## BRITISH AND TURKS FACE EACH OTHER

### LAUSANNE PEACE NEGOTIATIONS FAIL AND CURZON RETURNS TO ENGLAND

#### Peace Negotiations at Lausanne Break Down and Lord Curzon Goes Home; Armies Facing Each Other

LAUSANNE, Feb. 5. — The Turks on Sunday refused to sign the Near East peace treaty and the conference definitely collapsed. Capitulations and economic clauses were what Turkey refused.

Lord Curzon, the British representative at the conference, for England and the Turks afterwards expressed the opinion that peace was impossible.

Ismet Pasha, head of the Turkish delegation, declared that Turkey had no desire to resume hostilities either against Greece or Great Britain as a result of the collapse of the Near East conference, but said the Turkish and English armies were still facing each other in Asia Minor. He said he would ask the powers whether they considered negotiations officially at an end.

It is believed that misunderstandings which developed between British and French delegations in the last days of the conference, contributed to the final break as the Turks had the idea that they could count on a split among the allies and then obtain more favorable conditions.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—Lord Curzon, foreign minister, who conducted the Near East negotiations at Lausanne for the British government, returned to London this afternoon and immediately proceeded to an urgent cabinet meeting which has been called to consider the proceedings at Lausanne.

#### SAAR MINERS WENT ON STRIKE TODAY

PARIS, Feb. 5. — The miners of the Saar Valley, which produces nine million tons of coal annually, went on strike this morning.

#### NEW PUBLIC WORKS DISTRICT ENGINEER COMING THIS WEEK

Major R. M. Taylor, of Vernon, to Succeed A. L. Carruthers — Married Man With Family

Major R. M. Taylor, of Vernon, assistant provincial public works engineer for Okanagan district, who will succeed A. L. Carruthers, provincial public works engineer in this district, is expected to arrive in the city on the steamer Prince George Wednesday. Major Taylor is a married man with a family and his wife and children it is understood will arrive later.

Mr. Carruthers, who has been appointed provincial inspector of bridges, expects to leave for Victoria with his family on February 16.

#### PROVINCIAL ELECTION IN QUEBEC TODAY

Voting Marks End of Vigorous Campaign Characterized by Much Divided Interest in Cities

MONTREAL, Feb. 5.—Voting is being placed today in the Quebec provincial elections in 78 of the 85 ridings. The other seven went by acclamation, those returned without contest including Speaker Francoeur, Hon. J. E. O'Brien, minister of agriculture, and Hon. A. Galipeault, minister of public works.

Today's voting marks the end of a very vigorous campaign in the cities which have been the battlegrounds for both the leadership of the Liberal government and the opposition. In Montreal the election has aroused more interest than any provincial contest for ten years.

#### BOMB THROWN AT PREMIER

No One Injured in Attempt to Assassinate Bulgaria's Minister

SOFIA, Feb. 5. — A bomb was thrown in the direction of Premier Stamboulsky while seated in a box in the National Theatre last night with three of his ministers. No one was injured by the explosion.

The bomb thrower escaped.

#### JANUARY FISH

Halibut 1,865,100 lbs., Black Cod 31,100 lbs., Crabs 400 lbs., Says Official Report

Halibut amounting to 1,865,100 pounds and valued at \$244,557 was landed at this port during the month of January according to the official report of the fisheries department issued today. Of this amount of halibut 1,486,800 pounds worth \$199,463 was from American bottoms.

Black cod landed during the month totalled 31,100 pounds in poundage and \$1,283 in value, 15,700 pounds or \$667 worth being American. Crab landings during the month totalled 400 pounds valued at \$20.

#### BIG FIRE TODAY AT WICHITA, KANSAS

WICHITA, Kansas, Feb. 5. — Four persons were killed and at least thirty injured and some are likely to die as a result of a fire which wiped out the Gette building, one of the city's landmarks.

#### BIG CANNERY DEAL CLOSED

Canadian Fishing Co. Buys Bute-dale, Margaret Bay, Shushartie Bay, Lagoon Bay and Crab River Plants

The Bute-dale, Margaret Bay, Shushartie Bay and Crab River canneries, formerly owned by the Western Packers, and the Lagoon Bay Cannery, formerly owned by the Ocean Packing Co., have become the property of the Canadian Fishing Co., Ltd. according to an announcement made in Vancouver last week by A. L. Hager, president of the Canadian Fishing Co. This marks the consummation of a deal preliminary negotiations of which were reported some days ago in the Daily News.

