The new church will take the place of the former one which was destroyed by fire a couple of months ago. It will be similar in size to the old one but will be in a more central location directly across from the Community Hall.

Tenders will be called later for the erection of the parsonage which was also destroyed in the fire.

ROME, Sept. 12.—It is semi-officially announced that Italy is not prepared to consider any mediation or arbitration of her differences with Jugo Slavia with regard to the status of Fiume, since the question is said to be one for direct settlement between the two countries.

#### STACK BODIES FOR CREMATION

Curious Effects of Earthquake in Japan; Many Sleep Out of Doors

TOKIO, Sept. 12.—Investigation by the authorities of Honjo district, that part of Tokio hemmed in by the sea, the Sumida River and canals showed loss of life very heavy. Residents of this quarter of the capital were trapped in the flames which followed the earthquake. The ruins were crowded with dead and the majority are believed to have been suffocated.

In various parts of Tokio the bodies are being stacked for cremation. Probably three-fourths of the houses in Tokio are uninhabitable while half the capital is destroyed. The other half was severely damaged.

Thousands of the people here who sleep outdoors no doubt prefer to do so as the earthquakes continue, some rather sharp.

Arrivals from the Hakone Mountains describe the remarkable effects of the earthquakes there, where mountains have toppled over filling up the valleys and burying alive hundreds of persons. It will take weeks to dispose of the dead in Tokio, Yokohama and surrounding centres. Kawasaki, a manufacturing centre, is wiped out.

#### BATTLESHIP HITS LINER

Texas in Collision With Vessel of Isthmian Line Off Coast

SAN PEDRO, Sept. 12.—The battleship Texas, en route from San Francisco here with five other battleships, collided with the steamer Star Seafarer in the Isthmian line, 14 miles north of Point Arguello early this morning in a dense fog. The collision occurred near where seven destroyers ran aground. The merchantman was badly damaged, it is reported.

#### GROSS EARNINGS OF RAILWAY KEEP UP

MONTREAL, Sept. 12.—The gross earnings of the Canadian National Railways for the week ending Sept. 7 were \$4,791,656, being an increase of \$100,189 or two per cent as compared with the corresponding week of 1922.

The gross earnings from January 1 to Sept. 7 have been \$164,520,721, an increase of \$17,675,303 as compared with the corresponding period of 1922.

#### INSURANCE COMPANIES IN JAPAN ARE RUINED

OSAKA, Sept. 12.—Insurance companies in Japan are ruined. Their liabilities are about \$11,000,000,000 or about eight times their capitalization.

#### PRINCE LIVES LIKE OTHERS

Travelled as Private Citizen Across Atlantic and is at Quebec Today

QUEBEC, Sept. 12.—The Prince of Wales, travelling as Lord Renfrew, arrived this morning on the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of France en route to his ranch in Alberta where he will stay a month, testing the simple life. He did not leave the boat until three hours after he arrived. Then he drove in a automobile to the Chateau Frontenac to spend the day and night, when he will leave for the Canadian west.

The Prince's wish that his arrival in Canada shall be inconspicuous and should not be the occasion for a demonstration of any kind, was well respected.

Officers of the liner said the prince thoroughly enjoyed himself on the trip over. He mixed freely with the passengers and took part in all the dances. On the Sunday he read the lesson at the service. His genial manner made way commissioners in town an easy task for everybody to regard him simply as an ordinary traveller. He registered on the passenger list as "Lord Renfrew, London."

#### District Exhibits Make Fine Showing at Fair; Judges Appreciative

Scoring 745 points out of a possible 1,000, the Hazelton district exhibit carried away the Fair Board's challenge cup, now held by Prince George, at the Exhibition yesterday. Prince George was given 710 points by the judges and Massett, 665. The former exhibit gets Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Bohler's silver medal as second prize and the latter a diploma.

#### Judge's Remarks

The Hazelton exhibit was better than the others and there were more varieties, particularly in vegetables, stated P. W. Ankatel Jones, one of the government judges. The quality of Prince George and Hazelton was pretty even. Hazelton also had a great advantage in the matter of fruits and the other districts went away down because they had so little. The arrangement of the Hazelton exhibit was also better than the others.

