# BRITISH AND TURKS FACE EACH OTHER

## LAUSANNE PEACE NEGOTIATIONS FAIL AND CURZON RETURNS TO ENGLAND

### Peace Negotiations at Lausanne Break Down and Lord Curzon Goes Home; Armies Facing Each Other

LAUSANNE, Feb. 5.—The Turks on Sunday refused to sign the Near East peace treaty and the conference definitely lapsed. Capitulations and economic clauses were what Turkey refused.

Lord Curzon, the British representative at the conference, for England and the Turks afterwards expressed the opinion of peace was impossible.

Ismet Pasha, head of the Turkish delegation, declared that Turkey had no desire to resume hostilities either against France or Great Britain as a result of the collapse of the Near East conference, but said the Turkish and English armies were still facing each other in Asia Minor. He said he would ask powers whether they considered negotiations officially at an

It is believed that misunderstandings which developed between British and French delegations in the last days of the conference, contributed to the final break as the Turks had the idea that they could count on a split among the allies and then gain more favorable conditions.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—Lord Curzon, foreign minister, who conducted the Near East negotiations at Lausanne for the British government, returned to London this afternoon and immediately proceeded to an urgent cabinet meeting which has been called to consider the proceedings at Lausanne.

Today's voting marks the end of a very vigorous campaign in cities which have been the battlegrounds for both the leaders of the Liberal government and the opposition. In Montreal election has aroused more divided interest than any previous contest for ten years.

### DETENTION FOR ALL DISEASED

That is Proposal Made by Meeting at Victoria: Dr. Young's Plea

VICTORIA, Feb. 5.—At the meeting held under the auspices of the Vancouver Island Council for Social Hygiene on Tuesday evening, Dr. H. E. Young gave an address on the need of a detention home for sufferers from venereal disease, his plea being the basis of a resolution, as follows:

"That whereas there are persons who are careless in regard to continuing treatment by a registered medical practitioner, or who are vicious and uncontrolled, and whereas all such persons fail to complete treatment and are a danger to the public health;

"Therefore, be it resolved that a detention home is necessary; that the executive be instructed to continue canvassing after the new manager succeeds Mr. Venables has been quite to the purpose and that the public be educated to such necessity, and to urge the same upon the government. Further, that the government be urged to appoint follow-up nurses to the clinics already established."

## MC CAFFERY MAKES IT CLEAR TO VANCOUVER RUPERT'S POSITION

Says Blockade of Vancouver  
Business Will Be Complete  
if Dock Goes

In an interview given the Vancouver Province M. P., McCaffery makes Prince Rupert's position clear to the people of the south.

He says: Any attempt to move the Dominion government floating drydock away from Prince Rupert will be fought to the last ditch by the people of the northern city, according to Mr. M. P. McCaffery, ex-mayor and past president of the Board of Trade of Prince Rupert, who was a Vancouver visitor on Wednesday.

If Vancouver plays any part in inducing the management of the Canadian National railways to move the dock to Burrard Inlet, a rigid boycott of all Vancouver business will be instituted by Prince Rupert, Mr. McCaffery declares.

"The drydock is absolutely vital to Prince Rupert and we intend to keep it there," said Mr. McCaffery. "If through the representations made by Vancouver the dock is moved away the citizens of Prince Rupert will band themselves together to see that not one dollar's worth of goods is purchased in Vancouver."

### Serious to Vancouver

This would be serious blow to the business of this city, Mr. McCaffery continued. No less than twelve ships leave Vancouver each week carrying supplies to the northern port, he states.

"We are informed that representations were made to Sir Henry Thornton when he was in Vancouver looking to the removal of the dock from Prince Rupert. All I can say is if such a move is made Vancouver had better look out," added Mr. McCaffery.

"During the past ten years the Dominion government has spent \$50,000,000 in Vancouver. Prince Rupert takes no exception to this. We are proud of the great development that has taken place in this city," he said.

## DOMESTICATE MARTEN IS LATEST SCHEME

**Alaska Trapper Going to Try to Raise This Valuable Fur on Ranch; Blackhorn Sheep**

J. B. Palmer, an old-timer from the days of '96, now in Anchorage, tells the newspapers there when he returns to his trapping grounds in the Big Nenana, he is going to try and capture a pair of full-grown marten, box them and ship them to his ranch at Wasilla, and when the young arrive, domesticate and breed them.

Mr. Palmer relates while trapping recently near the head of the Matanuska fork, looking through his field glasses he detected at a distance of approximately two miles four mountain sheep. Taking particular note of their markings he discovered they had black horns and tails. Five years ago Jimmy St. Clair, another well known Alaskan, came into camp one day and said he had seen sheep of this same description at the head of Boulder creek. As this species of mountain sheep is so very seldom seen, St. Clair wrote to the Smithsonian Institute for data, receiving the information that the institute had no record of sheep so marked, and asked him if possible to give them more details, or send a specimen.

Mr. Palmer states that securing a specimen is almost an impossibility.

### THEY MARRY THEN WHAT?

Maurice Tourneur's "Foolish Matrons" is an Unusual Picture

This story concerns three women who constitute a molecule of social New York. Each belongs to a separate household. Each works out her own destiny; yet each meets on the other.

There is the woman who, possessing youth, beauty and other polite accomplishments, yet finds herself in an environment that cramps and dwarfs her personality—the woman who too often marries in order to find the social opportunity that is otherwise denied her. She thinks that she loves the man whom she marries; but really what she loves are the pleasures, innocent or not, to which marriage is the open door. Such a woman need not be like Georgina Wayne, actually hampered by living in a small town. It is, after all, nothing but the great respectability which keeps her from following in the footsteps of her more "brazen" sister who gets what she wants without the formality of marriage.