The deal is said to be one of the biggest in the coast fishing business for many years and it includes not only the canneries but the company buildings and all other equipment. These consist of residences and stores, light and power plants and docks and wharves.

It is understood that it is the intention of the Canadian Fishing Co. to put all the plants in operation this season. The Bute-dale, Shushartie Bay and Margaret Bay plants were not operating last summer.

Shushartie Bay Cannery on Vancouver Island is a well equipped plant employing 25 men. The Margaret Bay Cannery on Smith's Island is a larger plant employing 90 men. Bute-dale on Princess Royal Island not far south of Prince Rupert, is the biggest plant in the deal. It consists of a modern cannery and cold storage plant employing some 150 men. Crab River cannery is a small one on Gardner Canal, Lagoon Bay, which was operated under lease by the Canadian Fishing Co. last year, is located on Queen Charlotte Islands and will employ about 25 men.

The Canadian Fishing Co., Ltd. includes the operations of the New England and Allyn Fisheries on the Canadian coast. The head plant is in Vancouver and there are branches at Prince Rupert, Kelchikan and Seattle in the halibut business.

It has been ascertained locally that there is no cannery at Crab River although two years ago a license to build one was granted. The cold storage plant at Bute-dale is to be made a centre for the distribution of ice and bait to the New England's Co.'s fleet and also for the canneries and fish boats in the neighborhood. It will be convenient for the boats plying out of Vancouver to get ice and bait on their way to the halibut banks and also as a base for short trips into the southern part of Heate Straits.

#### GENERAL LUDENDORFF MET WITH CURSES ON A VISIT TO VIENNA

VIENNA, Feb. 5.—When the German General Ludendorff came to Vienna to address the National Peasant Congress he was met by socialist workers with curses. Fighting developed with pan-German irregulars and several were wounded. Street decorations were torn down and burned.

#### TIDAL WAVE IN HAWAII

Loss of Life on Hilo Island 10 or 12—Property Damage May Amount to \$1,500,000

HONOLULU, Feb. 5.—The inhabitants of Hilo Island, of the Hawaiian group, are today taking stock of the result of tidal waves which swept the district Saturday with an estimated loss of life of 10 or 12 persons and property damage which, though as yet undetermined, may run as high as \$1,500,000. The damage at Hilo alone is placed at \$100,000.

#### SERVE BEER TO MEMBERS SAYS JUDGE

Decision Given in Favor of G.W.V.A. Where Tokens Are Used

VANCOUVER, Feb. 5. — A decision of Judge Cayley, given at the week end, upholding the system adopted by the Vancouver branch of the G.W.V.A. in distributing beer to members upon receipt of tokens previously purchased from the club secretary, is likely to have a far reaching effect. Similar clubs throughout British Columbia will be legally entitled to practice the same method of beer distributing to members.

#### CORINTHIAN TEAM MAY VISIT CANADA AND PLAY IN WEST

MONTREAL, Feb. 5.—The Dominion Football Association is planning to get the Corinthians British football team to tour Canada during the coming summer. The tentative itinerary includes Victoria and Nanaimo.

#### OVER HALF MILLION AT FOOTBALL GAMES FOR CUP MATCHES

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The crowds attending Saturday's cup football games totalled 598,000 and the receipts for the day in the same matches amounted to \$40,600, an increase over the same events for last year.

#### BANDIT CAUGHT BOARDING TRAIN

Restored \$1334 of Money Stolen From Express Car at Regina

REGINA, Feb. 5.—W. M. Purvis, alias Curtis, who was arrested while running for the train Saturday, admitted that he was the bandit who held up the Canadian National No. 6, in the Regina yards on Thursday. He restored \$1,334 in cash and valuable papers taken from the bags while the bound and gagged messenger looked on.

Laundry marks on the handkerchief used for the gag led to the police getting a head on Purvis, who involuntarily answered to his name while boarding the train when hailed by a detective.

#### Prince Rupert as Shipping Port for Grain is Dealt with by Prince George Newspaper

Under a heading which declares that "Elevators for Prince Rupert are now a National Need," the Prince George Citizen in a recent issue says that this port is the logical place for grain facilities for shipping to the Orient. It deals with the situation as affects Prince Rupert in a convincing and concise manner as follows:

While the bigger ports of Vancouver and Victoria are clamoring for greater elevator facilities in view of the fight in which Alberta has joined hands with British Columbia to secure the western routing of grain, Prince Rupert stands in the background a strong argument in the locality with her natural advantages distinct of the Pacific terminus, regarded.

