FIELDING BUDGET IS PASSED BY COMMONS

LUMBERING INDUSTRY BEING REFLECTED IN MINING ON QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

Federal Government is Sustained with Narrow Margin Important Vote

OTTAWA, May 26.—By a narrow majority of eight, the House of Commons last Wednesday night adopted the seventeenth budget of Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance. The battle of eleven days in the House ended with dramatic scenes.

Last year the government carried its budget by a majority of 18.

The first vote on Wednesday night was on the Forke amendment, the House dividing by 162 against and 61 for, a majority of 101 against. The amendment was voted against by all the Liberals with the exception of A. B. Hudson, of Winnipeg South, and the Conservatives with the addition of A. W. Neil, Comox-Alberni and the two British Columbia Progressives, T. G. McBride, of Cariboo, and L. W. Humphrey, Kootenay West.

The vote on the main motion was 114 for and 106 against, a majority of eight for the budget. Liberals voted for the budget with the exception of A. B. Hudson, Winnipeg, A. W. Neil, of Comox-Alberni, and T. G. McBride, of Cariboo, and L. W. Humphrey, of West Kootenay, also voted for it as well as William Elliott, of Waterloo. Progressives voted against with the exceptions noted. The Conservatives voted against, also two Labor men and A. B. McMaster, Brome, and A. B. Hudson, Winnipeg, Liberals.

300 TEACHERS PASS
VANCOUVER, May 26.—Three hundred students have successfully passed the teacher's examinations at the Normal School here.

Trio of Confidence Men, One Over Eighty Years Old, Takes \$14,000 from Prairie Farmers

VANCOUVER, May 26.—The police are searching for a trio of confidence men who swindled two prairie farmers out of \$14,000 on the promise of big fortunes in a system of horse racing.

The farmers, who are wintering on the coast, were not known to each other but made the acquaintance of the same general strangers, one of whom is said to be over 80 years of age. The swindlers said they had learned a wonderful system of beating the race game through a mysterious turf exchange.

Farmers were induced to invest \$14,000 at a time in betting. One of the farmers was ready to invest \$20,000 more on a grand scheme when relatives intervened and the police to start an investigation which, it is expected, will lead to the arrest of a big confidence ring.

CASES COMING UP

Council Will Have 15 Canadian Appeals This Term

LONDON, May 26.—Fifteen Canadian appeals are to come before the judicial committee of the privy council during the ensuing term. One appeal is brought by the province of British Columbia against the Dominion government's disallowance of the provincial act validating orders in council with reference to the employment of Japanese labor in B.C.

A second appeal is made by British Columbia over the dispute as to whether liquor imported into the province is liable to a customs duty.

The funeral of the late T. Canada, who was run over by a train on Wednesday night at Pacific Cannery, took place this afternoon from the B.C. Undertakers' Parlors to Fairview cemetery. H. Higashi, Japanese missionary, officiating.

