Queen Barbara Wilson, winner of Prince Rupert's Port Day regal honors, will be crowned officially at a ceremony held at the Civic Centre carnival grounds Friday night. Barbara, second successive Kinsmen candidate in two years, won the right to be Port Queen last night by the widest margin ever recorded.

The pretty Metlakatla girl was pronounced winner of the five-week Queen competition at 12:45 last night after a vote count that lasted an hour and a half. Her majority was almost as great as the total individual vote of the other candidates.

Here are the official figures: Queen Barbara Wilson (Kinsmen) 237,500.  
Betty Pullen (Gyro) 121,000.  
Ruth Jerstad (Sons of Norway) 119,800.  
Lorraine Youngman (Junior Chamber) 93,000.

This year's Port Queen voting was the heaviest since 1945 when the city was filled with troops and brings more than \$5,000 to the carnival funds which will be used for Civic Centre purposes.

The campaign was one of the most energetic in the history of either Port Day or the Civic Centre carnival. Its effectiveness was due to the work of the individual campaign managers and the candidates' supporters.

**LEADS PARADE**  
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Queen-elect Barbara's majority was 116,500 votes over her nearest competitor, Gyro-sponsored Betty Pullen. All of the three other candidates will act as attendants at Friday night's coronation ceremony. This morning, they were with the Queen-elect at the Port Day opening.

Civic Centre carnival officials expressed satisfaction at the volume of votes, which they said were greater than they anticipated from preliminary returns. They showed the backing which the public is giving the Civic Centre on the basis of its first full year's operation, several declared.

The security council today rejected Hungary's bid for membership in the United Nations by a vote of 1 to 1 with nine abstentions.

### Hundreds Line Wharf at Port Day Regatta Opening

Port Day, Prince Rupert's annual marine festival, got under way this morning with a bustle and color that attracted an estimated 700 people to the Canadian National dock to watch competitive and display that continued throughout the day.

The program was opened with the parade of boats led off by the packer Cape Perry, carrying on her bridge Queen-elect Barbara Wilson and the three princesses that will attend her coronation Friday night. Flanking the Queen's barge was Dr. R. G. Large's cruiser Fuselier, flagship of the Prince Rupert Yacht Club.

Winner of the best-decorated boat prize was the gillnetter Goldfinch, which was awarded a \$25 prize, while the Alyanah gillnetter Baby Rose received the \$15 second prize. Dr. R. G. Large's cruiser Fuselier received third prize.

Scheduled on this morning's program were a rowboat race for children 16 years and under, a halibut gear-baiting contest, salmon collectors' boat race, rowboat race, open to all contestants, cruiser race, and gillnetters' race.

The Prince Rupert Civic Band, directed by Peter Lien, was in attendance on the wharf this morning. The Royal Marine band of H.M.S. Kenya was on the after-deck of the Queen's barge during the opening parade.

Beautiful sunny weather is favoring the Port Day proceedings.

Presence of the smart Greenville concert band, which paraded the streets this morning and again this afternoon, is also contributing greatly to the festive air of the day.

### Trade May Not Suffer At Present

STATEMENT MADE TODAY BY MINISTER OF FINANCE ABBOTT

OTTAWA (CP)—Unofficial observers last night were inclined to agree with a statement of Sir Wilfrid Easly, head of the British Treasury mission in Washington, that Canada will be one of the countries hardest hit by Britain's suspension of the free convertibility of sterling. However, a top government official expressed a less serious view.

Temporary suspension of conversion of sterling into dollars and Britain's undertaking not to make further withdrawals from her loan from the United States for the time was announced in London Wednesday.

Sir Wilfrid said "Canada's position will be seriously affected by what we have done and negotiations with her treasury officers are going on at this moment."

Minister of Finance Douglas Abbott said today that the new British action to restrict the transferability of sterling would not affect the trade situation between Great Britain as trade in wheat, bacon and beef did not depend for the time being at least on free exchange of pounds and dollars. There was no change in financial arrangements between British and Canada governing purchases in this country.

### INDONESIANS WITHDRAWING

REPUBLICAN CAPITAL MAY BE MOVED TO SUMATRA IN VIEW OF NEW DUTCH ASSAULT

JOGJAKARTA—The Indonesian cabinet, frankly anticipating a full scale resumption of hostilities with the Dutch, met in emergency session yesterday to complete plans for removal of the republican seat of government to Sumatra if need be.