When the Grand Trunk Pacific railway was under construction a lot was heard about the port of Prince Rupert as the logical shipping centre for traffic to the Orient. When the west flattened out under the collapse of the "Pacific Bubble," after boom days, the prospects of Prince Rupert as an Oriental port took second place to the immediate opportunities of her splendid fishing resources.

The fishing fleet that operates out of Prince Rupert, lands its catch at the docks there 500 miles near a market than would be the case if other railroads had to be used. The fact that the fish are caught in the seas contiguous to Prince Rupert is the only thing that saves that port from being raided for the benefits of this traffic, and it is this fish tonnage over the National lines that keeps the daily train service going today.

#### Vancouver Busy

With new elevators, which have just been arranged for, the port of Vancouver will probably have facilities for the handling of 10,000,000 bushels of wheat next season. Victoria is also in the running, with elevators in the arrangements of that port.

The westward movement of wheat means additional business and additional prosperity over the lines that this wheat is moving on, but the old Grand Trunk Pacific section of the National system, from the mountains west of Prince Rupert will not share in this prosperity unless elevator facilities are secured at Prince Rupert.

The striking economic advantage that Prince Rupert possesses over her competitors in shipments of wheat to the Orient is found in the fact that Rupert is 500 miles closer to the treaty ports across the Pacific than Vancouver or Victoria. Ships leaving the southern ports named, direct their courses north until they reach the latitude of Prince Rupert before they commence the Pacific crossing. This is a principal of navigation that is fixed by the men who plough the Pacific in Canadian ships.

#### Has Port Facilities

Prince Rupert has a 20,000-ton floating drydock owned and operated by the Canadian National Railways and there is a considerable shipbuilding plant in the harbor. There are ample dockage facilities there and plenty of room to extend these when the port reaches its logical development.

There is some discussion in progress concerning the possible removal of the Prince Rupert drydock to Vancouver. This would be a catastrophe for the whole northern section of British Columbia. Such action would take away from the northern port the very facilities which still give a right to hark back to the boasts that were made of Prince Rupert advantages in the Oriental highway, during the days when the development of these formed 79.

#### PREPARE FOR BIG BATTLE SOUTH CHINA

CANTON, Feb. 4.—With 40,000 troops marching on Canton to reclaim the southern capital from Sun Yat Sen, a sanguinary battle is imminent. Foreign warships are anchored in the river today for the purpose of protecting the nationals. Conditions in the city are chaotic. All business houses are closed and barricaded.

#### PARTY ON SATURDAY

Retiring Civic Heads and Members of Staffs Had Farewell Get-Together

Retiring heads of the civic departments and members of the present inside and outside staffs had a lively party in the St. Regis Cafe on Saturday evening. The affair was in the nature of a farewell get-together. It started at 8:30 and with the splendid spread provided by Mr. and Mrs. Richmond, speeches, songs, cards, dancing and music the hours fled all too speedily until 3 a.m. when the gathering dispersed. There were about 40 persons present and E. A. Woods presided, those seated around him at the head table being T. C. Duncan, T. B. Hooper, Mrs. Woods, and W. D. Vance. The time was spent in a very jolly manner although there was a tinge of regret on account of the departure of the departmental heads.

KETCHIKAN MEN ARE ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF IMPORTING LIQUOR

Conspiracy to Import British Columbia Liquor Into Alaska is Charged

On a complaint made yesterday by Fred E. Handy, deputy United States marshal, C. J. Bailey, Bert Barclay and George Kolendich were arrested charged with conspiracy to violate the laws of the United States, says the Ketchikan Alaska Chronicle.

The defendants were admitted to bail last night in the sum of \$1,000 each and their preliminary hearing was set for Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.

Kolendich, who was arrested the previous day on a charge of having intoxicating liquor in his possession, was given a trial before the commissioner yesterday afternoon, without a jury.

## DETENTION FOR ALL DISEASED

That is Proposal Made by Meeting at Victoria: Dr. Young's Plea

VICTORIA, Feb. 5. — At the meeting held under the auspices of the Vancouver Island Council for Social Hygiene on Tuesday evening, Dr. H. E. Young gave an address on the need of a detention home for sufferers from venereal disease, his plea being the basis of a resolution, as follows:—"That whereas there are persons who are careless in regard to continuing treatment by a registered medical practitioner, or who are vicious and uncontrolled, and whereas all such persons fail to complete treatment and are a danger to the public health;

"Therefore, be it resolved that a detention home is necessary; that the executive be instructed to consider the type of home adequate to the purpose and that the public be educated to such necessity, and to urge the same upon the government. Further, that the government be urged to appoint follow-up nurses to the clinics already established."

