## Cool Toward Wholesale Emigration

LONDON, (CP)—Australian and Canadian suggestions that those Dominions each would like to add about 12,000,000 people to their present populations have caused a notable lack of enthusiasm in the United Kingdom.

British government spokesmen never say they oppose emigration. Official statements in the Commons reiterate that Britain is always glad to see people of the Commonwealth moving about, carrying on the old traditions in new lands and developing understanding among bits of far-flung territories with one kin.

But in practice, the average Briton is made to feel his place is at home where he can help carry the United Kingdom through trying times by work of his hands or brain. Labor Minister Isaacs must have echoed Winston Churchill's words when he said he was shocked to hear that 800,000 Britons had applied to emigrate to the Dominions.

Churchill invited these would-be travellers to "stay here and fight it out—do not desert the Old Land. We cannot spare you."

Despite present walls about shortage of labor and the need of every hand, many economists believe that Britain would be better off in normal times with far fewer people. The present population of England, Wales and Scotland is more than 44,000,000 compared with 2,000,000 in 1811.

Large-scale movements of British people, plus recruitments of hundreds of thousands of new settlers from Europe, can change the whole aspect of the Commonwealth. A heavy drain of emigration could result in the United Kingdom ceasing to be the most powerful single unit of the Commonwealth. In such an event she would want to be sure that she was relieved of some responsibilities such as the major load of Commonwealth defence now carried.

NIAGARA FALLS (CP)—A killer with a rifle apparently bent on robbery, yesterday shot and killed 56-year-old John Bell on the threshold of suburban Stamford Township home, and today police sought two youths for questioning in the slaying. ## Convicted Chinese Death

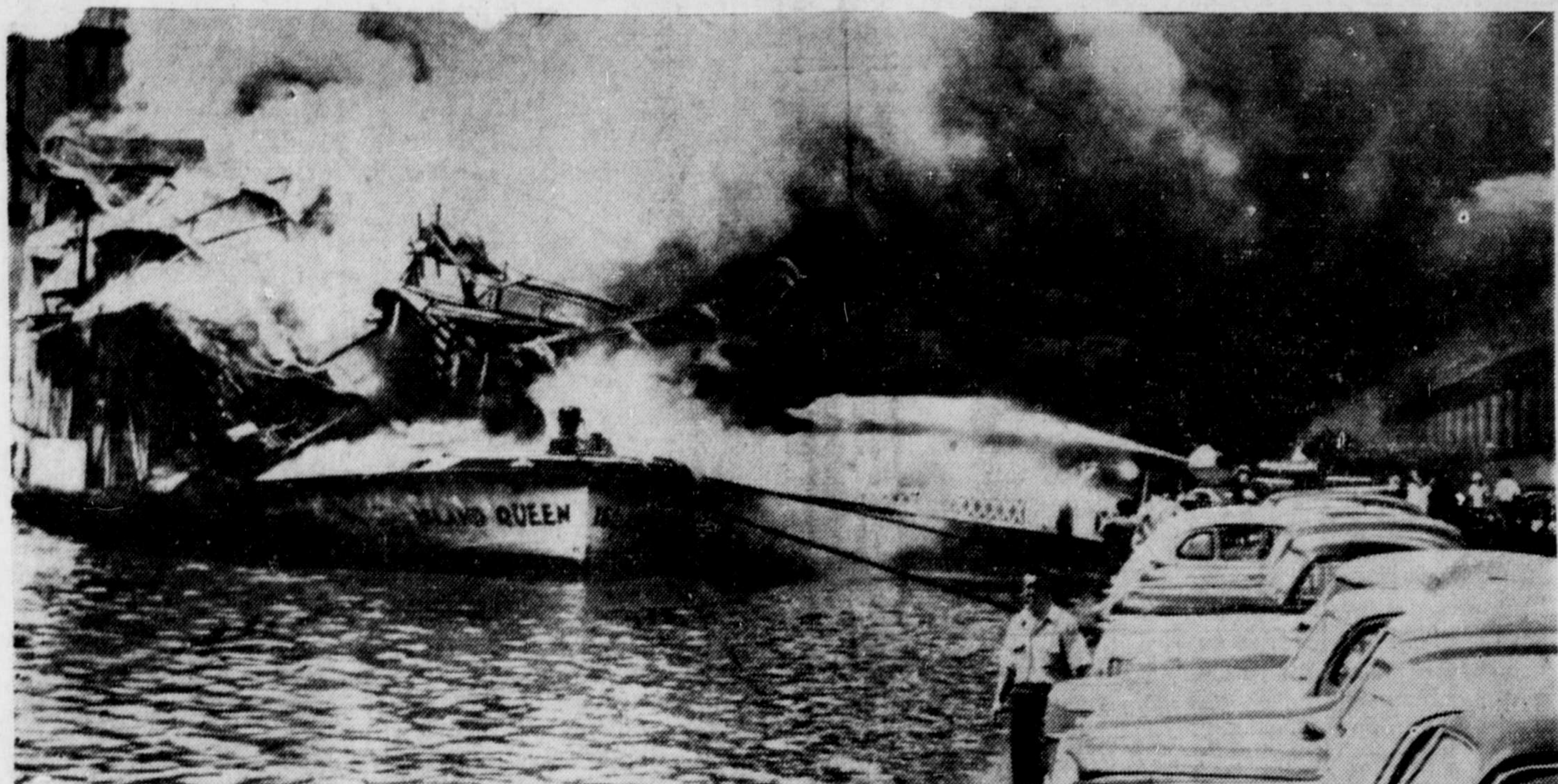
OVER, (CP)—Elinor Eva, 31, was convicted of murder in Assize Court yesterday in connection with the death on June 17 of a fish cannery foreman who, she was charged, was fatally beaten in a fight with her. She was released on bail until the end of the sentence.

