An Important Session DIGHTLY ENOUGH, accent is laid in the Speech I from the Throne at the opening of the new

session of Parliament at Ottawa on the closely inter-related questions of aid to Europe and the international fiscal situation as it affects the Dominion's economy.

There are important internal matters such as housing, labor code, income tax revision and veterans' aid which are taken into account in the general enunciation of legislative program. Important as they may be, however, they are still subordinate to the solution of world problems in connection with which Canada is looked upon to play an ever greater part. Without composition of these world problems, indeed, it is difficult to proceed in a stabilized way with permanent domestic policy although the government, as indicated in the Geneva trade agreements on the one hand and the temporary import restrictions on the other, has been endeavouring to compromise between the laying down of long range policy and the imposition of measures to meet passing and emergent conditions.

There may be no shooting war on but there are problems facing the nation today almost as serious and possibly more perplexing than those involved in the waging of war. The current Parliamentary session may well be one of epochal importance in the affairs of the land.

PEARL HARBOR

AN ANNIVERSARY to remember without fail It will be six years Sunday since Canada declared war on Japan, just a few hours after the shock of Pearl Harbor was felt around the world.

United States naval power in the Pacific was, for the time being, humbled. There was humiliation in the thought that her vigilence had been outwitted. Some of her finest ships were shattered. Not only had her sailors been killed and wounded. There was a deep feeling of hurt pride.

And not only at Pearl Harbor was there dismay. Thousands of miles further west, Canadians in Hong Kong were fighting for the lives they were destined to lose. The Sun Flag was hoisted over them, as Christmas dawned. Five hundred and fifty, including their commander, died.

Pearl Harbor is something to keep ever in mind. It is an anniversary and also a lesson.
