WASHINGTON, July 13 .-The United States government is giving serious consideration, it is stated, to the action of the Canadian parliament in the authorization of an embargo on wood pulp. The state department will doubtless address a protest to the Canadian government indicating that such an embargo would be a burden to United States newspapers and consumers of wood pulp. Retaliation will not be brought down although it is not overlooked that the United States government Is clothed with large powers to retaliate under the new Tariff Act.







Title cannot be obtained lu less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 6 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required. Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he tequires land in confunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made