TURKISH - GREEK DISPUTE SETTLED

LIQUOR BILL NEXT TUESDAY

Importation Measure Affecting B.C. Will Come Before Senate Next Week

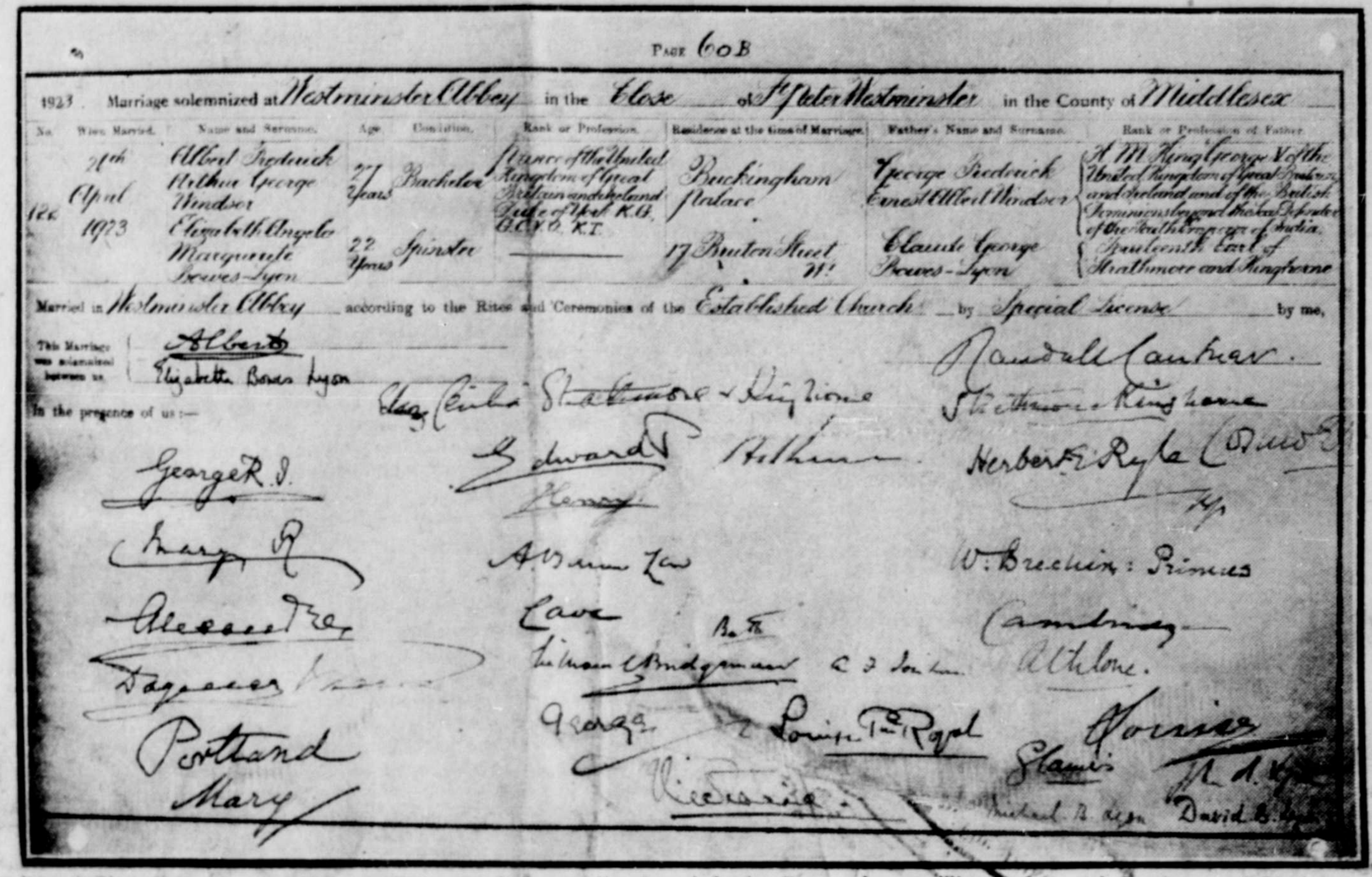
TORONTO, May 26.—The Toronto Star says that the bill to give British Columbia and Quebec governments the exclusive right to import liquor in those provinces will come up in the Senate on Tuesday. The Senate last year threw the bill out. A stiff fight is expected this year but the prairie provinces and Ontario are now supporting the measure as far as possible because it would also prevent the exportation of liquor from wet provinces to dry ones.

TURKEY TO MAKE SEPARATE TREATIES

Settlement of Long Standing Near East Dispute is Now in Sight

LAUSANNE, May 26.—Negotiations on separate treaties between Turkey and other nations, to determine the privileges to foreigners in Turkey have been agreed upon by the political committee of the Near East conference as a solution of the long standing dispute over this question.

Increased Activity in Mining on Queen Charlotte Islands is Reported by Resident Engineer

A great deal more interest is being taken in mining development on the Queen Charlotte Islands since the introduction of the lumber industry and there is marked improvement in every direction of the industrial life there according to George Clothier, resident mining engineer, who has returned to the city after a two weeks' trip of examination on the Islands.

The State Chuck Creek coal mining property, situated on the north side of Skidegate Inlet, seven or eight miles from Queen Charlotte City, is being developed by Messrs. Gordon and McMorris, residents of the Island. The property looks healthy and the present holders are endeavoring to interest eastern capital in the enterprise.

TO WORK ON SEATON MINE

Graby to Operate Sultana Group on Railway East of Here

Active operating work will be commenced immediately by the Graby Company on the Sultana group of claims situated on Boulder Creek, ten miles from Seaton, which is one hundred and twenty-five miles east of Rupert. There were originally some six or eight claims located and comprised in this group but this number has since been increased to fourteen. The ore is high grade, containing copper, silver and gold. Sampling across a sixteen foot ore body gave returns of sixteen ounces of silver, three and a half per cent copper, with gold values.

