PRINCE RUPERT NEEDED AS DOMINION PORT

HON. T. D. PATTULLO EXPLAINS HIS POSITION IN REGARD TO LOG EXPORT

Canada Needs Prince Rupert as Grain Port Says Former Mayor of Winnipeg Who is Visitor Here

"Canada will need every grain outlet available and, due more or less to the congestion at Vancouver and the splendid grade of the Canadian National Railway, there is no reason why the Prince Rupert route should not be very favorably considered by the powers that be in planning for the handling of a certain portion of the grain from Western Alberta."

This is the opinion of Charles F. Gray, formerly mayor of Winnipeg and consulting engineer of that city, who is in the city today on his way to Alaska. Mr. Gray arrived on last night's train and was registered at the Prince Rupert Hotel this morning. He said he had been impressed with the wonderful opportunity of getting the prairie wheat out by this route. The railroad grade, through its easiness, was most advantageous and Prince Rupert was an ideal port. Referring to the city he described its location as beautiful and said that the streets were a credit to those responsible for their building.

Mr. Gray predicted that the iron and steel production of the Old Country would soon be transferred to the Pacific coast which possessed all the requisites for the industry. The future of the British Empire, he said, was in the dominions across the seas and now was their opportunity.

Questioned as to his reason for saying that Alberta grain should be shipped this way without referring to the Saskatchewan and Manitoba product, Mr. Gray declared that the Hudson Bay route was the logical outlet for Saskatchewan and Manitoba. The people of those provinces were very anxious for the completion of that railway by the government and it was his opinion that it would soon be finished. This railroad would also open up an enormous mining country and transportation would be easy over it on account of the water courses. Ninety miles of steel yet remained to be laid to Fort Nelson, the terminus, Mr. Gray stated.

Mr. Gray is just back from a year's trip to Europe. English capital was looking for mining investments and was looking in the direction of British Columbia, he said. The capitalists wanted a good run for their money, however, and no more western real estate investments.

Over twenty years ago, Mr. Gray was an engineer at Bonington Falls near Nelson for the West Kootenay Power & Light Co. under Lorne Campbell and J. B. Thompson. He met the latter in London recently and also had dinner with J. H. Turner, former agent general for B.C., at Richmond. Mr. Turner, despite his age, is still hale and hearty. F. C. Wade, present agent general, was another B.C. man whom Mr. Gray met.

Mr. Gray was controller of the city of Winnipeg in 1917 and 1918 and mayor in 1919 and 1920 when labor troubles were seething there. He is president of the Manitoba Navy League and takes a great interest in marine affairs having come from a family of seafarers and also having had naval experience himself. He is also a member of the Winnipeg Kiwanis Club.

Accompanied by Capt. E. J. Fader, of Winnipeg, a well known mining man who has been here before, Mr. Gray leaves this afternoon by gasboat for a cruise up the Alaska coast. He will be back in about a week or fortnight on route home. Miss Peggy O'Neill, daughter of Capt. Fader, is also a member of the party.

ST. JAMES HOTEL HAD BAD BLAZE

Damage Estimated at \$5,000
Done When Interior is Guttled by Fire

Damage to the building and contents estimated at \$5,000 was done on Saturday evening when fire broke out in the St. James Hotel on Sixth Street between First and Second Avenues. The rear of the main floor and the second and third storeys were gutted.

The blaze broke out from the chimney of a small water heating stove at the back of the house and, igniting the paper and burlap lining of the rooms, had a good hold before the fire department was called at 7 o'clock by Sam Antos, clerk of the Prince Rupert Hotel. George James, proprietor of the place, was in his room upstairs and did not know of the blaze until he heard the call of fire from the outside below. He attempted to make his exit down the stairs inside but was forced back by smoke and flames and had to get out by means of a rope after having thrown his trunk and clothes before him.

Flames and smoke issuing from the windows of the back and sides and the roaring fire inside the building made it look for a while as if the whole place would go up in smoke. There was a strong gale blowing and the blaze was difficult to fight. Two hose lines were strung out and the firemen worked both from the inside and out, finally being successful in getting the flames in check. Actual fighting of the blaze took about an hour and clearing up the hose lines another hour. The whole fire department was out and valuable assistance was given by neighbors and passers-by.

