OLIVER IS EMPHATIC OVER FREIGHT RATES DECLARES PRESENT EMBARGO WESTERN ROUTE CONTRARY TO FEDERATION

Farmer John Oliver Dares C.P.R. in Fighting Speech at Vancouver on Preferential Freight Rates

VANCOUVER, B.C., March 9.—Declaring that the mountain differentials on the westbound freight rates were discrimination against British Columbia and as such a violation of the terms of the treaty under which this province entered confederation, Premier John Oliver told a mass meeting here last night that the Provincial Government would carry on its fight for lower freight rates to the bitter end. "If we fail in this struggle for right, justice and equity," he said, "then confederation is a failure."

Much of the speech dealt with the attitude of the Canadian Pacific Railway to the question and to himself. He denied, however, that he looked upon the drive for lower rates as a fight between British Columbia and that railway and he deplored in vigorous terms attacks which he said had been made upon him in public by officials of the railway.

"I am not seeking a fight with the C.P.R.," he said. "Do you think that at my age I am afraid of anything the C.P.R. can do to me?"

Telegrams were read from the boards of trade of Calgary, Edmonton and Medicine Hat sympathizing with British Columbia's purpose.

EXPLOSION ON BRITISH SHIP

Two Sailors Killed and Four Injured Aboard Cruiser Coventry

GHIBALTAR, March 9.—Two sailors were killed and four others injured, two probably mortally, as a result of a torpedo explosion aboard the British cruiser Coventry during the night. The cause of the explosion and the extent of the damage to the vessel is unknown.

The ship is a light cruiser of 4,190 tons displacement and carrying a normal complement of 527 men.

JUDSON CODY SHOT HIMSELF

Coroner's Jury Returned Verdict to This Effect This Afternoon

That deceased came to his death through a revolver shot wound self-inflicted was the verdict returned this afternoon by the jury investigating into the death of the late Judson C. Cody. Hearing of evidence took place this morning and the finding was reached early this afternoon. Coroner Walter Gale presided and the jurymen were R. Moore, J. Edwards, F. Gilhuly, Frank Stephens, J. Barnsley, and James McAlenah.

Evidence was given by Dr. W. T. Kergin and Dr. J. P. Cade, Mrs. Norton and Mrs. Ponzio, neighbors; Jennie Dennis and Doris Larsen, Indian girls who discovered the tragedy; W. P. Armour, who lived with deceased, and Constable D. S. Cameron.

CREW OF SCHOONER RESCUED NANTUCKET

Seven Men Spent Night in Cabin Flooded With Freezing Water

NANTUCKET, Conn., March 9.—The crew of seven men of the schooner E. M. Roberts after a night of suffering in a cabin flooded with water that was freezing slowly while their vessel was being wrecked by great seas, were rescued by the crew of the Conkaskat coast guard station.

GENUINE AMBERGRIS WORTH SMALL FORTUNE

Lump from Whale Washed On Beach

Arthur Sholin, one of the Sholin brothers who have a successful fur farm on a small island near Gichagoff, was an outgoing passenger on the Northwestern says a Ketchikan paper.

It will be remembered that the Sholin brothers are the men who found the dead whale on the beach a few weeks ago and secured what is believed to be a fortune in ambergris. When asked by a News representative yesterday as to the outcome of the find, Mr. Sholin said he still had every reason to believe the substance found in the whale was ambergris, as it was taken from the whale's body in the exact position where scientists claim the ambergris always forms. Returns from the American chemists have not yet been received, but a few authorities in this country say there is but little question of the substance being ambergris, although there are but few in this country who are familiar with the stuff. Realizing this, the Sholin boys have sent samples to Paris, where the manufacture of ambergris into finest perfume is handled nearly entirely, and a return on the tests is expected now at any time. Should the find prove to be of the genuine ambergris, the Sholin boys will receive a good sized fortune.