The cabinet's first move was to designate Vice-President Mohammed Hatta, who is now at the mountain stronghold of Bukittinggi in North Sumatra, as vice-commander in chief of Indonesian armed forces, thus enabling him to assume formal leadership of both civil government and army if President Soekarno is unable to function here.

Mr. Abbott admitted the necessity for the British restrictions on sterling exchange and welcomed the announcement that they were intended to be only temporary.

Under the present arrangement British purchases are financed by drawing on a \$1,250,000,000 Canadian loan to Britain and partly by payment in United States dollars and gold.

Mr. Abbott made it clear that the British action did not "in any way" affect trade and other transactions between the United Kingdom and Canada and other parts of the sterling trade areas.

### H.M.C.S. ANTIGONISH HERE TO TAKE PART IN CITY'S ANNUAL PORT DAY

Prince Rupert's "fleet" of visiting warships received an addition at 3 p.m. Wednesday when H.M.C.S. Antigonish, a frigate of the Royal Canadian Navy, docked at the government wharf to take part in the annual Port Day festivities which began this morning.

Placed on west coast duty last April, Antigonish is commanded by Lieut. Anthony Law, D.S.O., R.C.N., whose brilliant war career as commander of Motor torpedo boats in the English Channel was one of the major personal sagas of World War II.

Antigonish has a crew of 180, of which 40 are permanent navy men and the rest officer cadets from Canadian universities. She will be in port until tomorrow morning, when she will leave to return south to Gambia Island to pick up a number of Sea Cadets for a short cruise.

The anti-submarine vessel was sent to Prince Rupert at request of the Junior Chamber of Commerce which asked that the Canadian navy be represented during Port Day which it sponsors each year.

Lieut. Law, a veteran of 5 1/2 years overseas, is senior lieutenant in the Canadian navy. From Quebec City, he marked up a vast tonnage of German merchant ships sunk in raids on the German and Netherlands coasts as commander of a war-

## Island Hero Laid at Rest

All Queen Charlottes Pay Tribute to Late Francis Harry Beaven

One of the largest and most impressive funeral services ever held on the Queen Charlotte Islands took place recently at Queen Charlotte City when the remains of Francis Harry Beaven only son of Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Beaven, postmaster and pioneer merchant at Queen Charlotte City, were laid to rest. Rev. W. H. Burgess of Toronto officiated.

Prior to interment, a service was held at the Queen Charlotte City United Church where relatives and friends from far and near gathered to pay their last respects to a gallant and popular young man. The Church was crowded to capacity, and proved much to small to accommodate the sympathetic crowd which sought to enter. All activities in the entire district ceased during the solemn hour. Mr. Burgess was eloquent and powerful. His message was comforting and well received.

Immediately following the Church service, while the congregation remained seated, twenty-four flower bearers stepped forward and were handed the flower tributes that had been received and suitably arranged near the altar in the Church. Loaded with the tributes they took up a position outside of the building, forming two rows between which the pall bearers passed carrying the remains to the hearse for interment.

The pall bearers were Joe Baker and William Wainwright representing the Pacific Mills, Sandspit Camp, William Mathers representing Sandspit, Edmund Stevens, representing Skidegate Mission, and Clarence Severson, representing Queen Charlotte City. All were well known to the deceased.

Interment was made at Tlell where the same procedure as that which followed the Church service, was carried out, and where the last rites were solemnized, Rev. W. H. Burgess again officiating.

Francis lost his life endeavoring to save a young girl who found herself in difficulties when swimming beyond her depth at Copper Bay. Her plight was seen by the deceased, who was near by with his wife and family. He immediately plunged to her rescue and brought the drowning girl almost to safety when he showed signs of exhaustion. His wife, looking on quickly sensed the gravity of the situation. She rushed into the water, took the girl from her husband, only to find him slowly sinking beyond her reach. Her frantic efforts to grasp him proved fruitless and he disappeared from her sight never to be seen again alive. Help was quickly summoned and a rescue squad from Pacific Mills camp quickly arrived. The body was recovered but all efforts to revive him proved unsuccessful. The deceased was in his thirty-fifth year. He owned and operated a small saw mill at Sandspit. He took a keen interest in community affairs and his pleasing personality and willingness at all times to be of service to others, won him the esteem and respect of the entire district.

