Canada Represented in Important Confereces at Geneva

GENEVA. (P) - Experts on everything from wheat to penknives sit in 100 offices here taking their way toward what the United Nations has designed as a happier world.

They represent the 17 countries including Canada which are members of the international trade organizations preparatory committee. Since last April, they have been engaged on two tasks:

Establishing rules for international trade to avert ruinous trade wars and,

2. Lowering tariff barriers that hamper the free flow of goods. The first of these tasks has been completed. 



# Welcome, British Timbermen!

ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT of many U prominent visiting groups which have been in Prince Rupert during this busy year of postwar development is that of the United Kingdom Timber Trades Federation, comprising some forty leading British timbermen, who are here today to start a swing through the central interior which will conclude a three weeks' tour of British Columbia. They have been seeing the forests and the great timber manufacturing concerns in the southern part of the province. They have conferred with leaders of government and industry. Thus, at first hand, they have been seeing a picture of the industry here and, what is possibly more important, have been making personal contacts which may later on lead to substantial and well founded business rela-

Since the tour was arranged, largely under the auspices of the British Columbia government, and even since the visitors arrived in Canada, vital changes have been occurring in trade arrangements which will undoubtedly disrupt considerable of the business that has been going on during and since the war. Possibly, it is just as well that the visit should have been so timed so that our guests will have obtained an understanding of the situation which may aid them in making the necessary changes.

As has been said, the time of the visitors so far on their tour has been largely given over to viewing the different phases of the timber industry. Prince Rupert, judging from their itinerary, appears to be about the only place where they have not actually inspected a sawmill or some sort of operating timber manufacturing plant. Here, however, they are seeing one of the world's finest ports-excelled by p.m. none in Canada—a port of access to one of this country's greatest and newest timber areas, an area which is today enjoying its greatest expansion and for which much greater things, as indicated by the march of recent events, is immediately in store.

They will hear of the 50 billion feet of merchantable timber in the area and will see how splendidly this port is equipped. No doubt, they will go away with a picture of the possibilities it has in relationship to ocean shipping between Canada and the United Kingdom. So far much central interior lumber has found its way to the Old Country by crossing the continent by rail. The prospect now is that, if the lumber trade between Central British Columbia and the United Kingdom is to be maintained and developed, the port of Prince Rupert must needs be used more and more. So it is fitting that these important people should be spending this day with us here.

On behalf of Central British Columbia it is a pleasure to welcome them and we hope their visit to Prince Rupert and the trip on to Prince George and homewards will be pleasant, profitable and mutually beneficial.
