SURVIVOR TELLS OF TRANSPORT'S DEATH

TWO INJURED MEN FLOWN TO HOSPITAL

Clarence Einarson, 19, and George R. Kings, 45, employees of the Torbitt silver mine at Alice Arm, 100 miles north of Prince Rupert, were brought to hospital here at 4 p.m. Wednesday by a Canadian Pacific Airlines plane that made the mercy flight following a premature blast at the mine two hours earlier.

Einarson received face injuries when a charge of explosives went off before its expected time during road construction work near the mine. Kings apparently injured his abdomen while lifting a heavy crate just before the plane landed at Alice Arm.

The men were flown to Prince Rupert by Capt. James Black in a Barclay-Grow seaplane after the company office had received a request for a plane at 1:45.

Einarson, who was assisting a rock driller, apparently had lit fuses on two charges and was putting a light to a third when one of the charges exploded.

The men are being treated by Dr. L. W. Kergin.

Einarson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Einar Einarson of Fort William, Ontario.

Mr. Kings has made his home in Prince Rupert for years.

Request of a plane to fly Einarson to hospital was made to George Stanbridge, local agent for the mining company, who immediately got in touch with CPAL.

WORLD FLIGHT IS COMPLETED

Truman and Evans Down Their Planes at Van Nuys, California

VAN NUYS, Calif. — Setting their wheels down on United States soil for the first time in nearly four months, two care-free ex-Army pilots last night completed the last 1,275-mile leg of their round-the-world flight in a pair of Cub cruisers. Shaggy as bears, George Truman, aged 39, born in Saskatchewan but now of Los Angeles, and Clifford Evans, 27, climbed wearily from their cabins and asked with wide grins: "Where are the barbers?"

U.S. ENVOY IS RECALLED

OTTAWA — Dana Doten, attache to the United States embassy in Ottawa, has been recalled to the United States, Junia Harrington, American minister to Canada, said last night. Mr. Harrington told reporters that Mr. Doten had been "ordered back" and had been given a transportation warrant to his home in Vermont. It is believed Mr. Doten's "recall" is in connection with a recent controversy which followed appointment of Edmond Turcotte of Montreal as Canadian consul-general in Chicago.

Canada Termed 'Favored Nation'

Dominion Stands on Threshold of Great Opportunities, Declares Trade Minister
MONTREAL — Trade Minister James MacKinnon told Canadian business yesterday that it was his opinion following a 25,000-mile trade tour to a dozen countries that Canada is an extremely favored nation and that it stood on the threshold of great trade opportunities.

In a speech prepared for delivery to a meeting of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, the minister reviewed conditions in the various countries he visited and disclosed that many large European firms were making plans to establish "very substantial branch plants in Canada. He did not elaborate. "We have seen something of the domestic problems faced by other nations, of local conditions of soil, of climate and geographical location," the minister said. In all these respects, Canada seems to be extremely favored among the nations. In this perspective, our own difficulties, though real, seem much less imposing."

FIVE-CENT CHECK PROVES COSTLY

KELOWNA—A cheque, issued for the amount of five cents to a Montreal woman, Mrs. Dorothy Christie, has been returned here, the amount being a rebate in taxes. Before it was returned, the postal revenue department had benefitted to the extent of 12 cents. It cost the city a three-cent stamp to make the cheque legal and 4 cents for a letter postage.

In her letter to the city, Mrs. Christie wrote: "I would like to frame this but it might ruin your book keeping, so I have endorsed and returned it and you can frame it. It is economically unsound to pay 15 cents exchange on it here and my Scottish soul can't bear the thought."

Stores Are Destroyed

Fifty Thousand Dollar Fire In Dunbar Shopping Area of Vancouver

VANCOUVER — Four stores were damaged, including two destroyed, last night in a \$50,000 fire in the Dunbar district of southwest Vancouver. The cause was not determined. Five persons are also homeless as a result of the blaze which is believed to have started in the Lane radio store whose large Christmas stock of radios, phonographs and records is believed to be a total loss.