## FISH MORE THAN 50 PER CENT

Substantially higher catches of fish on the coast and much lower prices were reported by the Bureau of Statistics. The 50,000,000 pounds of fish caught in B.C. waters, including landings 75 per cent greater than last year, will benefit the fish industry accounting for 84,500,000 pounds—50 per cent of its total value last year.

## EXCURSION BOAT AFIRE AFTER BLAST IS FATAL TO ESTIMATED 21



Firemen playing their hoses on the fiercely blazing river excursion boat Island Queen following the explosion at Pittsburgh, Pa., in which an estimated 21 persons lost their lives. The ship exploded while at its dock in the Ohio River. Though the craft normally carries a crew of 96, police said most of the crewmen were ashore at the time of the blast. It is believed the blast was caused by oil drums exploding in the ship's engine room.

### Post Reward for Finding Body

SUNNYSIDE CANNERY—The Klispix Indian band, through Silas Johnson of Sunnyside, has offered a reward of \$50 for information leading to the discovery of the body of five-year old Perry Wilson, who is believed to have drowned in the Skeena River at Haysport on September 11.

The child is believed to have fallen from his father's gillnet boat near Haysport. The father, Edward Wilson, in an apparent attempt to rescue the boy, also lost his life. His body was recovered.

### WANTS JAPANESE TREATY SPEEDED

OTTAWA (CP)—Defence Minister Claxton said Wednesday on his return from a Commonwealth conference in Canberra on the Japanese peace treaty that the Canadian government hoped settlement can be achieved as soon as possible to permit Japan to resume trade with other countries, including Canada.

"Until we get the Pacific area trading again, there cannot be prosperity and true peace," he said.

### NO B.C. MAN AT MEAT PARLEY

VICTORIA, (CP)—Premier Hart said last night that he would not send a representative to the conference scheduled for Friday by Premier Drew of Ontario to discuss the Dominion-wide packers strike.

Hart said that the province had already agreed to accept as a conciliator any officer appointed to negotiate on a national scale, and could not see the point of sending a representative to the Toronto conference.

Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Quebec and New Brunswick all said they would send representatives.

### Loyalty Check Thought "Cheque"

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Somewhere in Georgia young lady heard that the government is making a loyalty check of its employees.

But she apparently got a garbled version, because she wrote the Treasury: "I understand the government is to give loyalty cheques to its employees."

"I think we deserve them. I worked for the War Department two years during the war and I had an excellent efficiency rating during that period."

"Please don't overlook me when the government starts to hand out those cheques."

The government didn't give out the girl's name.

### 80 PURCHASE WARTIME HOMES

Faith in the future of Prince Rupert and a feeling that a War-time house is a good buy under the terms offered by the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation seems to be indicated in the rush of tenants to become home owners.

More than 80 of the 422 war-time homes available to purchase have been sold with everything taken care of except the final approvals from Ottawa. It is just three weeks since the houses were put up for sale and there is no slackening in the flow of enquiries from prospective buyers.

### PINK SALMON EXPORT EASED

OTTAWA, (CP)—The Fisheries Department Wednesday paved the way for the export of pink salmon to any part of the world because the run this year assured adequate supplies for home consumption.

The export permit branch announced that starting today, permits for export to any destination of pink salmon, fresh, frozen, salted or smoked will be issued freely.

### Trieste Strike Communist-Led

TRIESTE, Free Territory, (CP)—Radio Trieste announced that an organization called Sindicati Uniti had called a general strike in Trieste and the British-American government had promptly declared the action was the first Communist attempt to hamper the essential life of Trieste and bring discredit to the week-old free territory.

### MUST KEEP UP PRODUCTION

HAMILTON, (CP)—Labor Minister Humphrey Mitchell Wednesday bluntly told Canadian workers that they must produce more if they want increased wages.

He urged 700 delegates attending the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada at the opening of its annual convention that labor must keep production up despite shortened hours or other concessions it might win.

### INCOME TAX CUT SEEN COMING

TORONTO, (CP)—A reduction in luxury and income taxes in the next federal budget was predicted in an Ottawa dated story carried by the Toronto Star Wednesday. The story said that reduced income taxes would account for about half the reduction in taxes that is coming.

## Western Powers Must Convince Russians of Desire for Peace

VICTORIA (CP)—Russia's distrust and suspicion of the western powers is a real fear, and Canadians and Canadian newspapers should try and convince the Soviet Union that this fear is unfounded, Senator Grey Turgeon said today in an address to the annual convention of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association here.

The Liberal senator from B.C. urged Canadians to tell the Soviet Union and the countries of eastern Europe that "We do not want war."

An essential domestic action which Canada can take is to "make happy people in a nation which cannot be led astray by propagandists whose desire is to change our system into communism Canada could achieve this by removing the threat of depression, and fear of economic insecurity."

He asserted that workers had the right to strike, but not for purely political purposes.

### TRIESTE SHIP STRIKE ENDED

TRIESTE (CP)—The general strike which paralyzed shipping in the port of Trieste for 24 hours, ended today. The Allied military government in the new territory announced an arrangement to call off the strike had been reached at midnight.

