounds Including Trawlers

Halibut arrivals at this port over the week-end totalled 349,000 pounds. This morning eight American boats and eleven Canadians marketed 165,000 pounds and 74,000 pounds respectively at the Fish Exchange.

On Saturday evening, the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s trawler Andrew Kelly arrived from the banks with 65,000 pounds and this morning the G. E. Foster arrived with 45,000 pounds for the same company.

### NEW TIMBER FIRM ON GRAHAM ISLAND HAS BEEN INCORPORATED

Incorporation of the Graham Island Timber Co. Ltd., with capitalization of \$300,000 and head office in Vancouver, is announced in the current issue of the B.C. Gazette. The incorporation was handled by Mayers, Stockton & Smith, Vancouver legal firm, and certain details were arranged by Patmore & Fulton, of this city. The company will take over a large area of timber lands on Graham Island but further details of its proposed activities are not known here.

### MOVE BEING MADE TO HAVE MEETING TAKEN FROM HERE

PARIS, Aug. 6.—The International Boxing Union desires to know what the French Boxing Commission proposes to do regarding a return match between Georges Carpenter and Battling Siki for the heavyweight championship of Europe. The union says the time limit for the match expired on June 29.

### Dybhavn & Hanson Pay \$20,000 for 83 Foot Frontage on Third Avenue at Corner of Fifth St.

A deal is being closed today between the Bank of Montreal and Dybhavn & Hanson, local real estate firm, whereby the latter become owners of the 83-foot north corner at Third Avenue and Fifth Street. Mr. Dybhavn announced this morning that the papers had arrived from the East and would be signed up to day. The purchase price is in the neighborhood of \$20,000.

Asked what the intentions of his company were following the transaction, Mr. Dybhavn stated they planned erecting a permanent business block on the property but construction of it would not start for a year at least.

A frame business building now occupies the property which is under lease to F. W. Hart. This building contains Gil's cigar store, McArthur's shoe store and the Canadian National city ticket and telegraph offices.

### CHANCELLOR IS NOT YET NAMED

Reginald McKenna Declines Premier Baldwin's Offer — Several Prospects Mentioned

LONDON, Aug. 6.—Rt. Hon. Reginald McKenna, who was chancellor of the exchequer under Premier Asquith and who was offered a similar portfolio under Premier Baldwin, has decided not to take the position, newspapers state.

The Daily Press says that it is likely Neville Chamberlain, minister of health, will be the next chancellor. The Daily Mail says that the names of Sir W. Joyson Hicks, Sir Laming Worthington Evans and Lieut.-Col. Amery are being mentioned for the post.

### NO DELAY IN TAX PAYING

Collections to August 1 Higher Than Year Before This Year Than Since 1913, Treasurer Reports

Up to August 1, the date on which the first penalty went into effect, \$203,332.82 or 81 per cent of the total general taxation levy for the year had been paid in, the city treasurer's office reported this morning. From outside points, several payments have also been received since August 1, which will further swell the total.

City officials state that the record of collections this year is the best since 1913 and reflects a restoration of confidence on the part of property owners of the city.

### WILL CARPENTIER AND SIKI MEET AGAIN FOR TITLE IS QUERY MADE

Agitation is reported in the south by different members of the Union of B.C. Municipalities to hold the 1923 convention in Vancouver instead of Prince Rupert. This city was selected for the meeting at the convention held last year in Kamloops and notices were sent out to various municipalities recently by A. W. Gray, New Westminster, secretary calling attention to the first meeting to be held here on Aug. 20.

### CHAIRMAN OF LIQUOR BOARD

Former Mayor Waugh of Winnipeg Gets Appointment—At Present on Saar Commission

WINNIPEG, Aug. 6.—Richard D. Waugh, former mayor of Winnipeg and the British representative on the Saar Valley Commission since its appointment, has accepted the appointment as chairman of the Manitoba Liquor Commission to administer the new Moderation Act.