200 Blue Foxes
According to Mr. Sholin's report, they are already on the way to independence, as they have over 200 prime blue foxes now on their island and have the stock and arrangements so well in hand that two of the brothers can take care of the fur farm nicely, while one of them will experiment with mink and marten raising somewhere on Puget Sound.

Mr. Sholin said that he had experimented sufficiently with mink and marten to feel quite certain that he could raise them on the Sound as well as in Alaska, and believed their skins would be as good outside as farther north, due to the fact that they must be raised in pens anyway, and the fur in captivity is never quite as good as in the wild state.

R. Moore returned this morning after making the round trip to Stewart on the Prince George.

FIRST EARTHQUAKE AT PRINCE GEORGE

LADY ASTOR AND LIQUOR

Introduces Bill Which is Opposed as Thin Edge Prohibition Wedge

LONDON, Mar. 9.—Lady Astor yesterday moved in the House of Commons the second reading of the bill prohibiting the sale of intoxicants to youths under eighteen years of age for consumption on licensed premises.

Walter Greaves, Lord, Conservative member for the Norwood division of Lambeth, moved the rejection of the bill, declaring it to be merely the entering of the wedge for absolute prohibition.

REMOVE RAILS IN MANITOBA

Hungerford Recommended that Those on Hudson Bay Route be Used Elsewhere

Ottawa, March 9.—The answer to a question in the House of Commons yesterday revealed the fact that J. Hungerford, vice-president of the Canadian National Railways, last fall recommended that steel worth \$418,900 lying along the unfinished portion of the Hudson's Bay Railway be removed and used elsewhere on the Canadian National and the Board later approved this and ordered the carrying out of the scheme.

GIRL APPARENTLY BEATEN TO DEATH

Body Found on Roadside and There Were Indications of a Terrific Struggle

VANCOUVER, Wash., March 9.—The eleven year old daughter of Paul Roscoe, farmer, was found dead on the roadside near the school house, her clothing torn to shreds. The indications are that a terrific struggle took place and the child was apparently beaten to death.

J. B. Lambert, Dominion public works engineer, returned from Stewart on the Prince George this morning and will spend a few days in the city before returning to his headquarters in Victoria.

FIELDING LIKELY GO TO WASHINGTON

(Special to Daily News)
OTTAWA, March 9.—It is persistently stated that Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, will be the first representative of Canada at Washington as Canadian Minister plenipotentiary. The fact that a sum is included in the estimates sufficient to cover the cost of the embassy, lends color to the statement that an appointment will be made, and Fielding is looked upon by everyone as the likely man for the position.

RUPERT LATE GETTING AWAY

Makes Initial Run After Thorough Overhaul at Local Yards

Sailing at 12 o'clock today for Vancouver, the steamer Prince Rupert replaced the steamer Prince George in the C.G.M.M. coastwise passenger service. The George was late getting in from Stewart and Anyox, not arriving until 9 o'clock and the Prince Rupert did not get away from the dry dock and oil wharf until after that time. The latter steamer loaded some fish and general freight for Vancouver before getting away. Soon after arrival here, the George went up to the dry dock where repairs and overhaul will commence at once in readiness for the resumption of the double service early next month.

Capt. D. Donald took the Prince Rupert south and Capt. W. S. Moorehouse is remaining here with the George. Chief Engineer Alex. Munro, Chief Officer Mabbs, Second Officer Johnson and Chief Steward Newey are remaining with the George also Chief Officers McLean and Flood and Second Officer Thomas transferred from the George to the Rupert.

Word was received in the city yesterday of the death at his home in St. Catharines, Ontario, of W. H. Kergin, husband of Mrs. W. H. Kergin and father of Dr. W. T. Kergin and Dr. L. W. Kergin, of this city, and H. F. Kergin, M.L.A., of Alice Arm. The latter arrived in the city from the north on the Prince George this morning and will leave on tonight's train for the East to attend the funeral.

The late Mr. Kergin was a native of Ireland and was 78 years of age. He came to Canada about fifty years ago and for practically all that time had followed the occupation of a contractor at St. Catharines. Other members of the family surviving are Mrs. J. F. Brandt, of Vancouver, and Mrs. F. W. Hardy, of Victoria, daughters. General sympathy will be extended to the widow, sons and daughters in their bereavement.