METAGAMA WAS IN COLLISION

Hit Freighter Baron Vernon in Clyde—Liner Not Badly Damaged

GLASGOW, May 26.—The steamer Metagama bound from here to Quebec and Montreal with several hundred passengers on board collided with the British freighter Baron Vernon in the Clyde. The latter is seriously damaged and the liner only slightly injured. The collision occurred in the river Clyde. The passengers will be transferred from the liner to another steamer.

CLAPP GOING TO COPPER MT.

Mine and Mill in Similkameen Will be Managed From Anyox

PRODUCTION MAY START IN 60 DAYS

R. Clapp, assistant general manager who has been located here for some time, will have charge at Copper Mountain and Allenby as resident manager.

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ELECTION MAY SOON BE HELD

Minister's Paper Says Federal Government May go to People on Fiscal Policy

BROCKVILLE, May 26.—The Brockville Recorder and Times, which is close to ministerial circles, said yesterday that it had been informed on reliable authority that it should not be surprised if the federal government decided upon dissolving parliament and going to the country in view of the popularity of Hon. W. S. Fielding's "middle of the road" fiscal policy. The Recorder and Times is owned by Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways.

OTTAWA, May 26.—Premier King declined to comment upon the statement by the Brockville Recorder and Times that an election might soon occur.

HARRY BIRCH IS NEW SECRETARY

Chosen by Hospital Board Last Night to Succeed Major George E. Gibson, Resigned

HARRY W. Birch, accountant in the city hall, was appointed secretary of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association at a meeting of the board last night. He will take over his new duties on June 1 or as soon thereafter as possible succeeding Major George E. Gibson, resigned. The salary, it was decided, will remain \$150 per month as at present with two weeks' leave of absence once a year.

The applicants included David Wilton, A. McRae, H. W. Birch, H. O. Greve and J. O. Williamson. Mr. Birch was selected on the third vote by 10 to 4 over Mr. Wilson Murray.

KRUPPS CANNOT HAVE MAN BACK

Empire Memorial Day On May 30.

The United States for several decades has followed the beautiful custom of decorating the graves of its fallen sailors and soldiers on Memorial Day, May 30. In various parts of Canada the day is also observed. In the city of Winnipeg the custom has been carried out for many years and the president of the C.P.R. recently issued instruction to the captains of the Canadian fleet to observe the day with religious services.

The idea of further extending the observance of the day is now being advocated in Canada as a means to linking more firmly together the people of the English speaking world. It is not proposed to make the day a legal holiday but it is suggested that such organizations as the Boy Scouts, churches and Sunday schools, patriotic societies and citizens of Canada generally might show in some simple manner that they had in mind their fallen heroes by wearing a sprig of evergreen or a picture of it upon a piece of white background or by decorating the graves of the brave dead.

Pacific Fisherman On Recent Tragedy.

Reports of the firing on an American halibut schooner by a Canadian patrol boat, resulting in the fatal shooting of Jacob York, a Seattle fisherman, are read with feelings of profound regret and sympathy for the apparently unoffending victim of the incident and his surviving relatives, says the Pacific Fisherman. At the same time, one feels that such a killing is a thing that could and should have been avoided, and those responsible should be made to realize that human life is not to be lightly taken or placed in danger. Statements as to the real facts of the case are too contradictory to warrant any positive judgment at present, but the matter is under investigation by the two governments, and a sincere effort will undoubtedly be made to determine where the blame should rest. Some phases of the affair, however, seem worthy of comment.

Reckless disregard of law or international custom are entitled to no sympathy, whether on the part of Americans or Canadians, and officials are bound to take effective steps to enforce the law. On the other hand, hasty or needless resort to the use of firearms in law enforcement should be discouraged. In this particular case, the patrol boat was a larger and much faster vessel, and could apparently have overhauled and stopped the fishing schooner without resorting to gunfire. On the face of the accounts given, the drastic course followed seems to have lacked justification.

Time That Rivalry Became Sportsmanlike.

The friendly relations lately existing between Canada and the United States have been of incalculable benefit to both sides, and every reasonable effort should be made to strengthen and perpetuate them. Fishery disputes have been a frequent source of friction between the two countries since earliest colonial days. It is time that rivalry in this field were raised to the same clean and sportsmanlike basis as in other lines, instead of continuing as a source of bitterness and bloodshed.

