We have always blamed lack of tourist interest in Prince Rupert on two factors: no paved highway leading into Central B.C. and our weather. But we much also remember that unless we invite tourists they will only come by way of the path of least resistance. Our highway has not been such a path.

Meanwhile, there are many attractions hitherto undeveloped which would hold tourists here in spite of the fact that we are a little more blessed with precipitation than the Yosemite Valley of California, or Banff.