Massett had a wonderful display of good stuff, said Mr. Ankatel Jones, but it was not put up so well and there were not so many varieties. Massett grains and grasses were good but those from Prince George were better. Hazelton's victory was due to the greater variety of vegetables and fruit and it was also a better balanced show.

The Vanderhoof exhibit was good but it was small and, consequently, did not come into competition with the others.

#### Ocean Bottom Displaced Say Japanese Seismologists who Investigated Recent Quakes

OSAKA, Sept. 12.—Earthquake shocks, which a week ago brought desolation to Japan, were not caused by volcanic disturbances but by violent dropping of two portions of the earth's surface, according to the best seismologists in Japan, who agree that the ocean bottom near Ho and that near the naval base at Yokosuka were successively displaced causing similar disturbances ashore.

No new volcanoes have appeared in spite of persistent reports, the seismologists declare, adding that farm lands in some places in outlying districts of the Bose peninsula are now six feet lower in proportion to sea level and some parts are submerged.

#### RESOLUTION ON GRAIN SHIPPING LEAVES MONEY ROYAL FAMILY

Board of Trade Sends Memorial to Premier Mackenzie King and Cabinet

Earl Farquhar Bequeaths Home to Queen Mary and Princess Arthur Gets Much

NO PORT CHARGES HERE  
Shipping from Prince Rupert Would Avoid Terminal Handicaps at Vancouver

LONDON, Sept. 12.—The late Earl Farquhar, Lord Steward in the households of King Edward and King George, left a two million dollar estate most of which goes to members of the British Royal Family. Princess Arthur of Connaught will get half the estate; Prince George, youngest son of the King, is bequeathed ten thousand dollars; the Earl of Southesk gets a quarter of a million.

King George is to select his own souvenir from the residence of the Earl. Queen Mary is bequeathed his property at White Lodge, Richmond Park, which is the present home of the Duke and Duchess of York.

An exhibit that called forth many words of favorable comment from the sightseers at the Fair yesterday was the bedroom booth put on by Geo. D. Tite. The cosy and homelike appearance of the booth turned many people's thoughts to home and bed.

Pacific milk galore is on hand at the F. G. Dawson Ltd. booth at the Exhibition. There are literally speaking mountains of this well known brand of milk and considerable hard work has undoubtedly been necessary to pile it all up.

The Prince Rupert Feed Company have a very attractive booth at the Fair displaying Spratt's dog and chicken feed etc. A large lump of coal is also on display on which guesses are taken as to the weight, the winner to get the lump.

A booth displaying the art of the tinsmith is of special interest at the Fair. This has been erected by the Tinsmith's Union and makes a remarkably fine showing.

The plumber's art is splendidly displayed by Smith & Mallett at their booth in the Fair. The booth is arranged as a modern bathroom and every conceivable plumber's fitting in connection with the installation of a house is on hand.

## GOOD SHOWING INDIAN WORK

Interesting Examples of Handicraft and Relics of the Past from Massett

The exhibit of Indian work and relics at the exhibition, which has been brought from the Queen Charlotte Islands by Thomas Deasy, Indian Agent at Massett, has created a great deal of interest. The exhibit includes wooden and jadeite totem poles, oil paintings on glass, ancient arrows, friction firelighters, beaded hunting bags, cedar bark baskets, original Hudson Bay rifles and guns, and also samples of work executed by the Indian school children of Massett under the guidance of Mrs. Charles Edenshaw. Included with the Indian exhibit are samples of the natural resources of the Islands embodying oil shale, coal and ruby sand. The exhibit is the most comprehensive display of the Indian art that has ever left its original land.

**Details of Exhibit**  
The exhibit includes three wooden totem poles, two of which are duplicates of the Raven legend of the Raven clan carved by Robert Gunyea of Massett. These miniature totem poles are two of the best of their kind that have ever been on public display. The third one is also made by Mr. Gunyea and represents the legend of the witch of which there has been an interesting story written. A glass case containing seventy five pieces of black jadeite totem poles, trays, inkstands, etc. is of special interest. These miniature totem poles convey the legend of the crab, sea dog, eagle, etc. This collection is the personal property of Mr. Deasy.

