Order-in-Council Passed at Ottawa Providing for Taking Census of all Chinese People:

OTTAWA, July 28.—Registration of all persons of Chinese SEATTLE SHIP origin and descent in Canada is provided for in an order-incouncil just passed. Immigration inspectors, customs officers or members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police will be the registrars according to residence. The Post Office may be used in some cases. Parents must register children. All Chinese must produce three copies of their photographs "full face with hat." Certificates of landing are also required if they are avail- Inbound Jap Steamer Rammed able. Immigration officials are made controllers of Chinese registration. Regulations governing Chinese in transit through Canada are also promulgated.

Imperial Conference Opens Next October for First Session Since 1918; Many Changes in Personnel

By George Hambleton, Canadian Press Staff Correspondent). OTTAWA, Ont., July 28 .- After five years, the Imperial Conference meets again in October with many and grave problems for solution. Some are of long standing, for they have been before successive Imperial conferences again and again. Others arise from the war and post-war developments, introducing new phases and new situations. And the conference will meet with a vastly changed personnel. Of the delegates of five years ago, only two-Premier Smuts of South Africa, and Premier Massey of New Zealand-will be there in October. The rest have all passed in the eddies and whirlpools of politics.

Transpacific Passenger Business The Next.

Prince Rupert is now established as a shipping point for lumber to the Orient. Two boats have loaded here already and Prince Rupert from the south and indications are that more will continue to come steadify. transpacific freight businss will increase steadily from now on, it is reasonable to expect. The next business will be that of carrying passengers for which Prince Rupert certainly has all the necessary requirements. This port is the terminus of the Canadian National transcontinental railway by which passengers can arrive from or leave for the East. The Canadian Government Merchant Marine boats which call here monthly have accommodation for a few passengers. In order to get a speedjer passage to the Orient than was possible out of Vancouver this week, a passenger came from the south to board the Canadian Highlander for Shanghai on Thursday. While these boats carry passengers only on a small scale, it is to be expected that sooner or later provision will be made for the carrying of large numbers of transpacific passengers from this port.
