

The world is a pretty fair place to be in, despite the professional reformers. Get the right slant, and it is quite possible that millions of folks are happy and prospering. Anyway, if that is the viewpoint from which one looks, the chances are he may not be so far out in reality.

#### CHLORINATION

ECISION to return to the use of chlorinated Water appears to have aroused but languid interest in Prince Rupert. The Medical Health Officer's recommendation has been adopted by the city in a casting vote and there it is. Some consumers say they do not relish the flavor. Others say they are unaware of difference in taste, or of feeling any ill effect. The object, all sublime, is to safeguard the public health. So be it!

#### BRAZIL

T IS PERHAPS not generally known that Brazil, from which country President Truman has just returned home, is larger than continental United States. The American chief executive and party have been in Rio de Janeiro, helping honor an important anniversary, and the occasion was one of great goodwill and success.

Brazil has a population of some 50 million. Railways total more than 20,000 miles. The climate is tropical with heavy rainfalls. In exports, coffee, to Brazil, is what wheat is to Canada.

Rio de Janeiro is one of the world's outstanding cities, with a population of approximately 2,000,000 and a harbor of surpassing beauty and utility.

Yes, the Western Hemisphere has more than North America.

### "DOLLAR SHORTAGE"

MAT IS KNOWN as the "dollar shortage" is VV occupying United Nations statesmanship just now. Sometimes John Public has only a vague understanding of what a problem or policy is or what it's all about. But he comprehends this one all right. He realizes, with crystal clearness, what it means. At least he thinks he does. It is put, rather boldly and has many thorny features not suggested in the phrasing. "Dollar Shortage" is correct, as far as it goes, but that's only the beginning.

### ILLITERACY INEXCUSABLE

T IS NOT AN unusual experience still to discover someone unable to read or write. This illiteracy is not confined to age or sex. Perhaps there is an acceptable explanation but it would have to be good. There seems little excuse for one growing to maturity in Canada today without being able to read or write. And if one comes to Canada, ill equipped so far as even the rudiments of education are concerned, he or she need not remain that way. The cost of education to tax payers in Canada is heavy. And Canada wants something to show for her money.

### JONES BILL OUT?

ALL INDICATIONS POINT to the Jones Bill 17 being on the way out, so far as Northern British Columbia and Prince Rupert are concerned: Already, American Senators are moving in that direction. By reason of the bill, which has been functioning for many years, both Alaska and this port have lost a lot. The time is long overdue for each to put more aggressiveness into natural advan-





Taking the average of many asseys on tomato juice and tomatoes canned it is found that a five-ounce glass of juice or 2/3 cup (five and a third ounces) of canned tomatoes, would provide approximately 1/3 of the daily requirement of ascorbic acid. So tomatoes pay dividends not only when served raw, but when served canned or as tomato juice.

Home economists recommend home canning of tomatoes, which because of their acidity do not require such long processing times as other non-acid vegetables. Complete directions for canning tomatoes and tomato juice are covered in the bulletin "Home Canning of Fruits and Vegetables," which may be obtained free of charge from the Dominion Department of Agriculture of Ottawa.

Following are some tested recipes for fresh tomatoes recommended by the experts.