The conference was attended by A. M. G. officials leaders of the Sindicati Uniti, which ordered the work stoppage, and the moderate non-communist Camera Fel Lavoro which had refused to participate in the strike.

### EVATT CHAIRMAN U.N. COMMITTEE

LAKE SUCCESS (CP)—Dr. Herbert V. Evatt, Australian secretary for External Affairs, today was elected chairman of the special United Nations Assembly committee on Palestine.

Meanwhile, in the Security Council, Poland proposed formally that the council give blanket approval to applications of Italy, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria and Finland for membership in the U.N. The five are ex-enemy powers covered by the new peace treaty which went into effect last week.

Dr. Evatt expressed reluctance to taking the Palestine committee chairmanship saying that he believed the chairmanship should come from a country outside the British Commonwealth, since Palestine is governed by Britain under mandate of the League of Nations.

### Fined Heavily On Liquor Charge

PORT EDWARD (CP)—George Bird of Cassiar cannery was fined \$75 with an option of 45 days in jail on each of three charges when he was found guilty in police court here of supplying intoxicants to Indians.

Falling to pay the fines, totaling \$225, Bird must spend 135 days, four and a half months, in jail.

### HEROIC TERRACE BOY 'SLIGHTLY IMPROVED' TODAY

Condition of 15-year-old Roy Clifford, of Terrace, who was badly burned when he carried his three-year-old brother through flames which destroyed their home Tuesday night was described this morning as "slightly improved."

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Clifford, of Terrace, he was burned about the head back and arms when he dashed up a burning stairway to rescue his brother Billy, when their home caught fire from an unknown cause.

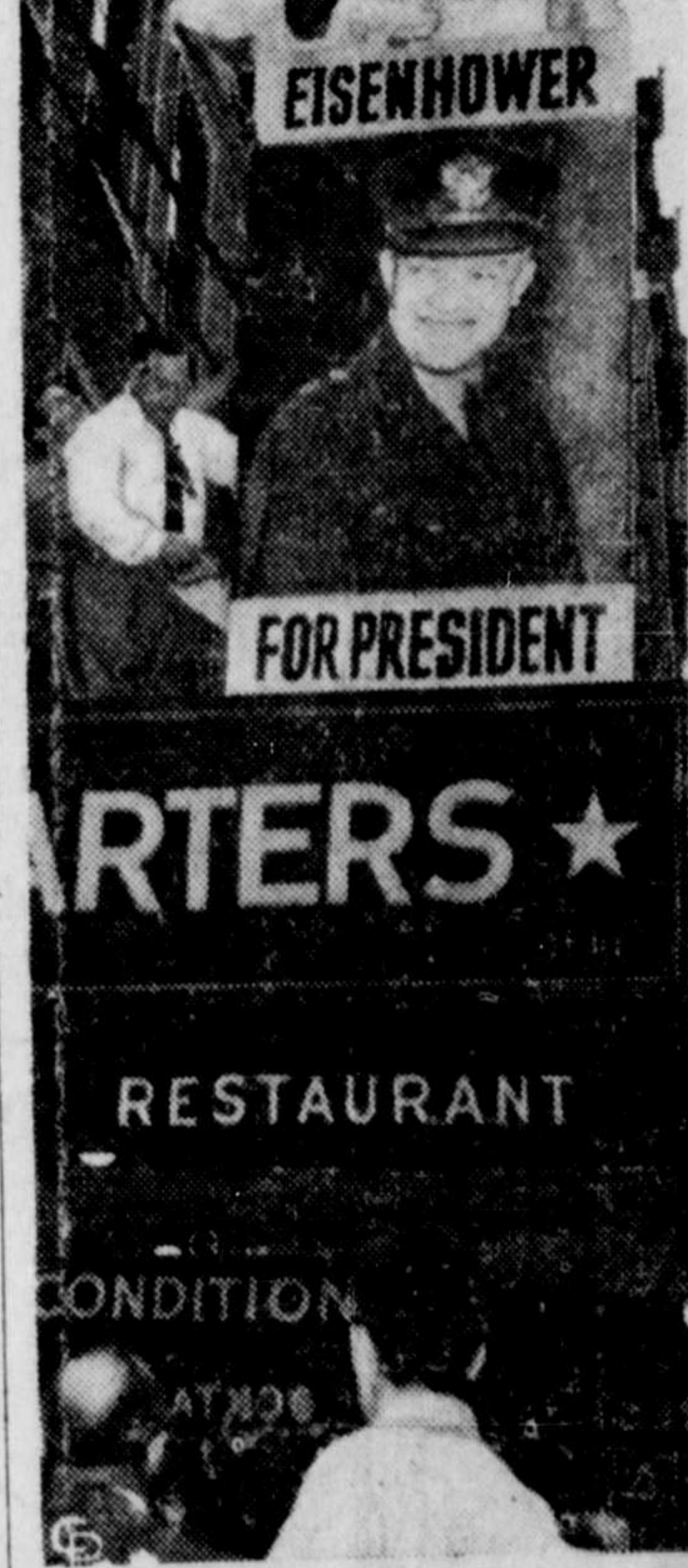
Billy succumbed to first-degree burns shortly after arriving at Prince Rupert General Hospital following a 90-mile trip by car.

An inquest into his death will be held at Prince Rupert, Coroner M. M. Stephens said Wednesday afternoon.