Mr. Waugh will return to Winnipeg as soon as he can be released from his European duties which he performs as a minority of one in the teeth of the rest of the commission's policy of aggressive militarism.

### DROWNING WAS JUST AVERTED

Prompt Action of C. H. Orme Saved Life of Earl Becker at Salt Lake

Earl Becker, a local young man, was nearly drowned at the Salt Lake yesterday afternoon and, but for the prompt action and presence of mind of C. H. Orme, serious consequences would undoubtedly have resulted.

Becker, with his brother, was learning to swim and had been in the habit of walking out in the shallow pool up to his armpits and then striking out for the shore. Yesterday afternoon he was walking out but stepped off the ledge and fell into the deep water. He had gone down for the third time when, G. H. Orme noticing his danger, swam to his aid and grabbing him by the hair, was successful in getting him back to the shore. According to eye witnesses, Becker would certainly have drowned but for the prompt assistance rendered him by Mr. Orme. He was not much the worse for his sudden immersion.

### INQUEST BRINGS VERDICT MURDER

But Death of Mrs. Jane Dick at Victoria Is as Much a Mystery as Ever

VICTORIA, Aug. 6.—The inquest over the late Mrs. Jane Dick, whose body with the head crushed was found in her home on Princess Avenue last week, concluded today. A verdict of murder against some person or persons unknown was returned by the coroner's jury. The police are vigorously bending every effort to solve the mystery.

**Newspapermen, Legislators,  
And The Public.**

There is a very decided tendency on the part of many people in Prince Rupert to unconsciously overlook the importance and duty of the newspaper to the community. It often crops up in the treatment that is accorded representatives of the press at meetings of public bodies and elsewhere. The most of people expect to see the doings of the various governing bodies faithfully and fully recorded in their daily paper. To make that possible it is necessary that legislators and officials co-operate with the representatives of the press upon whom the duty devolves of obtaining and preparing the reports. It very often happens that the first persons to criticize a paper are those who show it the least consideration. Especially is this true with amateurs in the governing world.

In most of cities more provision is made for the convenience and accommodation of the newspapermen than in Prince Rupert. People here often seem to forget the fact that the newspaperman is really the representative of the great mass of the people. When he seeks information he is not doing so personally on his own behalf or on behalf of any section of the community. He is doing so in pursuit of his duty of getting the news for the people. If that fact were properly realized, the importance of assisting and co-operating with the newspaperman would be readily apparent and legislators and officials would govern themselves accordingly.

**Attempts To Withhold  
Public Information.**


There are certain bodies functioning in the city of whose deliberations and actions it is the right of the public to know. This means that these organizations are dealing in public funds and with public affairs. It is not the place of these bodies or the members thereof to withhold their activities from the public. When an attempt is made to withhold information from a newspaperman, such persons should remember that they are dealing not with the newspaperman personally but with the public at large. The person who attempts to do so makes apparent his fear of public opinion and, through his contact with the representatives of the press, puts himself in a position the seriousness of which he does not always realize.

All the actions of public bodies in public assembled are public property and the newspaper is the medium through which these actions and deliberations are transmitted to the public. If the occasion comes up when certain information should be temporarily or altogether withheld from publication, the newspaperman and not the legislators should be the judge of what should be done. There are other means for public organizations to shield themselves from the public—whether they be justified in doing so or not—than by giving instructions to the newspapermen. The latter is not necessarily to be bound by such instructions and this fact should be remembered and taken into due account.

**Newspaperman As  
Public Barometer.**

Some people in their attitude towards the newspapermen obtain nothing but his contempt and distrust. Vice versa, others win his admiration and confidence. Just as a man appeals to the representative of the press just so will the public ultimately regard him for the newspaperman, perhaps more than any other person, is afforded the opportunity of sizing up those in public office.

