Alberta has gone for government control but that is not much indication what British Columbia will do. The tendency of people is rather toward a change in everything. A lot of people who a few years ago were strong for government sale of liquor are now moving once more toward prohibition, but points should be decided upon whether there is a sufficient movement yet to carry the measure before tenders were called. 

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



C. Hanbury Williams Visits The Hot Springs and is Much Pleased

STRAWBERRY CENTRE

Complains of Poor Motor Road But Sees Great Possibilities

During the tour of C. Hanbury Williams of Ottawa to the coast he visited Terrace and Lakelse and tells about it in one of the series of articles written by him and being published in this paper as follows:

Terrace is noted chiefly for its strawberries, as far as I can ascertain, although the season for them was over when I got there and I had to satisfy myself with looking at photographs of the prize winning selections, and, as there was nothing included in the photographs"that gave you any sort of standard to measure by; they looked-it must be confessed like any other strawberries you buy in the market.
