

Lack of Understanding

THE DAILY NEWS sees no reason why the tennis courts, provided by the Rotary Club as a public service at a great expense and tireless effort, has not been completed at this late date.

. It is a deplorable situation when red tape can entangle so simple a matter as a few hours spent by the city department of works in paving a tennis court. Especially when costs are born by the service club.

The following letter is published in this column because of its importance, news value and timeliness:

Editor, Daily News:

The recent write-up in your paper of July 3 headed, "Action Demanded on Tennis Courts" has prompted the undersigned to express their views.

We, as tennis playing enthusiasts Prince Rupert are, we believe, more confused and disappointed over the unnecessary delay in completing the courts than any one.

On May 14 Rupert tennis players were requested by the Rotarians to form a club and proceed with finalizing the necessary work which remained to be done to make the tennis courts suitable for play.

On May 21 a meeting was held, and the Prince Rupert Tennis Club elected officers to conduct the Club's affairs. Shortly after, the tennis club enthusiasts turned out for several nights in preparation for black topping. It was at this stage that we were informed, for the first time, that the tennis court project was in any way connected with the Parks Board.

A meeting of the Parks Board was attended by representatives of the Tennis Club, and the operation of the tennis courts was discussed. The Board believed that after some legal formalities, the operation of the tennis courts would, in all probability be vested in the club. However, voluntary work on the site was discontinued until the situation was completely clarified.

Since that time there has admittedly been a great deal of delay and buck-passing in connection with the adminisstration of the tennis courts; and even at this late date there is still no decision as to whether the Parks Board and the City Council can authorize the Prince Rupert Tennis Club to operate the court.

The Tennis Club has in no way contributed to this delay, but rather, has tried desperately to have the situation clarified in order that the remaining work can be accomplished as soon as possible.

As previously stated, the Club was informed on May 21 and has been ready and more than willing to proceed with the project had any authority been forthcoming. The complete lack of understanding is further evidenced by the fact that it was suggested in the report in the Daily News that nets be purchased when we have had nets on hand for some time. We also wish to point out that while the published report indicated "lack of co-operation" on the part of the Works Department, we have at all times found this department most co-operative, and to the best of our knowledge we do not believe that they have ever been authorized to proceed with the black-topping.

The Prince Rupert Tennis Club has always had but one objective in mind, and that is, to foster and enjoy the game of tennis. In view of the endless difficulties involved, the Club has decided to have no further interest in the operation of the tennis courts for 1952. This will, we sincerely hope, enable those in authority to have the courts ready for play as soon as possible, in order that the tennis-playing public can enjoy the game this summer.

Another use is that of holding solids in suspension. Most chocolate milk mixtures contain some of this substance, a tiny amount being sufficient to keep the chocolate from settling to the bettom. Other uses of the chemical are in inks, adhesives, boiler ; compounds, dettergents and cleaning compounds.