Billy was in bed in an upstairs room and Roy was reading in the kitchen at 9 o'clock Tuesday night when fire swept the home. The parents had gone to the theatre, leaving the 15-year-old boy in charge.

The third Clifford boy Teddy, aged nine, was playing outside. He saw the flames and turned in the alarm.

The house was levelled despite efforts of the Terrace fire department assisted by volunteers.

## The Public and the Unions

THE CANADIAN INSTITUTE of Public Opinion otherwise known as the Gallup Poll of Canada, recently took a sample poll of the public across the Dominion, and these questions were asked: Do you think communism is a very serious threat, a fairly serious threat, or no threat at all, to our form of government here in Canada?

Thirty-four per cent thought it was a very serious threat, 33 per cent felt it was a fairly serious threat, and the remaining 33 per cent either thought it was no threat at all, or had no opinion.

The poll showed that 67 per cent though it was a threat to the Canadian way of life, and the 34 per cent who thought it was a very serious threat, believed that Communists dominate the Labour unions.

This is a very powerful warning to unions, when over one third of the population is antagonistic, to labour unions because of Communist domination, as unless the unions win the sympathy of the population to their legitimate aims to better conditions for the workers the cause of the unions is either hopeless, or it precipitates violent disputes with employers during the course of which everybody suffers.

If the argument is used that those who believe that unions are Communist dominated and controlled, belong to the employing or capitalist class, that is ridiculous, for the employing class does not come anywhere near 34 per cent; it is a very much lower percentage.

The Gallup polls work on a marginal basis of error allowance of 3 per cent, and in every poll taken the error margin keeps well within that limit, thus a poll furnished an almost accurate reflection of public opinion. But it isn't any wonder why a large section of the general public believes that unions are Communist controlled, when it observes some of the methods used by unions in disputes with employers, and reckless disregard for others' rights.

In British Columbia there is a new labor law, providing for the regulating of employer-employee relations in that province. Certain procedure must be used before a strike can be authorized. Heavy penalties are set in case of an illegal strike, up to a maximum of fifty dollars fine per day for each worker on strike.

On June 9 a Canadian Congress of Labor Laundry Workers Union went on strike illegally; twenty-two women workers were convicted and fined, one dollar fine, and one dollar costs. Encouraged by this very low penalty, a large wood workers union now announces through its national director that it intends to disregard the law, and will pay no attention to it in connection with the union's relations with the employers. In effect the director said they were going to use union methods, law or no law, and the union would go its own way in an emergency dispute.

This is sheer defiance of the law; callous disdain for the rights of the public, and a bold and brazen challenge to the authorities. If the Province of British Columbia does not deal firmly with this threat of defiance, then it might just as well hand over the powers of government to these unions, for that in effect is the attitude of the unions. They assume they are bigger than the law, bigger than public rights; only their interests matter and in the defense of democratic self-government, B.C. must teach the truism that law is the cement holding the body politic together, and unions like every other group in the community come under the law or be penalized for its violation, and the rights of other citizens and groups must be protected by the government as the representative of all; against such brazen defiance and flaunting of law, government authority, and citizens' rights.

### CORONER TAKES ISSUE

Editor, Daily News:  
Your news item under the heading "Health Officer Refutes Rider to Jury Verdict" in your issue of September 22 would appear to suggest that the jury had exaggerated conditions found on August 29 last at the Grandview Hotel.

When on August 28 I was notified, as coroner, that a death had occurred at the hotel in question, I found, on arrival not only an unkept room in which Mr. Jardine had died, but an unkept house, to say the least. With the help of the two officers then in the house I tried in vain to contact the medical health officer and the sanitary inspector to report conditions. Both I believe were out of the city.

The death was reported August 28; the inquest was held August 29. That conditions had not improved since the reporting of the death was attested by the signatures of six good men and true—chosen as jurors by, or under the direction of Sgt. Potterton. The inspection referred to as having been made by the Health Officer, Sanitary Inspector and the Sergeant was made on September 5, a whole week after the finding of the jury and the publication of the verdict. Surely ample time was given to prepare for this inspection. I am advised by the City Clerk that "in view of this report, no action has been taken by the council."

But Sgt. Potterton goes further and according to your report which I quote: "Sgt. Potterton reported that this room was cluttered and unkept the day the death was reported but that on the same day he had inspected other rooms in the building and found them as clean as at the present inspection." May I ask, did the Sergeant inspect the hall leading from the front door to the stairs, the stairs and the long hall between the rooms upstairs? Did he inspect the toilet upstairs with its door standing wide open both on the 28 and 29, with its litter and dirt? Was there a light of any kind other than the little daylight through small windows at either end of the hall? Is he so deficient in the senses both of sight and smell that he believed the place to be clean?

If the Grandview Hotel has been brought into a sanitary condition then the object of the jury has been attained. None, I believe had any "axe to grind," and judgment may well be left to the people of Prince Rupert, to decide whether the credit is due the jury named below, or any official of the city for any improvement made. Certainly the members of the jury should be commended for their public-spiritedness. We need those men and more like them. They are: Don Forward, foreman; R. E. Benson, Peter McCormack, Verne Moore, Joseph Delinks, Thomas Pesut.

