## NEGOTIATIONS WITH GERMANY GOING ON ARRANGEMENTS FOR DEAL BETWEEN LAND COMPANY AND GOVERNMENT

### Germany will Probably Deliver Goods Instead Money on Reparations

PARIS, Oct. 8.—Negotiations between representatives of German industrial groups and the Franco-Belgian authorities of occupation looking forward to complete resumption of work in Ruhr are in a fair way to succeed it was stated at the French foreign office today. It seems likely also that arrangements will be made for deliveries in kind on reparation account.

### SEATTLE MAN SHOT BY GIRL

Dying Man States He Never Saw Her Before But Was Going to Help Her

SEATTLE, Oct. 8.—Henry Lacelle, aged 33, an advertising man recently married, was shot in a roadhouse near here early Sunday morning by Winifred Gibbons, aged 21, who claims she knew Lacelle years ago as one Bill Williams.

In a dying statement, Lacelle said he never saw the girl before. He was talking with a group of men on the veranda when the girl came to ask assistance in getting her car out of a ditch nearby. She suddenly drew a revolver from her clothing and fired at Lacelle, hitting him in the abdomen. The girl is in custody.

### OLD MINER LEFT FOR BETTER DIGGINGS AS HE JUMPED OUT OF WINDOW

VICTORIA, Oct. 8.—Edwin Dower, aged 81, died in the Old Men's Home yesterday. He was a pioneer of Alaska and the Cariboo country and latterly suffered from hallucinations. Yesterday morning he told his companion he was "leaving for another and better diggings." Then suddenly he jumped out of the second storey window and suffered a fracture of the skull from which he later died.

Miss Isabel C. Armstrong, who has been attending the recent convention of the Canadian Women's Press Club in Vancouver, passed through the city Saturday evening arriving from the south on the steamer Prince Rupert and proceeding East by special services in the local barracks.

### NET REVENUE OF RAILWAYS

Increase of Over Five Millions Shown Largely from United States Lines

OTTAWA, Oct. 8.—A net operating revenue of \$2,984,460 was earned by the Canadian National Railways in the seven months ending July 31 of the present year. This contrasts favorably with a similar period a year ago when the deficit was \$2,202,992. During the seven months referred to the National lines in Canada show a net deficit of \$2,232,838, but this was turned into a surplus by the net revenue on the United States lines which amounted to \$5,217,299.

### LIQUOR PLEBISCITE IN ALBERTA SOON

Electors to be Given Choice of Four Alternatives—Government Control or Prohibition

EDMONTON, Alta., Oct. 8.—Through a preferential ballot with four alternatives, electors of Alberta on November 5, will decide whether there is to be a change in the provincial liquor laws. On the result, the government will base its legislation, whether the people call for a system of government shops or for the continuation and development of the present system of prohibition.

The committee's report was the subject of a lively debate during the last two days of the session. The form of ballot will be as follows:

(a) Prohibition.—Meaning thereby continuation and development of the present legislation; that is, the abolition of the sale of all liquors other than for medicinal, sacramental, manufacturing and scientific purposes.

(b) Licensed sale of beer.—Meaning thereby the sale of beer in licensed hotels and other premises, as provided in the proposed Temperance Act.

(c) Government sale of beer.—Meaning thereby the sale of beer by or through government vendors for consumption in private residences under government control and regulations.

(d) Government sale of all liquors.—Meaning thereby the sale of all liquors by or through government vendors—beer to be consumed on licensed premises and in private residences—wines and spirits to be purchased in limited quantities under permit issued by the government, under government control and regulation.

### NEW SALVATION ARMY OFFICER IN CHARGE OF LOCAL DISTRICT

Staff Captain Carruthers Arrives to Succeed Staff Captain Jaynes Who Has Relinquished Post

Staff Captain W. J. Carruthers arrived in the city from Regina Saturday evening on his way to Wrangell, Alaska, where he will succeed Staff Captain Jaynes in charge of the Salvation Army in the southeastern Alaska and Northern B.C. district. Capt. Jaynes has been forced to give up the post on account of his wife's serious illness and is at present in Victoria. Later he will receive a new appointment. Capt. Carruthers, who is accompanied by Mrs. Carruthers and family, left today on the Princess Mary for Wrangell where he will make his headquarters. On Saturday evening and Sunday he conducted special services in the local barracks.