DOCK BEING KEPT BUSY

Car Ferry and Snagboat at Present on Pontoons—Prince George Overhauling

With the Swanson Bay car ferry and the snagboat Boboliak at present on the pontoons at the Canadian National drydock and the steamer Prince George going in for immediate overhaul, activity at the plant will be well sustained for the next few weeks. Repairs to the car barge are quite extensive following her recent grounding on Porcher Island and the snagboat is up for annual overhaul. In order to have the vessel ready to resume service in about three weeks' time, the work on the George will also have to be done with dispatch.

Notice has been received at the dock that the Canadian Britisher is going into Esquimalt for docking instead of here. The date of arrival of the Canadian Inventor, the next boat due here for overhaul, is not yet known.

OBJECTION TO FRENCH ACTION

British Merchants in Cologne Claim Attempt Made to Blockade Area

LONDON, Mar. 9.—An outcry is raised against the Franco-Belgian customs barrier around that area by the British merchants in Cologne and it gathers strength daily. The chief complaint is that British trade in Germany is being strangled and is almost at a standstill. It is claimed the French and Belgians are making an attempt to blockade the zone.

MARINE INQUIRY

VANCOUVER, Mar. 9.—The marine inquiry into the collision here between the Princess Beatrice and the Camosun has been concluded. Decision is reserved.

Presbyterian Synod of B. C. Votes for Immediate Union Other Churches by 63 to 27

VANCOUVER, March 9.—By a vote of 63 to 27 the Presbyterian Synod of British Columbia supported the resolution of the retiring moderator, Dr. J. Robertson and Judge Swanson of Kamloops, strongly approving organic union between the Presbyterian, Methodist, and Congregational churches and urging the Presbyterian General Assembly to take the earliest possible steps in that direction.

The Synod defeated by 62 to 28 an amendment of J. R. McLaren and Dr. W. Leslie Clay suggesting that the issue be postponed.

Dr. McLaren said he was a unionist himself but he feared disruption of the church if the matter were pressed until it had unanimous support.

Great excitement followed the taking of the vote and the franchise of ministers and elders supporting union was questioned by non-unionists but the objection was over-ruled.

MANY RAILWAY TIES COUNTED ENGLISH CUP SEMI-FINALS

Industry in Interior District Reflected in Monthly Report of District Forester

The tie cutting industry in the interior district is reflected in the monthly report for the month of February just issued by P. S. Bonney, district forester. During the month 61,101 railway ties were counted by the department as compared with 107 three are from the First Division in the month of January. Every Man An Agent For Publicity.

If there are two thousand adult males in this city there should be two thousand publicity agents. Every man a publicity man is the motto that is likely to bring results. There is such a tendency to leave everything to the board of trade, the city council, or to some other person or organization in order to escape personal responsibility.

Just now there are a lot of good publicity postcards and photographs published that if sent abroad will do good missionary work. The cost of these is small but if they are sent to the right people they should bring results. If everyone will purchase half a dozen of these and send them to people whom they think should have them, there will be more valuable work done than if the committee of the board of trade sends them out. Even if some of the work is duplicated, it will bring it more forcibly to the attention of the people who receive the message.

It is understood that several photographers were out taking pictures of the two big steamers at the drydock a few days ago. This is a good picture to send away. Let people know that we have a drydock and that it is being used.

Bad Weather In New York.

In this part of the country we have had a few cold rains lately but we have not frozen to death and there has not been a howling blizzard that obstructed all traffic and made it impossible for ships to enter the harbor. Sometimes we complain at the weather but when compared with other parts of the world we loom up very favorably in the matter of climate. Here's to ourselves and the climate we live in!

Fish Hatcheries And Their Value.