Medical Opinion  
"I am of the opinion that such a detention home would have a salutary effect in making sufferers take the treatment at the clinic as the lesser of two evils," said Dr. Young in advancing his plea. "The public still wrongly differentiates between venereal disease and other infectious diseases. You put a man with smallpox in a pest-house. Why not this other, more terrible 'pox,' in the pest-house?"

"Smallpox has not one particle of the loathsomeness of these other terrible diseases. It affects the individual only. Syphilis affects the children from generation to generation. Its horror can be seen in the Marpole annex at Essondale, where 98 per cent of the incurables are there as the direct result of syphilis."

Hideous Heritage  
"If a man won't submit to treatment, if he is a detriment to the race, a liability to the state, and if he will persist in propagating children who can never be an asset to the nation because of their hideous heritage, then I say that we should put him in jail and force him to take the treatment which will make him a sound and safe asset to the community."

## THEY MARRY THEN WHAT?

Maurice Tourneur's "Foolish Matrons" is an Unusual Picture

This story concerns three women who constitute a molecule of social New York. Each belongs to a separate household. Each works out her own destiny; yet each reacts on the other. There is the woman who, possessing youth, beauty and other polite accomplishments, yet finds herself in an environment that cramps and dwarfs her personality—the woman who too often marries in order to find the social opportunity that is otherwise denied her. She thinks that she loves the man whom she marries; but really what she loves are the pleasures, innocent or not, to which marriage is the open door. Such a woman need not be, like Georgina Wayne, actually hampered by living in a small town. It is, after all, nothing but the great zod respectability which keeps her from following in the footsteps of her more "brazen" sister who gets what she wants without the formality of marriage.

### Cold and Selfish

There is the woman cold and selfish, to whom marriage is little more than membership in a club to which one ought to belong because it is the thing to do. Such women need not be like Sheila Hopkins, a newspaper reporter; she may not be seeking fame as a writer. It is necessary only that she love herself more than anything in the world.

Lastly, there is the woman, who unblushingly acknowledges "If I ever find my man I will use every art I know to get him—and keep him"—the woman who considers that the secret of happiness for her is to make some man happy. Some people believe that this type of woman is out of date. They call her "old-fashioned." But secretly they envy her, whether she be a celebrated actress like Annis Grand or just plain Mrs. Smith next door.

### Noble Woman

The story of Annis Grand is the story of a noble woman who has achieved success on the stage, yet who, through all the years of hard work, has never lost her ideal of complete self-expression. Through accident, she meets Dr. Ian Fraser, a distinguished surgeon, to whose hospital the actress is carried after her automobile has been wrecked in a collision with a street car.

Annis' first anxiety concerns her face. The doctor, deeming her another of the shallow society beauties whose uselessness he despises, answers roughly that her face is all right. But when he learns that she is an actress and that her face is her

"bread and butter," as she says, he treats her more gently and soon becomes interested in her.

### They Marry

Annis learns from the nurse that the doctor has two sides of his character; that he is capable of chagging a wealthy pawnbroker \$10,000 for an operation, while from a poor washer-woman he refuses to take any fee for curing her crippled child.

Ian, on his side, is interested in this woman who does things. At the earliest opportunity he asks her to marry him, blissfully unconscious of how deliberately she has led him on to the proposal.

### KELLY'S CUT IS RECALLED

Must Have Been Editor Cowper Who Refers to "Gallant Bill Lynch"

#### PRIDE IN RUPERT

Protest at Removal of Drydock is Discussed in Editorial Article

A leading article, evidently from the pen of editor Cowper, formerly editor of the Prince Rupert Daily News, deals with the drydock situation in the Vancouver World under the heading "Our Young Brother Up North," with the subhead "It is always those we love the most who cause us the most pain." It is interestingly expressed although Prince Rupert people will not agree that the focal position was either "silly," or "mock heroic." The editorial article follows: "There is something beautifully boyish about the threat of the Prince Rupert people that while they are a law-abiding and generally have been a peaceful people they will not permit a tug to come here and tow that dock away." While that spirit prevails there is no fear of our northern neighbor's future. It is silly, it is mock-heroic, but it is splendid; like the readiness of the youth in his first long pants to "knock the block off" anyone who dares to look admiringly at his best girl.