**Paintings on Glass**  
There is a splendid exhibit of oil paintings on glass showing Indian encampments, hunting scenes, battle scenes, and other episodes connected with the bygone days of the natives. These paintings are original and pretty, and are also owned by Mr. Deasy. Old time arrows made from the vew wood of the Islands are on display and are reputed to be of great value. They are tipped with mussel shell and bound with the root of the spruce being gummied on the outside with spruce gum. Another unusual exhibit is the friction firelighter made of cedar wood. This is composed of a piece of wood after the shape of a cribbage board with round grooves bored in it. Pieces of wood, the same size as a thick pencil, are held in the hands and quickly turned in the grooves thereby producing sparks. The exhibit contains an old photograph of Skidegate showing the original Indian village and is one of the first photographs ever made. It is still very clear in detail.

As an indication of the importance given to hunting by the Indians in the early days there is a beautiful beaded hunting bag on display decorated with hand beading. This was used by the male Indians when on hunting trips for the reception of their powder and shot and any small game that chanced to fall to their gun.

**Cedar Bark Baskets**  
There is a splendid display of hand made Indian baskets manufactured from yellow and red cedar bark. A demonstration of basket weaving is being given daily by Mrs. Charles Edenshaw of Massett. The baskets are of every shape and description of decoration. Of great interest is a collection of Hudson Bay guns which date back to the days of the Crimean war. These guns are the old fashioned ramrod type and were of the pattern used by the British army in the Crimean war. In the early days