The value of fish hatcheries is still a matter of debate. While most officials declare that they are effective, a good many cannerymen say they are useless and that the young fish after being raised under artificial conditions are unable to take care of themselves and fall an easy prey to their numerous enemies. These cannerymen urge removing obstructions from the natural breeding places rather than spending a lot of money on hatcheries.

For a layman to take part in a debate of this kind would be injudicious to say the least. All we can do is to call attention to the fact that there is a great difference of opinion as to the value to the country of the money spent on hatcheries. If they have value, the people who advocate them should place before the public more facts to prove it and let the public know exactly what is being done and what it is costing. In an age of democracy the people want to know and when anything is kept quiet the feeling that something is wrong soon grows up.

What Will Happen In Germany?

What is going to happen in Germany? There is bound to be trouble there very soon if the conditions remain as at present. The value of German money has dropped to such an extent that the people are unable to buy food, much less other necessities of life. The strikes in the Ruhr have added to the misery of the people and it looks as if there would be some kind of an outbreak there before long. The country is like a rumbling earthquake with the possibility of a visible outbreak anywhere at any moment. The danger is that the example of Russia may be followed and that the people may be driven to extreme measures. Even those who do not sympathize with Germany to any degree will scarcely want to see a new eruptive force break loose in Europe that may involve the world again in a titanic struggle.

BANK SYSTEM IS EXPLAINED

S. K. Campbell Makes Many Things Clear to Members of Rotary Club

NOTES AND CREDITS

Necessity of Having Surplus Cash to Pay Deposits on Demand

At the luncheon of the Rotary Club yesterday an interesting paper was read by S. K. Campbell, manager of the Bank of Commerce on "Banks and Banking." He said:

One of the principal matters to come before the Federal House this session is the revision of the Bank Act. As you are no doubt aware the charters of all Canadian banks expire in July of this year, this being a recurrence of what takes place every ten years.

The reasons why charters are renewed or granted for a period of ten years are not difficult to understand. Business methods and laws are constantly changing and with development of our natural resources it is good business to bring our banking laws up to date to meet modern demands. But there is another reason why the Act is revised every ten years. Banks are the custodians of public funds and they enjoy certain privileges such as the issuing of note circulation. It is therefore prudent that our banking system shall be re-examined and that depositors and note holders shall be hedged with proper safeguards to protect them from loss in the event of failure or default of a bank.

Functions of a Bank

The principal functions of a bank are to receive deposits, issue currency and make loans. There are a variety of other services which a bank performs, but those which I have mentioned are the most important. Deposits may be divided into two groups, those payable on demand and those payable after notice—current deposits and savings deposits. Current deposits are subject to withdrawal by check and only in very exceptional cases is interest allowed. The service which a bank performs in facilitating the payment of accounts through the medium of checks is intended to cover any interest value in the account. In some cases the bank have the advantage with dormant balances but in the majority of cases the customers get the best of it as the operations of posting checks and supplying stationery run into costs which exceed the interest value of the average monthly or yearly balances.

Saving deposits are subject to withdrawal after 10 to 15 days' notice. That is to say the banks reserve the right to demand such notice but it is never insisted upon and so these funds are virtually payable on demand.

Note Circulation

The banks are allowed to issue their own notes payable on demand to an amount equal to their fully paid up capital plus the amount at their credit in central gold reserves. The circulation issued against paid-up capital is subject to a tax of 10 per cent but there is no charge against notes issued against the balances in central gold reserves.

The central gold reserves is a fund created by the banks and is administered by four trustees, three of whom are appointed by the Canadian Bankers' Association, and the fourth by the Minister of Finance. In it are deposited by the banks, gold, Dominion notes and other securities against which each bank may issue notes to the extent of its respective credit balance. At certain seasons of the year during the crop movement between September 1 and February 1, banks are allowed to increase their note circulation but they must pay interest on such excess at not more than five per cent. The privilege of issuing notes against capital is a very important one from the standpoint of the banks as it is tantamount to a free loan from the people of Canada, without which, as will be seen, the cost of providing a medium of exchange would be almost prohibitive.