The building was well covered with fire insurance and a wire has been sent to Vancouver for an adjuster.

The St. James Hotel was built about thirteen years ago by Tim Sullivan and is now owned by George James. The Terminal Investment Syndicate owns the property.

LONDON, March 5.—The Bonar Law government failed to secure a seat for Colonel G. F. Stanley, under secretary for home affairs, in the by-election for Willesden. The Liberal candidate Johnstone, got five thousand majority over Stanley.

Stanley was defeated at the last general election. The new member is only 26 years of age, the youngest member in the House.

MANIACAL SHOOTING VICTORIA

City is Terrorized by Fusillades of Shots; People Warned off Streets

(Special to Daily News) VICTORIA, March 5.—The city is terrified by a maniac in a shooting affair last night. The authorities are advising people to stay off the quiet streets at night, until the madman is rounded up. There was a fusillade of shots on Sunday morning along government street, through James Bay then into the Fairfield district.

An outbreak occurred last night in Lovers' Lane, Beacon Hill Park and along Cook Street. A residence between Lineham's home and Hampton Court Apartments called the police who found four freshly fired 38 calibre cartridges of the same bore as killed young Ernest Lorenz. On Sunday morning thirteen shots from three cars rushing along Government Street were counted.

Henry Crease, son of Lindley Crease, the lawyer, who had been held for investigation, was liberated after a day's questioning at police headquarters. Proof of his alibi was substantiated by a young society woman who alleged that he was not near the scene at the time of Lorenz murder. D. C. McKenzie, a veteran, who was first arrested has been sent to Essondale for investigation.

YOUNG MAN IS FOUND DEAD

Frightened to Death by Shooting at Night, Say Victoria Police

(Special to Daily News) VICTORIA, March 5.—A well dressed unidentified man, aged about 32, was found dead in Beacon Hill Park. The death was apparently due to fright during night shooting, say the police.

Two Bonar Law Ministers are Defeated in England Giving Shock to Unionist Cabinet

LONDON, March 5.—Sir Arthur Griffith-Boscawen, minister of health in Bonar Law's cabinet, was defeated in the by-election for the Mitcham division of Surrey by J. Chuter Ede, Labor candidate.

The defeat of Griffith-Boscawen, following closely the defeat of Colonel Stanley in Willesden is a serious reverse to the government. The Mitcham campaign was one of the most aggressively contested by-elections for many years. The government candidate was opposed by two others, Ede, the successful Labor man and J. T. Catterall, Independent Unionist. This tended to split the vote allowing the Labor candidate to be elected.

Both Griffith-Boscawen and Stanley were defeated in the general elections and the by-elections were efforts to find seats for them.

Colonel George F. Stanley, under-secretary for home affairs, who was defeated in the by-election for the east division of Willesden, tendered his resignation to Premier Bonar Law today.

Mr. Pattullo Replies to J. R. Morgan Co. Ltd. on Refusing Timber Export

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, has replied to a request from W. E. Williams on behalf of J. R. Morgan Co. Ltd., in which special privileges for the export of logs from Northern British Columbia are asked. The latter also refers to an interview published in the Daily News in which Mr. Williams and Mr. Morgan made it seem that the North was not getting a fair deal from Victoria. Mr. Pattullo deals with the matter fully as follows:

Feb. 23, 1923.
Mr. W. E. Williams,
Prince Rupert, B.C.
I am in receipt of your letter of February 22, in respect to the question of Log Export.

This matter has been constantly before us and the viewpoints of your letter have been given the most careful consideration upon numerous occasions. It must be remembered, however, that the administration of the timber resources of the Province must be viewed from a Provincial-wide standpoint.

It is all very well to say that you must have a policy sufficiently flexible to permit one thing in one part of the province and another in another, but it all depends upon what this policy is, and the nature of the regulations thereunder.