As one important means to this end, a more scrupulous observance of international law and fishing regulations is commended to operators and fishermen on both sides. Those who deliberately disregard the laws of a neighboring country not only expose themselves to severe treatment, but jeopardize the friendly relations between the countries. On the other hand, over-zealousness on the part of law-enforcing officers in dealing with foreigners of a friendly nation is uncalled for. In enforcing the law between the United States and Canada there should be no place for national spite or ill-will among officials entrusted with this important work. Law violation is not to be connived at or encouraged, but there is no reason for exceptional rigor or severity in making arrests merely because the offenders happen to be citizens of the other nation.

FLAG PRESENTED TO ROTARY CLUB

Yesterday's Luncheon Featured by Exchange of International Felicitations

The formal presentation of the American flag, sent by the New York Rotary Club to the Prince Rupert club, was made by John Dybhavn at the luncheon yesterday.

Mr. Dybhavn told of his recent visit to the New York club when the flag was presented, and spoke of the excellent work Rotary was carrying out in the metropolis among the boys of the city. To enable them to get an insight into industry it had been arranged by the New York members for the boys to practically run the city of New York at certain intervals. Even the mayoralty had been handed over to a boy. In making the presentation to the Prince Rupert Rotary Club, through Mr. Dybhavn, President Byer of the New York club, intimated that in the last few years it had been their practice to present an American flag to any new club organized in a foreign country and upon that principle the flag had been presented to the farthest west Rotary club as a bond of friendship, peace, and goodwill between the United States and Canada.

The flag was then unfurled by John Dybhavn and the audience, standing, sang "The Star Spangled Banner."

President's Thanks

President Dr. Grant thanked Mr. Dybhavn for the excellent manner in which he had carried out his mission, and said that the gift of the American flag was accepted by the Prince Rupert Rotary Club in the spirit in which it was sent. Although the United States had been out of the fold for something like 150 years, she was still British in her sentiments and if ever the old empire came to the bowing stage the Americans would rise in their power as the offspring of the mother country to maintain her integrity and strength. The president then called upon Chas. Eyth to be the custodian of the American flag on behalf of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club.

Consul Wakefield

American Consul Wakefield gave a brief history of the Star Spangled Banner. He said that the first American flag had been made in 1777 by Betty Ross in a very humble home in Philadelphia. This flag she presented to a Philadelphia regiment at the time of the revolution. The flag then contained thirteen stripes of red and white alternately, and thirteen stars representing the thirteen original states. He heartily endorsed the remarks of the president. When in St. Louis he intended to enlighten the International Convention as to where Prince Rupert was, why it was, and what it was going to be.

He spoke of the fact that during the last 100 years peace had existed between the United States and Canada across a broad territory without a gun or armed ship. This was a fairly good guarantee today for the peace of the world. The speaker said that the Americans did not forget that they were still the seeds of the acorn which fell from the mother tree.

In closing, President Grant gave an inspiring talk on the content and activities of the British Empire.

The singing of "Rule Britannia," "My Country 'Tis of Thee," and "God Save the King" brought the luncheon to a fitting close.