STRIKE IS DEFERRED

Seamen's Union Continuing Endeavors to Obviate Tie-up

VANCOUVER — Deadline for strike action by 7500 seamen on 150 deepsea Canadian ships, tentatively set for midnight Tuesday night, was extended indefinitely, an official of the Canadian Seamen's Union (American Federation of Labor) announced. He said the Vancouver office had been informed by telephone from Montreal that President Harry Davis of the Canadian Seamen's Union was continuing negotiations in an effort to avert the deepsea tie-up.

Originally the Canadian Seamen's Union had set November 15 as the strike deadline in their house and wages dispute with the Shipping Federation of Canada, the operators representative.

JEALOUS MAN KILLS WOMAN

MONTREAL — Police here and at Ottawa yesterday pressed a search for a 34-year-old divorcee "because nobody will have her if I can't."

The body of the victim, Mrs. Tillie Deprato, was found Tuesday night in her lover's room by detectives who were alerted by a letter sent to her sister in which the man, identified by the police as Sylvio Albert, of Ottawa, told of the slaying.

SCARCITY OF COAL CARS IN ALBERTA

VANCOUVER—Shortage of box cars is holding up delivery of coal to British Columbia from Alberta. Mines report that, owing to acute shortage, some mines are being operated on a two or three-day schedule.



HOUDE RE-ELECTED
MONTREAL—Camilien Houde was re-elected by acclamation today for his sixth term as mayor of Montreal. His expected opponent failed to file papers as nominations closed.

RICHMOND, Surrey, Eng., — Of 2,682 school children examined in the area 192 were found to be undernourished, said the Surrey Education Committee's annual report.

REDS EXPECT TO BE OUTLAWED IN GERMANY

BERLIN — American intelligence reports say that the Communist party in western Germany, acting on instructions from Moscow, is making preparations for underground activity in the British and United States occupation zones in the event it should be outlawed as a result of strained relations between the eastern and western powers.

Although the United States military government has made no move to limit the freedom of the German communist party (K.P.D.) intelligence said that "K.P.D. anticipates" outlawing if the strain continues and if Germany is permanently partitioned because of the failure of the Russians and western powers to agree on unification.

OCTOBER FINES TOTAL \$1,465

Fines collected in police court during October totalled \$1,465, according to the monthly report of Sgt. L. A. N. Potterton. It brought the amount collected so far this year to \$9,832, as compared with \$12,206 for the same period last year. There were 50 cases in police court in October, 49 of which resulted in convictions. There was one dismissal.

25 DOUKS CONVICTED

Will Be Sentenced For Riotous Assembly and Burning

NELSON — A finding of guilty was returned last night against twenty-five Doukhobors charged with being "riotously and tumultuously assembled and destroying a building by fire." They will be sentenced later.

Among the convicted Doukhobors was William Malakoff whose farm dwelling the twenty five were accused of setting ablaze last August.

BULLETINS

BIG FOUR AGREEING
LONDON—United States and Russia with Great Britain and France have reached almost complete agreement on the set-up of a new government for Germany, it was stated today from the Big Four foreign ministers' conference which appears to be making definitely positive progress toward an accord on the peace terms for Germany and Austria.

ALASKA PLANE CRASH
JUNEAU—Eleven persons died in the crash of a DC-3 passenger and cargo plane when it attempted to land at Yakutat from Portland enroute to Anchorage, it was reported here today. The plane carried nine passengers and crew of two, all of whom met instant death.

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Officers Believed They Were 25 Miles Off Shore

Most of Crew Swept Away In Tempestuous Maelstrom

KETCHIKAN (CP)—A survivor of the ill-fated Clarksdale Victory disclosed today that officers and crew of the wrecked United States Army transport believed the ship to be about twenty-five miles off shore when she ran aground on Hippa Island on the west coast of Queen Charlotte Islands. Taken Off Shipwreck

Four Survivors and Four Bodies from U.S.S. Clarksdale Victory

A lifeboat party from the United States Coastguard cutter Wachusett yesterday afternoon boarded the bow of the wrecked United States Army transport Clarksdale Victory, impaled on Hippa Island reef and removed four survivors and bodies of four other men. Otherwise there were no further signs of life and the belief is that 44 other members of the crew perished.