Must be General
If a wide open policy of export is allowed in northern British Columbia it will certainly have to be allowed on the west coast of Vancouver Island and in the southern interior, and it will just as certainly have to be opened out in the Vancouver district. In fact it would simply mean the abandonment of the policy of manufacturing within the province, and the permitting of export of raw material to be manufactured elsewhere.

With unlimited export you would find yourself relatively in a similar position which you now are. What you are really asking for is not equal treatment, but preferential treatment for northern British Columbia, because if open export were allowed in northern British Columbia no government could resist the pressure that would compel open export elsewhere.

As for your statement that first grades of spruce and cedar should not be permitted to be turned into the pulp mill, this statement is at least open to argument. In the first place, timber which comes through the pulp mill which is not from what is known as a defined pulp area takes the ordinary sawmill royalty, hence from a revenue standpoint there is no loss. On the other hand, the log which is manufactured into pulp and paper requires a good deal more labor and, as a consequence, a higher expenditure of money at the point of manufacture than does ordinary saw lumber.

Matter of Sawmill
I note that you say that if you were permitted to export logs this would enable you to put in a sawmill, which you state you would like to do as soon as possible, yet in an interview in the "Daily News" you are quoted as saying that "Mills cannot get started here as there is no way of exporting lumber."

You are also quoted as saying that "If the local people could make a little money out of logs they would start up a sawmill, and the industry would get along." In your letter you point out that there are already several

C. Hocken, Toronto West, urging the desirability of measures to encourage the publication of Canadian magazines and periodicals.

When the private members' motions are exhausted, the House will probably take up the bill of A. W. Neill, member for Comox, Alberni, to regulate immigration and that of W. Irvine, Calgary East, to abolish capital punishment.

WILDEST NIGHT YET IN RUHR

Workmen Cause Riot and Sack Stores and Cabaret at Essen

BELGIANS SEIZE MONEY

ESSEN, March 5.—The wildest night since the beginning of the French occupation resulted in the early hours of Sunday in an armed mob having looted stores, held up a cabaret and robbed the patrons of their cash.

The mob is said to have been made up of unemployed men. A German workman was shot dead by a French sentry and another wounded in the railway yards.

The Belgians have seized a billion marks from the Reichsbank on account of the cost of the Rhineland army of occupation.

Close Season For Halibut.

A closed season for halibut has been decided upon, a treaty drawn up and signed by the United States and Canada and this will have to be ratified by the United States Senate and the Parliament of Canada before it becomes law. As there is likely to be little opposition to this, the only feasible method of protecting the halibut during the spawning season, it is to be presumed that the Senate will pass it.

While it will tend to make the fishing ports of Prince Rupert and Ketchikan rather quiet during the three months when no halibut is coming in, it will stabilize the business and prolong the number of years during which halibut fishing may be carried on. As it has been in the past with the other banks, the fishing grounds would soon have been depleted and then we should have to look to other fish to supply the market.

Again and again the government has been asked to arrange for a close season and the Mackenzie King administration is to be commended for its prompt action.

John Fagan Engineer And Hero.

John Fagan, the engineer who saved two year old Violet Evans near Nanaimo, is a hero. His prompt and fearless action in breaking the glass shield of his cab and climbing out in time to throw the child from beneath the wheels of the big engine, ranks with the finest deeds of daring and quick response to the call of duty. Some recognition should be accorded a man who would act in that manner. He has an Irish name and the Irish people should be proud of him. So will all others. It is such resourceful men who make Canada great.

Kissing The Book Still Continues.

The pernicious habit of "kissing the book" in the courts of law continues in spite of numerous protests against it. In Ontario the member for Peterboro has introduced a bill into the Legislature designed to do away with the objectionable practice. It will be interesting to know if this passes and what will be the effect.

As a preventative of giving false evidence kissing the book has been a failure. Witnesses perjure themselves every day in the courts and get away with it. Anyone who has attended the sessions will realize this immediately. Even if it was effective, it is doubtful if the practice should be continued. To ask a clean young person to kiss the same book that some of the filthy lips seen in the courts have defiled, is asking too much.

Then again kissing the Bible smacks of idolatry. It is entirely opposed to modern conceptions of religion and life and tends to bring the courts into disrepute. It certainly should be abolished.