A party consisting of A. Anderson, Los Angeles; August Anderson, Oakland; Andrew Sonksen, Fresno; Ludvig Anderson, Solvang, Cal., and Carl Mygand, San Francisco, who have been attending a Scandinavian convention in St. Louis, reached the city from the east on Sunday night's train and proceeded south this morning on the steamer Prince Rupert.

### SIX FOUGHT DEATH AND FINALLY WON

Clung to Masts of Wrecked Steamer for 36 Hours Before Picked Up

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—Clinging for 36 hours to two masts, all that remained of the steamer Governor Parr, six men fought a battle with death and won, when they were finally picked up by the freighter Schodack.

The ship went down in a hurricane off Nova Scotia coast and Capt. Angus Richards and Seaman Bigh perished. The ship's cat and dog were saved.

### OLDEST WOMAN IN CANADA PASSES ON

Mrs. Emma Brown Died at Age of 109 Years: She Was a Native of England

HAMILTON, Oct. 8.—Mrs. Emma Brown, believed to be Canada's oldest woman, died here today. She was 109 years of age. A native of England, she came to Canada seventy years ago in a sailing ship.

### Tentative Agreement Reached Regarding Building of Road Prince Rupert to Skeena River

The question of the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Co., Ltd., bearing a part of the cost of a road leading out of this city to the Skeena River by turning over a portion of its land instead of paying cash and also the matter of subdividing its acreage in the vicinity of the city and allocating the proper share to the provincial government were fully gone into at a conference between Hon. T. D. Pattullo, member for Prince Rupert and minister of lands, and officials of the company in Victoria last week and a satisfactory agreement between both parties, subject to the ratification of the legislature, was reached stated G. P. Tinker, local representative of the G.T.P. Development Co., who returned to the city Saturday evening after attending the conference.

The acreage in question includes the holdings of the company behind the townsite, across the harbor and at other points nearby. The property including the Salt Lake may also be included. Mr. Tinker, while declining to give any definite results of the conference, stated his opinion that the agreement reached would be of considerable benefit to the city.

The conference was held at the request of Mr. Pattullo to clear up several outstanding matters affecting the G.T.P. Development Co.'s holdings in the vicinity of the city.

Those attending the meeting were Mr. Pattullo, E. A. Field, C.N.R. land commissioner, Winnipeg; J. A. Heaman, C.N.R. chief engineer, Winnipeg; G. M. Hair, C.N.R. solicitor, Winnipeg; R. W. Hannington, C.N.R. solicitor, Vancouver, and Mr. Tinker, Mr. Heaman and Mr. Hair came north on the steamer with Mr. Tinker and took the train from here on their return to Winnipeg.

SUNDAY Lloyd George turned the first sod in the Baptist Church at Westmount and spoke briefly, rejoicing that Canada was apparently escaping the wave of materialism which he said was threatening to engulf Europe.

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### NOW LACROSSE WORLD CHAMPS

New Westminster Amateurs Defeated Foundations of Victoria on Saturday

VICTORIA, Oct. 8.—New Westminster defeated the Foundations, Victoria's contenders for the Mann Cup here Saturday in decisive fashion by a score of seven to two and the mainlanders thus became the amateur lacrosse champions of the world.

The game was one of the most thrilling witnessed here in two seasons. The checking was close and fast but good sportsmanship prevailed. The game was marred by rain, however, which continued throughout.

### CALGARY AT LAST GETS MESSAGES FROM EXPLORATION PARTY

CALGARY, Oct. 8.—Radio stations in Calgary and Minot, North Dakota, have established two way radio communication with the McMillan Arctic exploration ship Bowdoin, which has been spoken several times lately. During the summer the ship could not get radio messages for atmospheric reasons.

Jack Barnsley of this city was the first to communicate and he has kept up his communications with the expedition for several weeks.

Quick Action On  
Road Arrangements.

The fact that there has been quick action on the negotiations between the Canadian National Railway and the Provincial Government in regard to the building of the road from this city to the Skeena River is most satisfactory. If the legislature sanctions the work, as it is to be presumed it will, there should then be no further delay in regard to proceeding with it.

Prince Rupert people will appreciate the commencement of this road work as it is something they have been long waiting for.

Evils Of Group  
Government Shown.

The recent trouble in Germany with final re-forming of the coalition government under Chancellor Stresemann is another example of the difficulties which attend group government. In Germany there are several groups and no party is strong enough itself to form a government without the support of others. The present government is made up of a number of elements which usually do not mix well. The result is that all have to compromise, and if there is one that is more stubborn than the rest it gets its way or the government is broken up.