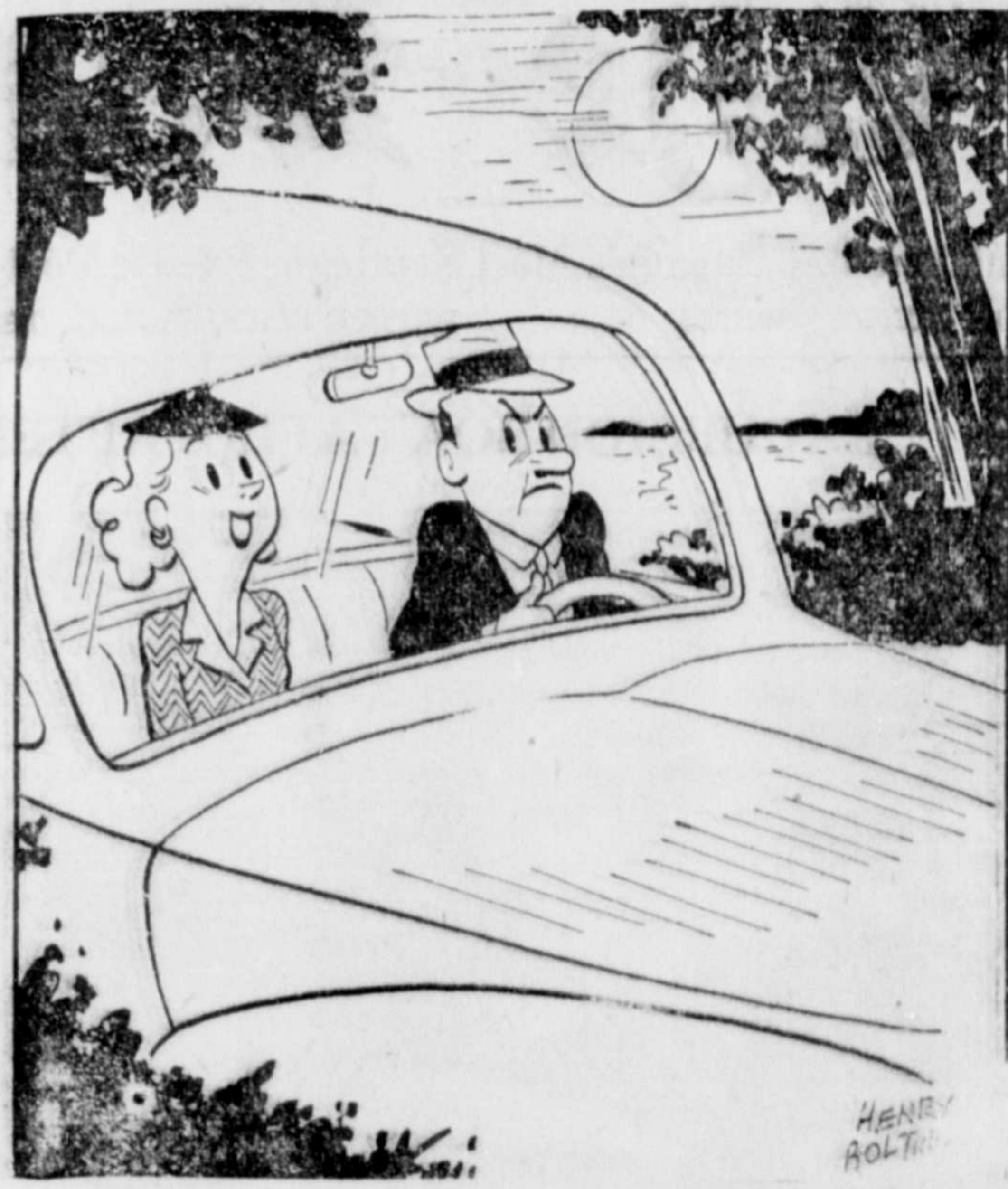

### Next Six Months May be Decisive For Democracy in Troubled Italy

ROME (AP)—Sovereign at last since her peace treaty became effective Sept. 15, now faces on her own the supreme test of her capacity for orderly self-government by democratic processes.

Wednesday Premier De Gasperi was called to account for his stewardship when left-winger Pietro Nenni's motion of no-confidence came up for debate in the constituent assembly. If he survives this test as seems likely, he must still look forward to turbulent times thereafter.

Events of the next six or seven months culminating in the election of the first National Assembly under the new constitution, may be decisive.

The outcome will be fateful not only for Italy, but for the world for this country along with Greece has become a political arena in which the giants of the east and west are testing their strength.

In Italy the Communists have their first opportunity to show whether they can win power constitutionally in a country not occupied by Russian troops. Italy also may be virtually the last barrier to the spread of Soviet domination to the shores of the Atlantic. A Communist triumph here could create the condition for a similar advance in France which would place the hammer and sickle in the ascendant from Vladivostok to Bordeaux.

In Italy's internal struggle, the propagandists are Premier Alcide De Gasperi's Christian democrats opposed by the leftist coalition of Communists and pro-Communist Socialists which De Gasperi ousted from his government four months ago.

The Christian democrat leader is waging his battle on two fronts. While he combats the Communist campaign to upset his government, he must fight also to save Italy from national bankruptcy.

Italy's dollar funds will be exhausted by Jan. 1 and so, too, will be her wheat supply. Beyond that date the government's main hope lies in emergency aid which might be provided by a special session of the United States Congress.

The only alternative, apparently, is the possibility of aid from Russia's bumper wheat crop which conceivably might be offered on the political condition that the Communists be invited back into the government.

In the fierce political debate there were many unfinished buildings. It is a pleasant little city now.

now in progress, De Gasperi has the firmer position on the foreign policy issue. The Communists are more effective in the field of domestic economy.