Notes Guaranteed

Canadian bank notes are not backed by gold, nor are they redeemable in gold. They are, however, amply protected, being a first charge on all the assets of the bank and further strengthened by the double liability of the shareholders. Then there is the bank circulation redemption fund held by the minister of finance. This fund is created by the banks

transmitted to the large eastern centres where they are loaned on calls instead of to the deserving farmers or business men of the west. Such is not the case. The loans made by banks in western Canada far exceed the accumulations of deposits in the same provinces. The branch banking system permits the free flow of loanable funds to any point from which proper demand comes.

United States System

The situation in the rural districts in the United States is vastly different where there are thousands of small local banks. In places where the demand for loans exceeds deposits the small banker when faced with an application for a large line of credit must take his customer's paper and have it re-discounted at one or a dozen of the larger banks, or banks of re-discount. In each case his customer is required to furnish a statement of his affairs. He has the disadvantage of having his obligations scattered all over the country and when it comes to a season of tight money these holders are not likely to consider how it suits the borrower's convenience to refuse renewals. There is a very strong agitation there now for the branch banking system and as it is backed by the larger banks there is every reason to believe that before long it will be an established fact.

In this country much criticism has been made on the ground that the banks restrict credit and that the currency system is not elastic. They think we should have government banks and that the power to issue notes should be confined to the government.

Based on Production

Let me say right now that credit and currency are based on production and trade, and any machinery which may be set up to create easy money on any other basis will bring disaster on the country. The issue of currency which is not redeemable in gold or goods of value will very soon destroy the purchasing power of the dollar and leave us in a state of financial chaos. You possibly know something of the Rural Credits Act in Manitoba. The administrators of that act received deposits and paid, I think, four per cent interest. They loaned that money to farmers for long years and recently the announcement was made that as obligations were not being promptly met there would not likely be any more funds available for some time. The legislature appointed a parliamentary commission to investigate and their report has just been published. Let me quote the following from it:

"Under the administration conditions which have obtained since 1920, money was so easy that obligations were assumed without the usual care either on the part of the borrower or the lender and the over extension of credit that has resulted will take years to clear away."

Easy Money

After stating that the security behind the three million dollars of loans already made is of a problematical value the report goes on to say: "Not only is it unfair for public money to be issued at public expense for a small section of the farming community but the false prosperity of easy money created by the operations of the societies has fostered the spirit of reckless spending of public funds in other directions to say nothing of personal extravagance and increased indebtedness."