After taking the men and bodies off the wreck, the lifeboat was unable to get back to the coastguard vessel but headed for shore where a fire was lighted and the survivors attended by a doctor with the party. Later it was hoped to get back aboard the cutter with the men and the bodies.

The survivors are suffering severely from exposure.

One of the survivors told rescuers that he believed the 45 other crew members lost their lives on being trapped in the stern end of the vessel which submerged after the ship broke in two soon after striking the reef.

PATROL BOATS SAYS SIX BODIES

American Coast Guard vessels and at least one Canadian boat planned to scour a 15-mile stretch of the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands today to seek bodies or possible survivors of the Clarksdale Victory which was battered to pieces on Hippa Island.

Word received here last night from the Fisheries patrol boat Sooko Post said that the vessel and the two Coast Guard boats at the scene of the wreck will probe the wave-beaten coastline today in hope of finding some of the 44 men whom so far are believed to have lost their lives.

Wednesday, a Coast Guard boat took off four survivors from the bow of the sunken vessel, and, according to word from Capt. Charles Stewart of the Sooko Post, there were six bodies as well.

The Sooko Post arrived at the scene of the wreck shortly before 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. She spent the night at Nestro Inlet, behind Hippa Island.

The Sooko Post, if the weather permits, will investigate the coastline as far north as Otard Bay, 15 miles north of Hippa Island.

FIVE YEARS FOR DOCTOR

VICTORIA — Dr. James P. Nye, 67-year old physician, yesterday was sentenced to five years in penitentiary following conviction of unlawfully supplying narcotics. A Royal Canadian Mounted Police officer testified that he had traded jewelry to the doctor for narcotics.

Mr. Justice A. M. Manson denied a plea for leniency on behalf of the doctor in view of his condition of health. His Lordship pointed out that on no less than three occasions had Nye supplied the officer.

grounding Monday night were related by Seaman Carlos M. Sanabria, aged 23, first of the survivors to be taken aboard the United States Coastguard cutter Wachusett.

Sanabria is suffering from severe shock and exposure, a fractured wrist, bruises and lacerations.

Three other survivors and the bodies of four seamen were to be brought aboard the cutter today. The other 45 officers and crew have been given up as lost. No passengers were aboard.

Sanabria said that the vessel "was lifted bodily by a roller, striking heavily, and she shuddered as she struck a rock."

All hands were called to the boat deck to abandon ship but, because of the mountainous breakers, it was thought safer to remain on board than to attempt to abandon in the ship's boats. Ten minutes later the vessel split in two at No. 3 hatch.

The section containing lifeboats and most of the crew slowly settled as the tremendous seas crashed heavily over the boat deck. The boats were swept away and in groups of two or three the crew was swept overboard into the maelstrom of churning waters, wreckage, oil and rocks.

"The last I saw of the master (Capt. Gerald R. Laugeson of Oakland, California), he was climbing to the boat deck with about half the crew shortly before I was washed over the side. After about twenty minutes, I was washed ashore. I passed out until morning."

LABOR WINS GRAVESEND

Close Margin In British By-Election Yesterday

GRAVESEND, Kent — The Labor government passed one of its most severe tests in the midst of post-war reconstruction when its candidate was declared victorious by a narrow margin early today in the by-election in this small Parliamentary constituency. With the result still fresh, voters trampled to cast their ballots in two other by-elections.

Final figures in Gravesend by-election, sequel to the expulsion from the House of Commons of Garry Allighan, Labor member, for "disorderly conduct," showed Sir Richard Acland, Labor, 24,692, and Conservative Frank Taylor, 23,017, a plurality of 1,675 compared with Allighan's margin of 7,056 in a three-cornered fight in the general election of 1945. Nearly eighty percent of the voters in the constituency record exercised their franchise.

Propaganda Needed

A LESSON might well be taken from the Russian methods of artful propaganda. If it was, there might be a lot less bother about the spread of downright red propaganda which is being so skillfully broadcast these days.

