tion. Fall varieties of salmon were being run through the canning plant. The fish were followed from the delivery platforms through the lines to the canning retorts. Making of cans and nets was also seen after which delicious refreshments were served in the mess hall.

Acknowledgment of the hospitality was extended to the host, H. F. Robins, manager of the cannery, by William Drummond of South Shields, England, in a witty speech.

The party also saw the site at Watson Island where the E.C. Bridge and Dredging Co. with big machinery is now digging out rock and earth at the rate of thousands of yards per day on the site of the Celanese Corporation of America's projected \$15,000,000 or more cellulose pulp plant.

Returning to the city late in the afternoon, the party was shown the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. (B.C. Packers) at Seal Cove and the ocean dock and lumber assembly wharf.

Later in the evening the dele-

gation proceeded in special cars attached to the regular east-bound train, their next stop to be at Prince George where they will remain for two days before continuing east with stops at Jasper, Winnipeg, Ottawa and Montreal, sailing from the latter port for home on the Empress of Canada September 27.

Officials accompanying the party, besides Agent-General McAdam, are T. G. Sturgess, Victoria, personal representative of the provincial Department of Trade and Industry; R. Douglas Roe, Ottawa, Dominion timber trade commissioner; C. W. Phillips, secretary of the Timber Trades Federation; Ivor Reece, Canadian National Railways, Ottawa; P. R. Reynolds, Canadian Pacific Railways, London, England; Harry Bowman, C.N.R. colonization agent, Prince George; is accompanying the party from here to Prince George having come here to meet them.

Only member of the delegation who was unable to make the trip to Prince Rupert was B. T. Price of Cardiff, Wales, who suffered a heart attack in Vancouver and had to enter hospital there. Greetings were sent from here to him.



Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers

TOMATOES PAY DIVIDENDS ARE EXCELLENT FOR CANNING USE

When first introduced into Britain by Sir Walter Raleigh the tomato was prized for its beauty and nurtured carefully in the gardens of the nobles.

What a pleasant discovery it was when this queen of horticultural splendor was found to be edible and healthful as well as beautiful to look at.

This one fruit seemed to blend with protein foods so it was usually served with the meat course, thus today tomatoes are often classed as vegetables rather than fruits.

People usually prefer fruits while they are fresh but tomatoes retain most of the natural raw flavor when canned.

From a health standpoint tomatoes rate high. Being one of our best Canadian sources of vitamin C, a glass of tomato juice, served as an appetizer or as the beverage with a salad or sandwich lunch, adds not only flavor but also vitamins and minerals.

Taking the average of many assays on tomato juice and tomatoes canned it is found that a five-ounce glass of juice or 2/3 cup (five and a third ounces) of canned tomatoes, would provide approximately 1/3 of the daily requirement of ascorbic acid. So tomatoes pay dividends not only when served raw, but when served canned or as tomato juice.

Home economists recommend home canning of tomatoes, which because of their acidity do not require such long processing times as other non-acid vegetables. Complete directions for canning tomatoes and tomato juice are covered in the bulletin "Home Canning of Fruits and Vegetables," which may be obtained free of charge from the Dominion Department of Agriculture of Ottawa.

Following are some tested recipes for fresh tomatoes recommended by the experts.

Garnish—

1/4 cup whipping cream prepared horseradish
First layer—Mix tomatoes, onion, and seasonings with chicken stock. Simmer 20 minutes. Strain through wet cheesecloth. Add gelatine which has been soaked in cold water. Stir into large shallow pan which has been greased lightly or rinsed in cold water. Mixture should fill pan to a depth of one inch. Chill until set and add second layer.

Second layer—Heat bouillon to boiling point. Add gelatine which has been soaked in cold water. Stir until thoroughly dissolved. Cool and pour over first layer. Chill until set.

To serve, cut in cubes or ribbons and garnish with cream which has been whipped and seasoned to taste with prepared horseradish and salt. Yield: six servings.

CUCUMBER CREOLE

2 large cucumbers (approx. 8-9 inches long)
1/4 cup milk-flavored fat
3 cups chopped fresh tomatoes OR 2 cups canned tomatoes
2 green peppers (cut in thin strips)
salt and pepper to taste

Wash and pare cucumbers. Cut in quarters lengthwise and remove seeds. Cut in fingers about 1/2"x3". Melt fat in pan and saute cucumber until browned. Remove to serving dish and keep warm.

Add tomatoes and green pepper to pan, cover and cook slowly 15 minutes. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Pour over hot cucumbers and serve. Yield: six servings.

HOW CAN I ???

By ANNE ASHLEY

Q. How can I make a good toilet perfume?

A. A good toilet perfume can be made by mixing two ounces of alcohol with one-half ounce oforris root. Keep in abottle, tightly corked, and shake well before using.

Q. How can I bleach a scorched spot?

A. Rub the spot immediately with a cloth dipped in diluted peroxide. Then run the iron over it and it will be as white as originally. Do not use this method on colored material.

Q. How can I test eggs for freshness?

A. Place the egg in a pan of water. If fresh, it will lie on its side. If a few days old, it will tilt upwards. If stale, it will float.