The government's policy of co-operation with the western powers and especially with the United States gives De Gasperi's adversaries scant ground for convincing criticism. The leftists grumble about American "intervention" in Italy's internal affairs, but they do not tell their followers it is better to suffer cold and hunger than to accept American dollars. They have nothing comparable to offer from their Soviet mentors.

On the economic issue, however, the leftists have De Gasperi's government at a disadvantage. Living costs have advanced 50 fold since 1938. In the same period, unskilled workers' wages have risen 36 fold, skilled workers' 26 fold and white collar workers' 19 fold.

In less than a year the price of meat has nearly doubled, the price of spaghetti is up 350 per cent of rationed bread more than 100 per cent.

vinced of its importance. He is also impressed with the fine weather Prince Rupert greeted him with, like many others he has heard that it rains in this area.

Dr. Carter showed the party around the local fisheries plants Wednesday. He accompanied them when they left by train for Vancouver last night. Dr. Carter will return to Vancouver from Jasper either directly by train or by way of Prince Rupert.

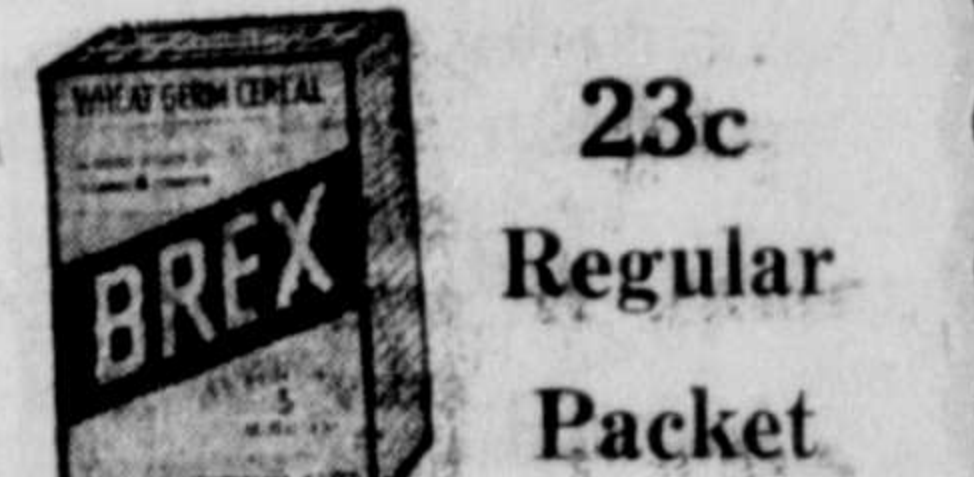

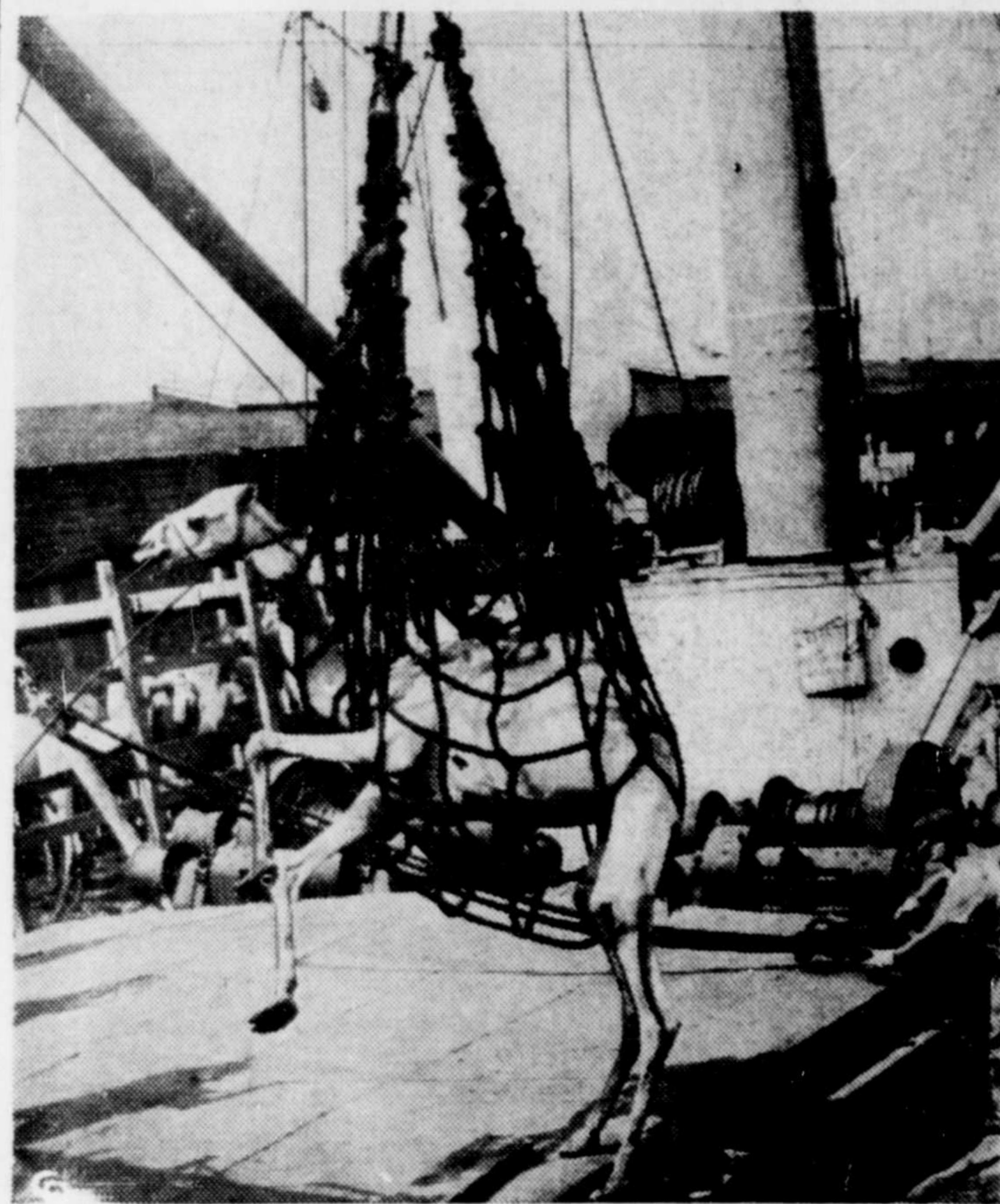

Naturally his own arrangement of the folksong was the first number he recorded for RCA Victor, for whom he records exclusively. Coupled with this traditional folk-song handed down from generation to generation in the rich farmlands of the Ukrainian, is a "Caucasian Melody" which describes the simple joys of life among the shepherds of the Caucasus. Gorin, incidentally, is a composer in good standing with the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers on records. He is also responsible for the arrangement of "Kasbek" another Caucasian folk song.

Gorin's most recent recorded releases have, however, been devoted to popular classics from the "light" repertoire. These include a coupling of "Play Gypsies, Dance Gypsies" from Kalmán's operetta "Countess Maritza." With his close friend Albert Hay Malotte's "Song of the Open Road" from the R.K.O. film "El Gaucho."

Then there is Victor Herbert's "Thing Alone" from "Eileen" coupled on another 10-inch Red Seal single with one of the late Vincent Youmans' tenderest melodies, "Through the Years." For all these records, the Victor Orchestra was expertly conducted by Maximilian Pilzer.

The range of Gorin's recorded repertoire is almost as large as that from which his programs are normally assembled for his coast-to-coast concert tours, since Albert Hay Malotte's famous "The Lord's Prayer" is listed, along with the same composer's musical settings for "The Beautitudes," "The Twenty-Third Psalm," "The Pledge to the Flag" and two songs-"Among the Living" and "My Friend"-for which the composer accompanied Gorin at the piano in person.

These are matched in Victor's catalogue of "The Music America Loves Best" by a number of operatic arias from "The Barber of Seville," Moussorgsky's "Khorovodchik," Leoncavallo's "Pagliacci" and a scene and aria "From the Immortal Summit"

