Great Britain will, doubtless, come through and continued aid will be one of the principal factors to pull her through since it would be fatal to the United States if Britain failed.

THE ROYAL NAVY has long been more or less I identified with the Pacific and the same, though

perhaps in lesser degree, is true of all the Navies. Hark back to stout old Sir Francis Drake whom, we are told, tarried at, or near what we call the Golden Gate of San Francisco. Ocean rover, explorer, raider, fighter and navigator he went, in his frail craft, about wherever man could sail. Indeed, he sailed around the globe and that was a feat of seamanship four centuries ago. In his wake followed more captains of renown-Cook, Vancouver and scores of others whose exploits provide a proud record. Note the hundreds of place names along the Pacific coast, and trace back the origin of each. Many, indeed, bear the name of some man who wore the Navy blue.

#### THEN AND NOW

COMPARISONS are sometimes termed odious but not always. Contrast, in your minds eye, the waterfront at Prince Rupert as it is today with how it looked, say, twenty years ago. View it from out front-about midway across the harbor. The general situation was not so "hot" in 1927 and the next decade was fated to be a lean one-although, Prince Rupert, in mercy, did not and could not know it. Yes, the skyline was commonplace enough. There was not the slightest hint of translating into reality the fabulous forecast of future fame that some cheerful genius had painted on the old Westholme Theatre screen. But today there is a difference, and it is greater than most of us realize. Today has all the earmarks of an up and coming seaport.