Are We Becoming Too Serious.

After the war there was a period during which after the strain of several years, the people threw restraint to the winds and entered into the wildest kinds of enjoyment. A dancing craze swept the country, wild parties were common and the wiseheads predicted that the world was bound in the direction of Hades at lightning speed. Now all that is changed and we are swinging to the opposite direction. The stress of hard times has had a sobering effect and we find a tendency to take life very seriously, perhaps too seriously. It must not be forgotten that when serious work is to be done, periods of relaxation are necessary. People must play as well as work, otherwise they become stale and lose vigor. Just now it seems necessary to issue the warning against being too serious and perhaps losing power through sticking too close to business.

LUMBER WHARF BADLY NEEDED

B.C. Timber Journal Backs Up
Efforts of Local As-
sociation

The annual meeting of the Northern B.C. Timbermen's Association which was held in this city recently is fully reported in the current number of the Pacific Coast Lumberman published in Vancouver and the article is accompanied with pictures of E. F. Doby and W. E. Williams, president and secretary respectively of the Association. Special reference is made to the need of a lumber assembly wharf at Prince Rupert and the journal comments editorially as follows:

"This journal sincerely wishes Prince Rupert the best of luck in its endeavor to secure a lumber assembly wharf and other facilities for the building up of a lumber export trade. Of all the timber growing areas in the province the north is the worst crippled by inadequate means of effecting shipment of its product. High freight rates impede its rail business permitting only the profitable shipment of the higher grades and the lack of assembly wharf facilities which will enable the interior mills to take part in the export trade and encourage large vessels to call at Prince Rupert for cargoes prevent it from enjoying the water-borne business it is undoubtedly entitled to.

"It must be somewhat galling to the Prince Rupert people to see cargo shipments of spruce being taken from Ketchikan to Australia without being able to at least compete in that market. We hope, therefore, that the efforts of the Northern B.C. Timbermen's Association will be crowned with success and that a lumber assembly wharf at Prince Rupert will soon be an accomplished fact."

mills in the district which are shut down. You are therefore in the position, according to your own arguments, of wanting to export the raw material in order to get money to start a mill, the product of which there is no way to export.

Big Order

The same issue of the "Daily News" quotes you as having refused to fill an order for 18,000,000 feet of raw timber because of our export regulations. I would like to know from whence came this order. In conversation in Rupert you alleged that it was not possible to sell your surplus output at a profit in the Vancouver market on account of the transportation difficulties. If the 18,000,000 feet order was from the United States I can see no reason why you should not be able to ship to the Vancouver market just as easily as to the United States market.

On the other hand, if the 18,000,000 feet order was from Japan, I can only say that my opinion is that the people of this province will not support a policy of this province becoming the basis of supply of raw material to be manufactured in Japan.

You were further quoted as stating that "When we want to export logs we have to submit a request for a permit to the Advisory Board at Vancouver, and it is refused. In that way Vancouver keeps a grip on the

Total Logs Scaled

For your information let me say that the approximate total saw logs scaled last year was 1,645,000,000 feet. Of this amount 410,000,000 feet was from Crown granted lands, leaving 1,235,000,000 feet from licensed lands. The total log export last year was 151,000,000 feet. Of this amount 47,000,000 feet was from licensed lands. That is to say that, out of 1,235,000,000 feet, 47,000,000 feet were permitted to be exported. As you know, we have no control over export from Crown granted areas.

In respect to your request in the last paragraph of your letter that you would like the matter to be re-considered by the Executive Council, I am not able to state on what date all the ministers will be here at the same time, but at any time that you may be down here I will arrange for a meeting of such members of the Executive as are in Victoria at the time. I hold no hope whatever, however, that you will succeed in changing the present policy.