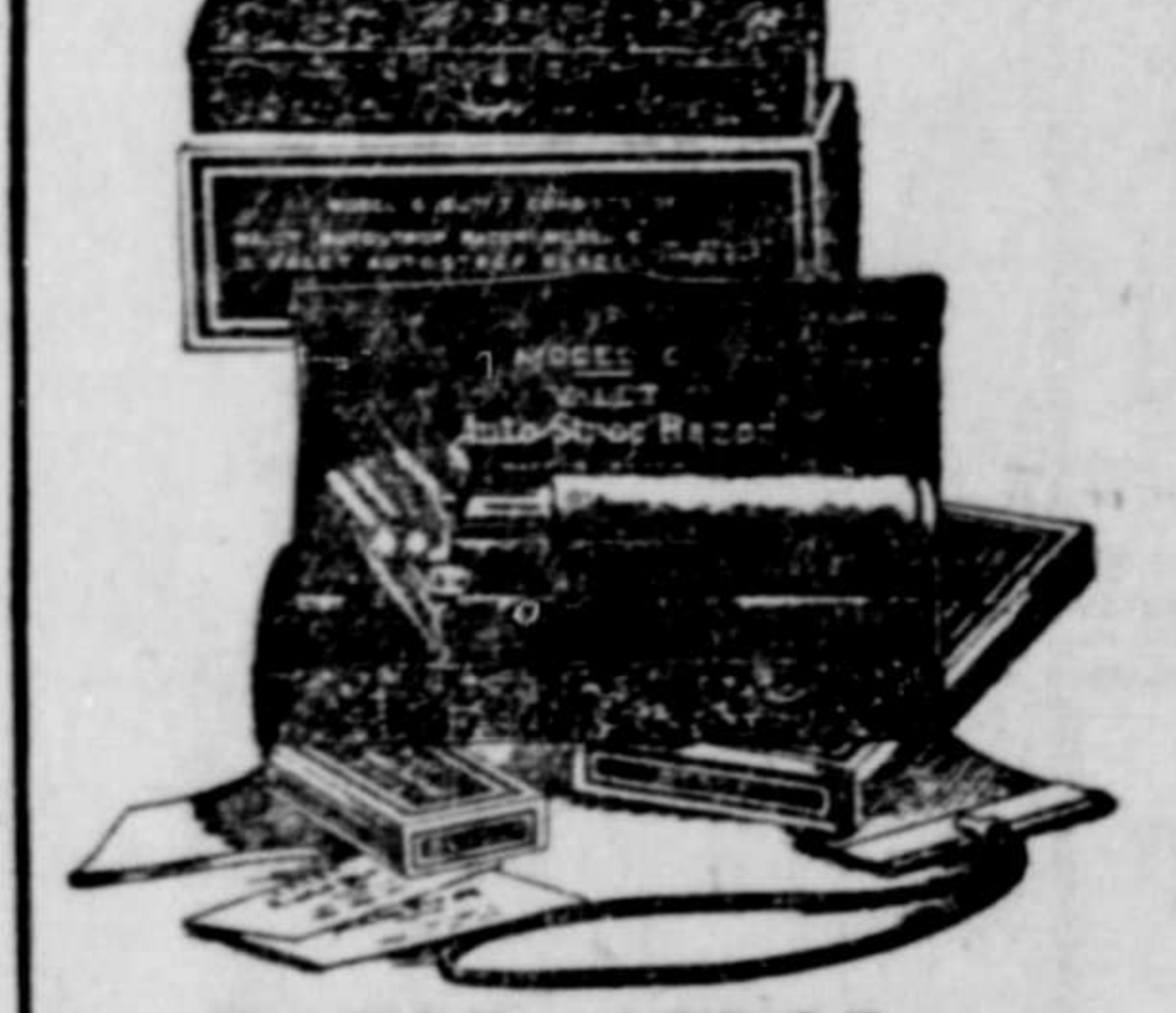

The John will lay up for two or three days in Vancouver and will pick up the run from the south on June 6. The company expects to keep the Albert running now for the remainder of the summer in general freight service. Capt. Neil McLean is in command and H. J. Healy is purser.

The business along the waterfront has been somewhat disjointed this week with the intermission of Victoria Day which was celebrated by the Admiral of the fleet and his merry men in a manner befitting the occasion. Thursday being a national holiday, the fish houses were closed and no fish was handled as a consequence. In spite of the short week, however, the business conducted has been well up to the standard and the Admiral is very well satisfied. Salmon arrivals have been heavier and the prices for reds has hovered around the 12c. mark. Prices for the halibut landings have held steady and rose around the 16c. mark on Tuesday. The Canadian retail market for fish has remained firm and in some instances the Canadian boats have received a better price for second class fish than did the Americans. Incoming boats report the conditions on the high spots to be of the best at present although early in the week some rather severe storms had to be contended with which held up fishing to some extent.

Empire Day

Thursday, Empire Day, was celebrated in right royal fashion along the waterfront. With magnificent weather prevailing the home base of the mosquito fleet was early besieged by crowds of young and old on pic-nic bent, and every available boat in which the engine would show a leg was pressed into service. The Prince Rupert Yacht Club members took advantage of the weather and from early morning until well on in the afternoon the professional and amateur navigators were busy getting started for fields of exploration. A number of ardent fishermen hit out on Wednesday evening in their floating homes for points of vantage. Muddy Creek, Mile 24, Khatada, and other distant points were visited and excellent sport was enjoyed.