Government by minority is worse than government by majority and neither are what might be called ideal.

Utilize Dock  
Already Here.

The suggestion that grain may be shipped from the local dock without an elevator is one that is worth investigating. If any local people have friends who are connected with the grain export trade it would be good business to get in touch with them and draw attention to the facilities here and possibly put them in touch with the grain committee of the local board of trade. Nothing should be left undone to advertise our facilities here and to try to induce shipping men to use this port. Its development depends to a large extent on the energy of the people here.

Opportunity To Dig  
And Farm In North

Since the founding of this city there has been no opportunity for local people to secure a piece of land which they might clear up and cultivate. Everything seems to have been tied up by the railway company or by the government because of the possibility of it increasing in value. This has tended to hold back the district. There should be a number of small truck farms in the neighborhood but the land cannot be secured.

Now that an arrangement has been made between the railway company and the provincial government for building a road through the island, it is to be hoped a good deal of the land will be offered for sale at such prices as would encourage permanent settlement for gardening or farming purposes. Many local people would like a piece of land outside so that they may work there nights and week ends.

Up to recently there has been no very great demand but now people are looking to establishing here permanently and they want more than a city lot on which to locate.

SUNDAY SCHOOL  
AND MORALITYECHO FROM THE  
CONSUL'S VISIT

Nanaimo's Proposal to Exact a Pledge in Regard to Property Destruction Criticized

In his sermon last night Rev. G. G. Hacker spoke of the proposed pledge at Nanaimo, intended to prevent young people destroying property and urged that interest in the Sunday Schools and in religion were much more important. After the sermon a number of people remained to ask questions and to discuss the problem. Mrs. Gordon Joliffe sang two solos. In the course of his sermon Mr. Hacker said:

"While we heartily approve of any movement in our schools which will make better citizens of our boys and girls, we are not ready to admit that the youth of Prince Rupert are lawless property destroyers. The only cases reported seem to point that a few reckless or mentally weak boys break or shoot holes in windows. Church congregations have decreased in some places but Sunday school attendance in intermediate grades has increased in B.C. for some years back."

"The Nanaimo proposals really deal with the work of the Sunday school. The moral influence of the Sunday school has not lost its hold on boys and girls," Roger Babson points out that in every one thousand juvenile criminals three are regular Sunday school attendants and 997 are non-attendants. A further proof of the efficiency of the Sunday school is that Judge Ben Lindsay, the juvenile expert of the United States, suspends sentence on three requirements: "Attend school regularly, be home at 9 p.m., and show a Sunday school attendance card."

"France tried the teaching of morals without religion and condemned it over twenty years ago. It is a producer of increased child crime and also greatly increases child suicide," is a quotation from their report. "The belief in God is necessary as a motive for doing right. The teaching of abstract morals is a failure." The Nanaimo proposal of religionless morals suggests Rip Van Winkle.

## Course of Instruction

"Is the character building in our school boys and girls of as much importance as domestic science, manual training, or forestry protection?" inquired Mr. Hacker. "These are in the hands of experts. Why make the teaching of morals a side line. Many teachers are already doing as much moral teaching as a side line admits time for. Why not follow the rapidly growing movement of having an expert instructor in non-sectarian religious education. Kentucky has a splendid course of study. Thousands of children have taken the course voluntarily. The teachers are approved by the education department. The examinations count on the departmental examinations. This course of study has the endorsement of the B.C. minister of education if the people will really show a lively interest in it."

"There are several problems justly deserving more attention than window breaking. What about temperance instruction and sex purity problems? We have first hand information that these would not be amiss in Nanaimo. The Sunday school does not reach all the youth as there is no compulsory attendance. Where the Sunday school fails to get the boy or girl there is not generally a very lively interest in character building in the home. The school then is the only hope for such boys and girls. Let us give them the best possible training."

"Evidently Nanaimo has scraped the church to a marked degree. It is also evident that the experiment is a failure. Why try another method which has failed, namely 'morals without religion?' Why not increase efforts in backing up the church's great work which is the Sunday school. Also supplement that work by religious training in the day school."