He certainly won easily finishing many lengths in front of St. Louis but he finished many lengths behind Captain Cuttle. Admittedly the latter say he was on the day of the Two Thousand. FOOLED BY PICTURES IN MAIL ORDER BOOKS

People Buy Goods Then Find Them Not What They Seemed

DOCTORED BY ARTIST

Wrong Impression Conveyed by Illustrations in Catalogues From Which People Buy

Pictures have come to occupy a very important place in the life of the world in recent years. It has been said that for newspaper purposes a picture which tells its story strikingly is worth more than columns of written words on the same subject. Newspapers and magazines have realized the truth of this fact and as a result pictures are used profusely in illustrating the news and fiction of the day.

No one has been quicker to realize the possibilities of the picture when properly—or it might be said improperly—used, than the mail order man. He has realized that a picture will do more to sell his kind of merchandise than a column of words and figures. One reason for this is that it is harder to catch a picture in a lie than it is in printed words and figures. For instance, if you sell a man a table on the strength of a printed statement that it is 48 inches wide and if when the table reaches the customer it is only 36 inches wide, the customer not only has a moral right to kick, but he has a legal right to accuse the seller of obtaining money under false pretences. However, if the customer buys a table which looks in a picture to be 48 inches wide, but which proves upon its arrival to be only 36 inches wide, he has no legal grounds upon which to base a complaint if the seller has not told him in so many words that the table was 48 inches wide.

Stick to Truth in Figures

Some unscrupulous mail order houses have taken advantage of this selling power of pictures in a very ingenious way. They adhere strictly to the truth in the actual measurements given in their catalogues of the articles which they have to sell. They may employ descriptions which exaggerate the qualities and appearances of the articles offered, but when it comes down to actual measurements the descriptions given are technically correct. Then these concerns rely upon their pictures to sell the merchandise, realizing that a picture will make a far deeper impression upon the mind of the prospective buyer than the actual figures given. A picture of a wide, roomy bed will attract the eye and the reader probably will not stop to measure off the width of the bed as it is described in the catalogue to see whether it is as wide as desired. Figures, in the abstract, mean little to the average reader and do not convey the impression that is given in the picture.

A former manager of a mail order house tells how his concern manipulated pictures in this way to suit its purposes. Pictures of its chairs were retouched so that the legs seemed to be an inch and a half in diameter when they were really less than an inch. It made narrow beds appear in the picture to be wide and comfortable. Posts of iron that were really an inch in diameter were made to appear as if they were three inches in thickness. These things are easy for any competent artist to do.

Patrons Had No Recourse

This concern, however, adhered rigidly to the truth in the measurements included in the descriptions. Customers who found, when they received their goods, that they were not what they expected, could kick, but it would do them no good. The mail order house could show that it had set forth the measurements truthfully in catalogues, and there was no recourse for the customer.

There is no question but that pictures will lie, sometimes without any manipulation, and the person who buys an article of merchandise from a picture is taking big chances, even though the picture is not intentionally altered to give a wrong impression. Any amateur photographer knows from experience how the camera often will give a wrong idea of proportions.

The only safe method is to buy from the local merchant where one sees the article itself and not a picture of it. The article itself cannot lie about its dimensions, at least.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and
reduced to \$5 an acre, second-class to
\$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to sur-
face only.
Records will be granted covering only
land suitable for agricultural purposes
and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished
but parties of not more than four may
arrange for adjacent pre-emption
with joint recording and each making
necessary improvements on respective
claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claim for
five years and make improvements to
value of \$10 per acre, including clearing
and cultivation of at least 5 acres
before recording Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation of
claim less than 5 years, and has made pro-
gressive improvements, he may, be-
cause of ill-health, or other cause, re-
quest intermediate certificate of pre-
emption and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent res-
idence may be issued, provided appli-
cant makes improvements to extent of
\$500 or more and records same each
year. Failure to make improvements
or record same will operate as for-
feiture. Title cannot be obtained in
less than 5 years, and improvement
of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres
cleared and cultivated, and residence
of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant
may record another pre-emption, if he
removes and in compliance with the
law without actual occupation, pro-
vided statutory improvements made
and residence maintained on Crown
granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20
acres, may be leased as homesteads,
title to be obtained after fulfilling res-
idential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes
areas exceeding 40 acres may be
leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on
timber land, not exceeding 10 acres,
may be purchased; conditions include
payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible
by existing roads may be purchased
conditional upon construction of a road
to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of
road, not exceeding half of purchase
price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to
include all persons joining and serv-
ing with His Majesty's Forces. The
time within which the heirs or devisees
of a deceased pre-emptor may apply
for title under the Act is extended
from one year from the death of
such person, as formerly, until one
year after the conclusion of the great
war. This privilege is also made re-
troactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptors are
due or payable by soldiers on pre-
emptions recorded after June 26, 1918.
Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money ac-
crued, due and been paid since August
4, 1914, on account of payments, fees
or taxes on soldier pre-emptors.

