Losing Our Museum

VIE ARE told that there is a grave danger of W losing one of the main cultural attractions in the city—the museum. And this because some 10,000 people cannot afford or are not interested enough in its support.

In a way, blame for the lack of public interest in the collection of historic relics is not to be laid at the feet of the general public, nor at the paltry donations of tourists.

Very few projects-if any-can get along without promotion; without/publicity and advertising. Our museum cannot get along unless it is steadily being kept in the public eye.

Fostering the museum also appears to fall in line with that of promoting tourism in Prince Rupert, and unless the project is taken up by some organization with promotional instincts and working ability, both are likely to suffer defeat.

We have here a considerable amount of the successful promotion of various projects by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, a well organized body in Prince Rupert. Promotion of tourism, including that of the museum, would appear to be a project of continuing challenge to young men and one of outstanding benefit to the entire community.

Belief in Miracles

DELIEVERS in miracles can defend their faith, D with some logic, against the attacks of skeptics. It is just as miraculous, it is said, for the world and its affairs to run smoothly as it is, for instance, for the world to stop turning.

Such a point of view is admirable, whether one can adopt it or not. To adopt it is to regain somethingof the unspoiled spirit of childhood, which accepts the world as a place where anything may happen and where everything that happens is wonderful.

The sadness of growing old is not only in the limitations that age places on one's activities, but also in the loss of the capacity for wonder and delight in what the fates may provide.

The person who is used to routine, accepts without surprise the daily rising of the sun, the annual return of summer (it has to come some time) and the perennial folly of politicians and bureaucrats. Only children and poets dream of a world of perpetual spring, where the sun might occasionally rise in the west, and that a government be either allwise, or unnecessary.

But it is worth while to remember that the progress our world has made has come from dreams of those who refused to yield to routine.

Belief in the possibility of a miracle is the first step in bringing it to pass.