Molecules 'Battle' Without Touching In Amazing Discovery by Scientist

NEW YORK. (AP) - At the Rockefeller Institute for medical research, Dr. Alexandre Rothen put a wall between some disease-fighting molecules and their enemies-and made an amazing discovery. Nothing was supposed to happen but these two chemicals reacted or battled through the wall without ever touching each other. The molecules showed an unsuspected power of "long-distance" influence.

It was about as surprising as if two automobiles, separated by the grassy strip of a dual highway, suddenly showed collision damage without coming into contact.

It always has been thought that molecules had to be in contact to react. Dr. Rothen's discovery is a fundamental new principle of potentially great importance in biology, chemistry and physics.

Molecules are collections or families of two or more atoms. Thus a molecule of water is two atoms of hydrogen and one of oxygen. Most individual molecules are much too tiny to see. But if ordinary molecules were the size of BB shot, the big ones would be the size of tennis balls or larger. These big ones were

the kind Dr. Rothen is studying. So far, they are the only ones found to possess this strange ability to inter-act even when separated.

In immunity studies, Dr. Rothen was working with antigens and antibodies. Antigens are substances which are parts of the disease-causing agent. They stimulate the body to produce antibodies which will fight the disease by reacting with the antigens.

CHRISTIANITY IS FLOURISHING WORLD FORCE

Christianity is flourishing in the dawn of a new day, not sinking in the dying twilight of one that is past, Dr. Hugh Dobson, Associate Secretary of Social Service and Evangelism told an open session of the Prince Rupert Presbytery of the United Church last night.

Dr. Dobson accompanied his lecture before an audience composed of clerical and lay delegates and local congregation members with lantern slide illustrations of the vast variety of Christian work going on in Canada and foreign countries.

Dr. Dobson viewed the Church as being at the threshold of a new day, which promises expanding recognition of spiritual values.

"Because of its critical attitude toward its own works, the church has been purified," he said. "Communion within the Church today means more than it ever did in the past."

He declared that Prince Rupert is the hub of a zone which extends as far as the "troubled shores of Asia" and described it as "down south" in emphasizing its central location.

"It is a hub, not an outpost in the world arena," he asserted.

"We must face the day, not with dirges, but with a Hallelujah Chorus if we are to enter it with a spirit appropriate to the Christian Church," he said.

Cyclist Collides With Parked Truck

R. Schaeffer was taken to hospital Wednesday after his motorcycle collided with a parked, city-owned truck on Shawatlans road. He suffered cuts on his chin, above his left eye and a bruised leg.

The truck was parked at the roadside waiting for the city grader to pass when Schaeffer rounded a curve. He succeeded in easing the collision by skidding the motorcycle before it crashed into the truck.