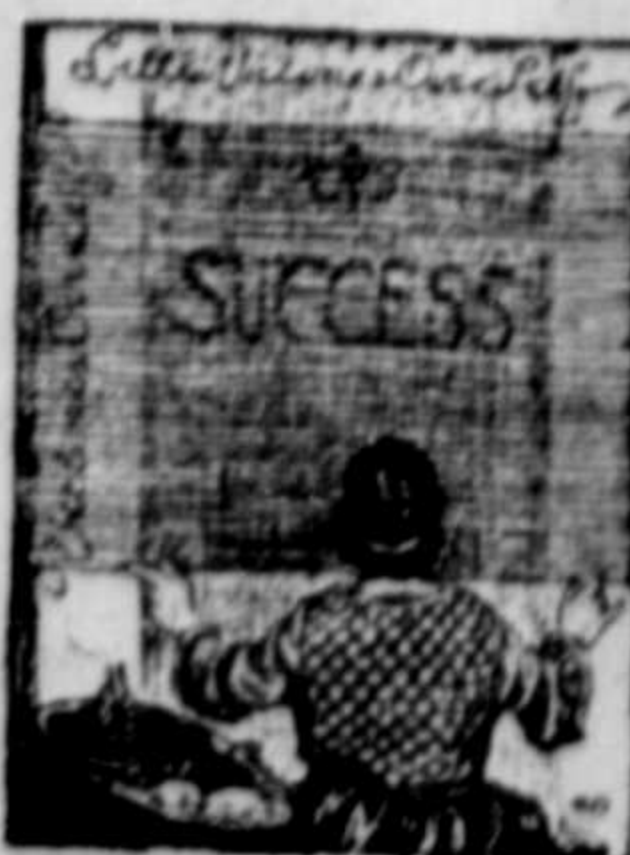

NELLIE MC CLUNG IS TO LIVE IN CALGARY

Moving from Edmonton With
Her Husband: Will Serve
Term in Legislature

EDMONTON, March 9.—Nellie McClung, novelist, lecturer and member for Edmonton in the Alberta Legislature, is leaving to reside in Calgary. She does not want to go, but her husband is going, he having been promoted to manager of a life insurance company for southern Alberta, and Nellie, independent as she is in many things, will tag along in the conventional manner. She has lived in Edmonton eight years.

Both Mr. and Mrs. McClung have been active in public life since coming to Edmonton, he having been transferred to this city from Winnipeg in December 1914 to take charge of the Manufacturers' Life office here. Mr. McClung aside from his prominence in insurance work has been popularly known by his pre-eminence in curling, as a member of the Royal Curling club was one of the most successful and best known skips in the west.

Mrs. McClung was elected as a Liberal member for Edmonton in the provincial elections of July 1921, and has been an outstanding member in the legislature. Her well known ability as an author and lecturer will no doubt benefit the city of Calgary, her new home, as it has Edmonton during her eight years residence here.

NEW COPPER PROCESS PROVES SUCCESSFUL

Test Plant in Constant Operation and Others Being Installed

BOSTON, March 9.—Speaking before the Grand Country Chamber of Commerce at Silver City, G. A. Anderson, assistant general manager of the Chino Copper Co., discussed the development of the Thornhill method of producing sponge iron and the importance of its application to China's ores. Oxidized copper in mixed ores is first dissolved and then reprecipitated in a form that makes it amenable to froth flotation. The economical production of a suitable precipitant has been one of the difficulties in making the process practicable.

Mr. Anderson said additional recoveries and economies effected by the use of sponge iron as a precipitant result in a difference of not less than \$150,000 in the net monthly income to the company on its present mill run. At the Santa Rita mine eleven of the company's 16 steam shovels are in operation. With the entire battery in operation and the consequent increase in ore Mr. Anderson said the savings over and above the present recovery would represent \$250,000 to \$300,000 monthly. On October 3 last, a test plant to produce six tons of sponge iron daily was started. It had been in constant operation since. Now the company plans to erect four furnace units to produce 12½ tons daily under the Thornhill license. Funds have been appropriated for this purpose and plans drawn for the plants.

IMMENSE QUANTITY OF MEAT CONSUMED

WASHINGTON, March 9.—More meat was consumed in the United States last year than in any previous year, the Department of Agriculture announces. The total consumption was estimated at 16,333,000,000 pounds which amounts to 119.7 pounds

per person. The per capita consumption showed an increase of six pounds over 1921 and 6½ pounds over 1920.

PRINCE RUPERT FINEST HARBOR

Technical Description Given by
Harbor Master For Use of
Shippers

ANCHORAGES FOR ALL CRAFT

Nearly all Shipping Facilities to
be Found Including Fine
Drydock

A technical description of Prince Rupert harbor has been prepared by Capt. E. McCoskie, harbor master, as follows:

Prince Rupert Harbor, British Columbia, is entered from Chatham Sound by vessels from the north and by Kinahan Islands and Lima Point, the extreme south point of Digby Island and from the south from Grenville Channel, Arthur Passage, Mallaega Passage, the inside channel and Hecate Strait and Brown Passage on the outside from Langara Island and Dixon Entrance.

Entrance Deep

The depth of water in the course which vessels from the north take at the entrance is from 21 to 29 fathoms and the least depth of water at low water is 14 fathoms southwest of Georgia Rock, which is buoyed with a gas buoy.