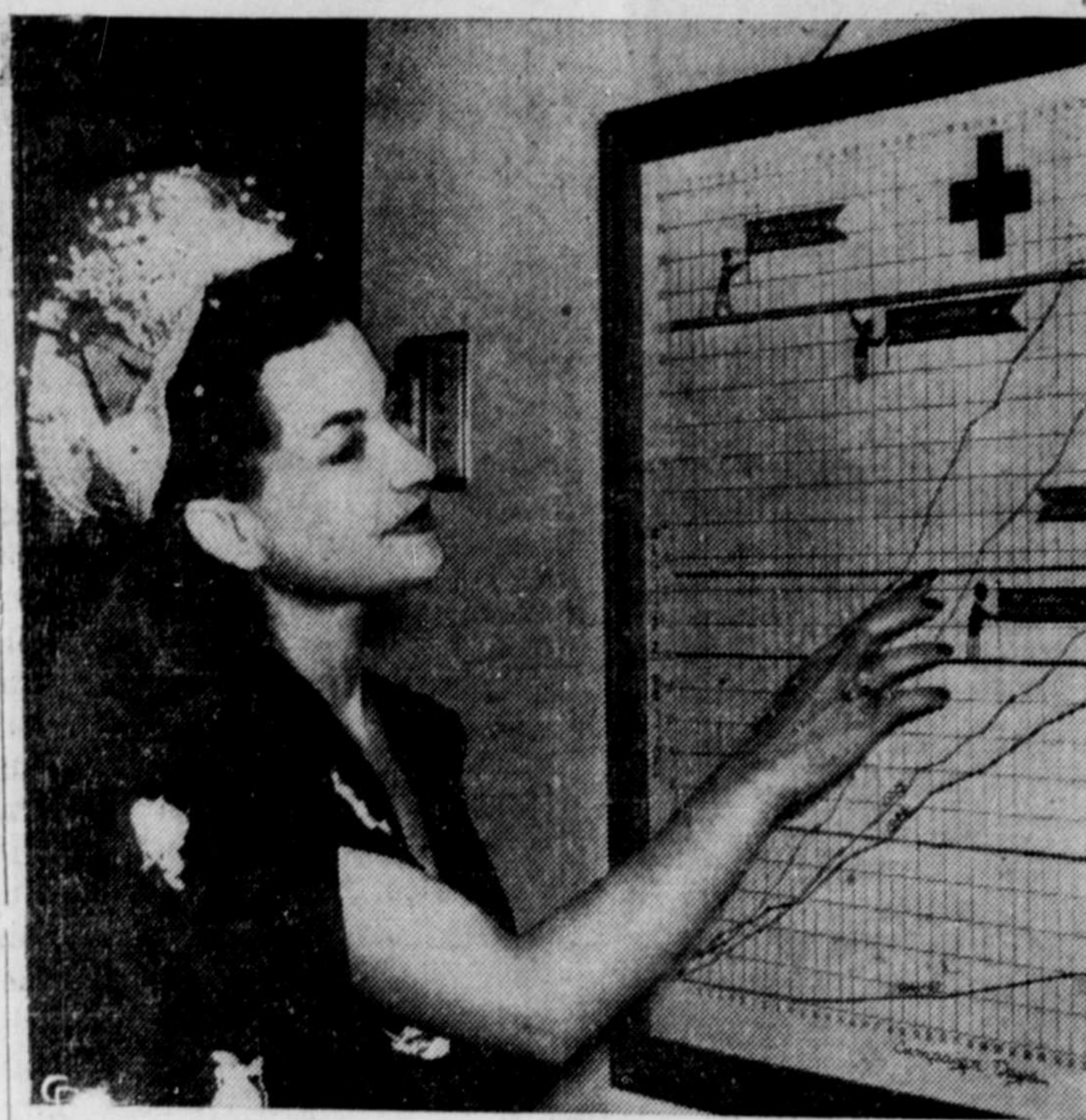

Mr. Alder still has business interests in the city and is a frequent visitor here. It is 38 years, he recalled, since he made his first trip to Prince Rupert. Most of his life he has been interested in real estate and it was he who built the first house in the city after the sale of lots across Third Avenue from the News building. The Alder Block on the corner of Third Avenue and Sixth Street was erected in 1909 and was one of the first commercial buildings to be completed.

Mr. Alder will remain in Prince Rupert for a week during which time he hopes to make a trip over the highway.

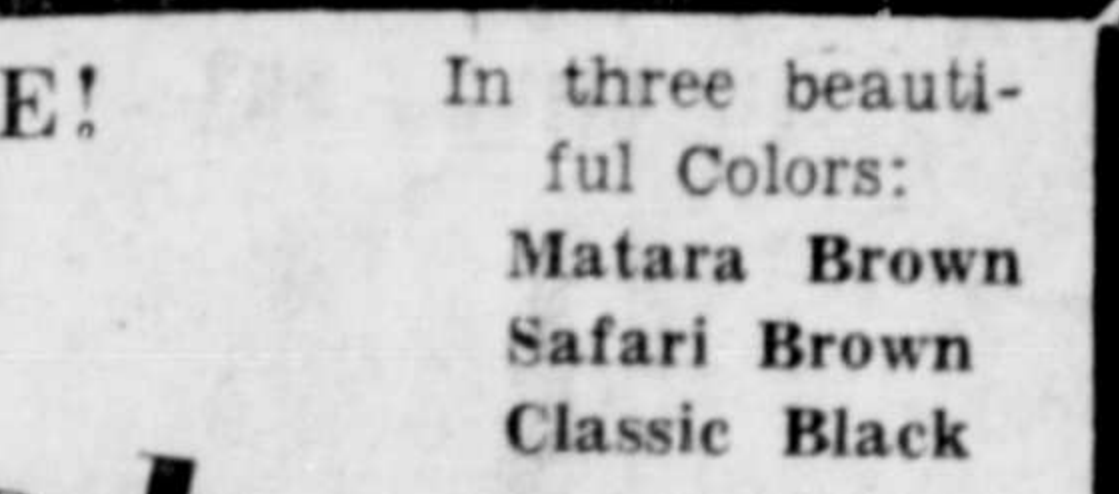
REFORM PENAL SYSTEM
