GERMANY SEEKS TO BE ABOUT BREAKING UP BIOLOGICAL SUBSTATION LIKELY TO BE ESTABLISHED HERE BEFORE LONG

Rhineland Breaks Away from Germany And Republic Declared Bavaria Also May Separate

AIX-LA-CHAPPELLE, Oct. 22.—The separatists led by Leo Deckers and Dr. Gulhardt, yesterday proclaimed Rhineland a republic. Not a drop of blood was shed although the separatists took possession of the city hall and various public buildings and contract public services.

The regular police ranged themselves on the side of the republic, which is now making its regime effective throughout virtually the entire zone occupied by France and Belgium.

Joseph Matthes, separatist leader, has set up general headquarters at Duren. The French and Belgians placed the telephone system at their disposal in order to keep in close touch with their movements throughout Rhineland.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—The Bavarian premier, Dr. Von Kneiling, has decided that Bavaria cannot remain united with Germany, according to a Berlin despatch.

MANENGE, Germany, Oct. 22.—Rhineland forces entered the city this morning but met with resistance when they attempted to occupy the city hall. Two separatists were wounded in the exchange of shots.

FISHERIES OFFICIALS IN CITY IN COURSE OF COAST INSPECTION TOUR

W. A. Found, assistant deputy minister of fisheries, Ottawa, and Major J. A. Motherwell, chief inspector of fisheries, Vancouver, are in the city in the course of a general inspection tour of Canadian Pacific coast fisheries. They arrived on the fisheries patrol steamer Givenchy Saturday evening after having spent a week on the voyage up the coast, visiting most of the points where fishing is carried on. Tonight they will sail for the Naas River and on the return south will visit Gardner Canal and Knight Inlet, two points they missed coming up. This morning they visited the marine station at Digby Island and this afternoon will inspect the two cruisers being built at the dry dock for the department.

It is Mr. Found's regular triennial inspection tour of the coast.

PETITIONS FAVOR ESKIMO'S MURDERER

Claim Made That the Dwellers in Far North Do Not Understand White Man's Law

TORONTO, Oct. 22.—At least seven petitions demanding stay of execution of two Eskimos recently convicted of murder in the Arctic are being circulated here for signatures. The general argument is that the Eskimos do not understand white man's laws and that at least one of the prisoners is only sixteen years of age. It is suggested that definite action be postponed until at least next spring when communication in the Arctic reopens.

PRINCE IS GIVEN OVATION ON RETURN

Is Officially Announced He Will Visit South Africa Next Spring

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—A considerable crowd assembled outside York House on Saturday and gave the Prince of Wales an ovation on his return from Canada. It is officially announced that the Prince of Wales will visit South Africa next spring completing the tour of the Dominions

Biological Station to be Established here is to Aid Fishing Industry

Being the most important deep sea fishing port on the Pacific coast of Canada, Prince Rupert or the immediate vicinity of the city will undoubtedly be the site of a new sub-station now being planned by the Biological Board of the Department of Fisheries stated W. A. Found, assistant deputy minister of fisheries, in an interview this morning with the Daily News. Not only will research work in connection with the fisheries be conducted at the station but lectures and motion pictures will be given and general educational facilities will be made available for the officers of the fisheries department and the fishermen in order to serve the industry from all standpoints. Power and water supply will be necessary for such a station and the site will have to be selected accordingly. The Biological Board is about to make an investigation into the character of a building to be erected and its surroundings.

Explaining further details in connection with the extended scope of the Biological Board which is to be effected and which was indicated last week when the announcement of the appointment of John Dybahn of this city to that board was made, Mr. Found stated that the object was to make the functioning of the board more intimate and useful to the actual industry. Heretofore, the Board has consisted of university men named by the minister, but now it is to comprise representatives of the industry from the Pacific and Atlantic coasts and a member of the Department of Fisheries will also be added. Particular attention will be given to the practical end of the industry such as the catching of fish and its preparation for market.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—The United fruit, passenger steamer Sangill out from Boston for Havana, reported by radio this morning she is sinking in heavy seas southwest of Jamaica.

Total Fish Pack for Season is Approximately Million and Quarter Cases says Inspector

The salmon pack in District No. 2 has been very satisfactory this season and there is no indication of the depletion of the fisheries particularly as far as sockeye is concerned, states Major J. A. Motherwell, chief inspector of fisheries, who is in the city today in the course of an inspection tour of the coast with W. A. Found, assistant deputy minister of fisheries.

The total pack for the coast this season will be in the neighborhood of 1,250,000 cases, practically the same total as last year. Sockeye fishing has been good on the Skeena River and at Rivers Inlet and Smith's Inlet.

The Fraser River pack has been very small and the Naas River has also been disappointing. Irregular sockeye packs on the Naas River of late years are difficult to account for, stated Major Motherwell. This year the total pack of sockeye for the Naas was set at 16,544 cases as compared with a big pack of 30,000 cases last year.

Practically all the canneries on the coast are now closed and Major Motherwell gave the following estimated figures of the pack for the year up to September 30:

OTTAWA, Oct. 22.—The department of marine and fisheries reports collecting nearly 8,500,000 sockeye salmon eggs from Babine Lake hatchery on the upper Skeena River. The collection exceeds those of previous years and in addition to fish that were stripped for hatchery purposes, a sufficient number ascended the creeks after the fences were removed to abundantly seed the natural spawning grounds.





The use of spruce logs from the Canadian Queen Charlotte Islands for making pulp and paper in an American Puget Sound pulp and paper mill is a matter that ought to receive attention from those who are making contracts for the sale of pulp timber in Alaska, says the Juneau Empire. The company that is purchasing these logs owns a mill on Puget Sound, and last year, wishing to double its output of paper, sought a satisfactory contract from the government for the purchase of pulp timber in Alaska, intending, if successful, to build the 100-ton mill, required to double its producing capacity, up here. It was not satisfied with a contract that provided for the readjustment of the selling price of timber every five years without the purchaser having a right to be a party to the readjustment. Instead of building a paper mill in Alaska, it doubled the size of its Puget Sound mill. Now it is purchasing logs in British Columbia and towing them 400 or 500 miles to its Puget Sound mill.

This would seem to be a concrete case where Canada has profited and Alaska has suffered because the contract offered by the American government to the sale of pulp timber does not provide one price for timber for the entire period of the timberland lease.