The northern entrance is about one and one-half miles wide between Lima Point and the Kinahan Islands. The width is about the same. The width between Digby and Kaien Islands is about the same. The distance from the entrance to the north narrows until it reaches Casey Point from the west, south of Kaien Island, where the width is nearly half a mile at Parizeau Point, on the opposite shore, the entrance widens to half a mile. At Pillsbury Point, on the same side as Casey Point from the west, south of Kaien Island, where the width is nearly half a mile at Parizeau Point, on the opposite shore, the entrance widens to half a mile. At Pillsbury Point, on the same side as Casey Point, the entrance expands to about a mile and continues this width for some distance along the front of the town.

Twenty Fathoms

The water north and south of the town is about 20 fathoms deep and opposite the town 23 to 27 fathoms in the channel and about 26 feet at low water along-side the wharfs.

Note.—See Marine and Fisheries Charts, 304 and 303 and Admiralty Chart 1923A.

The wharfs at Prince Rupert have a 1685 foot frontage, at various angles:

First angle 320 feet
Second angle 350 feet
Third angle 475 feet
Fourth angle 360 feet
Fifth angle 180 feet

The depth of water at all these sections is not less than 25 feet at low water and there are large wharfs and warehouses, two coal docks with 100 and 150 foot frontage respectively.

The Provincial Government wharf is 600 feet long with not less than 25 feet at low water.

Freight sheds and warehouses are located on these wharfs, also fish houses, carrying on business in the fresh fish industry. A new wharf 860 feet long, 170 feet wide, with 35 feet of water along-side at low water, has been built by the Canadian National Railway company, upon this wharf has been erected a warehouse 820 feet long, 148 feet wide, with walls 28 feet high. Electric hoists are now being installed, and it is expected everything will be completed within one month. The railway track runs within two feet of the doors of the warehouse which is one of the finest on the Pacific coast.

The Department of Marine and Fisheries in 1912 completed a lighthouse depot, with wharfs, piers, officers quarters, stores, etc., from this light and buoy services of Northern B.C. are attended.

Anchorages For All Vessels

The anchorage for the harbor is good for vessels of any size and draft.

The Prince Rupert drydock has been in operation for four years. Its length is 600 feet, the width 100 feet, and lifting capacity 20,000 tons. Foundry, and complete machine shops are in connection.

DISCUSSING MARRIAGE IS NOT A PROMISE IN EYES OF ONTARIO JURY

Widow Falls to Annex Forty
Thousand Dollars For Dam-
age to Her Affections

ST. THOMAS, March 9.—Discussing possible marriage with a woman does not constitute a promise to marry, according to a decision of the court in a breach of promise case here in which Mrs. Rose Pinfold sued Benjamin F. Honsinger for \$40,000 damages. Evidence showed that defendant was worth about \$160,000 and the widow, whose affections were alleged to have been damaged, claimed one-fourth that amount as compensation.

Honsinger admitted discussing marriage with the widow but denied making any promise to marry her. Also he denied that he had refused to marry her. The judge thought there had been a mutual understanding but the jury decided otherwise and the case was dismissed.

The discreet pages of the "Temps" have lately been brightened with some highly colored reports on the activity of German propagandists since the Armistice says the Manchester Guardian.

It appears that these unspeakable men not only dispute the Allies' view of war responsibility, but attempt to poison the minds of innocent neutrals with the suggestion that some of the French colonial troops have misbehaved themselves in Germany. This is a matter in which we all ought by this time to have learned to avoid throwing stones. Our Allied propaganda during the war was efficient, and, as everyone now knows, it and the German propaganda often threw aside scruples. We believe the German propaganda was the more untruthful of the two, but that of the Allies did some things which ought to keep us from being censorious for some time to come. Some of the faked photographs of atrocities, for example, have long been notorious.

Of course it is right to examine and answer any post-war misrepresentations that may be issued in Germany, either in print or by way of photograph or film. But it will be well carefully to avoid anything like posing as a pinnacle of virtue when condemning them. Perhaps such methods are indispensable in the waging of a modern war as the use of poisoned gas and air bombs. But their use, all round, seems to impose a certain obligation to practise some all-round reserve in mutual criticism of such performances.