No good newspaperman wants to be overlooked, neither does he want to be pandered to. He wants, however, to be treated squarely and above board and wants, once in a while, a little more consideration and assistance than is often given him in this city. Such treatment is due the public whom the newspaperman represents. A little more observance of this attitude would be better for everybody concerned and especially those who are functioning for and on behalf of the public.



## FRUIT PROSPECTS IN BRITAIN ARE POOR

Pears, Plums and Apples Suffered from Wintry Spring and Lack of Rain

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Owing to the lack of rain and the wintry spring, the fruit prospects throughout the country are very poor. Pears and plums have suffered most. The former are reported by the Ministry of Agriculture to be a failure, and the latter, it is expected, will yield only 30 per cent of the average. Apples, too, are affected, and this year only half of the average yield is anticipated. Cherry hopes are brighter and a 75 per cent yield is looked for. Gooseberries are expected to reach the average.

## CABLE FROM LONDON TO ANTIPODES IN 30 MINUTES NEW RECORD

LONDON, Aug. 2.—During the war Great Britain seized a German submarine cable running from Emden to the United States, and at the conclusion of hostilities one end of the line was drawn up to England and the other diverted to Halifax.

Today at Halifax the wire joins the telegraph system which extends from Halifax across Canada to Vancouver and thence under the sea to Fiji, Norfolk Island, Australia and New Zealand.

As a result, messages can now be sent from London to the Antipodes in 30 minutes. Thus are the far-flung parts of the British empire held together.

The G.P.R. steamer Princess Louise will arrive in port on Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock from Skagway en route to Vancouver.

## TECHNICALITY DID NOT WORK

### Judge Gregory Refuses to Accept Stuart Henderson's Plea for Northern Bootleggers

VICTORIA, Aug. 6.—There was no merit in the habeas corpus applications of H. J. Murphy, Stewart; Lee Lun, Anyox; Elsie McCoy, Frank Garnham and Geo. Graham, Alice Arm, committed to Okalla for bootlegging, according to the view taken by Mr. Justice Gregory in chambers here and the judge declined to release them on the grounds pleaded, namely, that the warrant of commitment had not defined Okalla Prison Farm as the common jail of Prince Rupert county.

Stuart Henderson appeared for all the convicted persons, the argument in behalf of one of them, H. J. Murphy, being taken as applying to all. They were convicted by the Prince Rupert magistrate for selling liquor in Anyox and other places, and were each sentenced to serve six months in Okalla. An amended warrant of commitment, specifying Okalla Prison Farm as the common jail of Prince Rupert County, was later made by the magistrate; but counsel asked the court to hold that this was invalid.

The applications were resisted in behalf of the Crown by W. D. Carter, K.C., Deputy Attorney-General.

Mr. Henderson said that the Government Liquor Act did not specify the place where persons convicted under its provisions should be imprisoned; and in such cases the point was covered by the Interpretation Act, which designated the place of detention as the common jail of the district. Okalla Prison Farm had been constituted, by order-in-council, the common jail for all the counties of the Province; but since the conviction was in an inferior court, and since none but a court of record could take judicial notice that Okalla Prison was a common jail, the warrant of commitment must so state, or the conviction was invalid. As to the amended warrant, Mr. Henderson argued that it could not cure the illegality of the original.

### Appeal Resisted

Mr. Carter contended that the original warrant was good, and in any case the amended warrant had cured the defect if there was one. The convicted man was in the place to which he had been sent. The court knew it. Law and justice had been satisfied. The name under which such a place was commonly known might properly be used in the warrant.

Mr. Justice Gregory plainly indicated his lack of sympathy with the invocation of technicalities to secure the release of the convicted men. There was no merit in their case, said the court; and while that was no excuse for not complying with the law as to their commitment to prison, it was bound to have its effect with the judge who was asked to release them on such grounds as had been contended for. In the court's opinion the original warrant was sufficient for its purpose, but if it was not, it could be amended, the judge held; and it had been amended. The applications would be dismissed.