Surviving are a wife and two

children, Harry Roland, age 8, and Sylvia Frances, age 6, residing at Sandspit. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Beaven and a sister Edna, reside at Queen Charlotte City.

The wife's father Thomas Pelton of Haney, and her brother Ralph of Vancouver, arrived by plane to attend the funeral.

## Excess Profits Tax Act Standard Profits Claims NOTICE

Recent amendments to the above Act provide that all standard profits claims must be filed with the Department of National Revenue before 1st September, 1947.

All applications are required to be in such form and contain such information as may be prescribed by the Minister and the Minister may reject an application that is not made in such form or that does not contain such information.

The prescribed forms (S.P.1) are available at all District Income Tax offices of the Dominion Government.

All pertinent information required on the form must be included or attached thereto in schedule form. Tentative or incomplete forms or those filed after 31st August, 1947, will not be accepted.

He switched from the Fraser to the Parsnip River, another British Columbia river which Mackenzie followed to the Fraser and the sea. He traversed to the Peace River, following the South Hart - Pack-Lesser Slave Lake-Little Slave River - Athabaska route to the Saskatchewan.

From there he got into the old, popular trade routes of New France - Lake Winnipeg, the Winnipeg River, the thread-like waterways of the Minnesota-Ontario border. Slipping through Grand Portages, he coasted the north shore of Lake Superior and entered the French River. Then, following the shore of Lake Nipissing, he came down the Matawa to the Ottawa River and the capital.

It was a long haul and sometimes the flies were bad—"the flies were terrible on Lake Superior, but I ran out of them about 50 miles from Sault Ste. Marie."

Some of the portages were "back-breaking," especially the nine-mile grand portage in Minnesota which took him two days to complete with all his equipment. Sometimes he slept out, sometimes he found lodgings in settlements at night.

He made a point of visiting the mayors of all the towns and cities he passed through. Now he has a bulky list of their signatures. In New York he'll present the collection to Mayor O'Dwyer along with greetings from former Mayor Cornett of Vancouver.

He figures his expenses have run something like \$50 a month—"a lot cheaper than I could live in a city."

When he gets to New York he's going to look around the big city for a few days and then its back home to Cripple Creek—canoe and all—but this time he's going by train.

## ARMY ESTATE BRANCH ENDS

OTTAWA—With the disbandment at the end of this month of the estate branch of the Department of National Defence, more than 44,000 closed files, containing all the details of the service estates of the men and women of the Canadian armed forces who died in uniform during the past eight years, have been laid away for safe keeping.

Close to \$20,000,000 has been distributed to date. The figures show that the average value of individual estates increased steadily from year to year.

Col. L. M. Firth, O.B.E., who directed the affairs of the branch is returning to civil life. When he closes it, he will turn over to the Judge Advocate General some 100 estates still open and seventy cases involving \$50,742 for which there have never been traced any heirs.

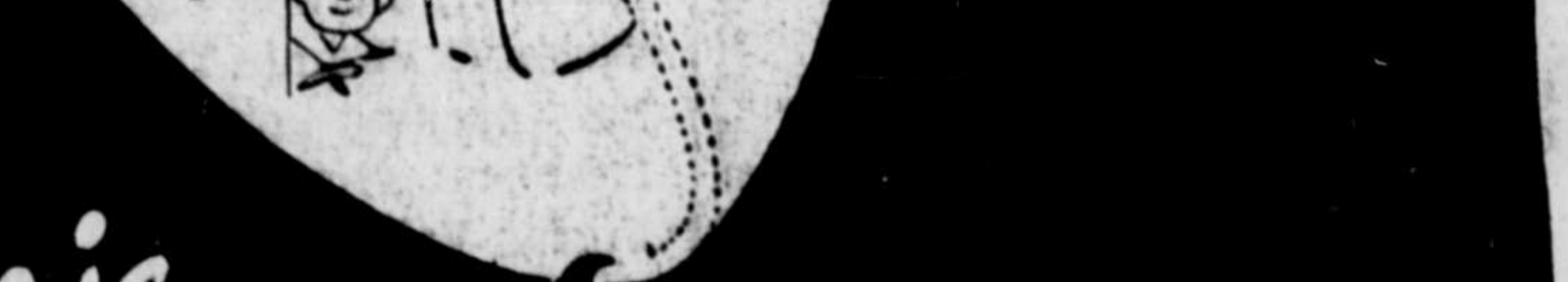
