LAUSANNE, July 17 .- The Turkish peace treaty will be igned on July 24 and 25, Allied and Turkish delegations signig the main pact. The Russian government has been invited by telegraph to take part in the signing of the Straits conven-

An agreement reached on the disputed question of concession and evacuation of Turkish soil by foreign troops will be adopted this afternoon.