Interest on agreements to purchase
town or city lots held by members of
Armed Forces, or dependents, acquired
direct or indirect, remitted from en-
listment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for issuance of
Crown Grants to sub-purchasers of
Crown Lands, acquiring rights from
purchasers who failed to complete
purchase, involving forfeiture, on ful-
fillment of conditions of purchase, in-
terest and taxes. Where sub-purchas-
ers do not claim whole of original par-
cel, purchase price and taxes may be
distributed proportionately over
whole area. Applications must be made
by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1915, for systematic
development of livestock industry pro-
vides for grazing districts and range
administration under Commissioner.
Annual grazing permits issued based
on numbers ranged, priority for estab-
lished owners. Stock-owners may
form Associations for range manage-
ment. Free, or partially free, permits
for cattle, sheep or travellers, up
to ten head.

In the Letter Box

DEATH OF MISS TOOMBS

Editor Daily News:

As I understand a letter left by
my sister, Miss Nellie Toombs,
has already become public prop-
erty, I should like to ask you to
publish a few further facts con-
nected with the case.

Since last Christmas my sister
has been troubled by different de-
lusions and dreams. Some have
taken an allegorical and spiritual
form and others have been violent,
sudden dislikes for and fears of
people hitherto regarded with
the utmost love and affection. At
other times she has tried to trace
to herself the blame for the series
of accidents which befell us last
year, with the result that she be-
came firmly convinced that some
great sacrifice was due from her-
self in compensation. All these
feelings were naturally attributed
to the fact that she was in a run-
down, nervous condition. She
had not regained her normal
health and spirits after the opera-
tions on her broken arm before
any other sister's accident and
later her own came on her, mean-
ing, of course, shocks and further
worry and anxiety.

Seemed in Good Spirits

I entertained no serious idea of
any mental derangement until
Friday last, when a friend sug-
gested that some actions were be-
coming unreasonable. However, I
saw my sister on Friday and
again on Saturday, and she seem-
ed much better and in good
spirits, and quite approved the
plans I suggested for the next
few weeks. Now in the face of
what has later transpired I can
have no doubt that her mental
balance was in some way affected.
We could not at first think this
possible, as there seemed no rea-
son why it should be. She has
always been remarkably clear-
headed and calm, and been always
so successful in any intellectual
work she has undertaken. Re-
cently she referred to an accident
she met when a girl by stepping
from a car before it had stopped,
which threw her to the ground
and rendered her unconscious
for a time. Apparently it left no
permanent injury and the matter
had been forgotten until she her-
self mentioned it. I now think the
fall on the ice last Christmas
twelvemonth must in some way
have aggravated this injury to
her head, as she has never been
quite the same since.

Correct Impression

I consider this letter is due
from me in order to correct the
impression created by the letter
my sister left. It is necessary
both on Mrs. Thomasson's ac-
count, who is absolutely happy in
her home and work at the camp,
and on Mr. Van Metre's account.
For a few days in January my sister
was engaged to Mr. Van Me-
tre and was very happy about it.
Then one of the strange, change-
able moods came over her and
she asked to have the engagement
temporarily broken. This Mr. Van
Metre instantly agreed to and
later at my sister's request granted
a full release.

In every way Mr. Van Metre
has shown the utmost courtesy
and consideration and given no
grounds whatever for the fears
expressed in the note my sister
left. On the contrary, he has
helped in every way possible to
ease her mind, thinking as we
did that this condition of mind
was the result of her nervous