#### Cold and Selfish

There is the woman cold and selfish, to whom marriage is little more than membership in a club to which one ought to belong because it is the thing to do. Such women need not be seeking fame as a writer. It is necessary only that she love herself more than anything in the world.

## KELLY'S CUT IS RECALLED

Must Have Been Editor Cowper  
Who Refers to "Gallant Bill  
Lynch"

### PRIDE IN RUPERT

Protest at Removal of Drydock Is  
Discussed in Editorial  
- Article

A leading article, evidently from the pen of editor Cowper, formerly editor of the Prince Rupert Daily News, deals with the drydock situation in the Vancouver World under the heading "Our Young Brother Up North," with the subhead "It is always those we love the most who cause us the most pain." It is interestingly expressed although Prince Rupert people will not agree that the focal position was either "silly," or "mock heroic." The editorial article follows:

There is something beautifully boyish about the threat of the Prince Rupert people that while they "are a law-abiding and generally have been a peaceful people they will not permit a tug to come here and tow that dock away." While that spirit prevails there is no fear of our northern neighbor's future. It is silly, it is mock-heroic, but it is splendid; like the readiness of the youth in his first long pants to "knock the dock off" anyone who dares to look admiringly at his best girl.

If the Canadian National Railways, as lessees of the dock, should decide to move it to where their fleet of ships can best use it, there is no more possibility of the Prince Rupert citizenry with shotguns and violent speeches preventing its removal, than if any other company wanted to move its own property. Nor is it to the interest of Prince Rupert to have the dock used uneconomically when it might be used economically. And to invoke the memory of gallant "Bill" Lynch and the Battle of Kelly's Cut in an effort to frighten its big brother, Vancouver, is a cruel blow, for there are several Vancouver citizens who packed guns on that memorable occasion outside Pete Black's hostelry, and many, many more who still hold their Prince Rupert real estate and pay their tax bills regularly.

**Educate Readers**

This journal has consistently sought to educate its readers to the great resources and the inevitable great future of the "new north." It has found a ready response, for Vancouver feels a real interest in the welfare of Prince Rupert and the country bordering the Grand Trunk Pacific. Vancouver never protested against the north having two representatives in the provincial cabinet while Vancouver has none; nor has it protested against the selection of a man from Prince Rupert to be the representative from British Columbia on the board of directors of the Canadian National system.

Vancouver has always felt a sort of pride in its vigorous younger brother. And it feels something akin to amused pride at the spirit which — however foolishly and unjustly — finds expression in talk of boycott and threats of force.

It is always those we love the most who cause us the most pain."

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and  
reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to  
\$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to sur-  
veyed land only.

Records will be granted covering only  
land suitable for agricultural purposes  
and which is non-timbered land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished;

but parties of more than four may  
have joint pre-emption, but each making  
necessary improvements on respective  
claims.

Pre-emptors must obtain claims for  
timber and make improvements to  
value of \$10 per acre, including clearing  
and cultivation of at least 5 acres  
before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor makes improvement  
more than 5 acres and has made no  
timber claim, he may receive a  
timbered intermediate certificate of  
improvement.

Records without permanent resi-  
dence may be issued, provided applic-  
ant makes improvements to extent of  
\$250 per annum and records same  
in year. Payment for improvements  
or record same will operate as to  
fees. Title cannot be obtained in  
less than 45 years, and improvements  
of \$100 per acre, including clearing  
and cultivation, and residence of  
at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant  
may record another pre-emption, if he  
remains in continuous confinement with  
his wife without actual separation, pro-  
vided statutory improvements made  
and residence maintained on Crown  
granted land.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20  
acres may be leased as homesteads,  
title to be obtained after fulfilling residential  
and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes  
areas exceeding 20 acres may be  
leased by one person or company.

Mill or factory or industrial sites on  
timber land not exceeding 40 acres  
may be purchased; conditions include  
payment of stamp duty.

Areas in swamps inaccessible  
by existing roads may be purchased  
conditional upon construction of a road  
to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of  
road, not exceeding half of purchase  
price, made.

### PRE-EMPTOR'S FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to  
include persons joining and serv-  
ing with His Majesty's Forces. The  
time within which the heirs or devisees  
of a deceased pre-emptor may apply  
for title is extended to one year from the  
death of such person, as formerly, until one  
year after the conclusion of the great  
war. This privilege is also made re-  
versible.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are  
due or payable by soldiers on pre-  
emptions recorded after June 26, 1918.

Costs for return of money ac-  
cumulated due and paid since August  
1, 1914, on account of payments, fees  
or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on amounts paid by members of  
Alien Forces, or dependents acquired  
direct or indirect, remitted from en-  
titlement to March 31, 1920.

### SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of  
crown grants to sub-purchasers of  
lands according to rights from  
purchasers who failed to make payment  
or purchase, involving forfeiture, on ful-  
fillment of conditions of purchase, inter-  
ests and taxes. Where sub-purchas-  
ers do not claim, or if original pur-  
chaser's purchase price due and taxes may  
be distributed proportionately over  
whole area. Applications must be made  
by May 1, 1923.

### GRAZING ACT.

Grazing Act 1914 for systematic  
development of districts. Individual pur-  
suits for grazing districts and range  
administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based  
on numbers ranged, priority for estab-  
lished ranges.

Native Americans may form  
associations for range management.

Free, or partially free, permits  
for settlers, campers or travellers, up  
to ten head.
