It should be good news, too, for the whole province that there is to be such a substantial augmentation of facilities for the care of the worthy aged people for whom little enough has been done. The provincial government is to be congratulated on this action and, no doubt, also the minister of lands and forests and member for Skeena, Hon. E. T. Kenney, who, it is well known, has been interesting himself for some time in the satisfactory disposal of the buildings and, in the successful culmination of which, he acknowledges the active support of the various boards of trade and chambers of commerce of the district individually and collectively.

MORE CONTROLS GONE

THE Ottawa government has taken another stride toward complete decontrol of commodities. Subsidies are to be discontinued on grain used for livestock feeding. The action, effective yesterday, narrows the field of restricted items to a handful of essentials, such as rents, sugar, fats, oils, wheat, flax seed, grape seed and sunflower seed.

The decontrol order was announced by Finance Minister Abbott and Agriculture Minister Gardiner. It stated that the feed grain assistance policy is to be maintained until the end of the current crop year.

Removal of price controls on oats and barley allows the return of ree trading in these grains as soon as the grain exchanges wish to begin.
