## TWO WORLDS

**P**OLITICALLY there are two worlds. There is a world which is democratic and comparatively free, and another world which, whatever other merits it may have, is neither democratic nor free, says an editorial in Canadian Churchman.

Economically there are two worlds. There is a world of prosperity and plenty, and there is a world of starvation and want.

We in our oasis of plenty do not like to admit the existence of this other world of destitution and want. To do so troubles our conscience. If there were children naked and starving in our attic, we would be able neither to rest nor eat until they were clothed and fed. But shivering and hungry children five thousand miles away we can banish from our thoughts. They belong to another world.

Not only politically and economically, but also spiritually there are two worlds. There is a world of Christian privilege and enlightenment, and there is a world of darkness, ignorance and despair. We who dwell in the former frequently but dimly comprehend the existence of the latter. This is why we so often look upon the Church, not as a rallying place for soldiers of the Crown, but rather, to quote someone's apt metaphor, as a sequestered retreat for spiritual Zombies.

But here surely is the crux of the whole matter. If there is ever to be one world, it will have to rest upon a spiritual basis. The foundation cannot be laid upon either wishful thinking or political planning. The supreme need is a cohesive power stronger than the disruptive force of hatred, suspicion, and selfish ambition.

### CHRIST'S DEITY

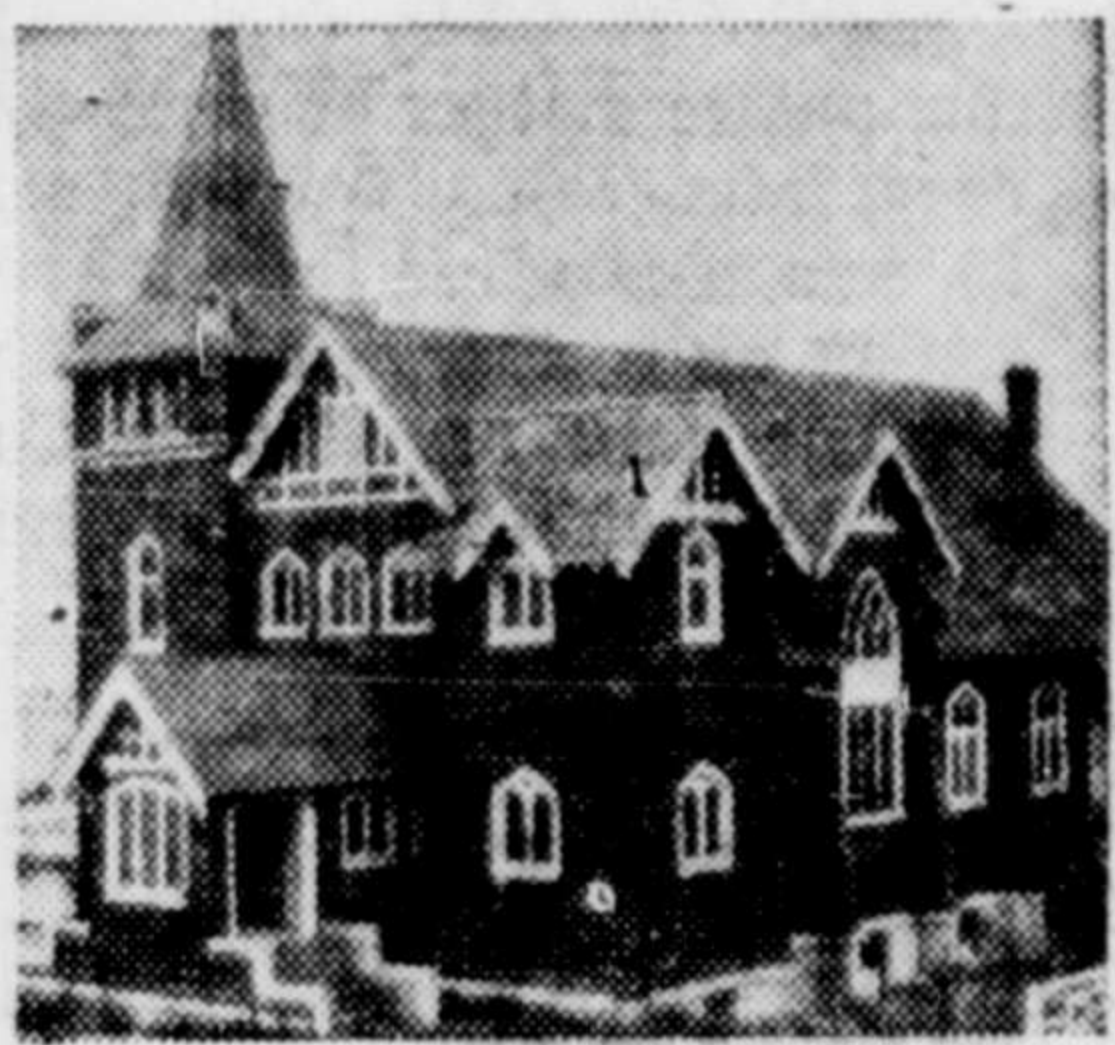
(By CAPTAIN EARLE F. JARRETT, Salvation Army)

