Tomorrow begins a new year. The old one passes without any regrets. It has been a period of chastening. To a few the chastening has been too severe and they have fallen under it. To others it has been a stimulus to greater activity, increased keenness and greater watchfulness. It brought the message that the old era of speculation, of careless spending and of high finance had passed. To many who had been denied the right to work for a living it brought irritation and, in some cases, despondency; to others it brought the desire to agitate for a change that would make another such a year as 1932 impossible.

The new year is full of hope for betterment. Every day that passes brings us nearer the time when the industries of the country will once more be flourishing and the unemployed working. There may be no return to conditions as they were in 1928 but there should be a gradual improvement commencing early in the new year. It is difficult to say much about Prince Rupert just now. We have had our setback like other places. As important factors in the production of food, the people here have been as hard hit as the farmers, grain growers, poultry raisers and fruit growers. By spring it is hoped the price of food commodities will have advanced to a point where production of halibut will be profitable. A few cents would make all the difference between profit and loss. The fishermen have learned to operate economically. Now every advance in price will prove a very material

The advance in food prices is bound to come soon and, with it, will come greater prosperity for failed in the past, will not fail turn to Vancouver and waypoints noon. this time. Because of this and in spite of the inability of the people's leaders to take effective action, we know that better times are close ahead. The natural law of rotation insures improvement in the very near future.