Native Visitors

A large flotilla of native fishing schooners and launches invaded the base of the home fleet on Wednesday and early Thursday morning with cargoes of happy men, women and children from outlying points, who had come into port to take part in the Empire Day celebrations staged by the Exhibition association and Elks on the Acropolis grounds. While a few of the visitors returned to their respective home ports yesterday morning a number of them remained over for the week-end to do some shopping.

Caygeon to be Scrapped

It is learned on very high authority that skipper Jim Morrison is at last fed up with the foolish antics of the Caygeon and that it is his firm intention to have it replaced with a modern slap up schooner. The old boat is to be purchased by the fighting men of the mosquito fleet as a battle practice target. The new boat will be of tremendous dimensions and Jim is spending a little spare time cruising around the bush for a hefty tree which he intends to hollow out for the hull. The power is to be derived from an eighty cylinder G.A.U.P. engine. We don't quite know what the initials stand for, our

mechanical knowledge having been somewhat neglected, but surmise that it means Go As You Please.

Myhill Returns

Skipper Myhill-Jones hove into port on Wednesday striding the bridge of his latest aquatic acquisition in the form of a new launch Oh Baby, which he recently purchased in Vancouver. The old original has passed into the Queen Charlotte Island passenger service. Myhill left Vancouver last Friday morning with the new boat and experienced some rough weather on his journey north which proved the ship's splendid seagoing qualities. The trip north took some six days. While Crossing Queen Charlotte Sound on Sunday last the launch was caught by heavy seas but pulled through in good shape. The new Oh Baby is slightly smaller than the original launch but is quite a bit faster. She measures 33 feet by 8 beam and has a draft of 2 feet 9 inches. Her power is derived from a 15 horse power Sterling engine. At the present time the launch is being remodelled to take care of the summer passenger business.

Caught Good Trout

Skipper Alex. McRae was out as far as Shawallans Lake on Thursday with his power boat Lois M., having on board Harry McLeod and L. E. H. Fulmer. The party indulged in trout fishing and photography. The piscatorial artists were rewarded with a good catch of trout of the cut-throat variety.

Honest Jim

Jim Lee, the potato growing expert, has been christened "Honest Jim" by the Admiral of the fleet, and it all came about through the influence of Nels Robertson, the well known hall-bout garage keeper. It seems that a mistake was made by Jim in a cheque carrying Nels' name with the result that the aforementioned garage keeper profited to the extent of an extra two cents. He intimated to the old man that Jim was the honestest man in the fish game even taking priority over Bill Shrubbsall. This fact was so hammered into the Admiral and such pressure was brought to bear that the christening was held at a state function yesterday morning. The act of the christening took the form of the Admiral sprinkling Jim's curly locks with a plentiful supply of Herb's famous herb juice to the strains of "Love Me and the Debt is Yours" played by the Cow Bay orchestra.

Shock troops are being organized and trained in readiness for the arrival of the next barrel, by Colonel Doc Clapperton, who learned his shoeing soldering in Brazil where the nuts come from.

QUEEN CHARLOTTE'S

W. Fairbairn has been appointed fisheries overseer for the southern section of the waters surrounding the Queen Charlotte Islands.

The Indians are awaiting the arrival of packing boats for the disposal of their fish at Hippo and Langara Islands. The price has not yet been fixed between the trollers and the buyers.

The Indians of Skidegate, are catching a large number of blue back salmon in Copper Bay for home consumption. One boat reports a catch of one hundred salmon a few nights ago. Under the new regulations, Indians are permitted to fish for salmon in the rivers and inlets on condition of having a permit and not disposing of any of their fish to outside parties. They are salting the blue backs for winter use.

James McKay and Charles Gladstone, two members of Skidegate band, launched their new motor boats last week. The vessels were constructed, and the engines were installed by the two owners. Both vessels show the fine workmanship of the Haidas. Over one hundred boats, driven by gasoline engines will engage in trailing for spring salmon, near Hippo and Langara islands. The boats have been owned and operated by Indians of Massett and Skidegate.

The drowning of a young man, who disappeared from a Peterboro canoe on Massett Inlet a few weeks ago while out on the waters at the head of the inlet, is very much deplored by his associates and friends. Search has been made for the remains without avail on account of the depth of water where the accident occurred.