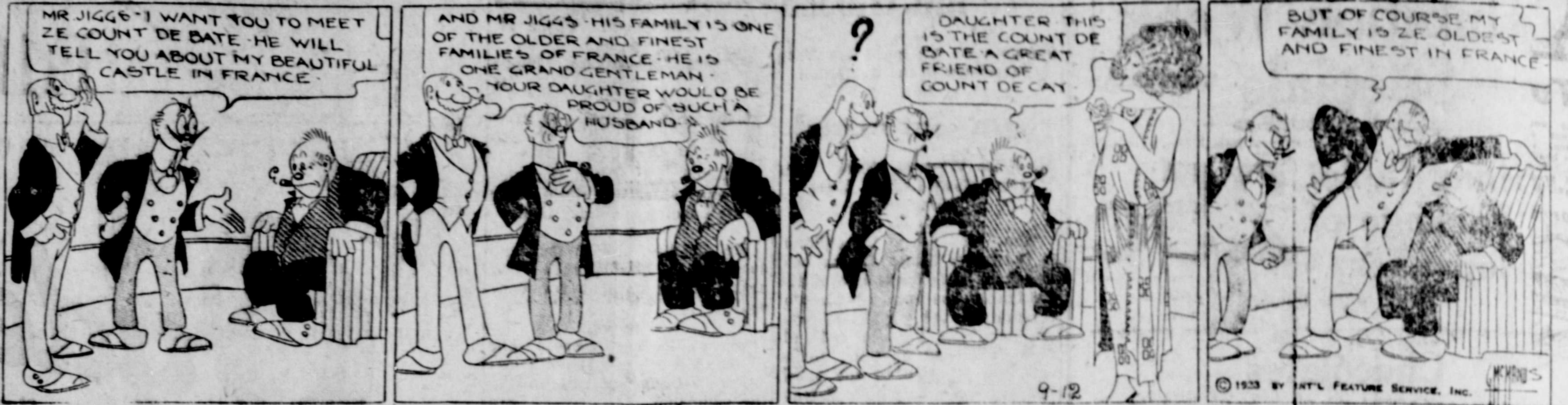

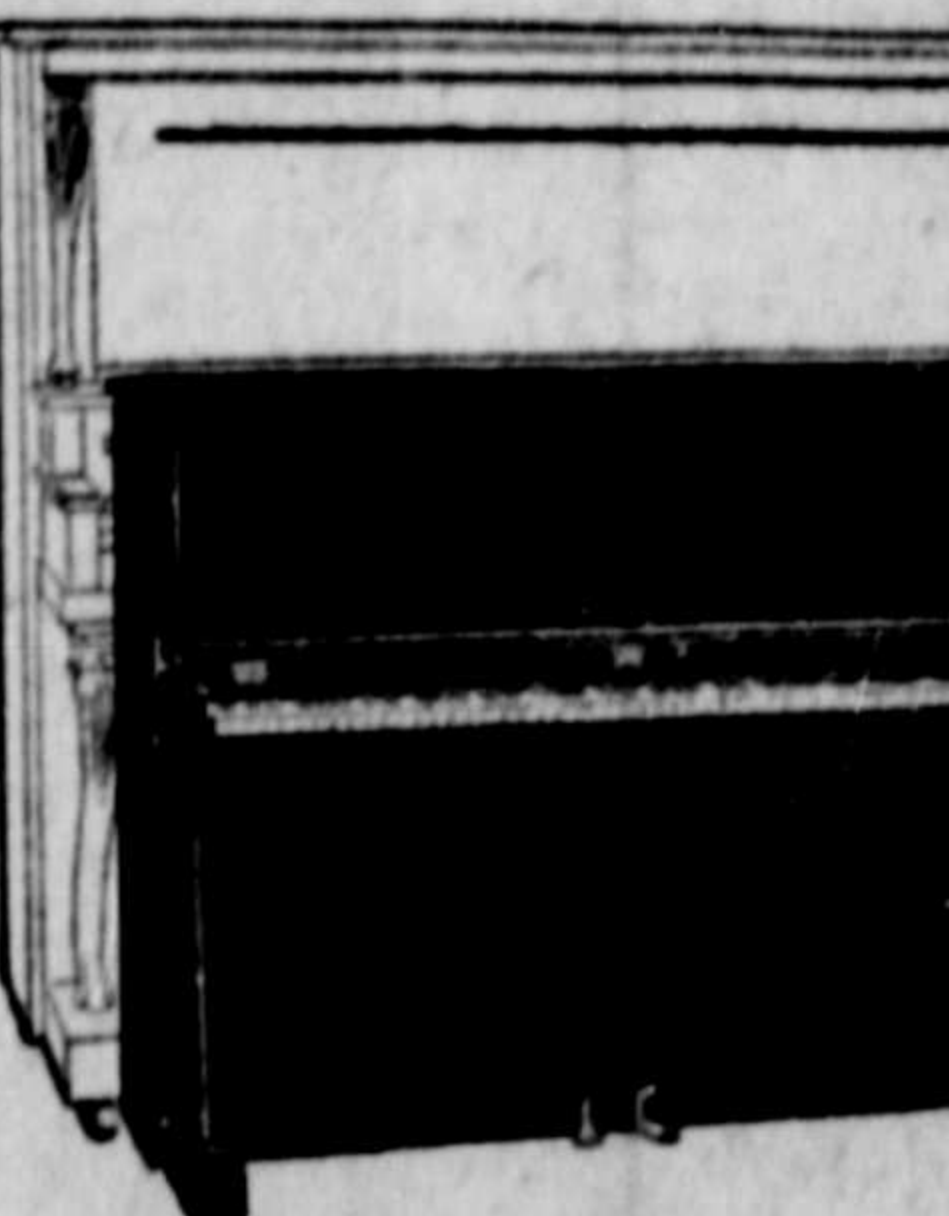

We lost points because we did not have fruit. Though small varieties such as strawberries, etc., are grown with success at Prince George, we do not go in for the larger type such as apples, etc."

#### Queen Charlotte Islands

Mrs. F. H. Carpenter, in charge of the Massett exhibit, pointed to the difficulties that attended transportation from the Queen Charlotte Islands to the Prince Rupert Exhibition. The display exhibited had been picked last Thursday and had come here from the Massett Fair which was held last Friday. Mrs. Carpenter pointed to the good display of grains and natural grasses in the Massett exhibit and stated that a special effort had been made with regard to wild grasses.

"I have learned a great deal at this Fair," said Mrs. Carpenter, "and we will do better next year. In making our display we went more for quality than display."

"I have lived for ten years on the Islands and will be happy to live there the rest of my life. Eventually we will grow fruit with great success. It should be remembered that Massett is perhaps the youngest district exhibiting at the Fair."