Having had a glimpse of God and His glory, they wanted to build him three tabernacles, and to abide there. Then a Voice said: "This is My beloved Son... hear ye Him." The Jewish heart of Peter wanted to keep the law and prophets as well but when they opened their eyes Jesus filled their horizon... They saw Jesus only. They now saw that everything, law, prophecy, etc., was superseded by Jesus.

He is the all-sufficient, all in all. That is the lesson we are to learn from this story from the Scriptures. A New Dispensation has begun—it is Jesus only now. Christ stands on the hill-top, the hope of the world, sent from God to fulfil the law and all the prophecies, to redeem and save mankind. ## REFORESTATION!

A MESSAGE TO THE PEOPLE  
OF BRITISH COLUMBIA . . .

To ensure that British Columbia's forest lands are kept continuously productive, it sometimes is necessary to reforest, artificially, those parts that have been logged over or burned over. That means, to plant the areas with young trees, grown in forest nurseries, instead of depending on natural seeding from seed trees growing in the vicinity. At the present time, the British Columbia Forest Service is expending nearly \$500,000 a year to grow twenty million young trees annually in its three forest nurseries, and plant them on forest land that is not satisfactorily reforested.

These young plantations are very vulnerable to forest fires. They represent a big expenditure of time, effort, and money and should have every care taken of them.