While such propaganda, much of it on the verge of subversiveness, is being circulated widely with much effect, the principles of democracy, on the other hand, are to large extent unemphasized.

The communists and the socialists, working in season and out, patiently and against odds, are always enthusiastic, watching and grasping at every opportunity to present and put their doctrines across. And they are influencing people too.

Call it propaganda or what we may, it is becoming more and more important in every day affairs. We should be dishing some out ourselves.

POPULARIZING BANK REPORT

A GAIN THIS YEAR, following a practice it originated, the Bank of Montreal has come forward with a well-illustrated, easily understandable bank statement for the benefit of its more than 1,500,000 depositors. Unique among bank statements, the report, which covers the 130th year of the B of M's career, can be read with complete understanding by everyone.

In the explanation of "the facts behind the figures", the bank emphasizes that money deposited does not lie idle, but works constantly for the building of the nation.

"Here is the money that makes the wheels of commerce turn," the report points out. "Here is the money that helps the farmer garner his crop... that helps the lumberman buy equipment and pay his men. Here are the dollars that enable the bank to make more than 500 personal loans every business day of the year to men and women who need money to meet emergencies and take advantage of opportunities."

The statement is also brightened considerably by the addition of little thumbnail sketches throughout, and the use of simple, everyday language in place of the more formal financial terms usually found in bank reports.

GOOD CONVERSATION

THE LOST ART of conversation can be revived, says Gelett Burgess in The Reader's Digest for December, if the principle which is the basis of all good manners be applied to talk. "This principle is the avoidance, in social contacts, of emotional friction caused by irritation, boredom, envy, egotism or ridicule."

In an article condensed from Your Life, Burgess deplores all purely subjective talk, such as that centering on your health, troubles, domestic concerns, wife or husband. "Streams of personal gossip destroy all objective discussion of art, science, history, the day's news."

Monopolizing the conversation is ruinous; occasional "flashes of silence" make it delightful. To state a fact with finality is to force an opinion on another, but to qualify the statement with "it seems to me" leaves the subject for the next speaker to enlarge upon.

Differences of opinion may extend and embellish an interchange of views, but flat contradiction is a conversation-stopper, Burgess says. While interruption puts the train of conversation off the track, an occasional "grace note," such as "How wonderful!" is a good way to urge the speaker on.

Good listening, essential to good talk, requires "not only your ears but your eyes, hands and even posture." The author has tested the interest of some of his articles by reading them aloud to friends. "If their eyes went to a picture on the wall, if their fingers fiddled, the manuscript wasn't holding them and I marked the dull spots for revision."

The ideal number for good dinner talk is six, Burgess holds. With more, "the conversation is apt to break up into separate side dialogues." If each of the six is engaged in a different pursuit, so much the better for shop talk will be avoided.

NON-FOG AREAS GROW TALL MEN

Geographer Greatly Impressed With Physique of Prairie Farmer

VANCOUVER — The big-boned men of the Prairies are taller than eastern Canadians, geographer Jasper H. Stembridge told the Vancouver Institute at University of British Columbia.

The geographical editor of Oxford University Press said he was greatly impressed by the physique of Prairie farmers.

He believed their physical development was due to lack of fog or dust-bound atmospheric conditions, which allow an extreme amount of ultra-violet rays to penetrate to the earth.

The prairie-bred strong men were proof of the triumph of environment over heredity.

"Man is a creature of his environment," he said. "The mechanical ingenuity of Eskimos is proof of this." Sheer, stark necessity compelled them to depend on the skill of their hands and the quickness of their eyes.

TIMBER CRUISER HAS TOUGH LIFE

REGINA—The life of a timber cruiser—the man who cuts and marks trees for lumbering—is rated the toughest in the forest industry. In the bush on a year basis, the cruiser must fight quills, flies and extra heat in summer, and deep snow and sub-zero weather in the winter. His life is constant hardship.

HEAVY INDUSTRY: HEAVY EQUIPMENT

Costly Machinery

IN the coastal region of British Columbia you can't make lumber by hand. It is an industry of big trees. That means it's a heavy industry.

HOW CAN I ???

