### Dempsey Retains World Boxing Championship by Knocking out Louis Firpo in Second Round FREED FROM CHARGE

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.-Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight LONDON, Sept. 15.- Madame champion, knocked out Louis Angel Firpo, the challenger, in Marie Fahmy, who is charged the second round of a scheduled fifteen round bout last night, here with the murder of her mil-The bout ended 57 seconds after the start of a furious second lionaire husband, a pseudo round when Dempsey floored the challenger with punches to the Egyptian prince by shooting him body and when he struggled to his feet knocked him out with in the Savoy Hotel two months the left and right to the chin.

The battle was witnessed by 90,000 people and was one of the fiercest heavyweight contests fought in years.