JASPER—Bing Crosby has just returned here from a two-week hunting trip along the northern boundary of Jasper National Park. His trophies included mountain sheep, mountain goat and moose, a growth of whiskers and a deep tan.

Fresh from his victory in the annual Totem Pole Golf Tournament at Jasper, Bing left September 8 with three hunter friends from the United States and outfitter Stan Kitchen. The pack train of 35 horses headed into the hunting country from Brule, then wound through Eagle's Nest Pass and the Wild Bay River, then to the Muskeg headwaters and along the Snake Indian to Devons.

Dr. Arnold Stevens of Beverly Hills, Calif., and two hunters from Elko, Nevada, Newton Crumley and John Oldham, all bagged moose and mountain goat but Bing was sole boaster of a mountain sheep trophy, prized bighorn of the Rockies.

Outfitter Kitchen described the Crosby party as one of the most congenial he had ever guided, with the crooner's tireless good humor setting the pace. He recalled the day Bing and he were caught in a sudden high country blizzard which whipped over the mountain they were climbing and forced them to seek the questionable shelter of a rock slab. Dusted snow from his collar and rifle, pounding his hands for warmth, Crosby turned to Kitchen. "Only one thing I could ask for," he shouted above the storm, "I'd give up my chance for a bighorn if Bob Hope were up here with us."

Leaving his trophies in Canada for mounting, Bing is now motoring homeward. The remainder of the party took off from Jasper airport Wednesday in Mr. Crumley's Beechcraft to fly direct to Nevada.

### Franco Plans Revival of Spanish Titles

MADRID, (AP)—Lt. Gen. Jose Mescardo, who won fame as defender of the Alcazar of Toledo in the first year of the Spanish Civil War, is expected to be one of the first to receive a title when Generalissimo Franco assumes the royal prerogative of creating Spanish nobles. Speculation on the new dukes, marquesses, counts and barons overshadows discussion of the political effect of the regime's latest move. By the Franco law of succession, Spain already is a kingdom without a king. Now, for the first time noble titles will be awarded without benefit of a king. Generally, the regime's action is seen as a subtle but effective thrust designed to end once and for all the political power of the so-called monarchist party as an opposition to Franco. has been divided into Carlists and Bourbons who, with their non-titled partisans, fought the 100-year wars of succession. This schism was almost healed by the death of the last legitimate Carlist pretender and monarchists from both factions joined in the civil war.

### 3 MINISTERS WELCOMED BY PRESBYTERY

Three ministers who have been added to the force of the United Church in the vast area of central British Columbia were welcomed at the opening session of the Prince Rupert Presbytery Wednesday afternoon.

Rev. Arthur Lawton, B.A., D.D., who came from Simcoe County, Ontario, as a volunteer for Indian work in this province, has taken up duties at the historic mission at Port Simpson.

Already, he has made a deep impression on the villagers, as attested by a comment by one of the older residents.

"Our new minister is the talk of the town. Everybody is going to church."

Rev. Stuart H. Forbes, veteran of 26 years of fruitful mission work in China, has accepted a call to Ocean Falls. Formerly in the Kootenays, he rendered valuable service in the wider interests of the church as chairman of the Presbytery, convener of Home Missions, and chairman of the conference committee on Overseas Missions.

With the experience of pastors in the mining camps of Pioneer and Bralorne, as well as Port Langley in the Fraser Valley behind him, Rev. Clinton Johnson, B.A. has recently taken over at Smithers, which for a year, was without an ordained minister.

By recent action of the British Columbia conference, the pastoral charge of Smithers was transferred recently from Cariboo to Prince Rupert. Rev. R. A. Wilson, chairman of the Prince Rupert Presbytery, officially welcomed the Smithers congregation. Mrs. F. V. Foster is lay delegate.

Two representatives of the general boards of the church are present and took part in today's discussions. They are Rev. Hugh Dobson, D.D., western secretary of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service, and Rev. W. P. Bunt, Superintendent of Missions for British Columbia.

### Jet Propulsion Fast But Costly

MONTREAL (AP)—Jet propulsion will get you where you want to go in a hurry but it will cost you a lot of money to reach there.

That is the word from Donald L. Mordell new associate professor of mechanical engineering at McGill University, who worked during the war at the Rolls-Royce plant in Derby England, on development of the much-talked-about gas turbine.

Flying time from Montreal to London could be halved by use of gas turbine propulsion, said Prof. Mordell but the cost would go up because of the greatly added, power required to drive a plane through the air at the much increased speed.

However there is a saving in the number of work hours gained and the McGill professor said he believed there will be many persons who will want to make an overnight flight to London and return the following night after completing their business.

### BRITONS MOURN 'LOST WEEK-END'

By JOHN DAUPHINEE LONDON, (AP)—That famous institution "The British week-end" seems likely to become a "Lost Week-end" for Londoners as the country returns to wartime conditions in the campaign to save dollars.

"It's going to be so uncomfortable getting out of town that only the more hardy will think the game worth the candle."

Before the war the institution known as the week-end was a source of amazement to foreigners, whether the "long" week-end from Friday afternoon to Monday or the "short" one from Saturday afternoon. As the Evening News tidily put it, "some have found in it the hidden source of our strength; others have seen it as a sign of our frivolity and decadence."

But the war changed the situation. Servicemen and many thousands of civilians were on a seven-day week and the week-end largely disappeared.

"What affected the traditional week-end then (and will again affect it now)" said the Evening News, "was more than anything else, that nobody could move."