By ANNE ASHLEY

Q. How can I remove grease spots from paper?
A. Lay a piece of blotting paper over the spot and press with a warm iron. If it doesn't remove it, cover quickly with chalk, or fuller's earth, and let stand for 24 hours. Repeat, if necessary.

Q. How can I keep brown sugar from lumping?

A. Keep the brown sugar in an open jar in the refrigerator and it will become and remain soft and free from lumps.

Q. How can I get rid of crickets?

A. Put cucumber peelings, cut in thin strips, on the floor at night near their haunts.

Q. How can I save sugar when sweetening acid fruits?

A. When sweetening acid fruits, such as gooseberries, use one-half teaspoon of soda to a quart of fruit, and stir before sweetening. Less sugar will be required.

Q. How can I clean gilt frames?

A. Gilt frames can be cleaned by dipping a soft cloth in milk and rubbing it gently over the soiled spots. Repeat several times, if necessary.

Q. How can I keep cheese fresh?

A. When one wishes to keep cheese fresh for a long time, cover it with a thin coating of paraffin. Before serving, remove the paraffin.

CANADA FOR PARTITION

NEW YORK (AP)—Justice Minister Isley declared yesterday that Canada was voting for the Palestine partition because it is the best of four "unattractive and difficult alternatives, but it does so with heavy hearts and many misgivings."

Addressing the general session of the United Nations, Isley said that "no responsible delegation could do otherwise after listening to the threat of reprisal and all the talk of fire and sword which have been heard from both sides to this controversy." He said it would be "folly" to assume that "there would be any less likelihood of disorder if any of the other alternatives to the Palestine partition were adopted."

QUEBEC TOWN HOTEL BURNS

DUPARQUET, Que. (AP)—An early morning fire today gutted the Goldfield Hotel in this town of some 2600 persons and left one man dead and another missing. Damage is estimated at \$75,000.

RIDICULE ROME STRIKE REPORT

ROME (AP)—Rome newspapers, echoing last week's threat by the pro-Communist Socialist leader Pietro Nenni, forecast yesterday a general country-wide strike that will include even Italy's public services. As it did with the Nenni announcement, the Italian General Confederation of Labor, the only organization which could call such a strike in Italy, ridiculed the report.







GARDEN NOTEBOOK

NATURE SOWS FLOWER SEED IN FALL; WHY NOT YOU?

NATURE SOWS

Whenever nature produces annual flowers in our gardens from self-sown seed, she demonstrates that annuals can be grown from seed sown in the fall.

The list of annuals which can self-seed may vary in different sections of the country, but it is probable that annual lark-

will take a chance for the sake of earlier plants. Large, soft seeds, even of hardy varieties, may decay in the wet ground, but the hard seeds will lie safe and protected from being washed out of the soil by rains, or injury in some other way.

A seed bed surrounded by a wooden curb is an excellent place to sow fall annuals. A cold frame will do as well; and many sow seeds in the open garden, where experience has shown drainage is good. If seeds are sown in rows, which can be marked, it is easy to check results and protect the seedlings when they appear.

Sow the seed thinly, mixing

small seed with dry sand to help scatter it, and do not sow much deeper than you would in the spring. Many gardeners cover the row with a shallow layer of sand after sowing. In a seed bed, or cold frame, after the ground has frozen a light mulch of leaves may be placed over the bed to keep the frost in. This mulch should be removed before the seeds sprout in the spring.

Annuals which are usually successful from fall sowing include alyssum, snapdragons, calceola, calendula, calliopsis, candytuft, centaurea, cyanus, clarkia, cosmos, eschscholtzia, euphorbia, gypsophila, larkspur, lupin, nicotiana, petunia, annual phlox, annual poppies and sweet peas.

Conditions in the spring are usually fine for transplanting and plants may be moved from the seed bed to the border about the time one would be sowing seed in the spring. The fall sown plants are not soft like



spur and cornflowers (centaurea cyanus) will be on the list almost anywhere. Larkspur, indeed, should be sown in the fall whenever possible.

Plants from fall sowing get started much earlier in the spring, and they flower almost as soon as indoor plants, besides being larger and more vigorous.