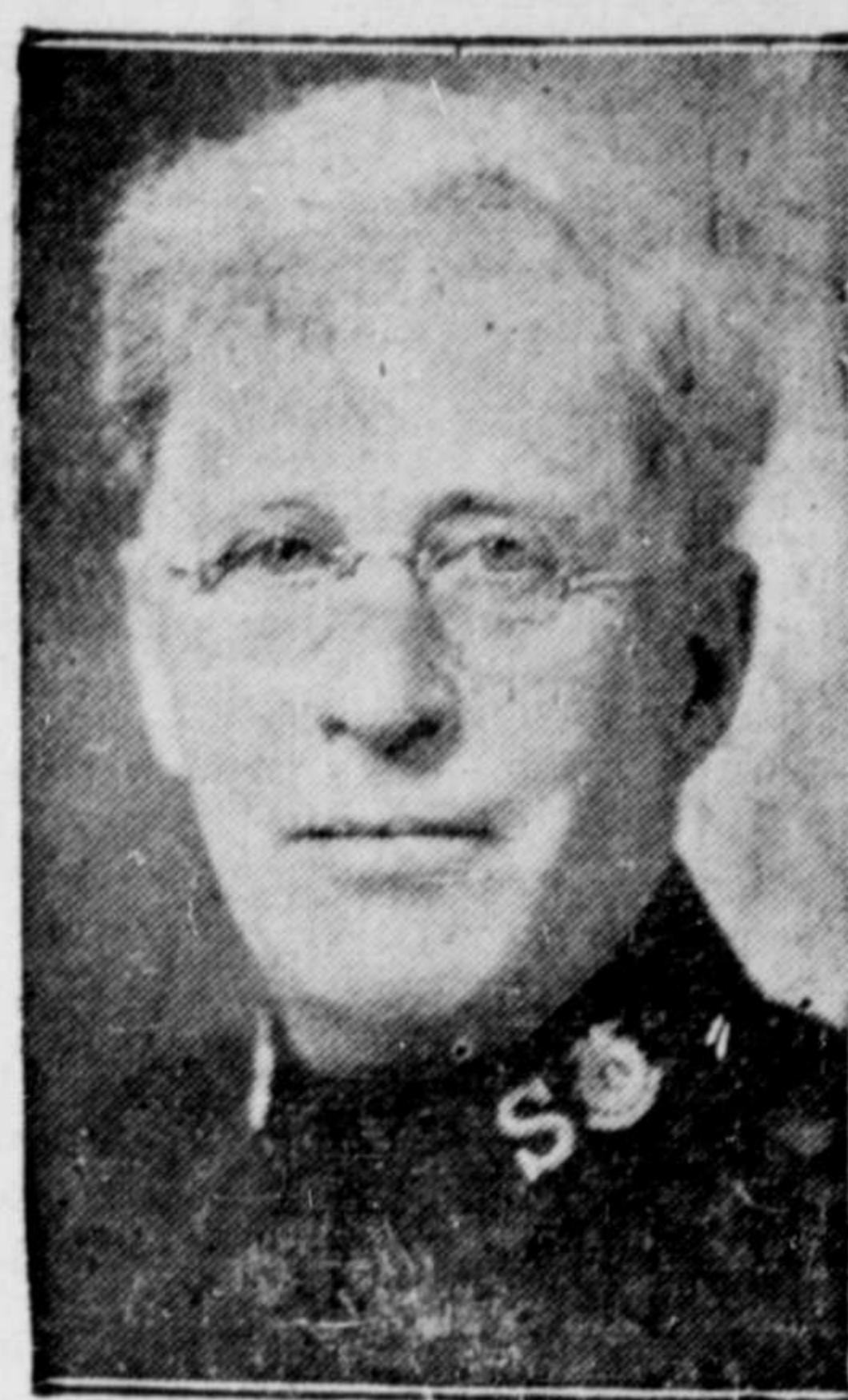

**REPORTORIAL EXPERIENCES**

(W. J. R.)

Occasional mention in the press of the possibility of Newfoundland becoming part of Canada reminds one of a visit to the ancient colony — long, long before grey hair was even imagined.

It was from the deck of the tramp steamer Carthagenian that we sighted the island's stern shores. The time was November and the crossing had been rough for the dozen or so young fellows, homeward bound from down in Uncle Paul Kruger's land.

Sailing from Liverpool was a wet experience. Just rain, and splashes of the same the next morning as the tramp lurched her way beyond dim glimpses of

the north of Ireland.

However, what was there in a bit of moisture to make youth, good health, high spirits, worry? There was something doing every day. Even the nimble, dripping porpoises, as they kept company, seemed to share in the general joy of life. Clouds hung low, there was a roll on, sea-legs were essential but who cared?

As the Carthagenian steamed into land-locked St. John's, a man-o-war, her band playing a brisk air, steamed out. First impressions were cheerful. Newfoundland hospitality, as the strangers found, was almost overpowering. The whole night was spent at the club and long before dawn, they felt strange no longer. The day was devoted to sight-seeing for St. John's, with her ships, industries, fisheries, and savor of the seas at every turn, has plenty to show.

All this, of course, was away

in advance of radio, wireless, super bombs and all that. For science has placed the old city in the very forefront of aviation and kindred discoveries, important in peace as well as in war.

A unique figure in life at St. John's was the proprietor of the Octagonal Castle—a place of entertainment out the road. And were we entertained at the Octagonal Castle? The old gentleman came originally from Baltimore and kept his casket in the drawing room. He loved to discuss its fine points with his guests. He has been occupying it, no doubt long ere this, leaving his eight-sided establishment to be carried along by other hands.

### Another Mine Disposed Of By Navy Halibut Fishing Ends Sunday

An explosive charge was used Thursday by two Royal Canadian Navy mine disposal officers to explode a Japanese mine which washed up on the beach on the southwest coast of Banks Island a week ago. The mine left a gaping hole in the beach. Warrant Officers H. G. Woods and R. Freeman, mine disposal officers from Esquimalt, flew to Prince Rupert on Wednesday after they had received reports of the mine being found by Capt. A. Enockson of the fisheries patrol vessel Sonia E. Thursday, they went to the spot 3 1/2 miles southeast of Kinzuwash (Shrub Harbor) in the navy boat Marysville under command of Lieut. Eric Jones, R.C.N. Instead of using their usual procedure of shooting the mine with a rifle, they decided to place an explosive charge beneath it. The mine made a violent explosion.