If the Canadian National Railway, as lessees of the dock, should decide to move it to where their fleet of ships can best use it, there is no more possibility of the Prince Rupert citizenry with shotguns and violent speeches preventing its removal, than if any other company wanted to move its own property. Nor is it to the interest of Prince Rupert to have the dock used uneconomically when it might be used economically. And to invoke the memory of gallant "Bill" Lynch and the Battle of Kelly's Cut in an effort to frighten its big brother, Vancouver, is a cruel blow, for there are several Vancouver citizens who packed guns on that memorable occasion outside Pete Black's hostelry, and many, many more who still hold their Prince Rupert real estate and pay their tax bills regularly.

#### Educate Readers

This journal has consistently sought to educate its readers to the great resources and the inevitable great future of the "new north." It has found a ready response, for Vancouver feels a real interest in the welfare of Prince Rupert and the country bordering the Grand Trunk Pacific. Vancouver never protested against the north having two representatives in the provincial cabinet while Vancouver has none; nor has it protested against the selection of a man from Prince Rupert to be the representative from British Columbia on the board of directors of the Canadian National system.

Vancouver has always felt a sort of pride in its vigorous younger brother. And it feels something akin to amused pride at the spirit which—however foolishly and unjustly—finds expression in talks of boycott and threats of force.

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### REFUGEES ARE IN BAD PLIGHT

Greeks and Turks Suffering as Result of Conflict Between Nations

#### MADDENED BY HUNGER

Great Part of Two Millions Will Perish if Aid is Not Forthcoming

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 5.— One hundred thousand refugees are seriously ill or dying on the coasts of Asia Minor, Thrace and the Greek mainland. No nation as such has come forward to help them. Private relief organizations seem helpless to cope with the entire problem. It is too vast. Greece is face to face with a social catastrophe. Internal order and security are menaced by the hordes of starving and distracted fugitives pouring into the country.

Famine and disease are stalking through Anatolia, Thrace and the Aegean Islands. Women and children are dying everywhere. Even so great and precious a thing as mother-love cannot survive the agony and despair wrought by the sudden breaking up of families and homes. At Famsoun, on the Black Sea, mothers in their desperation are abandoning their children and leaving for their lives on board any ship that will take them. The parentless children are left to the merciful hands of American women relief workers. Their fathers have long been deported or killed.

#### Robbing and Sacking

In Thrace, Greek soldiers and refugees, maddened by hunger, are robbing and sacking the countryside. In Constantinople, a city of a thousand sorrows, pedestrians at night stumble over the half-dead forms of children huddled in doorways and alleys. Today a caravan of dejected and exhausted refugees from Anatolia swarmed up the Grande Rue de Pera in the capital like famished wolves. Fifty thousand Turkish refugees, 45,000 Greeks and Armenians, and 44,000 Russians fill the capital's cup of misery to overflowing.

Typhus, smallpox, and dysentery are devastating the refugee areas in Thrace, Pireaus and Salonica. In Anatolia, where the Greek army burned, sacked, and killed, there are 600,000 shelterless Turkish peasants, whose plight is rendered doubly acute by heavy snows and lack of clothing. In the great storm of indignation following the Smyrna fire, they have been forgotten. Many of them are innocent, law-abiding, home-loving tillers of the soil, who deserve some measure of the world's sympathy.


#### Fuel, Shelter, Clothing

Correspondents who have travelled throughout the affected territories report that unless foreign government relief measures are undertaken, a majority of the two million or more refugees will perish this winter. There is virtually no fuel, no shelter, no clothing. The relief work of the Athens and Ankara governments is pitifully inadequate. They are both bankrupt. Help must come from the outside and as yet this help has not proved effective, particularly in Salonica, Thrace, Constantinople and the Aegean Islands.

Autos driving in the same part of the street continuously during the long thaw have made ruts in the new macadam roads and in some places the roads will need almost immediate repairs to prevent their going to pieces.

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and second-class land to be \$5 an acre, second-class to be \$2.50 an acre.  
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.  
Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.  
Pre-emptors must occupy claim for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least a "tree" before receiving Crown Grant.  
Where pre-emptor in occupation more than 3 years, and has made improvements, he may be granted a term certificate of pre-emption and transfer his claim. Residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$20 per acre and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in three 5 years, and improvement of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.  
Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he remains in occupation with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.  
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads. Title is obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.  
For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be used by one person or company.  
Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stumpage.  
Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with the Majesty's Forces. The one within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.  
No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by holders on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.  
Provision for return of moneys accrued due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, less of taxes on moneys, pre-emptions.  
Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of the military or naval forces, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS  
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase involving forfeiture on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1923.

GRAZING  
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.  
Annual grazing permits issued based on number of animals, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Fees, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers of travellers, up to ten head.