## CLIMBING UP MOUNT MORSE

**Pacific Milk Is Not Satisfied**



Eleven Local Men Scale Summit and Frighten Away Game  
WONDERFUL SCENERY  
(By H. F. Pullen)

For five years I have been looking forward to climbing Mount Morse but there were always lions in the way. Sometimes I was too busy or had other engagements, or failing this the weather was bad or there was no one to go with or a launch was not available to take us to the other side. Yesterday, however, everything was favorable and we did it. Eleven of us, mostly boarders at the Inlander, climbed to the summit of the mountain across the harbor, some three thousand feet above sea level and found there what was to us an undiscovered country, a dream of delight. The best of it was that none of us had been there before and for that reason, perhaps we enjoyed it the more.

It is not of that climbing Mount Morse is any great feat but it is one that so few people undertake and that it is so well worth doing that I am bound to tell about it in the hope that others will share the enjoyment which it gave us. A number of young ladies have reached the top at different times, but we were a stag party. There was Jimmie Farquhar, ball star, and J. W. Hamilton, better known as Hammie; Jack Johns, the commercial genius; Howard Pringle of the Cold Storage staff, well known as a sportsman; Ed. Jenner, merchant prince; S. Wrigglesworth, budding banker; A. Radbourne, another finance juggler; W. T. Battersby, wielder of the big knife; W. M. Watts, of Stork's emporium; and G. E. Foster, a tall athlete with a good voice.

### Off on Time

For a wonder everybody was on time, this fact being due probably to the matitudinal efforts of Battersby who has a habit of getting Inlander boarders out of bed at ungodly hours. Sharp at eight o'clock the party boarded the good launch Gwen and the little Easthope went thug-thugging up toward Tuck's Inlet, reaching the cannery at nine. Some little time was lost inquiring the way, but the best instruction we could get was to keep to the right of the creek and follow the deer paths. That is what we did.

There was great eagerness to

After climbing nearly two hours and a half, the leaders who had been showing off somewhat in keeping well ahead of the rest, decided that it was noon and the regularity of their eating habit could not be broken. When the rearguard arrived on the scene a little curling smoke was finding its way up among the pines and lunches were being produced. Alas, however, for all the calculations of the athletes. There was no coffee and what is lunch without coffee? The reason there was no coffee was that there was no water. Although the immortal Wiggs had labored throughout to

carry an empty lard container to this point, investigation proved that the water was far below. We could hear it in the distance. However two noble patriots essayed forth with the pail and after about three quarters of an hour returned and the coffee was made and everybody happy. What was our chagrin, however, to find later that right at the top of the mountain within a few feet of the highest peak, there was the finest clear water awaiting us. We shall know better next time.

It is difficult to tell of the scene that breaks on one as he reaches the topmost peak of Morse. In one direction may be seen Kain Island and surrounding country all laid out before him with the various waterways and lakes. Southwesterly is Digby and the Islands beyond. Toward the Pacific is the Dundas archipelago and Georgetown and Port Simpson and Alaska beyond. Northerly is range after range of mountains, with the gorge of Wark Canal well defined and splendid. Beyond it peaks and glaciers. We estimated that at least one hundred mountain peaks could be plainly seen but perhaps there were more. One glacier seemed to fill what looked like a volcano crater a mile or more in diameter. For more than an hour we drank it all in and did in a futile way snapping off a dozen or so kodak films.

### Alpine Scenery

The beauty of the view from the top of Mount Morse is much enhanced however, lay in their use for by the alpine scenery of the signals, although in the course mountain itself. There are crags and several Ptarmigan were carpeted with verdure. Small boulders as examples of their meadows where deer browse were brawny. Deer and bear, the two numerous. Open glades and picture-queens eagerly wished for, kept tureque formations—these all were in themselves sufficient attraction to induce one to climb to the top. Prince Rupert people should all go there. It is the one beauty spot that exceeds all others I have yet seen in this neighborhood. It can be reached by anyone who has stamina and muscle. We scarcely got wet feet and most of the travelling was on fairly dry ground. At the top there was no muskeg.

Coming down was rollicking fun for a while but toward the end there was a slowing up. I had hurt my leg and had to hang back as I got near sea level. It took me two hours to descend but some made it in a hour and a half or less. On reaching the cannery we found our launch high and dry on the mud and two hours to put in before it would be possible to get away. Happily we were able to get dinner at the cannery, through the courtesy of Manager Sutherland and Store-keeper George Ackerman. It was a wonderful dinner. Jack John's presided and made the speech of thanks at the close and at 8:30 or thereabouts we reached home happy and rather proud of ourselves.