An industrious Islander is negotiating for the purpose of placing an automobile on the forty miles of roadway between Tel-el river and Skidegate. The installation of an auto would mean the shortening of the time of travelling from Skidegate to Port Clements. At the present time, no motor driven vehicles are in use on the highways of the islands although notices have been posted instructing "Chaf-feurs to restrain from driving the vehicles at a pace faster than fifteen miles an hour." The owners of horse-drawn vehicles and bull teams are considering the question of protesting against such an arbitrary law.

Mr. Burnett made quite a record when he shot four bears in one day, a mother bear, a couple of yearlings and a cub.

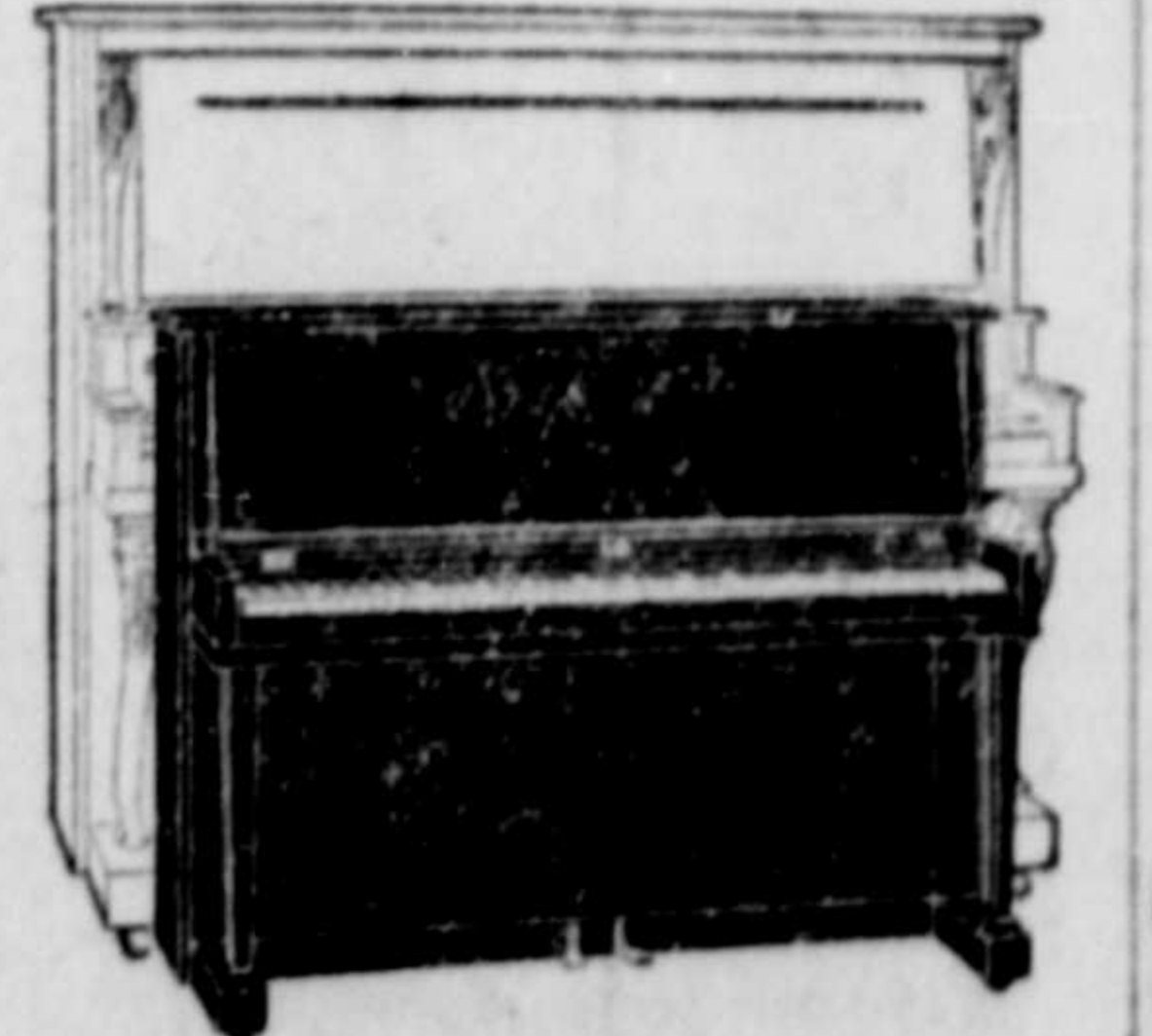
